## FIRE SEASON HERE

Boise — The closed fire season on all areas in the State of Idaho, outside of the cities, will become effective May 10. State Land Commissioner Gordon Trombley states that after this date it will be unlawful to burn on forest or range lands without a burning permit in possession.

Burning permits, when conditions are safe, can be obtained from State Forestry Offices, U. S. Forest Service offices and "Grazing District" offices. Advice on burning problems is also available at the same offices.

According to Ed. Ring, Assistant State Forester at Coeur d'Alene, campers, smokers and debris burners are responsible for 25 percent of Idaho's wild fires. Fires in these categories are the result of sheer carelessness and each citizen has a responsibility to see that they are prevented.

## IDAHO NEEDS MANY CAMPGROUNDS

Boise — The Idaho State Park Department has officially presented Gov. Don W. Samuelson a copy of the state's Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan. Wilhelm M. Beckert, director of the State Park department, made the presentation at a ceremony in the governor's office at Boise. The Plan is a result of a cooperative effort between the Park

department and University of Idaho, and has been approved by the Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. Federal approval means that the state is qualified to participate in federal grants-in-aid under the Land and Water Conservation Act.

The plan indicates needs for the state to the target date, 1970. In addition to an estimated 3,662 acres of campgrounds, the state will need 1,062 acres of so-called "open space" areas. These open space areas are developed for picnicking and other day-use activities.

Copies of the Plan will be made available to counties and municipalities, upon request, for their guidance in obtaining federal aid for outdoor recreation projects.

## S. C. S. MAKES AREA SOIL SURVEY

A field survey was made last week by S. C. S. men, to evaluate soil erosion losses in farm land in the county.

Considering the Troy, Deary and Kendrick areas as a whole, this is one of the lightest soil erosion years in some time. In spite of the fact that precipitation from October 1 to March 1 was 35 percent more than a year ago, totaling 11.42 inches.

There are some fields with severe soil washing, but they are in scattered locations, and are mostly in the cut-over forest soils, where clean cultivation was done. A few measure as much as 80 tons per acre of soil lost. There is hardly any erosion on winter wheat planted on re-crop land.

This year it is very noticeable how drill marks coming down the corners of fields have picked up run-off water and caused a gully.

The occurrence of many silt overflows at the foot of draws and slopes indicates that sheet erosion has taken a larger loss than usual.

## GAME DEPARTMENT OPPOSES ARMS ACT

Boise — Believing that restrictive firearms legislation proposed in the 90th Congress as S. P. 1 (as amended) or H. R. 5384 conflict with the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which constitutes the American citizen's right to keep and bear arms, and believing any restriction on firearms would tend to reduce the amount of hunting enjoyed by the American people, one of the basic freedoms traditional to this great country, the Idaho Fish and Game Department opposes these bills.

The Department further believes that a reduction in the sport of hunting would impair the economic welfare of Idaho where the pursuit of wild game represents a thriving industry.

It is further believed that this proposed legislation on gun control would only restrict, unnecessarily the law-abiding American citizens, leaving the criminal at large free to steal or smuggle firearms at will, since criminals do not abide by any laws, let alone firearms control.

Dams under construction along the Columbia river will bring slackwater to the city. The development will provide direct shipping to world markets. The city's position as a terminal port means that it will serve an extraordinary trading area. The chain of dams nears completion with the construction of the final dam, Lower Granite, expected to create the Lewiston slackwater in the early 1970's. Others are in the last stages of completion.

Presently the management of the Port of Lewiston is delegated to the "Port Commission," composed of three elected representatives: B. H. Wittman, E. V. Lorenz and J. H. Kayler.

