Village Is Now "City"
At a special City Council meeting, held Aug. 21, to reorganize the previous Village Board of Trustees, Fred Silflow was elected Mayor, and Bruce Sherman elected President of the Council.

House Bill No. 3 was passed by the 39th Session of the Idaho Legislature changing the status of corporate villages to corporate cities. The Board had earlier passed a resolution to adopt such ordinances as may be necessary to effect the provisions of H. B. No. 3.

The ordinances adopted also named the Kendrick Gazette as official publication media for the City; and the First Security Bank, Kendrick, as official depository for funds.

A Mayor and two Council members will have to be elected at the next city election, Nov. 7, 1967, by qualified voters of the city.

The Kendrick Junior High students will register Sept. 5, the first day of classes.
Pre-registration of Juliaetta Elementary students will be Sept. 1, from 8:00 a. m. to 2:00 p. m. All parents that can register their grade school students on this date will help eliminate the rush on the first day of school.

Summer Maintenance

During the summer there have been changes in both schools. The gym at Juliaetta has been painted, and so have the boys' and girls' dressing rooms. Smoke doors have been installed at the top of the stair well, in compliance with fire codes. The old wood heating vent has been removed. The second grade and library rooms have been painted, as have the outside window casings.

The student desks in the fourth grade have been replaced. New shelving has been built, and P. E. baskets purchased for P. E. clothes, for the fourth, fifth and sixth grade students.

A nine-piece obstacle course and two basketball standards have been installed under the Rural Fitness Program. New English books have been purchased for all grades — this is part of State Text Book adoptions.

POTLATCH RIDGE FIRE COVERS ABOUT 100 ACRES SUNDAY

A fire late Sunday afternoon, which began in the barn at the Arnold Hoisington ranch from unknown causes, burned about 100 acres of stubble and pasture land on the Hoisington, Howard Wolff, Harold Parks and "Doc" Little ranches before being brought under control by volunteers and men and equipment from the Kendrick Fire Protective District.

Dick Benjamin, Assistant District Fire Warden, said approximately 50 men fought the stubborn blaze before bringing it under control. He said that yeoman service by the volunteers and farmers using tractors and plows contributed greatly to the effective and quick suppression of the blaze.

Witnesses and workers said the dry stubble and cheat grass seemed to literally "explode" when touched by the racing flames. Had there been much of a breeze results could have been far more disastrous.

One volunteer fire fighter who arrived on the scene early, said that the Hoisington barn "almost seemed to explode," appearing to be burning in its entirety. It went straight up in smoke, with the roof and timbers collapsing right into the middle — and that helped, for the wind didn't scatter too many burning embers."

BICYCLES AND MOTORCYCLES

Kendrick Village authorities said this week that they have no desire to punish youngsters riding bicycles on sidewalks in defiance of the village ordinance — but that the ordinance must and will be enforced — so please, if your child is one of the riders — keep him or her off the sidewalk!

Further, in the interests of fire safety, motorcycles must not be ridden anywhere off regular roads — as the backfire from one, even if it is fully muffled, could set dead grass and weeds on fire!

They said further that all burning of trash and other matter, even in covered barrels must cease in its entirety until such time as rain abates the fire danger considerably.

Monday, with a breeze blowing, it was a mere 89 degrees, but skies were cloudless.

Tuesday — 94 degrees
The Potlatch river is down to "the merest of mere trickles," and one must "look twice" to be sure any water is coming out of Bear Creek. The Middle Potlatch shows a tiny trickle, and the Little Potlatch is a barren stream bed.

HARVEST IS ALL BUT OVER NOW

Local warehousemen say that in this area "Harvest is all but over." Occasionally a load of barley or late sown wheat makes its appearance, but in general, harvest is over for small grains.

Brocke & Sons, Inc., Seedsmen, say pea harvesting is almost complete, and that lentils are now two-thirds to three-fourths in.

In general, the quality this year varied from "good" to "excellent," but was hampered in harvesting and in some cases grading by an exceptionally large amount of foul matter — wild oats in particular — and in some cases cheat grass and lambs quarter. This was due to the lack of cool weather the past winter and an exceptionally wet spring.

