There is a health program, however, specifically planned to teach 4-H'ers the basic rules for good health, wholesome personal habits, and to safeguard community health. Sponsored by a prominent pharmaceutical firm and supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service, this program enrolls well over 600,000 4-H'ers annually.

Not only do members carry out individual projects suited to individual needs, but local clubs take on community health projects such as assisting with tuberculosis, heart and cancer educational campaigns. In smaller towns, drinking water surveys are often made, safety hazards checked and help is offered to hospitals, old people's homes and to the handicapped.

At the end of the 4-H Club year, members' records are evaluated for progress and outstanding achievements. The Extension staff carefully evaluates the records submitted for county and state competition and awards.

The member who completes the best health project in the entire state will be a delegate to the National Club Congress at Chicago with expenses paid by Eli Lilly. Six nation-winners will be chosen from

among state winners to receive \$500 scholarships.

More than 5,000 4-H members are expected to earn the county 4-H Health medal this year.

To be eligible for state and national awards the boy or girl must be over 14 years of age, and have been a 4-H member for at least three years.

**EASTER SEAL MEET
SET FOR OCT. 27**

Boise — Trustees, members and the staff of the Idaho Society for Crippled Children and Adults will meet in Boise commencing Oct. 27, through Oct. 29, for the annual meeting.

New officers and trustees will be elected. Therapists will report on the activities of each of the Easter Seal Society's five speech and hearing centers in the state, located at Coeur d'Alene, Sandpoint, Lewiston, Boise, Twin Falls and Idaho Falls. Reviews will be given on the past year's activities and services of the Society to handicapped children and adults of Idaho, as well as other Society business to come before the meeting.

Over 4,900 handicapped Idahoans have been helped by the Society this past fiscal year through its diversified services involving speech and hearing centers where individual therapy and evaluations are given; pre-school programs at Boise and Twin Falls for youngsters with speech or hearing handicaps; a case service program of direct aid to the handicapped individuals through financial assistance for transportation

expenses to medical centers for diagnosis and treatment; equipment loan program and provisions for other medical aids, and Camp Easter Seal, a camp especially designed for handicapped youngsters.

**TROY ROAD WORK
GOING FORWARD**

Work on the Troy-Kendrick Highway (State Highway 99) is making some progress despite the lateness of the season. The base oil mat is not laid from Troy to the Lester Clemm ranch near the foot of the old Bethel Hill, and the final hot plant mix has been placed on the road from Troy to past the top of the hill toward Kendrick.

It is regrettable that all the right-of-way has not been obtained so that additional work could be done this fall looking toward completion of this highway.

When the Bethel Hill itself is bypassed, as it will be when the road is completed, there will be an excellent road linking Troy and Kendrick, and on to the county seat.

AGRICULTURE IS MOVING FORWARD

U. of I., Moscow — "Agriculture is on the move in Idaho," so stated James E. Krause, dean and director of the University of Idaho College of Agriculture in a report to the Idaho Agricultural Consulting Council. The council, made up of represen-

tatives of agricultural associations and commodity groups, held its fall meeting at the University over the week-end.

"Reports show that Idaho's on-farm crop cash value has increased materially since 1962. The total increase from 1962 to 1965 was 20 percent. For the first time this figure exceeded one-half billion dollars (in 1965). And these statistics don't include the sizeable figures for processing the products after they

leave the farm," he told the council. Agriculture is changing, however, and will continue to change, he said. "And we must not only keep pace with these changes but be ahead of them if we are to continue to be of service to the people of Idaho by our research, teaching and extension programs."

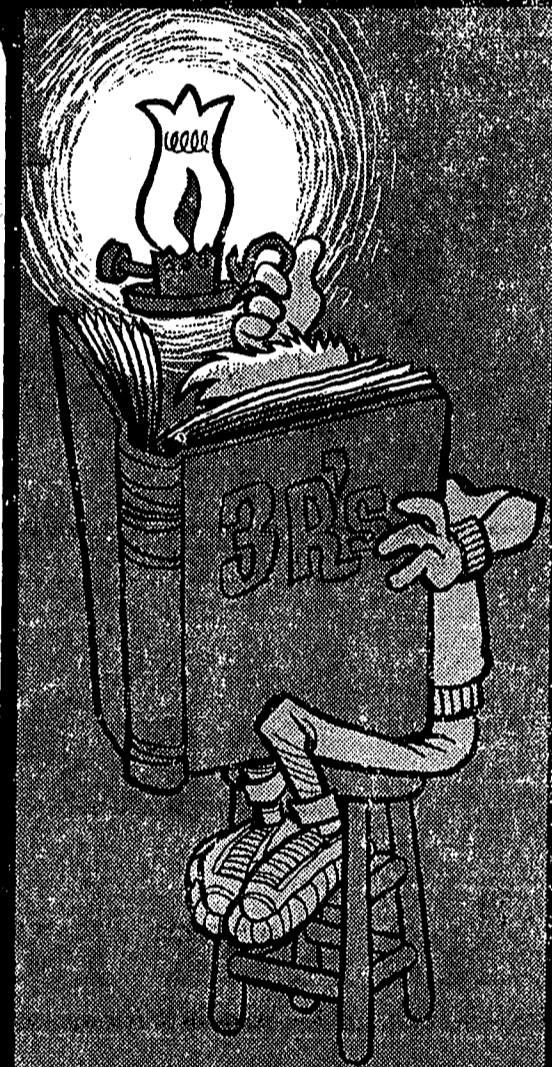

U. OF I. WORKS WITH HIGHWAY DEPT.

U. of I., Moscow - Research from the University of Idaho's Department of Civil Engineering is being translated into direct action by the Idaho Department of Highways, reports Cecil W. Hathaway, associate professor of civil engineering. Several years ago, the highway department, lacking research facilities and personnel of its own, joined with the university in a program of practical study of real problems. "This provided the highway department with the specialized research it needed," Hathaway explained, "and gave the university a solid graduate research program."

To date over \$60,000 has been spent or committed to research by graduate students. The first project was the development of an asphalt pavement air permeameter. This device was constructed by N. C. Pyk, a Norwegian graduate student. The object of the project was to determine by tests with the machine when asphalt paving needed to be recoated. The tests were inconclusive, but the researchers did learn that the longer an asphalt road is in use the less porous it is.

A study of landslides causes was a joint project among the highway department, the university and the U. S. Bureau of Mines. John J. Peebles, another associate professor of engineering co-ordinated this project with a graduate student. The program was to be able to identify ground water flows (seepage) that would produce landslides.

The current problem under investigation is highway maintenance. "It is a rather dull subject," Hathaway pointed out, "but in Idaho 45 per cent of the department's budget, exclusive of Federal funds, goes for maintenance. When you are spending \$7 million a year, there's a big area for research."
