Hazel Hill Dies At Spokane

Mrs. Hazel Irwin Hill, 70, a longtime area resident, died Tuesday morning of last week at the Sacred Heart Hospital in Spokane. She had been transferred there after entering St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston the preceding Thursday. Death was attributed to a paralytic condition and virus infection.

She had been an active member of more than a half dozen community organizations in the area, including the Juliaetta Rebekah Lodge.
