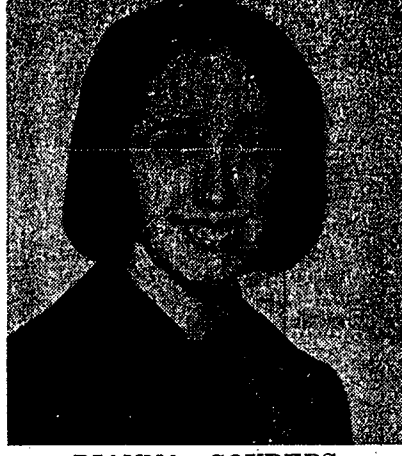

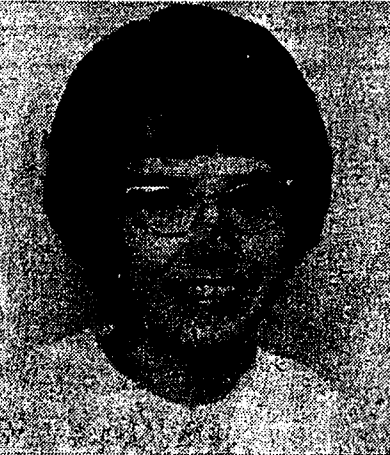

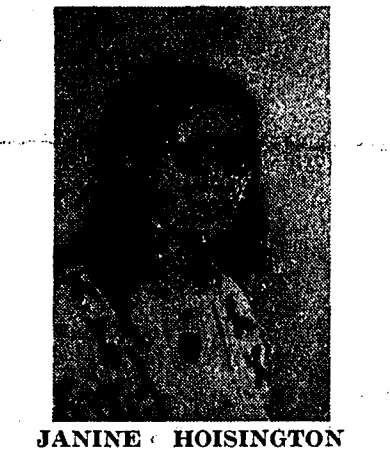

RICHARD WATSON KILLED IN VIETNAM ACTION IN APRIL

Sp 4/C Richard D. Watson, 18, of Clarkston, has been killed in action in Vietnam, has parents were notified Friday, April 28.
Watson was a son of Mrs. Glenn Hough, 723 4th St., Clarkston. He had been in the U. S. Army since February of 1966 and in Vietnam since July. He was serving in the 39th Engineering Battalion in the southern part of South Vietnam when his parents last heard from him.
They learned April 16 that he was missing in action, and they received formal notification of his death Friday. No details as to the area or the specific battle he was participating in were given.
He was born July 7, 1948, at Kendrick. When he was four, he moved with his family to Colfax to live for five years. The family has been residing in Clarkston since 1957. He was attending Clarkston High School when he entered the service.
Survivors in addition to his mother and step-father are two brothers, Ronald Watson, Seattle, and Danny Watson, Clarkston; one sister, Mrs. John (Donna) Frary, Kendrick; one half-brother, Gary Hough, and a half-sister, Catherine Hough, both of Clarkston, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Jessie Bateman, Kendrick.
The body is to be brought to the Merchant Funeral Home, Clarkston, for services and burial. Further details are lacking at this time.
Funeral services for Richard Watson will be held at 2:00 p. m. this Thursday, May 4, at Merchants Funeral Home in Clarkston.

Richard Watson was quite well known here, having visited often in the homes of his sister, Mrs. John Frary, and his grandmother, Mrs. Jessie Bateman, and other relatives. He had also assisted Harley Eichner with farm work for considerable periods of time.

EVENTS OF INTEREST AT K. H. S. PAST AND COMING WEEK

Further Federal Funds Possible
It is possible that Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 may qualify for further funds under Public Law 874.

Under this requirement, on May 9, the district will conduct the last of two surveys of parent's occupations. The results will be used to discover parents whose occupations may be federally connected. It is thus necessary that a reply be received for each student.

Of vital importance is the information from parents whose children may be federally connected. The basic requirement for eligibility is that the parent's work must be on federal property. For most workers the deciding factor is whether they are working on federal property on the day of the survey. This is not necessary for woods workers or farmers and in some cases others. They will be asked to answer added questions.

The blanks will be sent home by all school children in the district.
