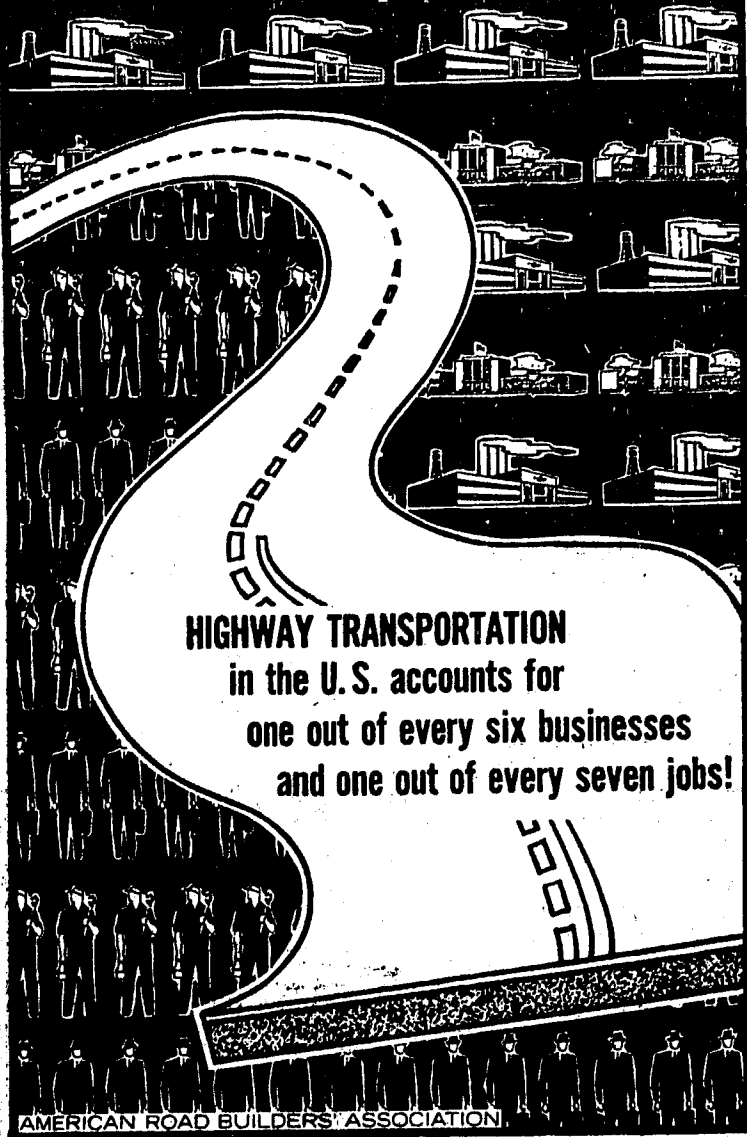

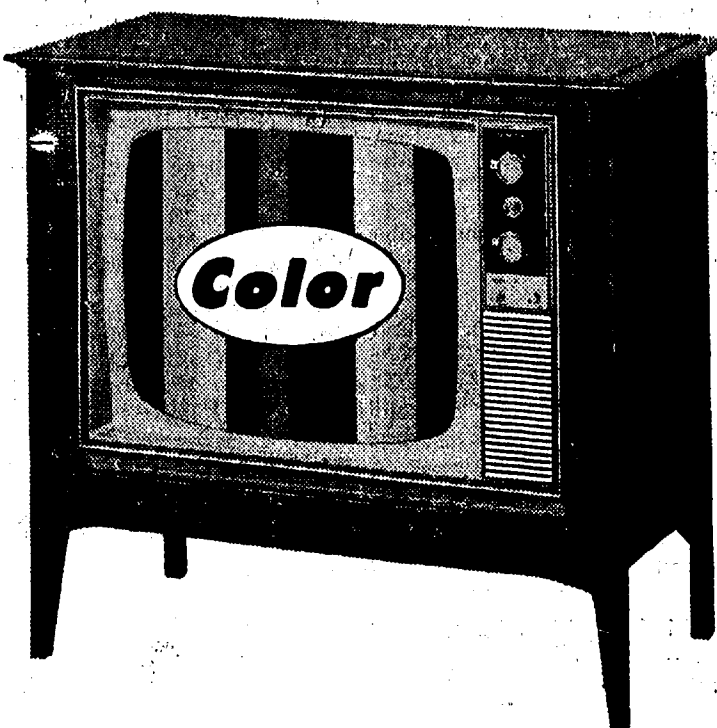

IDAHO PROFESSORS PREPARE TAX AID

U. of I., Moscow — Teachers and others can find assistance in reporting for federal income tax and in acting wisely under tax laws and regulations from an eight-chapter report published by the University of Idaho's Bureau of Business and Economic Research. The report entitled "Education and the Federal Income Tax" was written by Prof. William H. McKenzie and Cumer L. Green. Both authors are certified public accountants. Prof. McKenzie is also an attorney.

Covering a wide range of tax topics and heavily documented with footnotes referring to tax codes, court decisions and Treasury Department regulations, this report is a valuable aid to both the taxpayer and tax specialist. The authors hope the readers may gain several ideas that will reap some tax benefits and bring tax responsibilities into clearer focus.

The report is available in limited numbers free of charge to Idaho residents and can be obtained from the Bureau of Business and Economic Research, University of Idaho.

CATTLE GRUBS CAN BE CONTROLLED

Moscow — Cattle grubs can be controlled with systematic chemicals, says Leonard Burns, Latah County Agricultural agent. The time to take action, he advises, is in the fall before the damage is done.

The grubs are produced by the "heel fly," a pest that causes cattle to run in nervous irritation during the summer. The fly lays its eggs on livestock. Grubs burrow into the skin. When they come out in late winter they make holes in the hide. Damage caused by the grubs — also known as the warbles — is a serious loss to the industry every year.

