

The WWP president said that there is every indication the use of electric power by the average American family will continue to climb dur-ing the next decade. "A residential customer using 15,000 kilowatt-hours annually will be an 'average' customer," he noted.

"Anticipating that our customers" will be using electricity in such amounts, WWP has already announced the construction of a one-million kilowatt steam-electric station near Centralia, Wash., to meet these expected requirements. "We maintain a constant review of our rate structure. If electric power use by the majority of our customers moves steadily upward we are confident that further rate reductions can be achieved.'

The rate revisions currently proposed by WWP must be approved by the two state regulatory bodies, "Upon approval we will be able to meet our starting date of April 25,# Brunzell concluded.






