## G. F. BROCKE TELLS OF LEGISLATIVE DOINGS AT BOISE

This week the Legislature has been busy with committee work, with very little floor action. So far, only one bill has passed both houses.  
The work-load of the Legislature is determined by the work of the committees, who work in the different areas of the state's problems.  
Hearings were held this week on the Oleo Tax, the Trading Stamps, Water Legislation, and Small Water Development by the Soil Conservation Agency.  
Friday, Rep. Merrill of District No. 7 and myself introduced a bill to repeal the present 20-20-40 Equalization Law, known as Senate Bill 246 of the last Legislature. The reason behind the introduction of this bill was to have some protection for the people who are owners of property in the state, and return the powers of assessing to the County Assessor of each county.  
No Fish and Game legislation has been offered in the House at this time.  
The County Commissioners of the many counties were in Boise the forepart of the week to deal with the county problems which will come before the Legislature. From Latah county a good delegation was in attendance, including Gerald Ingie, Herb Zimmerman, Leon Danielson, Kelly Cline and Eugene Taylor.  
The Driver's Responsibility Bill offered is receiving good reception from the public, judging from the mail I am receiving. However, the insurance companies are working hard to kill this legislation.  
Next week more action should take place in the 39th Session of the Idaho Legislature.

## PAT JOHNSON WINS AS HOMEMAKER

Minneapolis, Minn. — Pat Johnson, by finishing first in a written home-making knowledge and attitude examination for senior girls, Dec. 6th, became Kendrick High School's 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow contestant.



Pat is now eligible for possible state and national scholarship award. Her test also earned her a specially designed silver charm from the company.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of all schools in the state, with the former receiving a \$1500 college scholarship, and her school will be given a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica. The runner-up will be awarded a \$500 educational grant.  
The winner from Idaho, together with those from all other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by her school advisor, will join in an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., next spring.

The national winner — the 1967 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow — will be announced at a dinner in Williamsburg. She will be chosen from the state winners on the basis of original test score plus personal observation and interviews during the tour. Her award will be an increase in her scholarship to \$5000. Second, third and fourth ranking national winners will have their original scholarship grants increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

## REMODELING AT K. ROCHDALE AT END

Remodeling work at the Kendrick Rochdale Co. warehouse is nearing an end, with results presenting a most satisfying picture.

In the operation of the warehouse itself a new automatic scale unit, 24-foot in length, with concrete top, and over-size dump pit is completed with the exception of installation of the compressor and other very minor details. The new scales, recording type, which print a scale record, permit fast and accurate handling of vehicles. By uncoupling the trailer, big truck-trailer vehicles can be accurately and rapidly weighed.  
The pit grating is ample to take all flows of grain. It contains just a ton of hand-welding steel grating! The entrance to the scales is closed at one end by sliding doors, and at the other by a counter-balanced overhead door, permitting all-weather operation. The driveway itself is three feet wider than before.  
The remodeled office is, slightly narrower than the old one, but several feet longer. And at the east end is the remodeled record vault.  
The interior, heated electrically, is completely insulated, and finished with warm mahogany paneling, and aluminum frame sliding windows. Overhead is acoustic tile in a soft white.

Bob Watts, manager, said it was the first office remodeling in many years, but was worth waiting for.

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#### SCOUT LIST GROWS

New Brunswick, N. J. - The first 10 national African Scout Associations, planning to send contingents to the XII World Scout Jamboree to be held August 1-9, 1967, at Farragut State Park, Idaho, have been announced by the Boy Scouts of America, host association, for the quadrennial event.

The countries and the anticipated contingent sizes are: Congo 18, Liberia 36; Malagasy Republic 30; Nigeria 42; Sierra Leone 20; South Africa 29, Sudan 12, Tunisia 9, Uganda 35, Zambia 18.

Under the theme "For Friendship" Scouts from most of the World's Scouting nations will camp together at this event of Scouting's 60th anniversary year. Millions of Scouts around the globe will hold simultaneous "Friendship Camp fires" and similar events, carrying the Jamboree spirit and brotherhood worldwide.

According to Scout officials, other African Scout Associations are working on their Jamboree contingents, selection, travel itineraries, and other arrangements and be represented at Idaho. The other African Scouting nations are: Algeria, Botswana, Dahomey, Ghana, Kenya, Lesotho, Libya, Morocco, Senegal, Tanzania, and the United Arab Republic.

#### COMMON SENSE NEED IN WINTER

On These cold winter mornings, real cold, snow and frequent icy roads are "normal" driving conditions in the Inland Empire. But that isn't cause for concern - just a few changes in basic driving techniques will make things a lot easier, according to the Inland Automobile Association. Here are a few suggestions from the AAA:

Press accelerator once or twice to start. Use starter 15 to 20 seconds. Do not pump accelerator. If you smell gas (carburetor is flooded), hold accelerator to floor and work the starter.

