HARVEST MOVING IN HIGH GEAR WITH WEATHER 'PERFECT'

Harvesting operations in this area are described as moving along in "high gear" with weather conditions "perfect." Trucks and pickups, in an almost endless string can be seen on Kendrick's Main Street from early morning to late evening — loaded with wheat, peas and the last of the fall barley.

Ben Westendahl of the Lewiston Grain Growers said Monday: "We are extremely busy these days, with wheat, rolling in. The quality of the grain itself is good, but foul material is heavier than it has been in years. As yet we have found no smut on wheat, but there has been some on the cheatgrass found with the wheat."

Most of the fall barley is in, and most of it graded No. 1. No spring barley has yet come into our Kendrick warehouse.

Farmers say their yields are down a bit from those of last year. "We have had no accurate yield reports as yet."

Brocke & Sons, Inc., Seedsmen, say the green pea harvest is almost at an end, with only an occasional load now coming in. They report the quality as good, but yields reported by growers are below those of last year — probably due to the sudden and then prolonged hot weather.

Black pea harvesting is reported as about one-third done. Here again the quality is good, but yields are down.

No lentils have arrived as yet at their warehouse — and it will probably be about a week or ten days before they can be expected.

Bob-Watts of the Kendrick Rochdale Co. said: "Wheat is coming in 'fast and furious,' and I believe about two-thirds of it is now in. This week, if the weather holds, should see almost all of it under roof."

The quality of the wheat is pretty good except for wild oats — and they are the heaviest or worst I have ever seen."

Fall barley is mostly in, only an occasional load coming now. To date we have received no spring barley. No accurate yield reports have been given to date — farmers being too busy to figure it out.

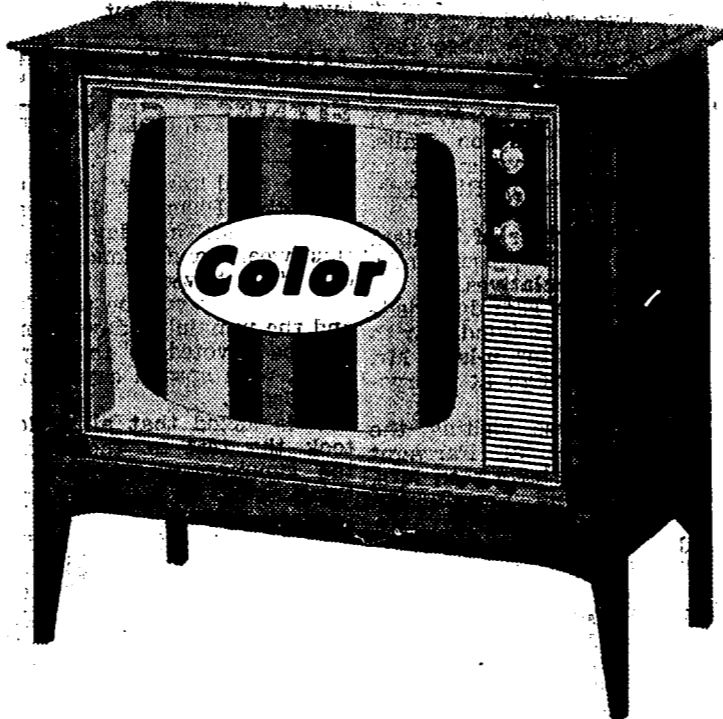

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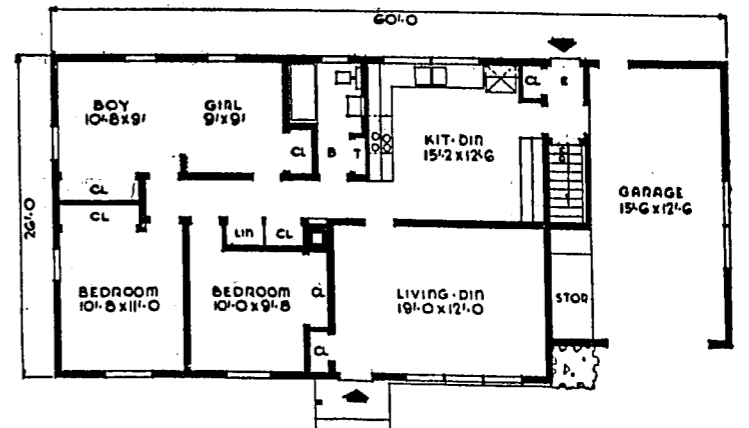

DESSERTS ARE MY DOWNFALL

Heard across the bridge table: "Oh dear, I wish hostesses wouldn't tempt me with candy and nuts..."
 "You really don't have to eat them, darling..."
 "I haven't noticed you refraining, dear!"
 "Come on, girls, I bid a no trump!"
 "Two spades. I can let the bridge mix alone. It's desserts that are my downfall!"
 "Three no, And don't even talk to me about desserts."

After a relatively heavy meal, a good dessert is something light, attractive, low in calories and yet not lacking in food value. Fresh fruits are excellent, or fruit cups artificially flavored to hold down the calorie count, or a compote of dried or canned fruits without added sugar; gelatin desserts, with or without fruit, jelled or whipped, are fine, and are low enough in calories to allow the luxury of some rich cream.

Plan Accordingly
 Why should we deny ourselves the pleasures of a fine cake, well frosted, or a tasty meringue with suitable trimmings, like maybe ice cream and fruit? These are excellent foods, providing the essential nutrients in a tempting form. They are not, however, suitable at the end of an elaborate meal featuring rich and high-calorie foods. When these desserts are planned, or others like them, the rest of the meal should be adjusted accordingly.

Try Ice Cream Or Ice Milk
 There is no need to forego desserts like ice cream, if they are planned as part of the meal. Ice cream is a delicious form of milk which is particularly useful for those who may not wish to drink milk. Children, of course — of all ages — love ice cream. For those who wish more protein and carbohydrate and less fat, ice milk is excellent. For those who cannot take sugar, dietetic ice cream or ice-milk are available, and taste almost as good.

A good hostess trick with desserts is to portion them for an hour or so after the meal, serving them with coffee in the living room or on the patio.

A suitable dessert may make the difference between a good and interesting evening and a social dud, with everyone fighting sleep.
