ORDINANCE NO. 538: AN ORDINANCE VACATING THE ALLEY SITUATED IN BLOCK "C" OF ADDISON ADDITION TO THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, IDAHO; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF DEEDS TO THE OWNERS OF LANDS ABUTTING ON SAID VACATED ALLEY AND PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Section 1. That all of the alley situate in Block "C" of Addison Addition to the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, as shown by the recorded plat thereof be, and the same is hereby vacated; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that there are hereby RESERVED unto the Village of Kendrick, easements over, under and across the above described alley and land for the location, construction, installation, removal, maintenance, repair and replacement of water, drainage and sewer lines, mains and connections, and for all other purposes of every nature pertaining thereto, together with the right of ingress and egress to and from said premises for the purposes aforesaid.
