The weather for the past few days has been more "cussed" than discussed. Literally, it's been terrible.

Tuesday of last week was a rather drab, chill day, following three very beautiful spring days — and Tuesday night rain began to fall, a pouring rain. It gave way to a drab, chill Wednesday.

Wednesday night the rain literally fell in torrents all night long here in the canyon, while on top the hills, in most areas, snow fell.

In the Cedar Ridge and Linden areas the depth varied from three to six inches — wet, sticky, which soon began to disappear under rain. It was mostly gone by nightfall, replaced by a chill wind.

The Potlatch river rose rapidly, and Thursday morning was the highest it has been in many weeks, and running a deep chocolate color, telling of erosion.

Farmers say it will take at least a week of good weather before they can get into the fields — and it's getting mighty late already!

Loggers are at a complete standstill, all logging roads being bottomless.

NATIONAL FORESTS OPEN TO FISHING

Missoula — Sportsmen will soon be fishing National Forest lakes and streams as the season opens in Montana, Idaho, Washington and North Dakota.

Sixteen national forests of the Forest Services Northern Region (eastern Washington, North Dakota, Montana, northern Idaho and western South Dakota) contain more than 10,000 miles of fishing streams and 113,000 acres of fishing lakes.

Fishing in national forest lakes and streams are subject to the seasons, catch limits and permit requirements established by the various fish and game departments.

More than 2,000,000 fishing visitors are expected in the regions forests this year.

K. M. ROBINSON DROPS POWER LEAD

Spokane — Kinsey M. Robinson has relinquished the post of Chief Executive Officer of the Washington Water Power Co. Associated with the electric industry for more than half a century, he will retain the chairmanship of the Board and the Executive Committee.

George M. Brunzell was named to the chief executive position by the board of directors. He will also continue as president, the post to which he was named in 1960.

Robinson said the move will free him from "daily decisions" and permit him to devote more time to the long-range planning that is so vital to the future well-being of Washington Water Power and the area it serves.

"The day-by-day operation of the company is getting more complex each day," Robinson noted. "It demands the stamina, the hours, that younger men can devote to it. I have every confidence that under the guidance of the men and women who are 'The Water Power' the company will continue to demonstrate the leadership that it has for the past three-quarters of a century."

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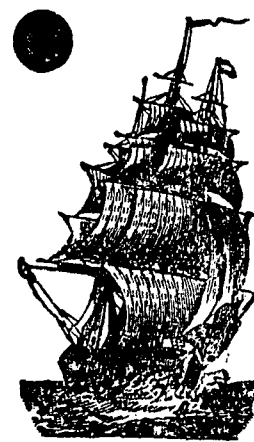

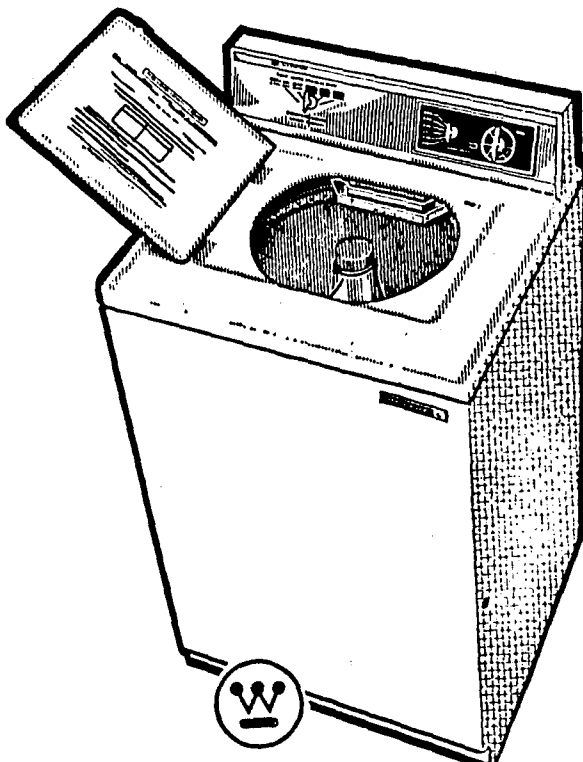

HEALTH TIP

Chicago — Are the bugs eating up your garden?

