## BIDS CALLED FOR ON HIGHWAY WORK

Bids will be opened Nov. 21 on a contract involving improvements to State Highway 3 and U. S. Highway 12 in the vicinity of Spalding, the Lewiston district office of the State Highway Department announced on Thursday.

The State Highway 3 project involves widening, straightening and paving the highway along the north side of the Clearwater River from Spalding to Arrow, a distance of 3.6 miles.

The project to pave with a bituminous plant mix 1.2 miles of U. S. Highway 12 from Coyote Gulch to Spalding Junction will be included in the contract.

The State Highway 3 improvement is part of a longer range project to relocate U. S. Highway 12 on the north side of the river between Spalding and Arrow. The next phase of that project will be to construct a new bridge across the river at Arrow. It will go across the downstream end of an island in the river near where Idaho State University archeologists from Pocatello dug for artifacts last summer. — Lewiston Tribune.

Wednesday, Oct. 18, ten members of the Hill & Valley Garden Club held an all-day work session. They started at the Kendrick High School at 10:00 a. m. They weeded and edged the shrub border, replaced pyracantha bushes and planted about ten dozen tulip and daffodil bulbs.

At the Kendrick Roadside park the group weeded and hoed around the shrubs and chopped out weeds around the edge of the park.

In Juliaetta the women reseeded a corner of the park where dirt had been hauled in to fill a low spot. Weeds were doped with a weed killer, dead vines were cut off, the wall the weeds hoed from the flower bed. A pyracantha bush was planted in one corner, and about ten dozen tulip and daffodil bulbs were planted in the flower bed.

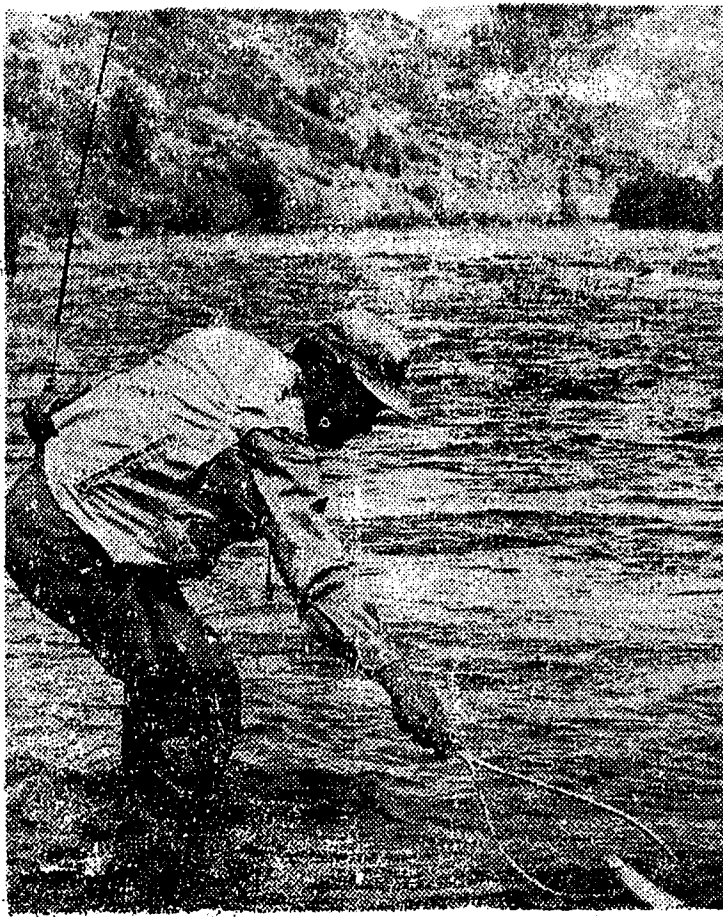

## GO AFTER THOSE INSECTS RIGHT NOW

Moscow — As frost put a nip in the air, insects as well as people like to find warm places indoors. Action to reduce invasions of several common kinds of insects is suggested by Homer Futter, county agricultural agent. The intruders include box elder bugs, clover mites, house flies, spiders and ants.

Prevention of dusting with an insecticide around windows, doors and foundations discourages the pests the county agent said. Although the insects are not likely to cause severe damage and their presence will be short, they are a nuisance and should be unwelcome.

Wettable DDT powder makes a good protection. It prevents bug traffic when soaked into the ground around a house. Surface sprays of 5 percent DDT or 2 percent malathion are effective inside a building. Care in the use of chemicals is essential because of residues and hazards to people and pets if the insecticides are applied in the wrong place or in amounts other than those recommended on labels.