When starting on slippery surface, be easy on the power as too much power gets you nothing but wheelspin.

To stop, pump brakes once or twice per second. It is better to slow down in advance of intersections, traffic lights or turns.

Get accustomed to the road. Speed up slightly and then slow down to determine how slick the surface is on which you are driving and adjust your driving to prevailing conditions.

Allow plenty of room between you and the car ahead and if a car follows too close, it's better to allow it to pass than risk getting involved in a rear-end collision.

Be careful to avoid patches of ice often found on bridges, in shady spots, in underpasses, on banked curves, etc.

Be alert for skids of your own car and of other vehicles. Scan your roadway, particularly the right side, for areas where evasive action could be taken in the event of a skid.

If your car skids, let up on accelerator gently and turn front wheels in direction of skid. Do not straighten front wheels until car stops skidding.

Always keep a side vent open or a car window slightly down as exhaust gas, containing deadly carbon monoxide, can quickly fill a non-ventilated car. In addition, too much heat in the car makes the occupants drowsy.

In snow or rain, it is advisable to keep automobile lights on low beam during daytime driving so other drivers will see you. Use low beams when driving in snow as they produce less reflection from snowflakes than high beams, thus improving visibility.

#### LSD IS DANGEROUS

"I would rather distribute cyanide free than LSD because most people know how dangerous cyanide is," says Georgia Tech psychology professor M. Jackson Marr, who has spent two years studying the drug. LSD does have beneficial effects in the treatment of patients, but when it is not administered by a qualified professional its dangers are "directly proportional to the incompetency of the person," he reported. "And addiction to the drug may result, not from physical need, but in its psychological effect."

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**TURKEYS PLANTED NEAR BOISE**

Boise — Idaho Fish and Game department biologists Dick Norell (left) and Steve Judd display a turkey recently imported from Colorado. As part of the Five Point Program for the Future, the department received from Colorado 12 birds, including three toms and nine hens. These birds were released on the South Fork of the Boise river in an area selected because it meets the habitat requirements of the birds. Previously, other birds were introduced in the lower Salmon River area, and in lower release sites in northern counties. Present indications are that the birds are increasing in all areas.

**CHECK MEDICARE FOR ACCURACY**

Older people in the area who have

paid doctor bills but have not yet claimed their Medicare Doctor Bill Insurance Payments are invited to have their claims checked by the Lewiston Social Security Office before mailing them to the Medicare Carrier, according to D. Gene Shaw, district manager.

"In the first six months of the Medicare program some benefit payments were delayed because the applicants did not include all the necessary information with their claims," he said.

Most people will need this help only the first time they make a medical insurance claim. "The Medicare Handbook, which is given to all beneficiaries, explains how to make the claims," he said. "And the form is relatively simple, but most people can use some advice the first time they apply. We're glad to offer assistance, and we believe we can help many people to avoid some delay in their payment." The Medicare claim may be made either by the patient or by the doctor, if he accepts assignment of the insurance. If the doctor applies for the Medi-

care payment, he bills the patient only for any part of the \$50 deductible that still remains to be paid and for 20 percent of the bill over the \$50 deductible.

Under the other method of payment the doctor bills the patient, the patient pays the bill, and then the patient sends the completed request for payment form to the Medicare carrier. A statement from the Doctor showing the treatment given and the charges already paid by the patient must be furnished either on the request for payment form or in a separate receipted bill.

People being treated by a doctor whose office is in Idaho send their Medicare bills to Medicare, the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, P. O. Box 8048, Boise, Idaho, 83707.

People living in Asotin and Garfield counties in Washington, treated by a doctor whose office is in one of these counties, send their Medicare Bills to Medical Service Corporation of Spokane County, 1201 N. Division, Terminal Box 3166, Spokane, Washington 99220.

If the beneficiary leaves out his Medicare identification number, it is impossible to verify that he is signed up for the doctor bill insurance, or how much of his deductible amount has been paid. Some elderly people with failing eyesight are unable to make legible entries. And

some do not get adequately itemized receipts from their physicians, or forget to enclose the receipts with their claims. If the request for payment form is incomplete or improperly filled out, the Medicare carrier has to write back to the beneficiary, thus delaying the payment.

"The Social Security Office does not make the decision or pay the claim," Mr. Shaw said. "The law requires that the payments be handled through the selected Medicare carriers. We can answer general questions about Medicare and help people in this area get their applications ready for review by the carrier."

