## CASH FOR PEA AND LENTIL RESEARCH

Pullman — Harold Blain, manager of the Washington and Idaho Dry Pea and Lentil Commissions, announced this week that word had been received from Senator Warren Magnuson's office that President Johnson had signed the Agricultural Appropriations Bill making \$60,000 additional funds available for the regional dry pea and lentil research program at Washington State University. This will make a total of \$85,000 now available for research during the coming year.

Earlier this summer a delegation representing Idaho and Washington pea and lentil associations and commissions testified before both the House and Senate Appropriations Sub-Committee seeking additional funds for the present regional program. A factor in granting of the additional funds was the close bipartisan support and cooperation of the Washington and Idaho congressional delegations in support of the industry request.

Blain also noted that being able to show Congress there is an organized industry which is already supporting research and developing new cash markets was a strong factor in securing the approval for the additional funds.

### American Education Week

American Education Week is being observed Nov. 5 to 11 throughout the country. State Superintendent of Public Instruction D. F. Englekling has asked Idaho citizens to give serious thought to the question, "How good are your schools?"

"We need community appraisal of schools not just during this week, but continuing through the year. Schools in every state are facing a crisis of change to meet new knowledge, new technology and new social attitudes as well as the problem of steeply rising costs," Englekling said.

Idaho's chief school officer noted that the study being initiated by the Idaho Task Force Committee for Education will ask for such an appraisal in local districts by both educators and the lay citizens.

The success of this study depends on the interest and participation of the total community. We want responsible criticism, because we know there are grave problems facing Idaho's school system.

"The Task Force's goal is to find the most urgent problems and recommend a program of solutions," Englekling said.

## 3-D TV COMING?

Detroit — Dancing figures in front of your television set could become a reality, say University of Michigan scientists, with a process for three-dimensional television based on the techniques of holography or "lensless photography."

In 3-D TV, a laser would be shown on subjects in the TV studio, the interference pattern scanned and broadcast. Another tiny laser inside the TV receiver would shine through the interference pattern produced on the screen. The researchers say that there is still a great deal to be done to make 3-D TV feasible.

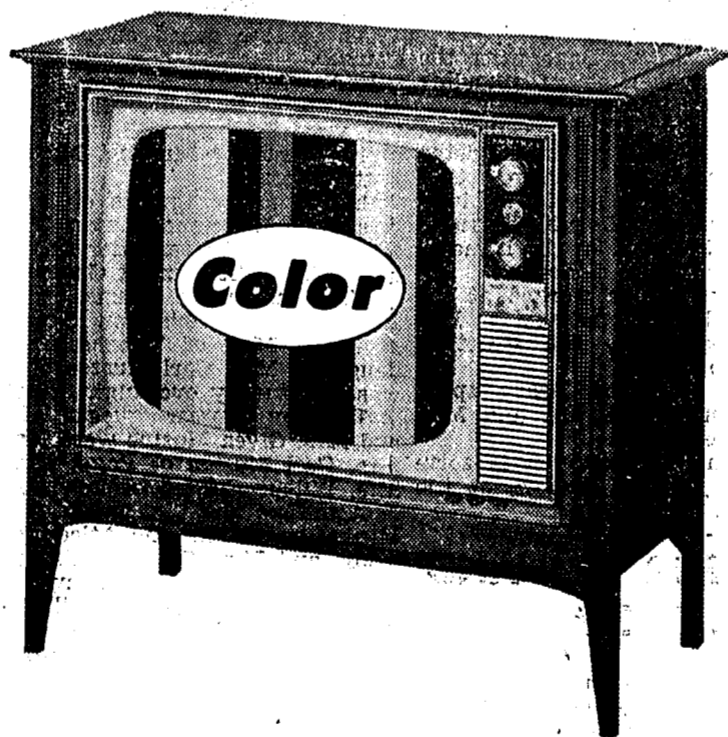

**TIPS ON WINTER FLOWER BULB CARE**

Moscow — Tips on the winter care of cannas, dahlias and gladiolus were offered this week by the county agricultural agent on the basis of recommendations from Tony Horn a horticultural specialist of the University of Idaho Extension Service.  
 When tops of cannas have been killed by frost, they should dry a few days, then be cut off, the roots dug and dried in the sun a few hours and stored in a cool, moderately dry, frost-proof cellar on racks or in slat boxes so air can circulate freely. The best storage temperature is 40 to 45 degrees. A cellar suitable for potatoes is a good place for cannas.  
 Care of dahlias is similar. After a killing frost, cut tops to within six inches of the ground. Then lift, being careful not to injure the roots by bruising or breaking the crown. Remove as much soil as possible from the roots dry thoroughly. Store in a frost-free place at a temperature of about 40 degrees. If the atmosphere of the storage is very dry, the clumps should be placed in boxes of peat moss, vermiculite or sand, or wrapped in newspaper. Use dry packing material because it will draw moisture from the clumps at first and reduce the tendency to dry out near the end of the storage period.

After frost hits gladiolus, dig the entire plant. Dry in a cool, well ventilated place. Then cut off the stems, separate new and old corms. Burn everything except the new corms and cormels. Store in a frost-proof cellar.  
 The county agent also noted that fall is the best time to plant spring-flowering bulbs because they grow best if they develop roots before winter.


