## BURNED LANDS TO BE RESEED SOON

Moscow — The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee for Latah county has announced that \$850,000 is now set aside for cost-sharing the reseeding of burned over rangeland near Potlatch. Some 251 acres will receive 10 pounds of mixed grass seed per acre sometime after the fall rains begin or winter sets in.

Before aerial seeding starts, some of the farmers plan to clean up the area with dozers for a smoother, more productive range. Roy Glenn, Chairman of the ASC committee, said that most of the fence building will be postponed until next year, and could be cost-shared under the 1968 ASC program.

Mr. Glenn said that aerial seeding of grass on burned over rangeland has been very successful in the Bo-vill, Deary and Kendrick areas in past years. A mixture of orchard grass, timothy, alta fescue and alfalfa clover is recommended. Some farmers have used hand seeders and obtained good results.

Mr. Glenn also reminds farmers who plan fall conservation practices to be sure to sign up before starting the project. Such practices include field striping, rangeland seeding, spring and pond development, pipelines for cattle, weed control, grass waterways, terraces, channel clearance and planting winter peas for ground protection and green manure.

U. of I., Moscow — An estimated 300,000 viewers watched, and another 600 in the audience cheered, as George M. Brunzell, Spokane, President of the Washington Water Power Co., announced his firm's gift of \$50,000 to the University of Idaho's Fund for the Performing Arts Center Wednesday night of last week.

Brunzell is a graduate of the University and National Chairman of FPAC. The campaign for "more than \$2 million" launched jointly by the University and its Alumni Association to build a new Performing Arts Center on the campus, was kicked off at a huge rally in the ballroom of the S. U. B. and was televised throughout Idaho and the Inland Empire.

The National Kickoff Rally, titled "Idaho/67" was attended by the 30 area chairmen for Idaho, each of whom will now hold a rally in his locale. Nearly 1,000 alumni and friends of the University are geared to carry the appeal to nearly 10,000 selected persons in the state.

## IDAHO GETS CASH

Wash., D. C. — Idaho's highway construction program received a more than \$7 million economic boost last week-end, Senator Frank Church announced this week.

Church said that the Department of Transportation released the full amount of next fiscal year's quarterly allocation of federal highway funds on Oct. 1st. The \$1.1 billion authorization is divided among the 50 states. Idaho will receive \$7,212,000.

The Idaho Senator said this should have a marked effect on the Gem State economy as compared to this time last year when the administration ordered a holdback in highway funds to curb inflation trends.

