HARVESTING WILL HIT PEAK IN AREA THIS WEEK

Unless the unforeseen in weather develops, local warehouse men expect harvesting operations in this area to hit their peak this week.

Bob Watts of the Kendrick Rochdale Co. said that wheat is now beginning to pour into the warehouse, with the quality good. There are, of course, some shriveled kernels, due to the extremely hot weather of the past three weeks. However, the big problem is wild oats which are literally "loaded" with them. It seems there wasn't enough winter to kill out the pests.

Mr. Watts also stated that the fall barley harvest was almost at an end, with the quality good.

Ben Westendahl of the Lewiston Grain Growers said the harvest was "just beginning to come good" and the quality was good, with the exception of wheat carrying a high percentage of wild oats. The fall barley harvest was all but at an end, with the quality good.

He added that green peas are now coming in, and that growers have reported yields of from 1,500 to 2,200 pounds per acre. Here, too, the quality was good.

Ben added that the peak of the harvest should be reached this week.

Brooke & Sons, Inc., Seedsmen, report that most of the local grass seed crop is now in, and that both quality and yield were good.

Peas are now beginning to pour in, and yield and quality both appear quite satisfactory.

A few Austria peas are also coming into their warehouse at this time. No lentils have yet been threshed to that firm's knowledge.

Monday morning, early, quite a number of trucks were to be seen on Kendrick's Main Street, awaiting the opening of the warehouses to unload. It reminded one of the days when box cars were so very short and the warehouses were unable to ship satisfactorily. Then, long lines of trucks were to be seen, the drivers waiting patiently for their turn to unload.

DICKSON ACCEPTED AS MALTING BARLEY

Milwaukee, Wis. — The Malting Barley Improvement Association has announced that the variety "Dickson" has been classified by industry as an acceptable malting and brewing variety for production in mid-western malting barley producing states, subject to acceptance by industry in future commercial production.

The decision to classify Dickson as an acceptable malting and brewing variety was based on extensive pilot and plant scale malting and brewing tests. Plant scale tests were made on car-lots from the 1964, 1965 and 1966 crops.

Dickson must be marketed in pure variety lots because the quality characteristics of it are somewhat different from other malting varieties. This will permit separate malting of pure Dickson for best results, and will enable the malsters to satisfy the brewers' specifications on varietal blends in their malt.

While Dickson has shown good field resistance to leaf blight diseases, there have been indications that it may be more susceptible to kernel blight than other currently grown malting barleys. Under average growing conditions, Dickson will tend to produce a lower percentage of plump kernels than Larker, but comparable to Trophy, and superior to Traill. Along with other important factors kernel blight and percentage of plump kernels can affect market price.

TO SEE LOG SKILLS

New Brunswick, N. J. — The famous logging skills of the Northwest will not only be demonstrated for the Scouts from 100 nations gathering in Idaho this August, they'll get to try their own hand at them.

Under the leadership of Weyerhaeuser Corporation, the lumber industries have arranged for championship loggers to demonstrate their climbing, cutting and other abilities prior to the rodeo, Aug. 4. Then, at the end of the Adventure Trail on the Jamboree site, the Scouts will have an opportunity to test their own skills at log raising, log rolling, sawing and wood chipping.

FIRST FIRE OF THE SEASON MONDAY NEAR SOUTHWICK

The first seriously threatening fire of the season happened on Monday, between 9:30 and 9:50 a. m. at what is known as "the old Southwick dump." It is located around half a mile east of the Tschantz Brothers farm. The blaze, of undetermined origin, began in the dump and burning trash, carried by gusty winds, blew it across the road, threatening wheat and hay fields. However, only a strip of a wheat field was burned, and the fire did not get into the canyon.

Some 30 to 35 farmers, women and others in the entire area were soon at work fighting the fire. They had it quite well under control by the time the Kendrick Fire Protective District had arrived on the scene. Three men and two pumper trucks responded immediately following the call at 9:50.

Norman Lewis, Deputy State Forester, in an interview, credited those who responded to the danger with averting what could have been a great loss in crops and property.

He also urged those using the dump to be careful in backing too far now, as the log cribbing at the dump was burned away and a vehicle could plunge to the canyon below if backed onto the former edge of the dump for unloading.

FORMAL OPENING OF SCOUT JAMBOREE

Farragut — The massed flags of almost every free nation on earth led the opening ceremony as the Boy Scouts, 14,000 strong, began the XII World Jamboree Tuesday evening. For nine days, Scouts from over one hundred countries will camp together in the rugged Northern Idaho country at Farragut State Park.

Pine covered mountains made an inspiring backdrop at the 25,000 person natural amphitheater as the Scouts began to weld together their Jamboree theme of "For Friendship."

As the colorful flags cleared the 300 foot stage, the torch which was presented by the then King Constantine of Greece during the last World Jamboree in 1963 was again carried into the massive open air theater by a Greek Scout to continue the eternal flame of friendship.

