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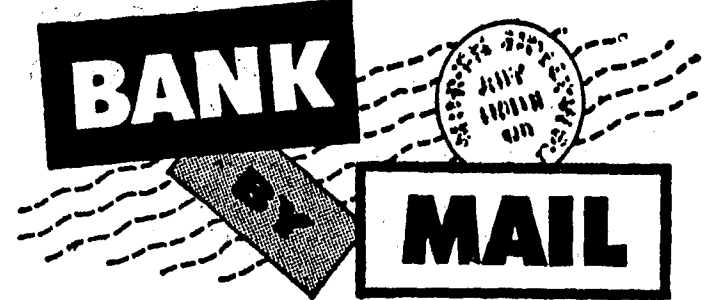

U. OF I. GRAD BUSY IN SPACE PROGRAM

U. of I., Moscow — When a Titan III-C booster hurled six satellites into orbit from Cape Kennedy, Fla., this month, Lt. Col. Merrill E. Barnes, University of Idaho graduate from Boise, helped put three more "phone links" in the new U. S. military communications network in outer space.

Lt. Col. Barnes, son of Mrs. Martha Barnes of Boise, is system programs staff officer with the Air Force Systems Command Space and Missile Systems organization at Los Angeles.

Barnes received his B. S. degree in civil engineering from the University of Idaho, and his Master's degree in civil engineering at the University of Illinois.

SCOUTS TO TOUR U. S. FOR JAMBOREE

New Brunswick, N. J. — Boy Scouts from 100 countries will move into the United States beginning on July 16, on their way to the XII World Jamboree to be held at Farragut State Park, Idaho, from Aug. 1 to 9. The last group will leave this country on Sept. 4.

During the time they are in the United States, they will tour nearly every state, visit major cities and national parks, and stay at Boy Scout camps and homes, and western ranches. Arrival and departure points for the World Jamboree contingents include New York, Miami, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Spokane.

Forty Scouts from Chile, for example, will visit New York, Cleveland, Chicago, Omaha, Cheyenne, Yellowstone National Park, Los Angeles, Miami and Lubbock, Texas during their six-week bus trip.

Scouts from Switzerland will visit

New York and Chicago; stay with Swiss-American Scout families in New Glarus, Wis.; and be hosted by Scout families in Sioux Falls and Rapid City, S. D.; Sheridan, Wyo., and Leavenworth, Wn.

The large delegation of 1,315 from Great Britain, will divide into six groups and will make different coast-to-coast tours before and after the Jamboree.

Nearly all of the 100 contingents will arrive in the United States by air, but most will travel by bus to and from the Jamboree.

One air charter flight will bring 136 Boy Scouts from the Danish Boy Scouts Association and the YMCA — Boy Scouts of Denmark, plus one member of the Boy Scouts of Faroe Islands, and 24 adults from Copenhagen to Oakland, Calif. Their bus tour will include Salt Lake City and Logan, Utah; Yellowstone National Park; Missoula, Mont., and Eugene, Ore.

Host committees have been organized to assist all groups at the ports of entry.

