**BUREAUS UNMASKED
IN ARGUMENT**

Portland — One argument favoring government participation in the development of electric power is that the U. S. power requirements are so great that it is necessary for tax-exempt government projects to supplement taxpaying free enterprise. While this theory appeals to some people, investor owned power companies have proved they can meet the electrical needs of the country without the aid of government projects.

What happened to an investor-owned utility in South Carolina that planned to build a new multi-million dollar generating facility? The Interior Department intervened before the Federal Power Commission. It contended that the company had no need for electricity from the proposed new plant and that any future power requirements could be met by power projects planned, but not yet built by the federal government.

Citizens of South Carolina considered the choice between a tax-exempt power project and one privately financed, which is expected to produce some \$18 million annually in state and local taxes — plus another \$24 million in federal taxes. They made known their support of the investor owned company's plans.

Interior Department opposition gave way to public pressure, and the F. P. C. recently licensed the company to begin building an \$86 million unit to be part of its \$700 million hydro and nuclear power complex.

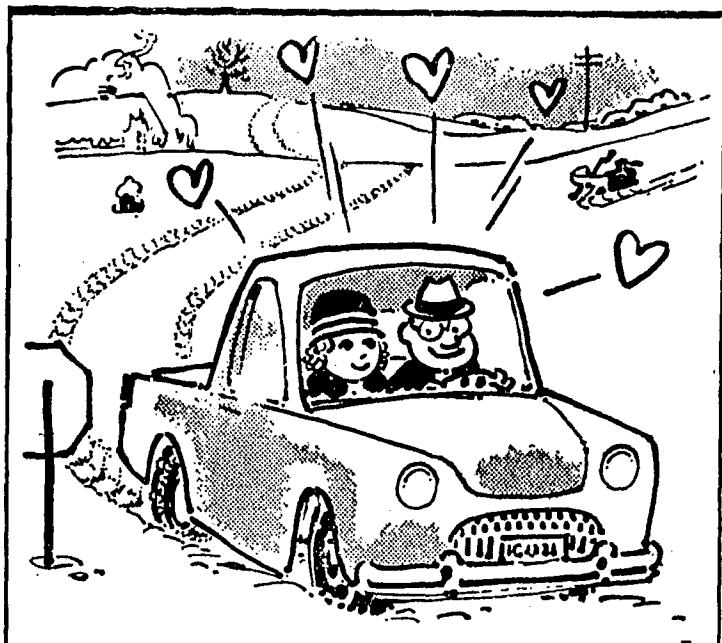
In the wake of the entire affair was a full view of bureaucratic obstructionism and an invalid argument. Government financing is not needed for America's electric power needs. Publicly regulated, taxpaying, investor owned utilities experienced in providing efficient, dependable service are and can meet our requirements.

One could not help but wonder just how many of these trees were legally purchased from the land owners, or reputable dealers — and how many were cut under "moonlight requisitions!" It would be most interesting to know.

In the meantime, it behooves the owners of timberlands to take all possible steps to head off this sort of thievery.

HUGE ANTLERS

Boise — What may be the largest non-typical mule deer antlers in the next Boone and Crockett Club International Competition — and 20th among the all-time high scoring records — will be entered by Ed. Martin of Boise.

He killed the muley, which dressed out a solid 240 pounds of meat, on Lick Creek near Cuprum. It had no incisor teeth at all, because of old age, and the molar teeth that were left had been completely worn down to the gum line. The steaks, chops and roasts were tender and tasty, although biologists say that this animal was at least ten years old.

The unusual trophy was measured by E. Kleiss Brown, chief of the Information and Education division of the Idaho Fish and Game Department. Its preliminary score was 274, which is more than the 269

score rated by a Colorado entry which won the top honors two years ago in the Boone and Crockett International Competition for this class.

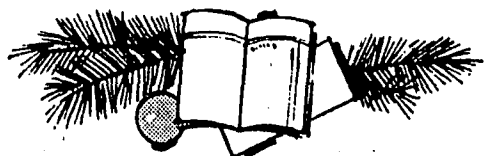

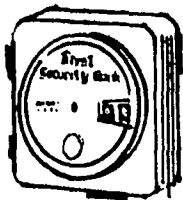
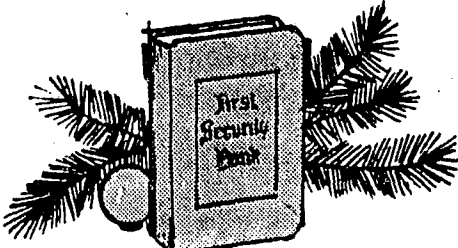

Doctor in the Kitchen

THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Twenty years ago this month the United States launched a national program of the greatest significance to the growing children of our nation. It was the National School Lunch Program.

Long before that, concerned physicians and public health workers, as well as educators, had realized that poor nutrition in children was not only a danger to their health but a detriment to their learning capacity.

Many local efforts were made to meet the challenge. The distribution of milk at the morning recess time was one of the first. Pediatricians objected to this on the ground that it interfered with appetite for lunch.

School Milk Begun

Teachers and public health nurses observed that many children came to school without breakfast, for a variety of reasons, including just plain shiftlessness of parents in some instances. Distribution of milk was therefore undertaken, in many areas, just before the opening of school in the morning.

As school and home became more and more distant, and more and more parents worked all day, it became evident that more than just milk was required. Many children brought lunches which were woefully inadequate nutritionally, though often appetitizing enough. Educators and public health workers deplored the lack of educational impact in the mere distribution of milk, despite the fact that this partially filled a serious deficiency.

So was born the National School Lunch Program, administered through the U.S. Department of Agriculture and State departments of education. Federal funds reimburse the local

communities for part of the cost of the food, most of which is purchased locally. Some foods are purchased by the Department of Agriculture, and some surplus foods are also distributed from this source.

