Hazel Hill Dies At Spokane

Mrs. Hazel Irwin Hill, 70, a long-time area resident, died Tuesday morning of last week at the Sacred Heart Hospital in Spokane. She had been transferred there after entering St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston the preceding Thursday. Death was attributed to a paralytic condition and virus infection.

She had been an active member of more than a half dozen community organizations in the area, including the Juliaetta Rebekah Lodge.

She was born Aug. 7, 1897 at Palouse. She attended elementary school at Juliaetta and was graduated from Lewiston High school. She attended Lewiston Normal School, now Lewis-Clark Normal School, and later spent several years teaching in the area.

On May 9, 1920, she married G. C. Otosen. They lived at Juliaetta and Elk River several years before moving to the Seattle area in 1926. They were divorced in 1937.

She moved to Lewiston where she was married to John H. Hill in 1943. He died in 1965.

Survivors include a son, Louis H. Otosen, Lewiston; and a brother, Leland Irwin, Spokane.

Funeral services were held at the Palouse Christian Church Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, with Rev. James Farrell presiding. Music was furnished by Rev. and Mrs. James Farrell.

Pallbearers were Wm. Spray of Walla Walla; Howard Buchanan of Moscow; Wm. Carlton, Jr., and Kenneth Gruell, both of Lewiston; Wm. Carlton and Cecil Gruell, Juliaetta. Interment was in the Palouse Fraternal Cemetery.

Mrs. Heimgartner was born Myrtle Hoisington, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hoisington, Oct. 24, 1887, at Union, Nebraska. In the spring of 1888 she moved with her family to Palouse, and later to Troy, Idaho. In 1896 the family moved to Fix Ridge, near Juliaetta, where she received her education.

Mr. Heimgartner was born March 18, 1884, at Leeds, Iowa, the eldest of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Heimgartner. In 1901 the family moved to a farm on Fix Ridge.

The Heimgartners were married in 1907 and lived on Fix Ridge until they purchased their present farm on Potlatch Ridge in 1918. They have eight children.

In 1957 they retired from farming, although they still live in their farm home. The farm has been

turned over to their sons. Mr. and Mrs. Heimgartner still work a bit, however, as both enjoy gardening, and Heimgartner helps their sons with the work shop.

When asked about their philosophy for a long and happy married life Heimgartner said: "When it looks like we will start quarreling I go for a long walk. It's hard to quarrel by oneself, and if you walk enough you will cool off."

He added: "When there is plenty of work to do there is no time for fighting."

Their eight children are: Mrs. Marion (Erma) Stevens; Eldon, Floyd and Wilbur Heimgartner, all of Juliaetta; Mrs. Alvin (Mabel) Steigers and Clarence and Earl H. Heimgartner, all of Gifford, and Mrs. Robert (Bernice) Foss of Mountain View, Calif. They have 21 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

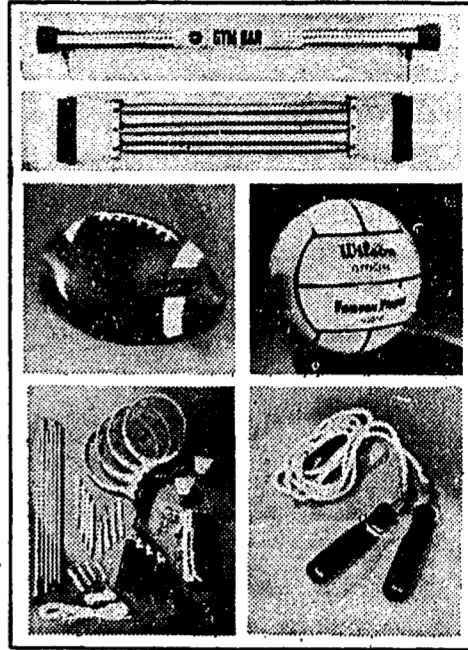

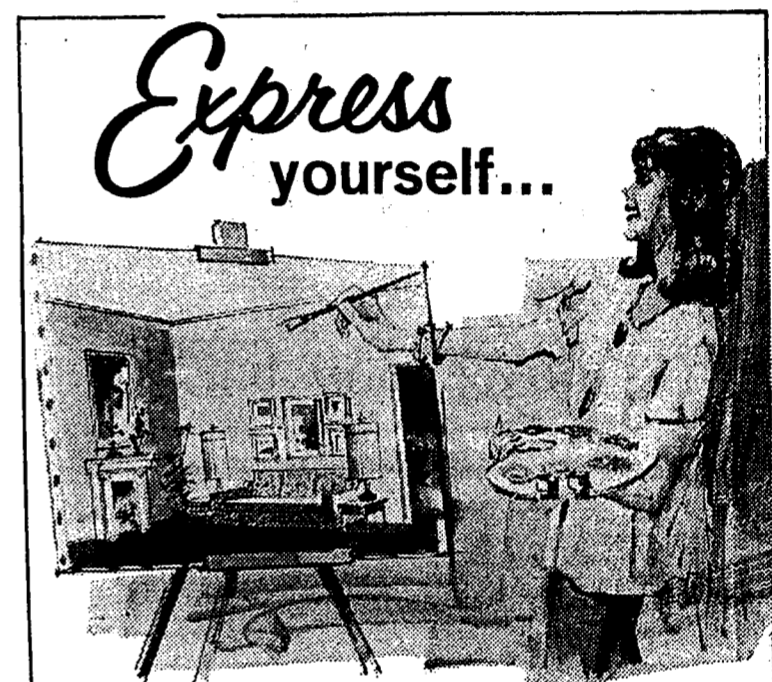

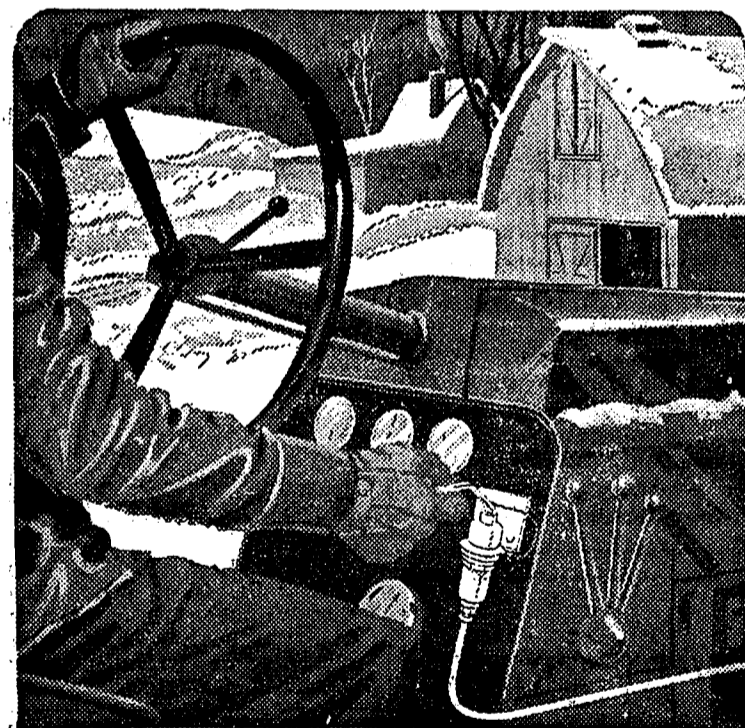
