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## 94 KENDRICK FANS FOLLOW TEAM TO BURLEY TOURNEY

Ninety-four Kendrick basketball fans followed the Kendrick Tigers to Burley, Idaho, last Wednesday to watch their favorites in championship play, and saw them set a tournament record when they defeated Midvale 100 to 79 in later consolation play.  
**Dietrich vs. Kendrick**  
First game of the three-day series saw the Tigers matched against the defending champions, Dietrich — who with four starters from last year's championship team defeated the Tigers 85 to 80.  
Dietrich jumped ahead 11 to 5 in the opening minutes, and was never behind from that point on. Kendrick stayed close during the first half on the shooting of Mike Merz, 6-foot 8-inch junior. However, Mike fouled out in the third quarter.  
Dietrich, with the help of Ron Knowles and Byron Weiss, moved to a 20-point lead.  
Fifty fouls were called during the contest and 89 free throws attempted.  
The score by quarters: 23-14, Dietrich; 43-30, Dietrich; 67-47, Dietrich; 85-60, Dietrich.  
Kendrick scoring: Craig 13; Pea 7; Merz 18; Heimgartner 8; Kimbley 6; Zumhove 4; Hoffman 2; Salter 2.

**Tigers Dump Midvale**  
In Friday's consolation semi-final action the Kendrick Tigers dumped Midvale 11 to 79.  
Kendrick and Midvale played on quite even terms during the first half of the contest, then the Tigers hit their stride and pulled away rapidly in the second half. Kendrick made it an even 100 in the remaining 12 seconds of the game when Von Zumhove dropped in two gift tosses.  
In the first half the Tigers pulled away from a 9-9 tie on the shooting of Gary Craig and Gary Pea. The Tigers moved into a 9 point lead midway through the second quarter before Midvale began a drive and cut the lead to 50-46 at the halfway point.  
Gary Craig and Ken Heimgartner lead a semi-press and fast break which put Kendrick ahead 76-59 at the end of the third quarter. Heimgartner was also credited with 12 assists.  
Kendrick scoring: Craig 26; Pea 19; Merz 7; Heimgartner 21; Kimbley 11; Ball 2; Zumhove 4; Hoffman 4; Ron Salter 6.

**Tigers Win Consolation**  
The Kendrick Tigers won the consolation honors with a comeback 83-63 victory over the Roberts Mustangs in the final evening of the Burley tournament Saturday.  
In the consolation game Roberts bothered the fast-breaking Tigers with deliberate slow-down play during the first half, but the Tigers then solved the problem and broke loose to score 54 points in the second half and turn the game into a runaway.  
Roberts did close the margin to nine points playing against the Tiger reserves with 2:34 remaining before Gary Craig and Ken Heimgartner teamed up for nine straight points between them to kill any Roberts hopes.  
The Tigers used a pressing defense to break the stalling Roberts offense and began getting the upper hand late in the second quarter, closing the Mustangs' lead to 31-29 at the halfway point.  
The Tigers took the tip-off at the start of the second half tied the score on that play within three seconds and then were off.  
Craig finished with 24 points and Heimgartner with 19 to account for more than half the Tiger total.

**Tourney Highlights**  
It would be impossible to name all those who were at Burley, from this area, for the District 4-A state basketball tournament.  
Eighty spectators, and 14 players, managers and coaches made the trip. Counted among the 80 spectators going were members of the band, Yell Queens, students, parents and fans. The total present was 94, according to a count by a Kendrick fan.  
All reported a good time and great pride in Kendrick's reputation for clean playing, sportsmanship and wholesome, responsible behavior.  
Said a prominent Kendrick booster who attended the tournament: "We of Kendrick can be proud of the conduct of those from this area attending not only on the part of students and players, but of everyone. Not a single 'out of line' incident occurred."  
A real snow storm hit Burley on Saturday evening. Sunday morning fans left there with the prospect of battling snow — but soon came to cleared highways and good road conditions for the rest of the trip home.

## FLORENCE JOHNSON, KENDRICK PIONEER, DIES MARCH 7TH

Mrs. Florence May Johnson, 86, a covered wagon era pioneer of the Kendrick-Juliaetta area, died at 3:00 a. m. Tuesday, March 7th at the Gritman Memorial Hospital, Moscow, of infirmities of age. She was the widow of the late John L. Johnson, and a Juliaetta resident for 25 years.  
She was born Florence May Stevens, daughter of Daniel and Ingia Stevens, Feb. 20, 1881, at Hillsboro, Ore. When she was 12, she came with her family by covered wagon from the Willamette Valley to American ridge near Kendrick. The family homesteaded near Melrose a few years later.  
She was married to E. T. Brandon at Melrose in 1900. They had two children. They operated the first general store at Culesac until Brandon's ill health prompted them to move by covered wagon to California where he died in 1906.  
She returned to Kendrick and was married to John L. Johnson there on Oct. 25, 1908. They farmed on American ridge until 1941, then retired and moved to Juliaetta. Johnson died Feb. 26, 1956.