Speaking on behalf of the host nation, Chief Scout Executive Joseph A. Brunton, Jr., expressed the warm greetings of the United States of America as boy meets boy to strengthen friendship and mutual respect during nine days of living together in the spirit of Scouting.

There is a fun side to scouting, too. The wonderful world of pantomime — and fun — was enjoyed without the need for words as famed clown Emmett Kelly, Jr., entertained under the light of an Idaho sunset.

As the sky darkened, one of the largest fireworks displays in the world spelled out the word "Welcome in French, Spanish, and English, the official languages of the XII Jamboree. To the music of "Around the World in 80 Days," a crescendo of sky rockets lighted the mountains and valleys ending with the World Jamboree theme ... For Friendship in glowing ten foot letters lighting the sky.

FIVE COUNTIES ARE JOINING FORCES

U. of I. Moscow — Economic linking of five northern Idaho counties was sought recently with the filing of papers with the Secretary of State at Boise for permission to establish the non-profit Clearwater Economic Development Association.

Dr. David D. Kendrick, dean of the University of Idaho's College of Business Administration and temporary president of the proposed association, said that the five counties joining forces were: Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nezperce.

Purpose of the association is: "To promote the welfare of northern Idaho, the State of Idaho and the region as a whole; to improve the economic stability of said areas; to seek, accept and assist in the placement of new industries of the region; to cooperate with all levels of government, local, state and federal, and with all interested private individuals and legal entities in the furthering of all such purposes."

"Of special interest is the requirement that each county, certain cities and the Nezperce Indian Reservation are to be represented on the board of directors. There will also be a representative of each major sector of the five-county economy."

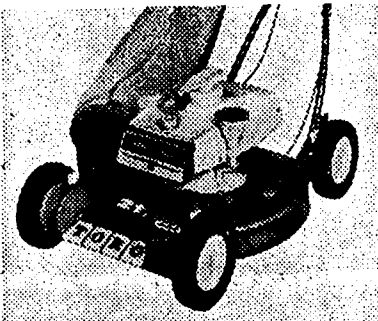

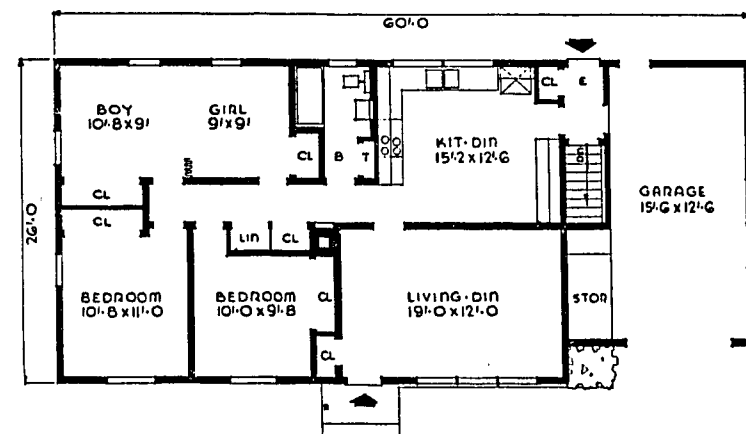

SOME SIGNS ARE INADEQUATE

Spokane — With more and more super highways being completed, more and more motorists are complaining that the signs along the highways don't always tell them how

to get where they want to go, according to a preliminary national survey of vacation travel habits, the Inland Automobile Ass'n said last week.

Seventy percent of those responding to a recent survey on the vacation habits of its members listed "confusing or inadequate directional signs" as the thing that annoyed them most about highway travel. In a similar 1955 survey, 62 percent made the same complaint.

Other annoyances, listed in order were: Traffic congestion in urban areas, 35 percent; billboards on the scenic highways, 28 percent; large trucks and buses, 27 percent; lack of services on freeways, 22 percent; very large house trailers, 19 percent.

Large trucks and buses apparently are not annoying travelers as much as they did in the similar survey of 1963. That complaint dropped from fourth place to fifth on the list.

IDEAS GET REWARD

Lewiston — Leonard L. Hayes, project engineer for the Lewiston and Jaypee veneer and plywood plants of Potlatch Forests, Inc., has received two checks totaling \$500.00 for developing two improvements to lathe equipment now being used by the company at both plants.

Patent applications have been filed with the U. S. Patent office in his name for a self-cleaning veneer lathe chuck and a new chucking device for lathe loading equipment. The improvement to the loader allows the operator to keep the lathe spindle turning as each new log is loaded for peeling into veneer instead of stopping each time as previously required.

The self-cleaning lathe chuck (a device for holding each log in the lathe as it is peeled) is also a time saving improvement, eliminating the troublesome problem of periodically stopping the lathe to clean out the chucks plugged with pieces of wood. The two improvements have increased the veneer production rate at both plants.