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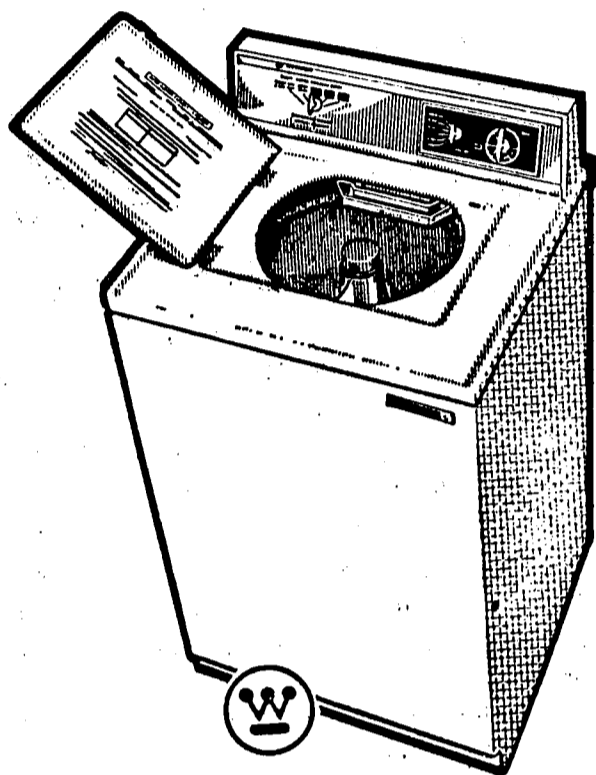

**SCOUTS TO BE WELL PROTECTED**


Boise — Idaho State Police have been working for several months to formulate plans for protection of the more than 17,000 who are expected to attend the World Boy Scout Jamboree to be held at Farragut State Park in northern Idaho, Aug. 1-9.  
Supt. A. E. Perkins of the I. S. P. said 40 state troopers have been selected for on-site duty during the Jamboree, with Lt. Jack McGinnis of Coeur d'Alene as commanding officer. In addition, the I. S. P. will work with personnel from five other state agencies — Fish and Game Department, Department of Highways, Forest Service, Park Service and Department of Health. Also cooperating will be the Kootenai county sheriff's department and the Coeur d'Alene city police department.

"Every effort is being made," Perkins said, "to insure absolute safeguards for our guests and it is our aim to provide every emergency service necessary to guarantee protection and safety for the Scouts, their advisory personnel and visitors."

Troopers assigned for Jamboree duty will work on a call 24 hours per day. The men will live in 20 mobile trailers inside the park and will operate out of a headquarter


ters established in a larger trailer. State Police will start guarding the campsite July 26, and will be stationed there at least through Aug. 12-14. Each man will have his own squad car and activities will be correlated by three-way radio communication, augmented by personal walkie-talkie units. In addition several helicopters will be based at the site for possible emergency service.

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

Section 2. That the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Clerk of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed, in the name and on behalf of the Village of Kendrick, to execute and deliver to the owners of land abutting on said vacated portion of said alley good and proper deeds conveying to said owners the one-half of said vacated alley abutting on the land of said owners.

FARMERS, WATCH THAT BEAN SEED Boise — Stanley I. Trenhaile, Idaho commissioner of agriculture, reminds Idaho farmers that they cannot legally plant their own bean seed in this state unless it was field and windrow inspected by State Department of Agriculture representatives and was found to be free of halo blight disease.

The reason for this reminder is that the Idaho seed bean has long been known throughout the United States and in many foreign countries for its high quality and freedom from seed borne diseases. In a united effort to protect, expand and improve the position as a leader in the production of bean seed free from seed borne pathogens, the Idaho bean industry has developed regulations which, if carried out, will improve the quality of bean seed produced in the State of Idaho.

The regulations require that all bean farmers plant only bean seed, regardless of variety, which carries a tag, issued by the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, or the Idaho Crop Improvement Association, certifying that the seed has met the qualifications for in-state planting.

These tags are of three types; the white tag indicates that the bean seed satisfactorily passed field and windrow inspection for the diseases commonly known as halo blight; the yellow tag indicates the seed was grown prior to the 1965 growing season and is apparently free of the disease; the blue tag of the Idaho Crop Improvement Association signifies the seed is certified and has met the in-state seed planting requirements.

Bean farmers are cautioned that the planting of bean seed that does not carry the "In State Planting Certificate" will disqualify their bean acreage from insurance under the pooling agreement and under Federal Crop Insurance.

BE CAREFUL IN THE PLANTING OF TREES Moscow. — Success in tree planting depends on good preparation and careful attention to steps that will give the seedling a chance to survive, says Vernon Burlison, University of Idaho Extension Forester. He offers the following tips:

Have your planting area well prepared. The soil should be like a firm seed bed for grain. Pulverized or loose soil will dry out. Land that has been summer fallowed is best for planting trees. Do not plant in sod, in areas infested with perennial weeds or in dense brush.