Mrs. Johnson, with her husband and family attended the American Ridge Methodist Church for many years; till it closed. She later became a faithful worker in the Assembly of God Church in Kendrick.  
She was a sister of Mrs. Ralph R. Roberts, Clarkston, whose husband drowned in the Snake River Jan. 24.  
Other survivors include seven children: Edwin Brandon, Kellogg, Ida.; Mrs. Ronald (Pearl) Wolfe, Troy, Ida.; Mrs. Phil (Iva) Johns, Juliaetta; Mrs. Willard (Mary) Bartlett, Lima, Peru; Mrs. A. W. (Joye) Swan, Lewiston; Ivan L. Johnson, Lewiston, and Mrs. Wayne (Wanda) Hoskins, Culesac; another sister, Mrs. Jonas Johnson, Snohomish, and two brothers, George Stevens, Clarkston, and Floyd Stevens, Shelton, Wash.; 18 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Kendrick Assembly of God Church at 2:00 p. m., Thursday, March 9, with the Rev. Hubert Deweber officiating. Music was furnished by Adeline Puckett and Linda Swan. Active pallbearers: were Walter Benscoter, Jorla Callison, Cecil Roberts, Richard Blewett, Harley Eichner and Perry Mattoon. Honorary: Wade T. 
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## IDAHO 48TH IN SCHOOL SUPPORT

Idaho has slipped to 48th place among the states in its financial support of public elementary and secondary education when figured on a basis of spending for each pupil in average daily attendance, a report of the National Education Association showed last week.

According to the NEA report, Idaho is estimated in the current academic year to be spending \$389 per pupil compared to a national average of \$564. Only South Carolina, with estimated expenditures of \$373, and Mississippi with estimated spending of \$315 ran below the Gem State.

While these figures are estimates for the current year, they indicate that Idaho has slipped several places in a ranking of the states.

In the academic year of 1965-66, the NEA estimates that Idaho spent \$385 per pupil in average daily attendance. In that year, seven states were below Idaho and one was tied.

While these figures are estimates for the current year they indicate that Idaho has slipped several places in the ranking of states.

When figured on a percentage basis, Idaho is currently estimated to be spending only 69 percent of the national average per pupil in average daily attendance, according to the report.

At the other end of the scale New York is now estimated to be spending \$912 per pupil, which is 161.7 percent of the national average. — St. Maries Gazette.

## MORE BUSINESSES IN LATAH COUNTY

Today Edward Seder, manager of the Spokane office of Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to 356 businesses in Latah County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun and Bradstreet Reference Book totaled 356 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in this area as compared with 259 in 1965 - an increase of 37.5 per cent for the period.

According to Mr. Seder, each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun and Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns - to corner grocery stores worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun and Bradstreet Reference Book lists the manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total businesses in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

Kansas City, Mo. (Special) — Leslie M. Fry, Reno, Nev., Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, has announced the appointment of Joseph B. Forest, Kendrick, Idaho, as Assistant Inspector General, V. F. W.

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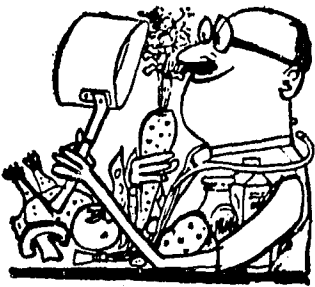
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## Doctor in the Kitchen

### WHEN A BUSINESSMAN TRAVELS

... or when he lunches downtown, for that matter, can he keep his dietetics as efficient as he keeps his business? If not, why not? If so, why?

Let's tackle those questions in order.

The answer to the first one is a definite, as they say in the armed forces, AFFIRMATIVE. Here's how it can be done.

He may have to skip the two martinis, for the sake of holding down his calories, of which he doesn't need too many while working at a desk, unless he takes the advice of Professor Steinhaus, who suggests, perhaps with tongue in cheek, that the desk worker should run, not walk, to the water cooler and the washroom, and should leap from his chair instead of struggling out of it. Well, anyway, part of the plot is to hold down those calories at lunch time, not only for weight control, but to make it easier to keep awake and up-and-at-'em between two and three p.m.

#### Concentrate On Salads

The next item on the agenda—a no businessman can function without an agenda—is what shall he eat? He needs protein and vegetables (for vitamins and minerals), and he doesn't need too much carbohydrate or fat. So the hot sandwiches immersed in gravy, the cream soups, and the french fries need to be handled with discretion. Better to concentrate on salads. Here one encounters the contemptuous

brush-off, designating these as rabbit food. Perhaps. But consider the rabbit. It is light on its feet, does not develop a paunch, eludes its enemies with considerable success, and multiplies in geometric progression.

Sceptics have suggested that the rabbit is a sissy who couldn't punch his way out of a paper bag. Maybe so, but he has a terrific wallop in his hind legs, which have sharp claws, as any boy knows who has had rabbits and hasn't learned to keep them from extending their hind legs with force.