ROY PHAYER DIES AT MOSCOW AUG. 17

Roy Phayer, 84, a resident of the Deary and Kendrick areas most of his life, died Thursday, Aug. 17, at the Paradise Villa Nursing Home in Moscow.

Phayer, a retired farmer, was born June 21, 1883, at Missoula, Montana. He had never married.

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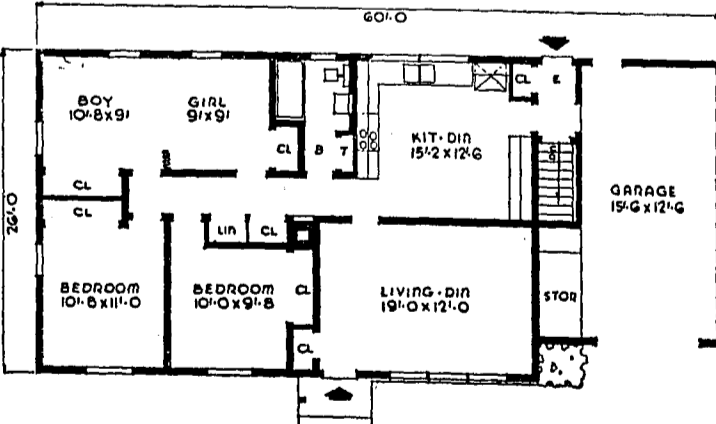
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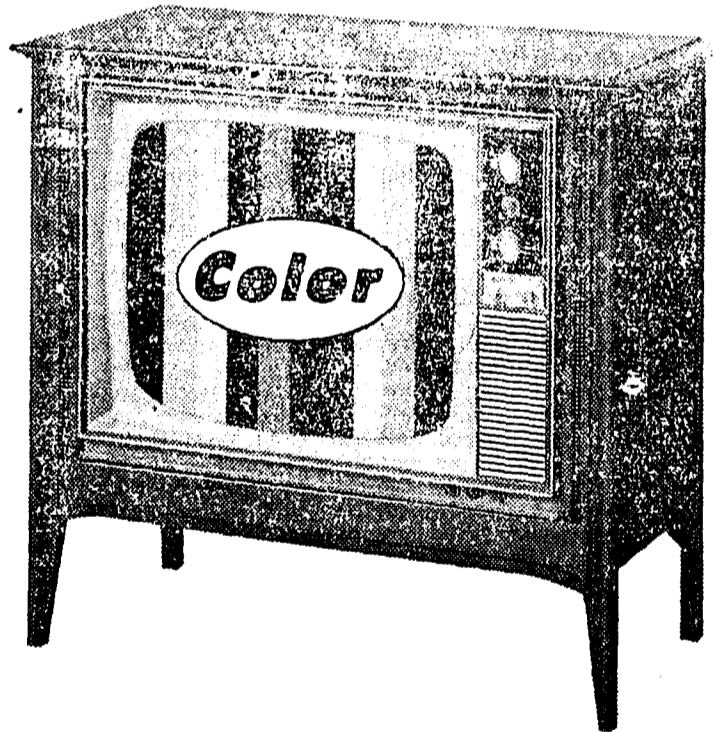