Chemicals used in the fall help to reduce the damage by killing the grubs in the animal's system. Some of the chemicals also control lice. A few lice that survive the summer are often found in ears, tail switch, and on bellies of stock. As the weather gets cooler they increase. Several generations develop in a winter and an entire herd may be infested from a few animals. Gains are often reduced because animals are disturbed. They spend a good deal of time rubbing against posts, buildings and trees.

The county agent had a word of caution: Some chemicals cannot be used on milking dairy stock because of residue problems. Lists of suitable materials are available at the county agent's office.

'BETTER' TRASH

Evanston, Ill. — Nothing breeds

more trash than better trash collection service. That's the findings of a Northwestern University study of refuse collection in two Chicago wards.

In the project, the amount of refuse collected on a once-a-week basis was considerably less than the trash harvest of twice-weekly service. One explanation is that refuse that stays in a garbage can for a week has a chance to dry out, thus reducing its weight. The survey reported that the more likely explanation, however, is that increased service encourages more trips to the garbage can with trash — instead of burning it, dumping it, or simply leaving it around the house.

TO LOSE INCHES

U. of O., Portland — Jogging a mile or more several times a week is one way to reduce your waistline and get physically fit. Three Oregon physicians and a track coach set 363 Portland area white collar workers to jogging the University of Oregon track for an hour a day, three days a week.

The results: In 12 weeks, the 265 men who completed the program reduced their waistlines an average of 1 1/2 inches. Their blood pressure lowered by varying amounts. Nearly 180 overweight men lost an average of 7.8 pounds.

