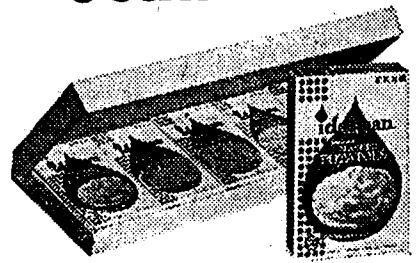

ABOUT MEDICARE

A new procedure will facilitate reimbursement under Medicare for doctor bills paid by or on behalf of a Medicare beneficiary who dies. Dr. Gene Shaw, Social Security District Manager, announced today.

The simplified procedure will make it unnecessary for widows, widowers, or other relatives to arrange for the appointment of a legal representative of a medicare beneficiary's estate simply to collect a medicare payment. In some cases, he said, the legal costs would equal or even exceed the amount of the reimbursement under Medicare. The Social Security District Manager said that where there is no legal representative of the beneficiary's estate, and where none is expected to be appointed, Medicare will make payment to a surviving widow, widower, or other relatives.

THE BALANCE OF NATURE AND TODAY

Until comparatively recent times, food and fiber production consisted mainly of planting and harvesting crops in seasonal cycles. Man learned to live with what he called the balance of nature, but it was a precarious business at best. Finally, as populations expanded, it became obvious that unless man himself wished to become a victim of the balance of nature, methods had to be devised to produce more food and fiber of higher quality.

Those who wonder why the balance of nature has become more of a menace than a help in agriculture are easily answered. In the first place there are nearly 200 million people to be fed daily in the United States. High and continuous production, such as is required today, furnishes an abundant food supply for insects as well as people.

Insects and pests are constantly adapting themselves to our new farming methods, producing species that thrive on the new techniques. Many of the new crop varieties that were bred and selected for high yields are not as resistant to insects and diseases as older varieties. Modern transportation makes it easier for insects and diseases to spread rapidly across the country. There is no longer any question as to whether chemical pesticides should or should not be used by the

farmers and industry.

The only question, and one in which the agricultural chemical manufacturers themselves are deeply involved, is how to ensure safe use of the crop-saving compounds. Pesticide companies and appropriate authorities are cooperating from the local to the national level in a vast educational program aimed at accident prevention and proper application of modern agricultural chemicals — chemicals without which man himself would one day face merciless decimation, as the balance of nature goes its ruthless way.

TAXES OVERLAP

According to Walter Rogers, U. S. Representative from Texas: "One of the important reasons the federal government needs to adopt a greater sense of fiscal responsibility — in curbing excessive spending and holding down the burden of taxation — is that state and local governments also must look to the same citizens for support of their operations. When a clear delineation is lost as to the proper role of federal, state, and local governments ... a clear delineation is also lost as to sources of revenue each level should rely upon."

IDAHO HIGHWAY APPORTIONMENT

Spokane — The State of Idaho has

been apportioned a total of \$28,933,946 in Federal-aid Highway funds for the fiscal year beginning next July 1, David C. Guilbert a member of the AAA's National Highway Committee, announced last week.

Of this amount \$19,872,966 is designated for the Interstate program, and \$9,060,980 for in-state highways. "The Federal-aid highway programs are financed from federal taxes on highway users, which are channeled through the Highway Trust Fund," the official explained. "On interstate projects the Trust Fund pays 90 percent of the project cost, while on the other systems there is a 50-50 matching. The share of each state in the Interstate apportionment is based on an estimate of the cost of completing the system; all other apportionments are based on formulas taking into account such factors as area, population and post-road mileage."

For the nation as a whole, the fiscal year apportionment amounts to a total of \$4.4 billion, with \$3.4 billion for the Interstate system and the other \$1 billion for the remaining roads, often called the ABC system. The \$1 billion apportionment includes \$450 million for the primary system, \$300 million for the secondary system of farm-to-market and feeder roads, and \$250 million for the urban portions of the primary and secondary systems.

ANIMALS DO THINGS

Wash., D. C. — Animals can adapt to environment where fresh water is not available. For example: Whales have kidneys that allow them to drink and dispose of sea water. The sea gull has a special apparatus in its skull for distilling sea water to obtain a supply of fresh water.

LONGER LIFE

Chicago — Among white Americans, the higher a person's family income and level of education, the longer he can expect to live. This general conclusion has been reached by two University of Chicago experts who directed a six-year study of 340,000 Americans who died between May and August. The study was designed to weigh the effects of various social and economic factors on the death rate.