Oh, lest we forget, rabbits don't drown their vegetables in high-calorie salad dressings, rich in fats.

#### Try Open-Faced Sandwiches

The salad, adorned with julienne of ham, turkey and cheese, provides the necessary protein, and makes a tasty and satisfying meal. The open-faced sandwich with meat or cheese, a pickle and a slice of tomato or a dish of cole slaw, makes a nice lunch, too.

Add a glass of milk, whole or skim or butter, depending on your waistline, and you have a nutritious lunch, satisfying and not paralyzing. It lets you work without nodding.

Dessert? Fresh fruit in season or sherbet fills the bill.

Probably few businessmen will read this column, but a wife could call her husband's attention to it—or, could she?

## HEART RESEARCH IS VITAL FOR CURE

Research is the vital link between understanding and cure, in the battle against disease of the heart and blood vessels. This year the Idaho Heart Association is supporting two researchers at Idaho State University with a grant of \$14,050 announces Dr. L. Crismon of Lewiston, president of the Heart organization.

Dr. Albert I. Edlin and Dr. Robert B. Nelson, assistant professors of pharmacology at the Idaho State University of Pocatello, are making an extensive study of hypertension.

These Idaho heart grant researchers are attempting to induce hypertension in dogs by surgical techniques and to examine and measure the altered cardiovascular functions such as blood pressure, the amount

of blood the heart pumps, how much resistance to the flow of blood results, and how much blood flows to the kidneys.

Dr. Edlin says that the results of the study will be compared to similar measurements from human patients recorded in the clinical literature. He points out that the two-fold aim of the study is first to develop the surgical techniques to the point that the results closely resemble hypertension in humans and then to develop techniques for accurate and reliable measurements of changes that occur in such condition.

"Our long-range goal is to increase understanding of the process of hypertension and to develop a useful method for conducting dependable studies of this common heart problem," he says.

Working on the project in addition to Drs. Edlin and Nelson is Jerry

Jones of Wendell, Idaho, a technician who has been employed to care for animals, to maintain surgical and electronic instruments, and to collect and evaluate data needed for the study.

Before 1950, the physician's weapons against hypertension were quite limited, Dr. Crismon points out. Since then - thanks to the development of a wide variety of anti-hypertensive drugs and to much better understanding - there has been a startling reduction in the death rate

from hypertension and related heart disease. It is now 50 per cent lower among men aged 45-64 than it was in 1950 and 56 per cent lower for women in the same age group.

This Idaho Heart Association grant to researchers at Idaho State University is but a portion of Idaho "heart dollars" going into research, says Dr. Crismon. For every dollar given to the Idaho Heart Association last year, more than 27 cents have been invested in various research projects over the country.



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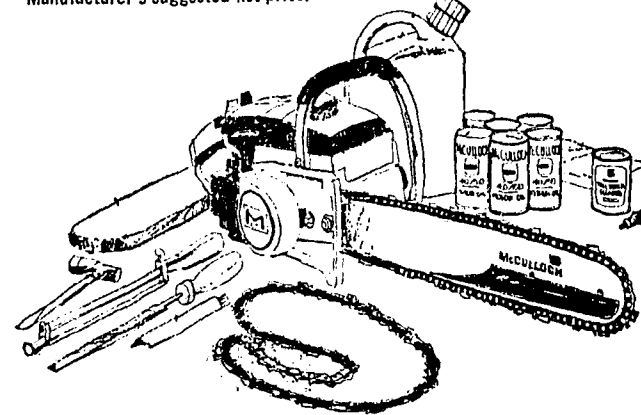
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## ROAD SUGGESTIONS

MOISTURE CONTENT LOW IN PARTS OF LATAH COUNTY
Moscow — Moisture shortage of 1966 could be a production problem for farmers in parts of Latah county. Tests taken around Genesee show a definite low available moisture content, reports Homer Futter, Latah county agent. Fields that were in crop last year show the lowest sub-soil moisture.
Normally, says Futter, we can expect 12 to 17 inches of available moisture at this time of the year — while tests show 7 to 12 inches this spring.
Fields north of Moscow and in the eastern part of Latah county appear to be close to normal, with the low sub-soil moisture problem showing up from Moscow south.
Soil tests taken in the Genesee area in September of 1966 showed no available moisture in the top five foot level, and only .4 of an inch in the six foot level. This test was taken in a field where Gaines wheat was harvested and indicates that the wheat had used practically all of the sub-soil moisture to the six foot depth. With good rainfall up till February, this was still not enough to recharge the sub-soil to normal capacity.
If we get normal rainfall the rest of this growing season, with our low reserve, we could have fields with a total of 12 to 14 inches of available moisture to produce a crop.
Research shows that it takes about four inches of available moisture to raise wheat plants, and each inch of moisture over this should produce about six bushels of wheat.
Using these estimates, some fields would be limited in production to 50 or 60 bushels per acre.
