VILLAGE STREETS OILED LAST WEEK

Most of Kendrick's streets and the main alley in the business district received a seal coat of oil and chips last Thursday and Friday, and results appear most satisfactory.

The old schoolhouse hill was oiled up beyond the V. F. W. Hall, and the north slope of the hill received a double coat of oil.

While the roller was operating on the street south of the V. F. W. hall, near the Dave Clayton home, the brakes gave way on the machine and down it came, raising a terrific clatter. The driver headed it into the alley just below the hall — and then jumped. The big machine tore down the steel guard railing at the edge of the alley and came to a stop in the V. F. W. parking lot, breaking a cement walk just below the guard rail — but apparently doing no damage whatever to the roller.

Perhaps as a result of this, the south slope of the schoolhouse hill was not rolled, leaving the packing of the surface to vehicles traveling it.

Going back into the years we recall that when the south slope of the schoolhouse hill was first paved, the paving company's roller driver refused to operate the machine on it, and Emulus Brown took over and did the job.

Doctor in the Kitchen

 Consultant, National Dairy Council
TODAY'S DAIRY FOODS
 This is June Dairy Month, when special attention is focused on the widespread industry which keeps the United States supplied with a basic essential food product never exceeded in quality and safety anywhere, any time.
 Based on cow's milk, dairy products constitute a mainstay of the diet of our people. They are the principal food of most of our babies; even those who are fed at the mother's breast often have supplementary feedings of cow's milk. Young people need and enjoy dairy products, and they are essential to the aging for the maintenance of vitality in bones, teeth, muscles, nerves and blood through the calcium they supply. Milk products are the principal and only good source of calcium in our dietary.
Abundant Energy
 The fat in whole milk contributes essential fatty acids, supplies abundant energy in small bulk, adds flavor to our cooking, and carries a natural supply of vitamin A, besides acting as the vehicle for the vitamin D customarily added to milk to safeguard our young people against rickets, especially in infancy.
 Milk fat is the main constituent of butter and is present in most cheeses. Creamed cottage cheese contains only four percent milk fat; uncreamed cottage cheese has virtually no fat. Milk supplies the body with an easily and quickly assimilated simple sugar, lactose, an immediate source of energy.
 In addition to calcium, milk supplies a variety of so-called "trace" mineral elements, essential to the body in minute quantities (traces). It is also a source of the B-vitamins riboflavin, niacin, and thiamine, necessary for the maintenance of normal body chemistry.
 Dairy products include whole milk, skimmed milk, low-fat milk, buttermilk, sour cream, cream, half-and-half, ice cream, ice milk, sherbets, many kinds of cheese, butter, and the milk solids which often are added to bakery goods and other food products to enhance their nutritive value.
Safety Guaranteed
 The safety of milk is guaranteed by the tuberculin testing of all cattle to guard against bovine tuberculosis, and Bang testing to protect against undulant fever. Sanitation of barns; sterilizing of milking equipment, bottles and bottle-filling equipment; and supervision over the health of herdsmen contribute to the safety of your milk products. Fluid milk and cream and some cheeses are pasteurized as a further safeguard. Milk is kept cool all the way from farm to family, except during the pasteurizing process.
 These safety precautions are supervised by health officials; many were initiated by the industry even before there were legal requirements.

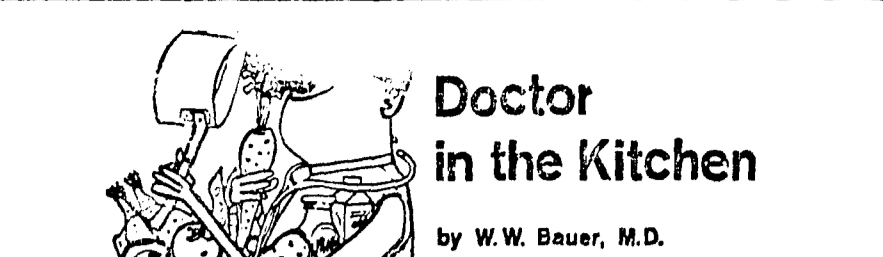