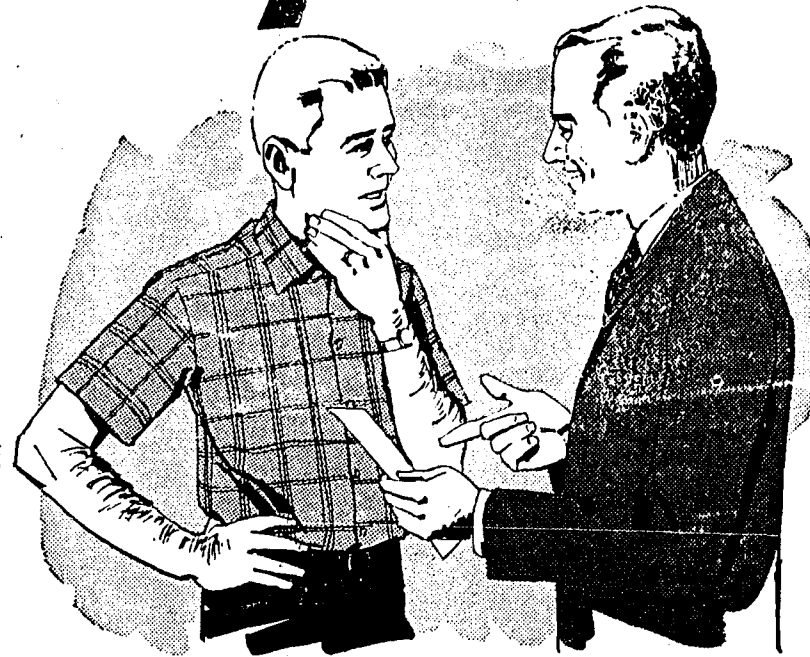

DR. INGLE HONORED

Dr. Dwight J. Ingle, professor and head of the Department of Physiology of the University of Chicago, a fellow in biochemistry in the Mayo Graduate School of Medicine, Rochester, Minn., from 1934 to 1938, is the subject of a biographic account in the journal, BioScience, for October, 1966.
He was born in Kendrick, Idaho in 1907, and was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1929.

MOVED TO MOSCOW

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VANDALISM COSTS RUN HIGH IN IDAHO

Lewiston - Vandalism of signs and facilities on the State Highway system is increasing. Replacement of vandalized signs is now costing the Idaho Department of Highways over \$50,000 per year. Funds used to replace these signs could be used to great advantage elsewhere. These signs are not only expensive to replace, but are installed to aid the traveling public. Loss of the signs endangers the traveling public and can cause serious accidents.

When the new construction project was completed on the north side of the White Bird Hill, a dangerous situation was caused where the new construction connected with the old road on the south side of the hill. Traffic going south traveled over a 70 mile per hour designed highway going up the hill and starting down the six percent grade on the other side of the hill. At the end of the project a 70 mile per hour design highway connected into a 35 mile per hour, or less, narrow section of road. Because of this danger to the traveling public, blinker lights were installed to warn the public of the danger. Before these had been in operation two weeks vandals shot out all the lights. This not only cost the Highway Department some \$500 to replace the lights, but for a period of time placed the traveling public in grave danger.

More recently, a new rest room installed at a rest area had all the fixtures ripped from the ladies' rest room. Not only does this cost the road user additional tax funds, but the facility is now locked and cannot be used until new parts can be secured and the damage repaired.

It would be impossible to list all vandalism occurring within District Four. This varies from scrawled messages on rest facilities to tearing down major signs. Although vandalism is contrary to law, it is difficult to apprehend.

The Idaho Highway Department hopes that bringing the seriousness of the problem to the attention of the traveling public will help to prevent such acts - so that the Department of Highways may help the public to better spend their Highway Users' Tax Dollar! - Donald L. Cox, P. E.

TREE CUTTING WARNING ISSUED

Boise - As the harvesting and selling of Christmas trees commences at this time, the Idaho State Forestry Department wishes to point out the Idaho state law concerning the "Transportation of Coniferous Trees." The law states that "It shall be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to transport on the highways of this state, more than five coniferous trees without having in his possession a bill of sale showing his title thereto."

The penalty for violation of this law, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding six months or both.

However, a bill of sale is not required for the transportation of coniferous trees by the owner of the land from which they were taken, or by his agent, nor is a bill of sale required by a common carrier or contract carrier. Carrier must have suitable evidence or affidavit of this ownership.

Your nearest Idaho State Forestry Department office may be contacted for further information regarding this law which was passed to protect growers and harvesters of Christmas trees.

WEATHER IS CHILL, RAINY PAST WEEK

The weather this past week has been on the chill and rainy side - with interludes of bright sunshine - and pastures are beginning to green despite the fact that it is late in November.