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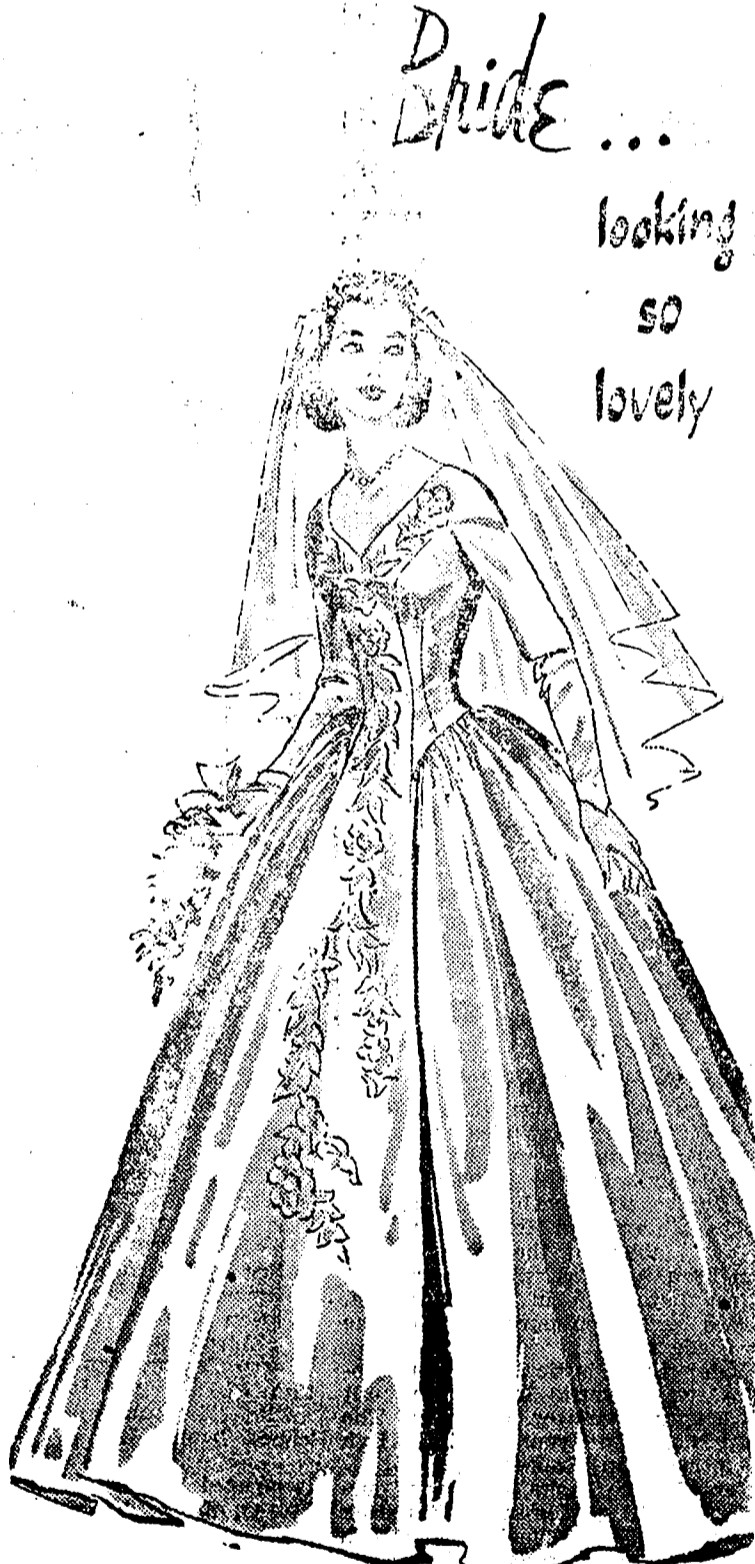

Boise, Aug. 18 — Whereas an unusual fire danger exists within parts of Idaho hereinafter described — and under authority of Section 38-116, Idaho Code, the following described areas are closed to unauthorized entry:

All forest lands and range lands within the following Forest Protective Districts: Kootenai Valley; Priest Lake; Pend Oreille; Mica Forest; Cataldo; West St. Joe; Kendrick; Clearwater-Potlatch; Maggie Creek; Craig Mountain; Kaniku; Coeur d'Alene; St. Joe National Forest; Orogrande Forest.

Excepted from the closure will be local residences and established campgrounds and parks.

(In general this includes all areas of North Idaho north of the Salmon River, with the exception of the Nez Perce National Forest.)

Permit to authorize entry into the closed areas may be obtained from the Forest Warden's offices and the National Forest Ranger stations.

This closure shall be in full force and effect from and after 12:01 a. m. Saturday, Aug. 19, 1967, until the 20th day of October, 1967, or until otherwise ordered. — Gordon C. Trombley, State Land Commissioner.

WHAT TIME IS IT?

