CAR OVER BANK

Saturday morning watchers along Main Street were rewarded by an "almost worm's eye view" of efforts to extricate a Plymouth car belonging to Aaron Hensen of Juliaetta, from its precarious perch hanging over the grade going up to the home of Mrs. Dallas Groseclose and family. Had the car continued its descent it could well have landed anywhere from the Potlatch Telephone Co. building to the new village garage at the rear of the Olderness Dept. Store.

However, the car somehow hung onto the bank. Efforts were made to pull it back onto the road with another car, but this resulted only in failure and lots of burned rubber.

Then a small crawler tractor was brought from the Groseclose home — but for some reason this also went over the side of the grade, and stopped with its nose pointed up the very steep and rocky hillside.

Finally the wrecker from the Kendrick Welding & Machine Shop was called, and it pulled the car back onto the road without difficulty. The tractor, however, was a different matter, the wrecker being forced to seek a place on the hillside well above the tractor, and use a long heavy cable and winch — but the tractor was then pulled to the road and driven to the Groseclose home.

The accidents were investigated by E. M. White and Chas. Klatt, Village Marshals. Mr. Klatt also assisted in getting the car and tractor back onto the road.

Mr. Fairfield married Neeta Stevens at Moscow, April 25, 1917. "Our wedding trip was the long trek from Moscow to our farm on Big Bear Ridge," Mr. Fairfield said, grinning, "and our honeymoon was spent making wood and getting ready for spring plowing."

They farmed their until 1920, when they moved to the Stony Point area where they farmed until 1931, when they returned to Big Bear Ridge.

Moving to Kendrick in 1946, Mrs. Fairfield clerked at N. B. Long & Sons store, while Mr. Fairfield still maintained a small farm.

Retiring in 1952, they moved to Lewiston and reside there at their home at 1402 Idaho St.

Big Bear Ridge residents who well remember the "lean years," the 1930's and early 1940's can recall the Community Hall or the old Pine Creek schoolhouse being the scene of a Saturday night dance. It was a rarity to attend and not find Neeta at an old upright piano and Leonard with a Sears-Roebuck fiddle supplying "the music."

"We don't play any more," Mrs. Fairfield said. "In those days our children and those dances were all the entertainment we had and we all enjoyed it, but anymore, playing is hard work and we don't need any of that."

Three of their four children will be present to help them observe the occasion. Roy, (ElMonte, Calif.), Eileen (Mrs. A. C. Needham, Coeur d'Alene) and Buford, (Lewiston Orchards). Another son, Danny, living in the east, cannot attend.

TWO FORMER LOCAL RESIDENTS DIE IN SPOKANE HOSPITAL

A brother and sister, John D. Jones, 51, Moscow, and Agnes Goldie Sherbon, 66, Pullman, died Thursday at a Spokane hospital 1½ hours apart.

Jones, a partner at Al's Service Station, Moscow, died of cancer, and Mrs. Sherbon of a massive heart attack and stroke.

Jones was born Sept. 7, 1915, near Kendrick, and had operated the Deary Cafe. He worked at service stations at Deary and Troy before he moved to Moscow 15 years ago. He had been a partner in Al's Service Station before illness forced him to retire.

Jones married the former Iva Lee at Lewiston in 1945. She survives him at Moscow.

Mrs. Sherbon was born at Woodburn, Iowa, Jan. 27, 1901, and had lived at Pullman since 1944.

She was married at Lewiston, June 26, 1930, to Ollis W. Sherbon, shop superintendent at Washington State University, Pullman. He survives her at Pullman. She is a former employe of the WSU linen department, having retired last year.

Surviving Jones and Mrs. Sherbon are a brother, Ray, Kendrick; four sisters, Mrs. Jack Maynard, San Diego; Mrs. Stanley Bennett, Spokane; Mrs. Ray Shoemaker, Connel, Wn., and Mrs. Opal Reddington, Salmon, Idaho.

Also surviving Mrs. Sherbon is a son, Dr. John Sherbon and two grandchildren, Barbara and William, all of Ithaca, N. Y.