A particular advantage of keeping insects out of the home as weather gets colder is that population within homes will be kept low, with little opportunity for troublesome increase when weather gets warmer again and insects that survive the winter become active once more.

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**FALL FLOWER BULBS**

Moscow — A soil bed 12 inches deep is excellent for planting spring-flowering bulbs, Homer Futter, county agent, advises. If the earth is hard and difficult for roots to penetrate below that depth it is a good idea to dig even deeper. Good drainage is essential. Bulbs may rot in heavy soil that does not drain well.

In areas where the ground does not freeze, daffodils may be planted until January, but an early planting is preferred.

Correct depth of planting is important, the county agent said. For crocuses, glory-of-the-snow, scilla, grape hyacinths and snowdrops, plant the tip of the bulb two inches below the surface. Iris can be set three inches deep, hyacinths four inches, tulips six to seven inches, and daffodils six to eight inches. In case

the soil is unusually light and contains large amounts of sand or organic material, it is well to plant a little deeper.

Where winters are severe, a mulch of two to four inches of straw, hay or leaves is recommended. Such mulching prevents alternate freezing and thawing when bare ground freezes several inches deep.

**RAIN SLICKS ROADS**

Boise — Rain slick highways at this time of the year can be as treacherous as the snow and ice covered roads of winter, warns the Idaho State Police. Highway tragedies can result either from light sprinkles of rain or torrential downpours characteristic of the late fall thunderstorms.

During light rains roads that have been collecting dirt, grease, oil and grime during the heavy summer

travel are nearly as slippery as when covered with ice. Traction is lessened to a degree that speeding cars quickly spin out of control unless extreme caution is practiced by the driver.

Too, when a thick covering of water blankets the highway, automobile tires at certain speeds will "plane" on the water's surface similar to that of a boat on water, and when a vehicle does this, there is very little solid contact with the roadway, causing loss of control.

The Idaho State Police appeal to all motorists to drive safely at all times.

**BRIDGE DAMAGED**

Lewiston — The Harpster bridge on State Highway 13 has been extensively damaged by an over-loaded logging truck and is closed to all truck traffic until repairs can be completed.

Passenger cars, pickups and small campers may use the bridge. Truck traffic and large trailers going to Elk City may detour by way of U. S. 95 to Grangeville, and down either State Highway 13 or the Mt Idaho grade. Motorists coming in from Montana may detour by way of Kamiah via State Highways 62 and 7 to Fenn, and from there to State Highway 13.

## Doctor in the Kitchen

### WATCH THOSE CALORIES

Now that the fall and winter are approaching, many of us will become less active than we have been during the summer months. And so the extra pounds will creep up on us faster than the winter season.

So now you and I will be saying to ourselves, "Better watch those calories!" Watch 'em? Watching them isn't enough. We have to count them. Not the way some of us maybe have been counting the golf strokes all summer, with a convenient forgetfulness when nobody is looking. The calories will show up, even if you watch them, and even if you count them, unless you also control them.

**Watch Winter**  
 "If winter comes, can spring be far behind?" If you over-eat, can overweight be far behind? And we'd better not rely on the more active spring season ahead to cut the weight back to normal. Better to keep it there.

The best way to keep weight where it belongs is to weigh regularly, at least once a week. Some like to weigh daily, and this is all right if it doesn't worry you when you fluctuate up and down a pound or two. Whenever there is the slightest indication of a steady trend upward, even if it is slow, that is the time to stop, look and listen. That's when there may be danger ahead.

In order to control calories, it is necessary to know exactly how

many you are taking in daily. The standard person is described as a male, 25, weighing 154 pounds, or a 25-year-old female, 128 pounds. Recommended daily calorie levels are 2900 for the man, 2100 for the woman. As age progresses, calorie recommendations are less.

There are good sources of information available about caloric and other nutritional values. Among these are the publications of the American Medical Association, especially TODAY'S HEALTH GUIDE; the materials published by the American Dietetic Association and the American Diabetic Association; the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Handbook #8, COMPOSITION OF FOODS; a manual by Alice V. Bradley, TABLES OF FOOD VALUES; and reliable books on nutrition and weight control.

**Avoid Fad Books**  
 But look out — just because it got printed between hard covers doesn't necessarily make it authentic. Check it with someone who knows, like your doctor.

Watching, counting and controlling calories does not mean unbalancing the diet with crash diets — the main thing they crash is your good nutrition and your good health. And you soon gain your weight back when you quit them. Safe and sane weight control means controlling how much you eat in relation to your activity, without losing any of the essential nutrients.
