YES, IT'S A FACT - THE MEMORIAL POOL IS IN DANGER!

Several months ago the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick was informed by the State Health Department that the present filter in the War Memorial Swimming Pool was inadequate, and would have to be replaced before another season.

The Board has been investigating costs, types of filters, etc., and has come up with some approximate cost of the project:

Table with 2 columns: Item and Cost. Filter: \$1,500.00; Pump and motor: 500.00; Suitable housing, pipe, etc.: 1,000.00. Total: \$3,000.00

This has created quite a problem, in that there is only \$465.00 in the pool fund at this time. To give you an idea as to the costs involved in the past years the following figures were compiled from 1957-1962. During these years there was a loss of \$350.00 in operating and maintenance. These figures do not include water, electricity, or labor of village employees.

G. F. BROCKE TELLS OF LEGISLATIVE DOINGS AT BOISE

With less than 20 days remaining to finish the work of the 39th Session of the Idaho Legislature, many problems still remain and must be solved by the Legislature.

This week, House Bill 17, which placed a 3 percent tax on insurance premiums when such insurance was issued to members of a fraternal organization, was defeated by a House floor maneuver, so this issue will be dead for the balance of the session.

Another problem taken care of this week was Daylight Saving Time. This action means that there will be no change in the time as we have had in the past. North Idaho will go on Daylight Saving Time the last part of April, returning to Pacific Standard Time the latter part of October.

The most urgent problem now facing the Legislature is the court decision that was handed down last week by the Supreme Court in which the Equalization Law, commonly known as the "20-20-40 Assessment Ratio," was declared unconstitutional. The problem is to work out some sort of workable plan which will take the place of the monies that will be lost due to the reduction of the assessment ratio of the utilities.

For many years the assessors of the many counties have assessed property in several classes. For example: Residential property is being assessed at the rate of 12.5 percent of actual cash value; farm land is about the same; business property is another class, assessed at 20 percent of true cash value, while utilities were assessed at 31.5 percent of cash value. Now all this property must be assessed as one class at a given percentage of value that will provide funds for County taxing units operations. This will mean that the percentage used on residential and farm property will have to be raised, while the percentage used on business, personal and utilities property will have to be lowered.

Also facing the Legislature is the problem of working out a formula that will determine in a satisfactory manner that which will be fair to the property owner. The valuation of the taxable property is something that must be solved before the school foundation formula can be presented to the Legislature, as State funds are provided on a basis of valuation per average daily attendance.

The Budget for the next Biennium is of great concern to many members as some are working to hold the budget to a figure close to the governor's \$152.1 million so that there will be funds for tax relief; still others are for a larger budget which would allow several new programs such as the take-over of Boise College, the start of a medical school, and several other new programs.

Next week more action should be coming as the full reflection due to the court decision will be given in figures that will show the true impact in the many counties.

Mrs. Walter Eberhardt, 67, a long-time resident of this area, died at Clearwater Valley Hospital, Orofino, at 2:25 p. m., Tuesday, Feb. 7. She had been seriously ill following surgery in November.

She was born Nancy Ellen Weaver, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James A. Weaver, Dec. 23, 1899, at Elk Creek, North Carolina. In 1903 she came with her parents to Cloverland, Wash. In 1914 her family moved to Lenore, Idaho. She received her elementary education at Cloverland and Lenore. She graduated from Clarkston High School and attended Eastern Washington College of Education at Cheney, Wash.

She taught school at Jack Creek, Lenore, Teakean, Kendrick, Twin Falls and Orofino for a total of 21 years.

She was married to Walter Eberhardt at Lewiston, June 28, 1941. Their home was at Lenore.

Mrs. Eberhardt was a member of the Presbyterian Church; Canyon Chapter No. 67, Order of Eastern Star at Kendrick, and the Willing Workers Club at Lenore.

Surviving besides her husband are two brothers, Walter Weaver of Lewiston and James L. Weaver, Clarkston; six sisters, Mrs. R. F. (Callie) Parsons and Mrs. Nora J. 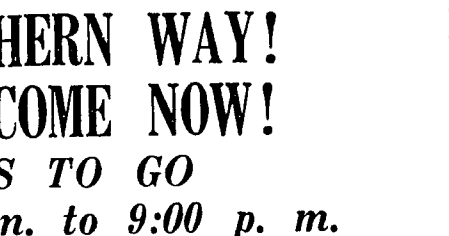