Most insects can be knocked out with sprays, powders and other poisons, but the unwary gardener sometime can suffer from the effects of bug sprays, too. Some tips on their use are offered in Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Read the directions on the container carefully, and follow them. The manufacturer spells out the proper usage and safety precautions. If the directions call for rubber gloves, protective clothing or goggles, leave this alone, unless you are an expert.

Store the insecticide in its original container, with original label, in a safe, locked compartment away from children and pets. Destroy empty containers immediately.

Apply downwind, to avoid inhaling sprays and dust. Stay out of the freshly sprayed areas.

Do not smoke while spraying or dusting. Some of the chemicals are flammable.

If chemicals are spilled on the skin, wash thoroughly and immediately.

Cover bird baths, dog dishes and fish pools before spraying. Pour any left over spray down a drain or into the soil. Don't leave it around in pans or pails. In case of accident, follow the directions on the container. If in doubt, call your physician.

GETTING FED UP ON PROCLAMATIONS

From the office of Don Samuelson, Boise, Governor of Idaho — One of these days I just might proclaim "No Proclamations Week!"

On the average, several requests are received each week for proclamations. Those from within the state we always honor. It takes something pretty special from outside the state, because the staff could spend half its time preparing the documents if all requests were granted.

There are enough worthy causes inside Idaho to keep the proclamation department busy, and we are always glad to issue these.

SEARCHING FOR A POLLUTION CURE

Lewiston — The annual stockholders' meeting of Potlatch Forests, Inc., was held last week in Lewiston. Benton R. Cancell, PFI president, reported the company's financial performance and discussed air pollution control efforts for the Lewiston area.

"We are leaving no stone unturned in our continuing efforts to improve air in this valley," Cancell stated. "To meet our responsibility as good citizens, Potlatch has been moving as rapidly as possible.

"For years we have been installing new devices and new methods for reducing pollution. The big problem now is that we must wait for scientists to give industry the information and knowledge necessary for designing new equipment to further reduce pollution."

Cancell pointed out that PFI recommended that the State of Idaho, through its Department of Health, apply for a federal research grant to help provide some of the technical answers needed.

"In the meantime we are investigating every possible method known to the industry in our goal to improve the situation in this valley," Cancell stressed.

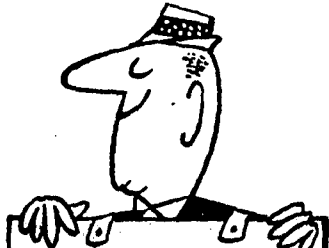
The PFI president told the stockholders that 1966 was a relatively good year for the company in terms of sales growth and profit improvement. "Even more important is the improvement in the company's organization. The steps taken in 1965 to streamline the company are now operating well," Cancell reported.

Potlatch stockholders were told that equal diversification into three main products groups — wood products, paperboard and packaging, and printing and business papers — has strengthened the company. The reason given is that each of these product groups moves in somewhat different business cycles.

MEDICARE RECORDS

Lewiston — Medicare beneficiaries who signed up for medical insurance protection can now obtain an information kit to help them keep a record of their doctor bills, so they will know when they reach their yearly \$50.00 deductible.

The kit includes a record-keeping folder and two leaflets which explain the two methods of payment for medical insurance claims, and what medical expenses count for the \$50 deductible. The folder has pockets on the inside for holding doctor bills and space to write in the date and amount of each bill, so the beneficiary will know immediately when he or she reaches the \$50 each year. After that, the medical insurance plan pays 80 percent of the reasonable charges for covered expense for the remainder of the year.