Boise — By now, most Idahoans have probably grown accustomed to Daylight Saving Time. Some people make the most of the extra daylight hours — others complain a little about staying up so late and having to get up so early. If that is not

enough, consider the confusion and the reports of a few complaints that the clock has caused for the Idaho Department of Highways.

The main headquarters office of the department is located at Boise. The six district offices are at Shoshone, Pocatello, Rigby, Lewiston, Coeur d'Alene, and there is also a separate district office at Boise.

The Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene offices are located in the Pacific Time Zone. The others are in the Mountain Time Zone, or one hour ahead of the northern areas.

Because total coordination between all districts is necessary, all offices conform to Boise time. Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene highway people have to be on the job at 7:00 a. m., which is 8:00 A. M. in the capitol city.

To further confuse the issue, the northern districts get off work at 4:00 P. M., which is 5:00 P. M. in Boise, which would be 3:00 P. M. in Lewiston if Pacific Daylight Savings Time was not in effect. Whew!

District Highway Engineers Don Cox, Lewiston, and Merle Harding, Coeur d'Alene, commented: "Our employees have no difficulty coming to work at 7:00 A. M. and getting off at 4:00 P. M. The complaint we receive from a few people is reasonable but not true. Our people work a full eight-hour day building and maintaining highways. All districts

have to conform to the same time for daily communications and in the event of any emergency. We hope this clears up any misunderstanding."

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 WHERE GOOD WILL IS IMPORTANT

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AGRICULTURE HAS ADVANCED RAPIDLY

U. of I., Moscow — "Agriculture in Idaho as elsewhere has advanced beyond what most of us could not have comprehended 15 years ago." With these words, James E. Kraus, Dean of the College of Agriculture, set the pace at the recent Northwest Plant Food Association meeting in Twin Falls.

"We have added over a million acres of irrigated land in Idaho in the last decade," Kraus reported. New land, plus new methods of farming, has meant more use of fertilizer, he said. Last year Idaho invested \$27 million in the three main fertilizing elements used in the state.

But it isn't enough to continue using fertilizers to get higher and higher yields, Kraus cautioned. "Yield, as such, means little if the product is not of sufficient quality for the use to which it is to be made," he said. He pointed to the famous Idaho Russet potato as an example. If the tuber has a poor russet surface, it has poor salability

on the fresh market.

"We have reached the point where we need to re-evaluate our objectives, methods and values as related to soil fertility research," Kraus emphasized. "We need extensive research in the area of tissue analysis, for instance. If this is practical and economically feasible, we could do a better job of tailoring fertilizers to crops."

4-H BUG HUNTERS IN INSECT WAR

Chicago — One of the most fascinating projects undertaken by 4-H Club members is entomology, the science dealing with insects and insect control.

Plants, animals and humans in North America are attacked by some 3,000 different kinds of insects. Crop and livestock losses in the United States alone caused by these pests amounts to \$12 billion annually. The battle between insects and man is as old as time and so far, the insects are ahead.

hunters have joined the ranks of home owners, farmers, scientists, researchers and gardeners to lessen the destruction caused by insects. The 4-H entomologists first learn to identify harmful insects common to their area. Then they learn how and when to control them.

Working with the boys and girls enrolled in the national 4-H Entomology program are local club leaders and county extension agents. Safe use and storage of pesticides is particularly stressed.

"If habits of safe and correct use of pesticides are cultivated by 4-H members, they are likely to carry them over into adult life," commented a 4-H leader.

Some 4-H'ers choose another phase of the entomology program. They make a hobby of collecting, classifying and mounting insects, including butterflies, for display and study. Others collect specimens for laboratories, colleges and to exchange with young scientists.

BE 'WATER' CAREFUL

Walla Walla, Wn. — Lt. Gen. William Cassidy, chief of Army Engineers, is disturbed by the report of 200 drownings at Corps-operated reservoirs in the country last year.

While announcing that 193.7 million visitor days were spent by Americans at Corps' water recreation projects throughout the nation during 1966, he expressed himself as appalled at the needless fatalities.

He said too many swimmers overestimate their strength and ability, and too few boaters observe common sense caution in handling their craft.

Use of Corps' water recreation

facilities rose 25 percent in 1966 over the previous year.