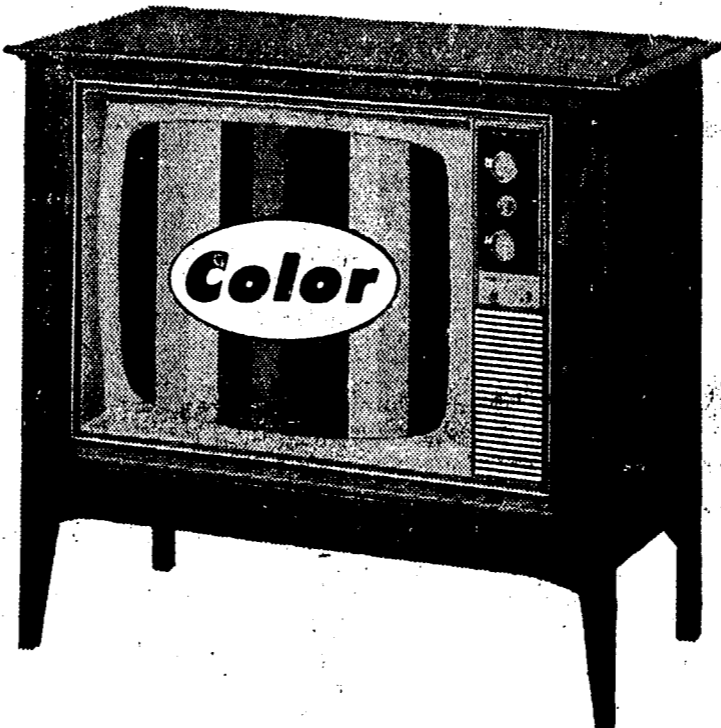

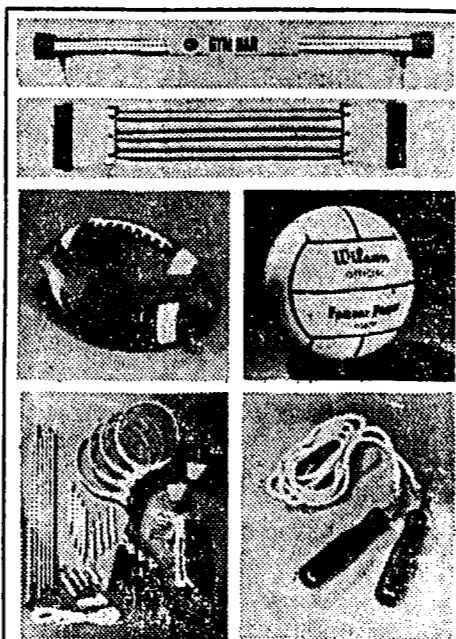

**ASC HOLDS ELECTION**  
 Re-elected to a three-year term as chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee for 1968 was Roy Glenn of Kendrick. Serving a one-year hold-over term and reelected vice chairman was Clarence Jensen, Farmington. Melvin Procnier, Troy, was serving a two-year hold-over term as a regular member. First and second alternates elected to the committee respectively were Wayne Davis, Kendrick, and Lawrence Curtis, Palouse.  
 The ASC farmer committee system is unique in that no other group has so direct a voice in developing and running a government program. Farmers eligible to take part in programs administered by the committee first elect county committeemen, who in turn elect county committeemen. While the county committee is responsible for program expenditures, the county committeemen lend operating assistance where needed, and aid in keeping neighbors informed.

**CHURCH STRIVES FOR IDAHO FISH MONEY**  
 Wash., D. C. — Sen. Frank Church has urged the Senate Commerce committee to favorably report a bill which would make additional federal funds available to improve Idaho salmon and steelhead fish runs.  
 The bill introduced by Church and co-sponsored by Sen. Len Jordan, would include Idaho in the Anadromous Fish Act which provides matching federal funds of up to 50 percent for restoration and development programs. Church said the Act presently prohibits spending federal funds in the Columbia River drainage.  
 "This was appropriate for our sister states of Washington and Oregon, because they have numerous anadromous fish streams that pour into the Pacific," Church said, "but Idaho's great Snake, Salmon and Clearwater rivers — one of the last major spawning grounds for salmon and steelhead trout — are part of the Columbia drainage and thus excluded from the benefits of the Act."  
 Church said the bill would simply amend the Act and authorize the State of Idaho to participate.  
 "This is not just because it is only fair and equitable," Church told the committee, "but because these fish sustain and estimated \$50 million annual industry in the Pacific Northwest. The runs must be preserved and the major spawning complex is in Idaho, where much of the research work must be done."

**DODD GUN BILL TO BE MODIFIED**  
 Wash., D. C. — Citing the strong opposition of Sen. Frank Church and the citizens of Idaho, Sen. Thomas Dodd of Connecticut has proposed modifications in his restrictive gun control bill.  
 The suggested amendment would allow the states to exempt themselves from the rifle and shotgun

regulations imposed by the Dodd Bill but not from the handgun regulations.  
 "This is the first major breakthrough in our fight against federal gun controls," the Idaho senator said. "It shows that the administration is reconsidering its position."  
 Dodd told the Senate that "the record the sub-committee compiled this year demonstrates that some of our states do not want and do not feel they need federal assistance in controlling the acquisition of firearms."  
 "Senator Frank Church, for example," Dodd continued, "presented to the sub-committee a petition of some 44,000 signatures from the state of Idaho who categorically oppose any federal firearms legislation."

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
