

IDAHO 48TH IN SCHOOL SUPPORT

Idaho has slipped to 48th place among the states in its financial support of public elementary and sec-ondary education when figured on a basis of spending for each pupil in average daily attendance, a report of the National Education Association showed last week.

According to the NEA report, Ida-ho is estimated in the current academic year to be spending \$389 per pupil compared to a national average of \$564. Only South Carolina, with estimated expenditures of \$373, and Mississippi with estimated spending of \$315 ran below the Gem State. While these figures are estimates

for the current year, they indicate that Idaho has slipped several places in a ranking of the states. In the academic year of 1965-66, the NEA estimates that Idaho spent

\$385 per pupil in average daily attendance. In that year seven states: vere below Idaho and one was tied. While these figures are estimates

When figured on a percentage basis, Idaho is currently estimated to

be spending only 69 percent of the national average per pupil in average daily attendance, according to the report. At the other end of the scale New York is now estimated to be spend-