All schools, private as well as public, are eligible, provided they operate on a nonprofit basis. The school lunch, too, must be operated on this basis. The lunch must conform to the established standard, providing one third of the day's nutritional needs for a 9 to 12-year-old boy. This means:

- One-half pint fluid whole milk as a beverage;
- Two ounces of lean meat, poultry or fish; or
- Two ounces of cheese, or one egg, or 1/2 cup cooked dry beans or peas, or four tablespoons of peanut butter, or
- An equivalent quantity of any combination of the above-listed foods served in a main dish;
- A 3/4-cup serving of two or more vegetables or fruits or both, or full-strength fruit or vegetable juice may be substituted for 1/4 of this requirement.

With increasing numbers of children taking their noon meal at the school, the importance of such a lunch is obvious. Even more important, perhaps, is the educational opportunity presented and the nutrition habits formed when children experience the pleasure of good eating and improvement in their health.

National School Lunch week, observed each October by Presidential Proclamation, is a significant recognition of a monumental contribution to the nation's health through its greatest wealth — its children.

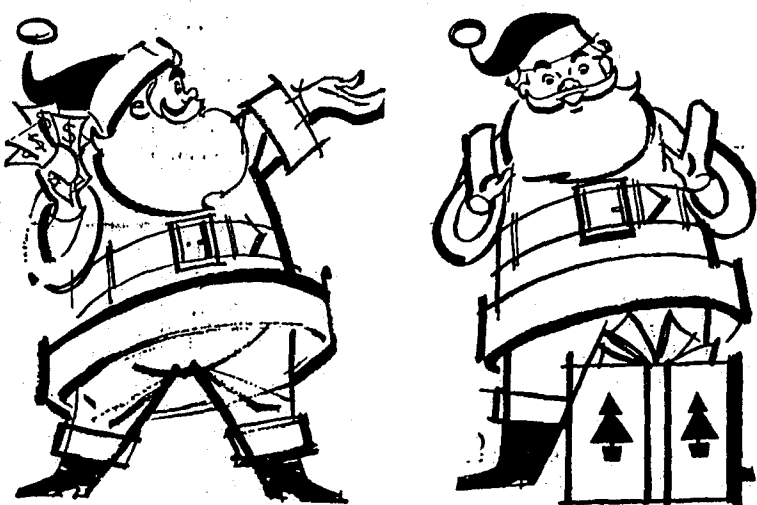

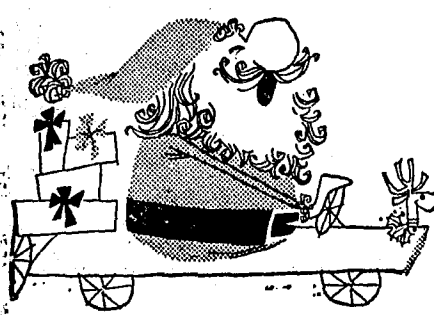

**GEO. F. BROCKE TELLS
OF S. IDAHO TRIP**

Idaho State University has a well designed campus, with many new buildings, and with a student enrollment of some 4,400 students. The University has made progress in the field of vocational education, commonly called a trade school. This department is operating at full capacity at this time. The school of Pharmacy, along with pre-dentistry, and nurses training program are doing very well. They also have a very good school in general education. At a noon luncheon on Friday, December 2nd, the president, Dr. Davis, gave a talk, in which he made a detailed report on the progress that was being made, and gave the legislators the amount of increase which would be requested of the legislature for operation during the 1967-1969 years, which was 3.7 million dollars, or about a 35 percent increase over the 1965-1967 years. Also a request was made for several new buildings. After the noon luncheon the legislators were given a tour of the entire campus.

December 3rd, leaving Pocatello at 7:30 a. m. in the morning the legislators were taken by bus to American Falls to inspect the American Falls dam, and the Lamb-Weston potato processing plant. This plant processes 15,000 bags of potatoes per day, making several different items such as french fries, hash browns, and potato flakes. These products are sold in every state in the Union, and this is only one of 15 potato processing plants that we have in Idaho. Potatoes have become the most valuable farm crop grown in the State, bringing in a growers income of some 83 million dollars.

From American Falls the tour continued to Aberdeen, where the University of Idaho experiment station is located, this experiment station is one of the state's most valuable assets, as experiments are taking place in many new seed developments which are most valuable to the agricultural industry throughout the state. The cost of this operation is low as far as state funds are concerned, as many organizations, and private industry provide funds for this operation.

At Blackfoot the legislators were shown a film of the activities of the National Reactor Testing Station. This is Idaho's largest single employment of people. Some 5,500 are employed in this operation.

From Aberdeen the tour continued to Blackfoot to inspect the State Hospital South. Vast improvements have been made at this institution, with the construction of several new buildings, and the new modern methods that are now being used.

After making an inspection of the operations at the Mental Hospital, the tour continued to Pocatello, arriving at 4 p. m.

We left Pocatello at 4:30 and drove to Boise, over the new interstate Highway, which is one of the finest and most remarkable highways in the state of Idaho. While stretches of this highway have not been completed to interstate standards, the full construction should be completed within a few years.

Leaving Boise Sunday morning we drove up through the winter snows of the Cascade McCall area, arriving in Kendrick at 3:30 p. m.

We noticed the fine State buildings that have been constructed the past few years at the State Institutions. The monies to do this, come from the State Permanent Fund, which gets most of its money from the \$10.00 so called head tax. This is one of the soundest programs that we have, and all of the people of the State can feel justly proud of this fine program, which in reality, on a capital basis, is not costing anyone more than a just share.