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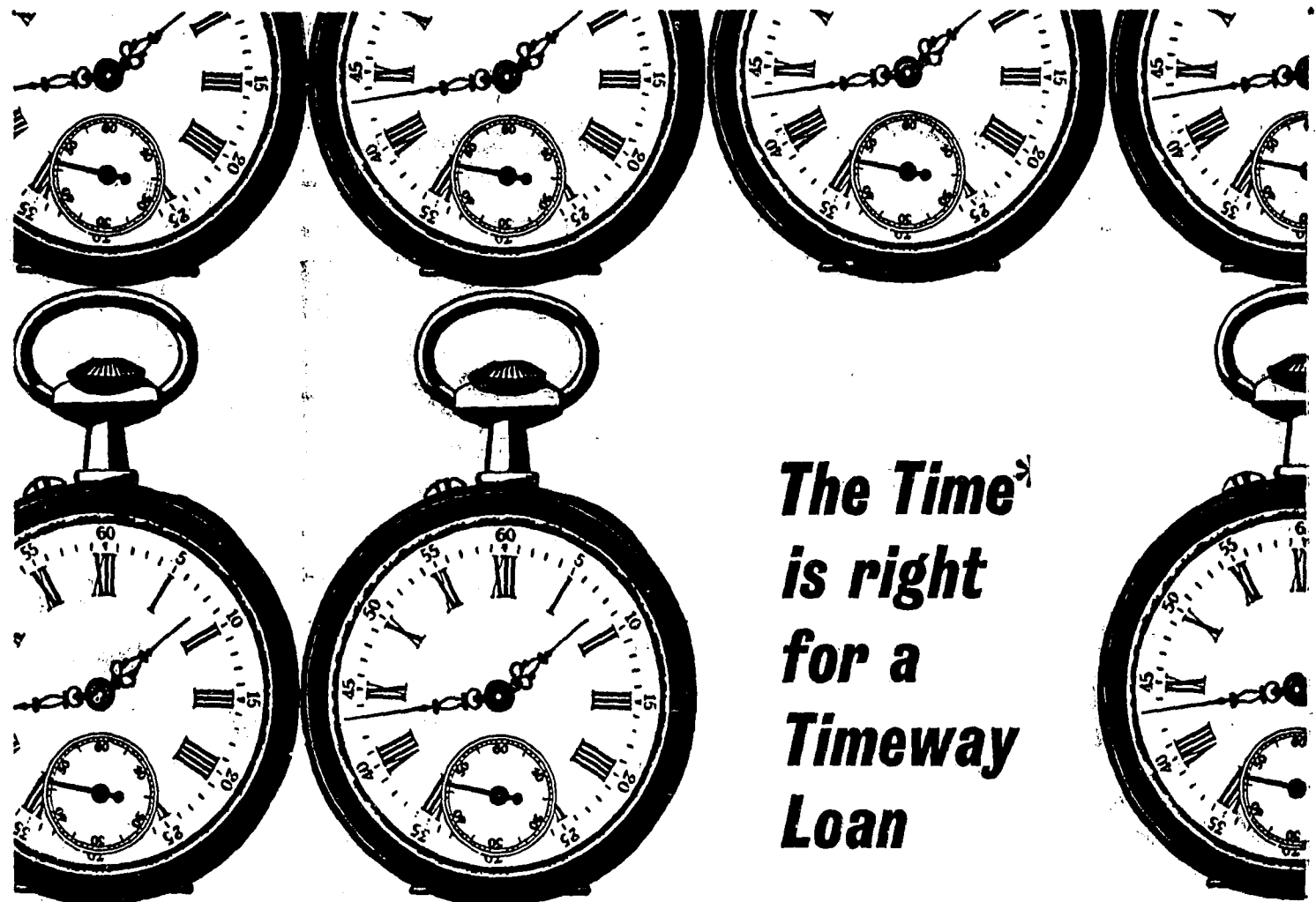

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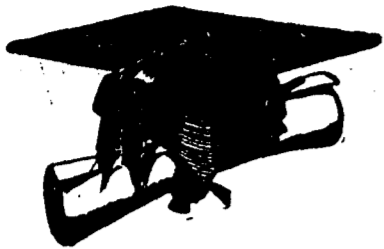