"If an older person cannot visit the Social Security Office in person, he can send the forms by mail or by someone else," he said. "But in this case he should be sure to give his telephone number." The Lewiston Social Security Office is located at 726 21st St., and the phone number is Sherwood 3-9456.

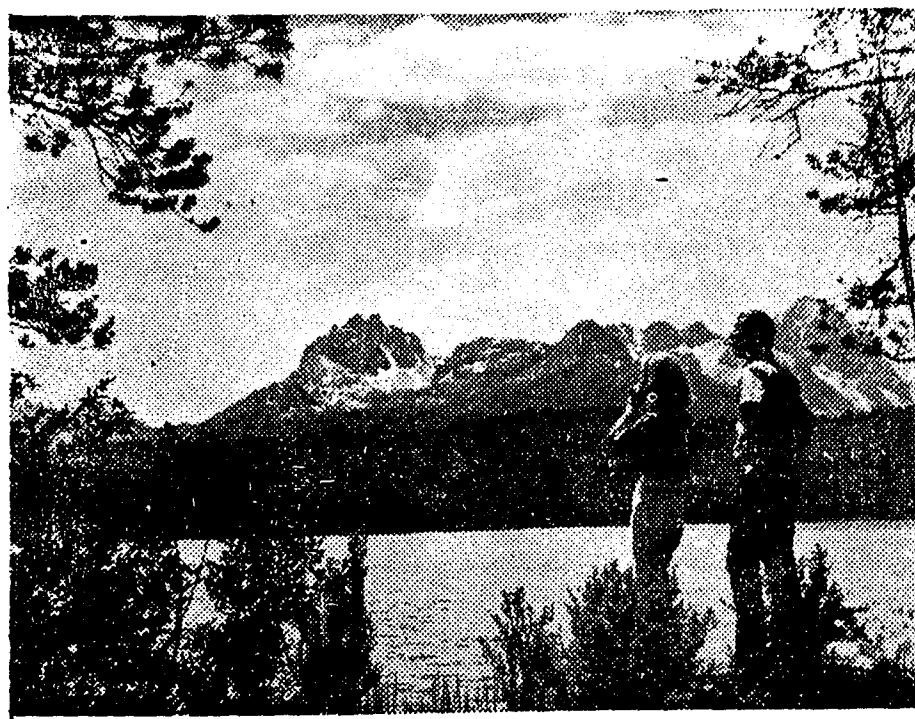

**HORSE SHORT COURSE IS SET**

U. of I. Moscow - Oregon rancher R. A. (Rube) Long will headline the third annual University of Idaho Horse Short Course scheduled March 16-17 at Jerome.

Morris L. Hemstrom, extension livestock specialist and director of the short course, said Long would demonstrate his method of handling a green horse.

Working without a rope, the Fort Rock, Ore., rancher halts and gentles an untrained horse, trains him to lead and - if the horse is large enough - to ride, all in two short work sessions in view of the arena crowd, Hemstrom said.

The Short Course if offered this year in cooperation with the Jerome County Sheriff's Posse, the local co-sponsoring group. The program will include sessions on internal and external parasites of horses, disease control, identification and treatment of common unsound conditions of feet and legs, nutrition and safety with horses.

Hemstrom said a light horse judging clinic for all participants will again be a highlight of the program. Horsemen will judge three different breeds of horses at halter and one class each in western reining, western pleasure and cutting horses, competing with the official placings of a three-judge panel.

The full Short Course program and registration details will be announced later.

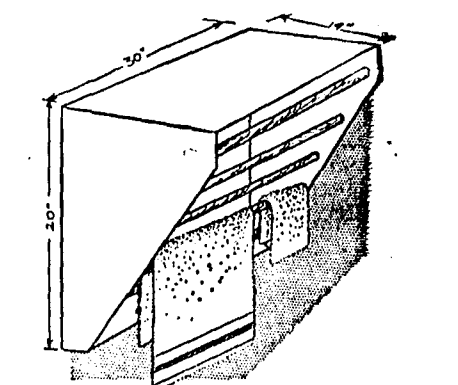


**A Service of Thor Research Center For Better Farm Living**

A practical project for the handyman whose wife could use a compact wall rack for drying clothes, hanging towels or use in a closet, involves only an evening's attention.

The clothes rack utilizes 1-inch plywood and 1/2-inch dowels, and can be constructed to fit space available. Built in inverted pyramid fashion, the compact rack is 2 inches wide at bottom, 14 inches wide at the top, and 20 inches in over-all height. Suggested width is 30 inches, but can vary. Length of the dowels is determined by the width selected.

Drill 1/2-inch holes in the plywood to receive the dowels 1/2