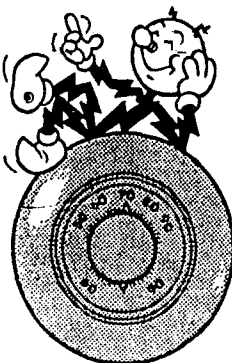

CHECK COOLING SYSTEM IN FALL

While today's car cooling system is designed to operate the year around with reputable anti-freeze solutions, local garagesmen suggest that a periodic inspection of the system is still necessary. They say: "The best times to check are in the fall and spring. Winter and summer put the most strain on the cooling system. Following are the suggested items to be checked:

Inspect condition and level of the anti-freeze. Check to insure solution will handle a minimum temperature of 20 degrees below zero.
Test the pressure-type system for leaks (preferably when cold).
Test the pressure cap and inspect the radiator filler neck. Check the hoses and hose clamps.
Check pump drive belt.
Check thermostat if engine is overheating or running cold.
Check heater operation and connections.

NEW TYPE DRIVER LICENSE ISSUED

Boise — The change-over to a new type of driver's license, which is expected to result in a savings of approximately \$40,000 annually to the Department of Law Enforcement, is announced by Jack Farley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division. The new process now being followed by all sheriff's departments when applications for licenses are made, results in a more durable license. The new laminated type will not break or crack like the old type, the raised lettering has been eliminated, and licenses will be issued to applicants about ten days sooner.

The new application form now includes the written examination on the back and everyone must take this test.

IDAHO HOPES FOR SCOUT JAMBOREE

New Brunswick, N. J. — Farragut State Park, Idaho, has been tentatively approved as the site for the Seventh National Jamboree by the Executive Committee of the Boy Scouts of America. Dwight Thomson of Cincinnati, Ohio, is chairman of the committee. The event is scheduled for the summer of 1969. The 5,000 acre park on Lake Pend Oreille was the site of the XII World Scout Jamboree this past August, when 12,017 Scouts and leaders from 107 countries attended. Mr. Thomson explained that the Executive Committee had approved his committee's recommendation for the site, pending formal agreement with the State of Idaho relative to physical improvements needed to accommodate the larger national jamboree.

