## BUSINESS FAIR TO GOOD SAYS BANK QUARTERLY REPORT

Business in Idaho at the end of the third quarter of 1967 was fair to good, with considerable variation among different segments of the economy.

This is the report of First Security Bank's quarterly News Letter now being distributed. It was announced by James Hoogland, Jr., local manager. The News Letter is edited by Dr. Elroy Nelson, First Security vice president and economist.

Production of metals and phosphate was approximately the same as last year, but lumber production was seriously curtailed due to forest fires. Food canning and processing were also below last year's levels, and chemicals production somewhat higher.

Expansion is anticipated in the state's economy for the fourth quarter in food processing; metals should equal last year and crop production set a new record. Lumber output is expected to increase in order to rebuild inventory and meet the increased demand in the construction industry.

Cash receipts from farm marketing in Idaho during 1967 will approach the record established last year. Gross agricultural income for the first nine months of the year was about four percent below last year, but some increase in prices for the last quarter indicates considerable improvement. Livestock prices should be above levels a year ago. Fed cattle prices should continue to improve in the fall marketing period.

The crop production index for the state for 1967 is shown at 180 percent of the 1947-49 average, a new record. This compares with last year's final index of 166 percent, and that of 1965 which was 172 percent. Production of wheat, hay and feed grains is far above last year's record and above the five-year average.

Value of minerals produced in the Gem State in 1967 should approach the record established last year. Lumber production for the first seven months was reported at 1,910 million board feet, a six percent decrease from the same period a year ago. Paper production is slightly above last year's levels.

Retail trade in the state was somewhat slow in the early months of the year, but had increased by late summer. Car and truck sales were also down six percent from last year.

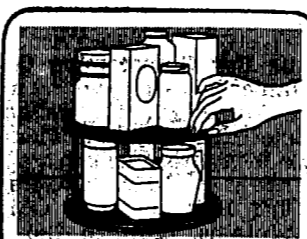

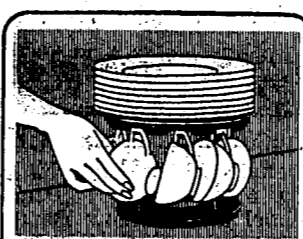