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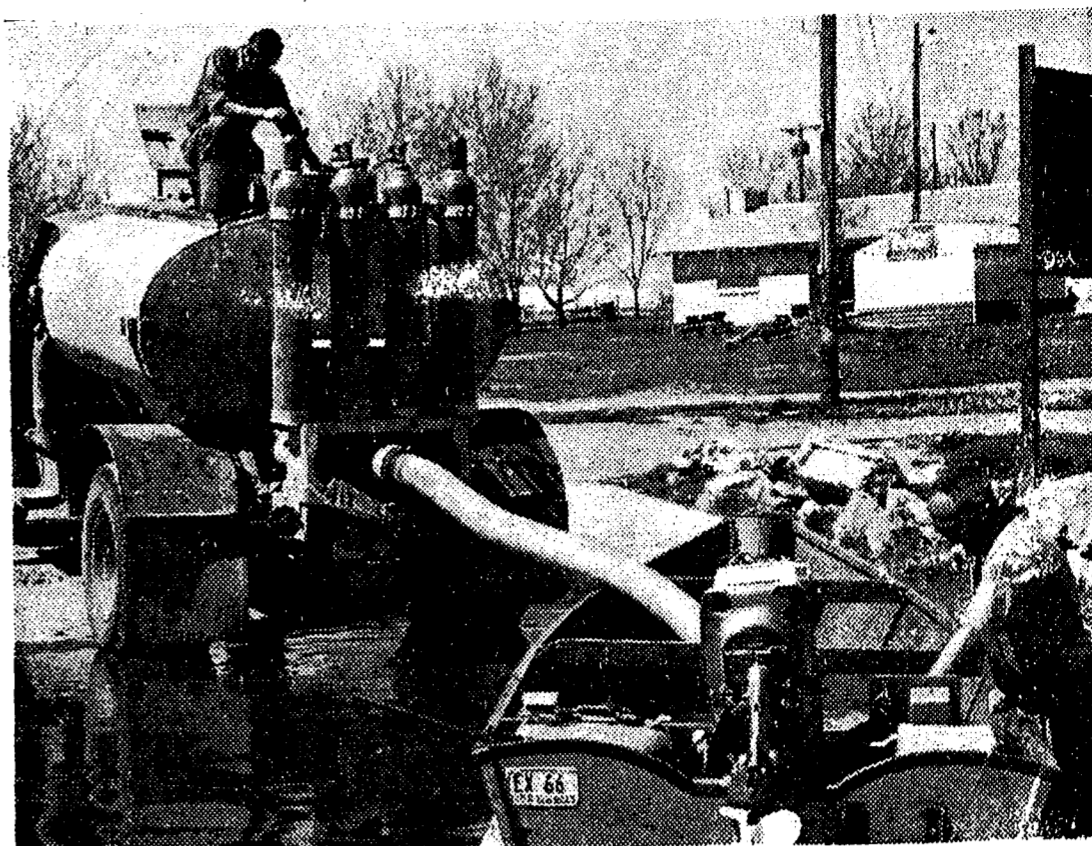
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TROUT PLANTING IN SOUTH IDAHO

Boise — Trout embarkation starts for trip out on American Falls Reservoir. Norman Floyd, American Falls hatchery superintendent, here checks flow of fish from tanker trucks as they are loaded into boat. Fisheries biologist Osborne Casey, Pocatello, controls water depth in boat. When fish are loaded, boat makes release run across reservoir as trout flow through suction gate at stern. This system distributes fish evenly around the reservoir to prevent loss by being eaten by larger fish.

HIGHWAY BADLY NEEDS SEAL COATING

State Highway 3 from Spalding Junction to at least as far as Deary is badly in need of seal coating, say those who travel it frequently. At the Deary end there are ruts which cause a car or light vehicle to "weave," where heavily loaded vehicles have left their mark in the oiled surface, softened by summer suns.

Between Juliaetta and Kendrick it is described as "not too bad," but a seal coat would help greatly.

Between Juliaetta and Spalding the road is full of "waves," ruts and some "dishes" or shallow pot-holes. Here a real leveling and oiling job is needed.

No one blames our local highway crew, they have certainly put in the hours and done their best, but real heavy seal coating is needed in many spots. Let's hope we get it before winter comes.

MAPS ARE POPULAR

Boise — The 1967 state highway maps featuring historic points of interest and scenic attractions have been distributed by the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development, through the courtesy of the Department of Highways, to 50,000 more people than in 1966.

As part of the state's travel promotion program, 900 maps are mailed daily by the Department of Commerce and Development. Requests come from all over the United States, Canada, and foreign countries. The bulk of inquiries are written by educational institutions, tourists intending to vacation in Idaho, and others

responding to the state nationwide advertising program. In addition bulk shipments are sent to sports and travel shows.

The maps, together with packets of Idaho brochures, supply state agencies, conventions, libraries, U. S. auto clubs, chambers of commerce, travel agencies and other miscellaneous groups.

In 1966 the Department of Commerce and Development distributed 155,000 highway maps.
