There will be a detour on the south side of the river for cars and small trucks — but it will be impossible for larger vehicles to negotiate the detour curves. Detour signs will be placed.

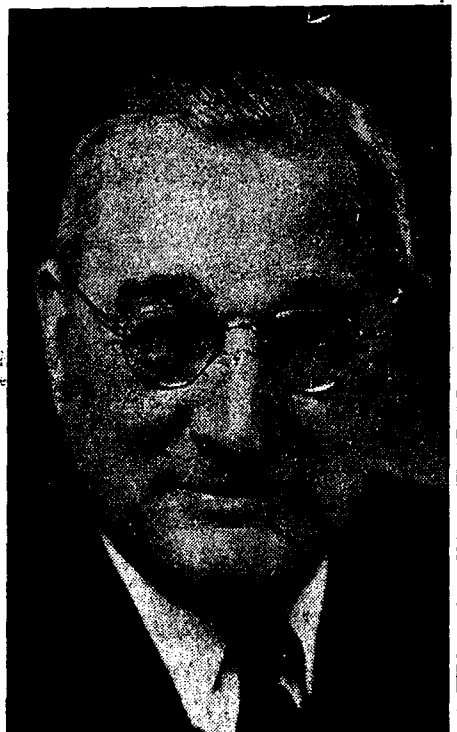
Lloyd Craig, Leland, is now the supervisor for this area. New equipment and more employees are to be added to care for the enlarged area.

## REAL CROWDS AT SEVENTH ANNUAL BLOSSOM FESTIVAL

An estimated 1,800 to 2,000 people attended the seventh annual Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival Saturday, and for the seventh time the "weather man" cooperated. Skies ranged from cloudy to sunny, but the temperature was just right.

To begin the day 55 entries paraded, including ten area riding clubs.

Grand Marshal for the day was Rev. F. C. Schmidt, who, accompanied by his granddaughter, Debbie Schmidt, rode in a large convertible, following the Color Guard of the V. F. W.

Grand prize for the best float went to the Trail Riders Motorcycle Club of Kendrick with the theme of "Hawaii." First place in the Commercial division went to Brocke & Sons, Inc., Seedsmen. Second place went to the Gem State Lumber Co. of Juliaetta.

First place in the Community division was won by the Happy Home Club of Big Bear Ridge. The Potlatch Ridge 4-H Club took second place.

As nearly as can be determined by a "plate count" 1,250 were fed at the barbecue in the Kendrick Park, the serving beginning at 11:15 and ending just under two hours later. The barbecue was handled by the Kendrick Community Lion Club and the Kendrick V. F. W. The Kendrick High School band furnished music during the noon hour. There was a special reserved section for "Old Timers."

The Hill & Valley Garden Club held its 3rd Annual Flower Show as a part of the Festival. Amid a setting of garden scenes, picturing lilted music, themes of "Cool, Clear Water," "In a Chinese Temple Garden," "In the Good Old Summer-time" and others, the artistic arrangements and horticultural entries were displayed. According to Latah County sheriff's officers, who were summoned, Mrs. Jean had apparently carried an over-heated pan of grease to the sink, where it either exploded or caught fire, igniting a head scarf she was wearing.

The rest of her clothing then apparently caught fire and she ran from the house to a hydrant in the yard.

Mrs. Chester Westling, a neighbor, saw her in flames and called another neighbor, Mrs. Edward Groseclose to help. They ran across a lot with a blanket, but Mrs. Jean had collapsed.

According to Dr. R. D. Brooks, Latah County coroner, Mrs. Jean died of extensive second and third degree burns.

The body was taken to Short's Chapel in Moscow.

The funeral will be Wednesday at 10:00 a. m. at the Southwick Community Church. Burial will be in the Southwick Cemetery.

**WW2 VET HOME LOANS TO STOP**

Less than three months remain for veterans of World War II to use their guarantee privileges for a loan to purchase a home, farm or for business purposes. This warning came from Loryn E. Kopan, director of the Veterans Administration center in Boise.

Present statutes provide that the absolute cut-off date for World War II veterans will be on July 25, 1967. This deadline is the result of Congressional action which has delayed the final date of eligibility several times.

The cutoff will not affect veterans of the Korean Conflict or veterans who have served since January 31, 1955, Kopan pointed out, as these veterans are covered by different legislation.

Almost seven million loans have been guaranteed by the Veterans Administration to veterans since the beginning of the program following World War II. One out of every five homes constructed in the United States following World War II was with V A guarantee.

The Veterans Administration will guarantee up to 60 percent of the purchase price of a home for a veteran with limitation as to the total purchase price.

Kopan urged veterans planning to purchase a home to make their selection as soon as possible, avoiding the last minute rush for certification.

**LONG TIME AGO**

Fragments of two celestial bodies that collided some 650 million years ago are still raining on earth, a Purdue University scientist reports. In fact, he says, more than half of the meteorites that have fallen on earth probably came from this single collision, which occurred between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter.

The building was built during the fall and winter of 1882, and was opened a year later to students between the ages of 5 and 20. The school housed as many as 89 students, and was used for religious services, town meetings, dances, as well as educational instruction. It received its name — American Ridge — from the community in which it was established.

Two Idaho pioneers, Harvey Brilhart and Joseph Davidson, were responsible for erecting the original building. The shingles were made of split tamarack and then shaved; the doors and window frames were hand made. The building did not have electricity, but depended on the natural sunlight that flowed through six small windows. A lone pot-bellied stove added warmth to the room.

The original blackboards, nothing more than dull, black paint over paneling of the interior walls, and chalk marks can still be recognized.

The school house was used for ten years, until it became too small for the growing number of children. A new school was constructed to replace it in 1894, near the same location.

**KNOW YOUR IDAHO**

Idaho is rich in its heritage of slumbering ghost towns. Visitors thrill at yawning doorways, weather beaten buildings in a landscape that once bespoke the prosperity of the early gold rush days.

A craze for gold lured men and their families from every corner of the continent. Lawyers, miners, gamblers and adventurers ambled the streets of the once-thriving gold rush towns.

Rich memorials of a gun battle in the old saloon - arrival of the town's mail - laden stage coach masses of heavy machinery now reduced to rusted scraps flavor the scene of Idaho's ghost towns.

Remnants of these early settlements sprinkled over the state include: Silver City, the most picturesque of all, situated high in the Owyhees in southwest Idaho; Leesburg, located a few miles west of Salmon City; Placerville tucked away in the Boise National Forest; Idaho City, also located in the Boise National Forest; Florence, 31 miles south of Grangeville, and Dewey, five miles from Silver City, Idaho.

**A SMALL WOUND**

A pin scratch, a bee sting or a small cut — can be the channel through which you could get tetanus, reports the American Medical Association. Tetanus-producing spores lie dormant in the soil of your garden, the dirt of your garage and the dust inside your house. They may remain in your body for long lengths without producing the disease, or they might produce poison effects in 5 to 14 days. First signs of tetanus are irritability and restlessness. Muscles rapidly become rigid, eventually causing a clenched-jaw leer that gives tetanus its nickname — lockjaw.