Day-time temperatures have been in the mid-50's, and at night when cloudy, dropping to the high 30's. On clear nights white frost has been common.

There have been several really heavy rain storms, two of which were said to have dropped more than an inch of moisture in the 24-hour period in which they occurred.

Bear creek and the Potlatch river are now running water, but still are below the normal run-off for this season of the year.

Farmers are happy with the moisture and the temperatures, saying it is "just right" for the fall sown crops.

Some trees and bushes are still carrying a goodly number of their leaves - others are completely bare.

FARMERS ADVISED ON TAX PENALTY

Boise - Farmers who recently received income tax penalty notices but had paid their tax by February 15 are being requested to indicate this on the notices and return them. Internal Revenue officials said this week.

IRS director Calvin E. Wright explained that farmers who paid by February 15 are not required to make quarterly estimate payments for which the penalty notices were issued.

However, he said for all farmers who paid after February 15 the penalty is mandatory by law if they did not pay on an estimate basis during 1965.

Wright added that also subject to the penalty unless they paid by estimate are all farm employees, business and professional men, retired persons and others who do not "pay as they go" by withholding from salaries and wages.

MY CHILD WON'T EAT!!

In tones ranging from exasperation to despair on the telephone, in plaintive letters to health information agencies, in the pediatrician's office and in the discussion groups at the P.T.A., the cry from young mothers is:

"What can I do when my child won't eat?" This has been going on for a long time, ever since (more years ago than I'll ever tell) my professor of pediatrics in the medical school admonished us, with a child on his knee, about the care and feeding of infants. This theme became the title of a book for young mothers long before the era of Dr. Spock, and has been spoofed in the form of advice on the care and feeding of executives. There seems little difference—just don't let the individual dramatize himself.

Best Advice

The first and hardest advice to these young mothers is to relax. No normal child is going to starve in the midst of plenty. When he vacates the center of the stage, or has the rug pulled out from under him by having mother calmly walk out and let him alone, he'll eat. When he gets ready. And that will be time enough.

There are several reasons why the toddler doesn't eat as his parents wish he would:

- a) his growth has slowed down since he was a baby, and he doesn't need as much food; b) he begins to have likes and dislikes;

c) he likes to dawdle and play over eating; d) he loves the limelight and the attention he is getting.

Therefore you must not expect him to eat as much as you think he should. If he is healthy and gaining, he is eating enough. You must consider his likes, and substitute other and equally nutritious foods for those he doesn't like. You must be patient, but not too patient, with his time-wasting. And you must quit worrying, or he will—excuse me—make a monkey of you, just as my kids did of me, until I got on to them.

A Problem Letter

Here's a letter I received which will put your problem, and its solution, into a nutshell—that is, in the postscript: Dear Doctor:

I have a problem with my youngest child, she doesn't want to eat. I can coax, tease, threaten, read to her, give her flowers on her tray, buy her special dishes—she still won't eat. What can I do? Please, help me, doctor.

(Signed) Mrs. (A very worried mother)

P.S. I have two older daughters—twins. I never make a fuss over them, and they eat just fine. I can't understand it! So, mother, when your child gets a bit disrespectful about the four groups of essential nutrients, just add a fifth ingredient—spice the meal with a bit of loving toughness and a smidgen of judicious neglect.

P.S. The toddler will still love you.

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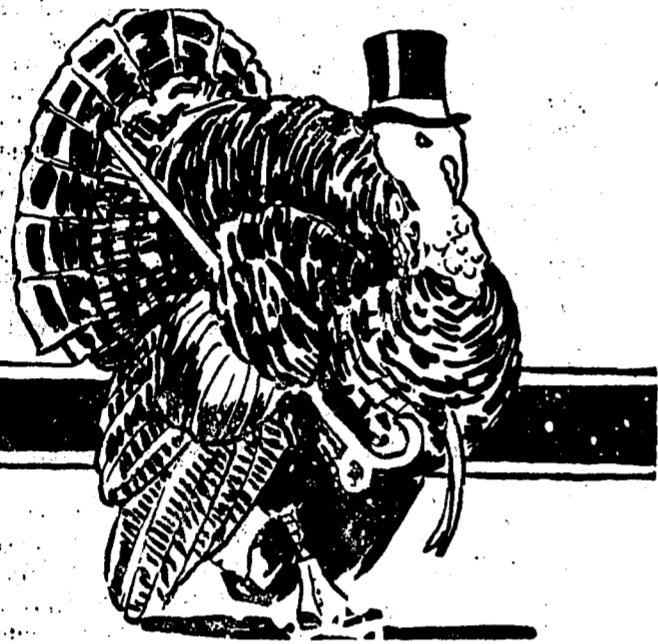
