
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
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QUESTION: Our wood kitches cabinets are worn and scratched in places and I want to dress them up. Is it necessary to remove the old finish first?

ANSWER: It usually is necessary because the added coats of finish can cause sticking of the doors. Too, it is recommended if you want the cabinets to have a like-new appearance. Paint or varnish can be removed quiter easily by one of the many paint removers on the market. Such removers penetrate paint or stain and convert them to sludge, which can be removed with a putty knife. Then use your portable electric sander to assure complete removal and smoothness: after the surface has been dried for refinishing.



Place enough weight on center of warped door to bow it slightly in opposite direction.

QUESTION: I just finished sanding down some birch plywood doors for a cabinet I'm building. Then I washed them down and they warped. Can I salvage these warped doors and if so how?

ANSWER: Yes. Place the doors on the floor with supports under each end, then place enough weight on the center of the door to bow it slightly in the opposite direction. Let it sit for two or three days or until the bow has been compensated and the door straightened. Then apply a coat of sealer paint to both sides of the door to keep moisture out and prevent a recurrence of the

QUESTION: I have a pasement door that binds. I've got a portable electric sander, so fixing it. is no problem. The trouble is, I can't find the exact spot where it's sticking to the frame. Is there an easy way to detect the sore spot?

ANSWER: If you look closely you should be able to see that the frame wood is shiny where the rubbing is occurring. You can find the trouble quickly by pushing a piece of paper between the edges of the door and the frame. You will not be able to pass the paper through the areas where the door is sticking.

## IDAHO BUSINESS POOR TO EXCELLENT SAYS SECURITY BANK

Business in Idaho by the end of the first quarter of 1967 varied from poor to excellent, depending upon the industrial segment. This is the report of the First Security Bank News Letter being distributed this week, it was announced by James Hoogland, Jr., manager of the Kendrick First Security branch.

The News Letter is edited by Dr. ElRoy Nelson, First Security vice president and economist.

According to the publication, total employment, payrolls and personal income were all higher than in 1966, but the rate of increase had slowed somewhat, and agricultural income was lower because of decreased prices. Total personal income was approximately 5 percent above the \$410 million in the first quarter of

Changes in the second quarter will probably correspond closely to those nationally. "There is definitely a slowdown in the rate of expansion, but the total of personal income and employment should be higher," says the Letter.

The outlook for agricultural income in Idaho this year is somewhat less optimistic now than anticipated at the beginning of the year. With few exceptions, prices by March had decreased considerably from people decreased considerably from peaks reached last year, and cash receipts from farm marketing in the state will probably be below the \$525 million for 1966.

Prices of cattle and calves habve been disappointing — some \$2 below those of last year - and the inventory of beef cattle in January was slightly lower in the state. Milk, both in Idaho and nationally, was some 3.2 percent lower than during the previous year. However, during the first three months of 1967 milk

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