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NEW PENALTIES FOR CARELESS DRIVERS

Boise — An increase in penalties for Idaho motorists who may have their driver's license suspended under the state's traffic violation point system was instituted Friday by the Commissioner of Law Enforcement, Warner C. Mills, commissioner, announced he was issuing an administrative order which increases the length of suspension for second and third offenders. He said the repeal of the law which calls for the suspension of licenses of habitual violators does not exclude them from punishment under the point system.

"These drivers," he said, "still are subject to points accumulated in this state or others, and so face suspension the same as other motorists."

According to the new order, first time offenders who have their licenses suspended for accumulating 12 points within a 12-month period, still will be denied their driving privileges for 30 days if points were assessed where no accidents occurred and 60 days if involved in an accident.

Non-accident drivers who accumulate 12 points for a second time within a 12-month period will have their licenses suspended for 90 days, and those involved in accidents will face suspension for a period of six months.

Those who garner 12 points as third offenders in a succeeding 12-month period will have their licenses suspended for six months if no accidents are involved, and for one year if points are assessed following conviction where accidents occur.

The commissioner pointed out that traffic conviction points are accumulative and continue through the 12-month period from the time the first points are noted.

Thus, he said, a driver who collected three points for a violation in April and another three points in November still would have three points against his record the following April.

POWER IN IDAHO

Boise — Soon after Thomas A. Edison perfected the incandescent lamp, the first electric lights flicker-

ed in Idaho. The state now develops over 1,000,000 kilowatts, more electricity to provide power for three and one half million modern homes — or nearly every residence in the state of California.

Ketchum had the first hydroelectric development, operated to supply smelter's lights and machinery in 1881. Then other small plants spotted the map. The first hydro plant to harness the Big Wood River was established at Hailey in 1885. Two years later Boise's first electric light appeared.

Idaho has more water dropping a greater distance than any other state in the nation. It ranks seventh in all the states in hydroelectric resource potential. Ninety percent of Idaho's total hydroelectric potential is yet to be developed.

BET ON HEADS

Evanston, Ill. — Penny flippers should put their money on "heads," according to a research project conducted by 160 freshman mathematics students at Northwestern University. The students conducted 319,020 separate penny flippings and found out that heads came up 160,136 times — that's 50.2 percent. Distribution of metal in the pennies apparently made the coins slightly "tail-heavy."

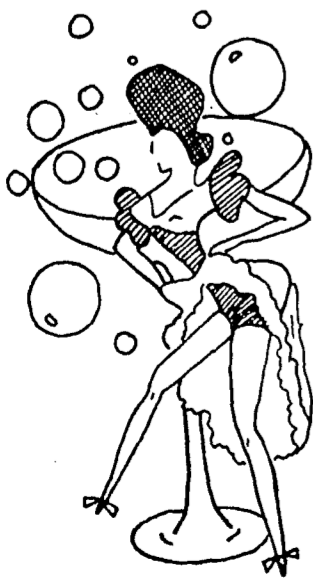

CRATERS OF MOON

Boise — All things are possible in Idaho. One of the most fascinating aspects of eastern Idaho is the Craters of the Moon National Monument on Highway 20 near Arco. With numerous cones and craters and stretches of barren desolation, it resembles the surface of the moon. The last volcanic eruption is believed to have occurred in the year 400 A. D.
 Although lava floods destroyed all vegetation in their paths, today it is possible to find over 200 species of plants native to the area: Sagebrush, antelope bitterbrush and rabbitbrush, mock-orange and tansybrush, to name a few. Lumber pine appears to be the only tree, but juniper, aspen and Douglas Fir have also taken root.
 Two types of lava are found in the area. Both have Hawaiian names since most of our experience with volcanoes has come from Hawaii.
 The 75 square miles of the region forms one of the largest national monuments.