Her funeral was held Monday at 11 a. m. at Simpson Methodist Church, Pullman, with Rev. William G. Berney officiating. Kimball Funeral Home was in charge.

His funeral was held at Short's Chapel, Moscow, at 1:30 p. m. Monday, with Rev. Raymond Moody, Spokane, pastor of the Manito Presbyterian Church, officiating.

Joint committal services were held at Wild Rose Cemetery, Big Bear ridge, Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

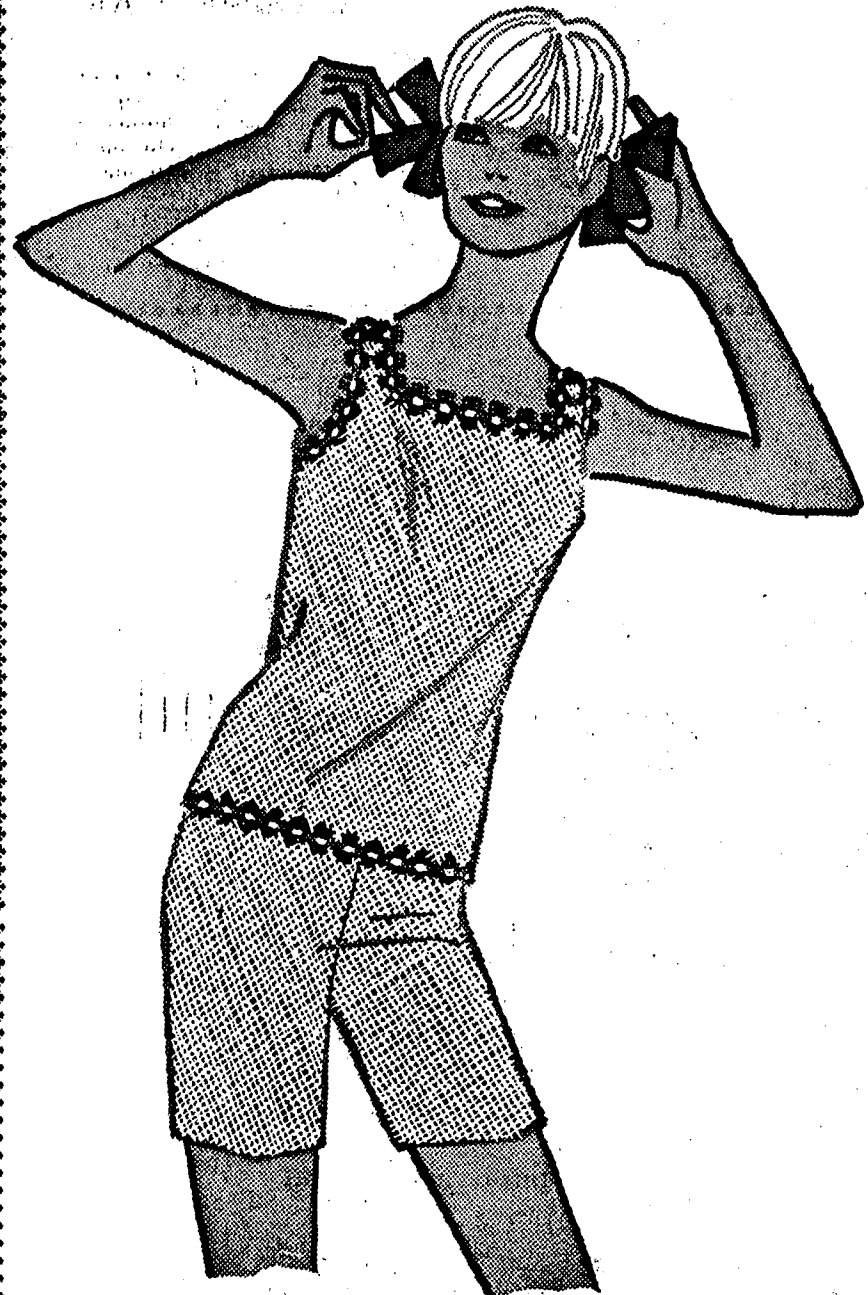