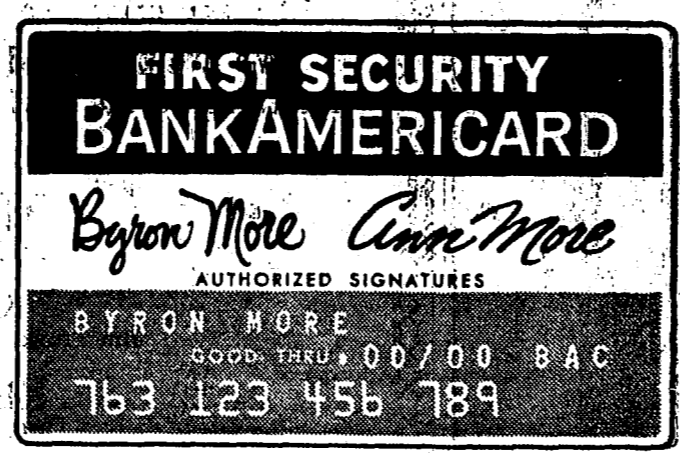

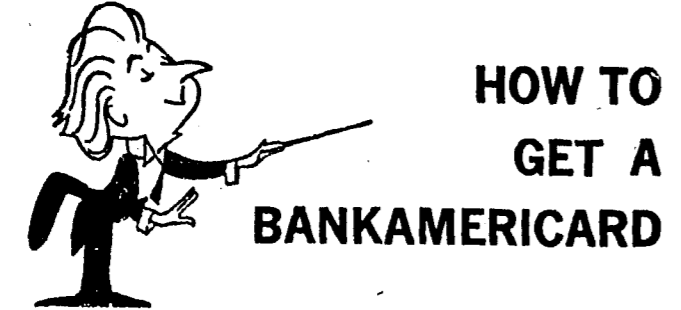

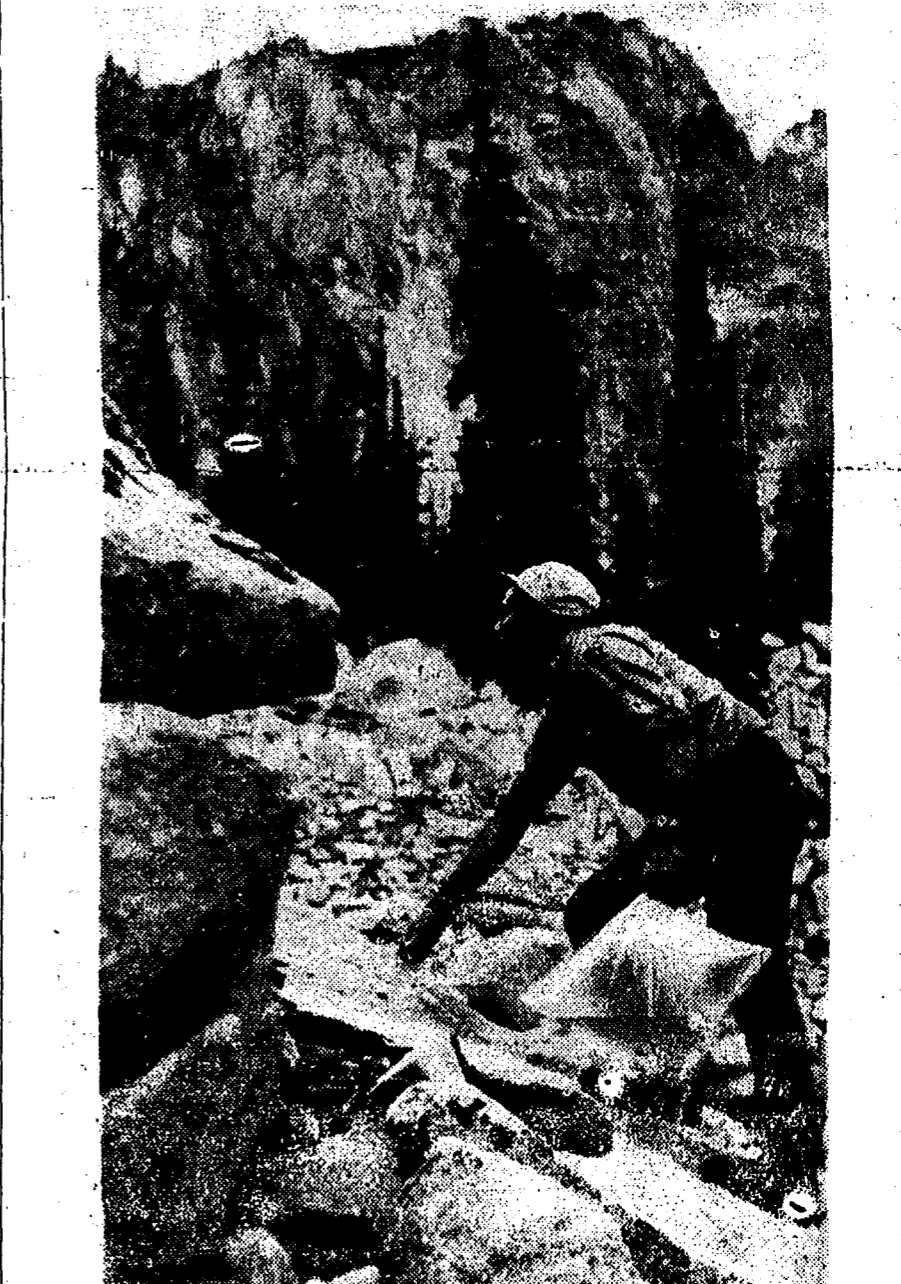

Robert J. Bell, regional fisheries biologist at Jerome, is carrying this plastic bag into a lake that cannot be reached by horseback in southern Idaho. All forms of transportation are used to deliver fish, including backpacks, totebags, horses, conventional aircraft and helicopters.
