Adolph Giese, Pioneer, Dies

Adolph E. Giese, 62, a retired farmer and a life-long resident of the Juliaetta-Lewiston area, was found dead at 5:30 Sunday afternoon at his home at Lewiston. The body was discovered by a neighbor, who notified authorities.

Wilfred J. Duclos, Nez Perce coroner, said Giese had apparently died of a heart attack.

Mr. Giese was born Dec. 6, 1904, at Juliaetta. He attended school and grew to manhood there. He moved to the Peck area in 1927, farming there until he retired earlier this year. He then moved to Lewiston to make his home.

He was united in marriage to Elizabeth Goin in Moscow, June 30, 1930. They were divorced in July of 1942. He served in the army during World War II.

Survivors include five brothers: Alfred, Santa Anna, Calif.; Herman and George, both of Lewiston; Julius, Medford, Ore.; and Carl, Temple City, Calif.; and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Phippen, Alhambra, Calif., and Mrs. Susan Albright, Portland.

Funeral services will be at 2:00 p. m. Thursday, Nov. 16, at the Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston, with Rev. Nels C. Carlson, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church officiating. Interment will be in the Fix Ridge Cemetery.

GEORGE A. WILKEN, CAMERON PIONEER, DIES NOV. 8TH

George A. Wilken, 68, a pioneer Cameron farmer and lifelong resident of this area, died at St. Joseph's Hospital at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday, Nov. 8. He had been suffering with a heart condition for the past several years. He retired from farming in 1951.

George C. A. Wilken was born at Cameron, July 16, 1899, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Wilken. He grew to young manhood there, attending schools at Cameron. He farmed the same ranch for 33 years — the one on which he was born and grew to manhood.

He was married to Miss Martha Finke at Lewiston, June 20, 1923, and they made their home on the farm near Cameron until his retirement, when they moved to Kendrick in 1951. He was a life member of the Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron.

He was a Road Commissioner in the Cameron District for several years, and Chairman of the Board of the Kendrick Rochdale Co. for a number of years.

At Kendrick he devoted much of his time to yard and flower growing at the family home. He loved to bowl, and for several years had bowled when his health would permit.

In addition to his widow he is survived by one son, Kenneth Wilken, Cameron; two daughters, Mrs. Paul (Margaret) Kerbrat, Venice, Calif., and Mrs. Theodore (Marlene) Meyer, Cameron; a sister, Mrs. Hattie Johnson, Peck, and six grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Friday, Nov. 10 at 2:00 p. m. in the Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Cameron, with Rev. Theo Meske, pastor, officiating.

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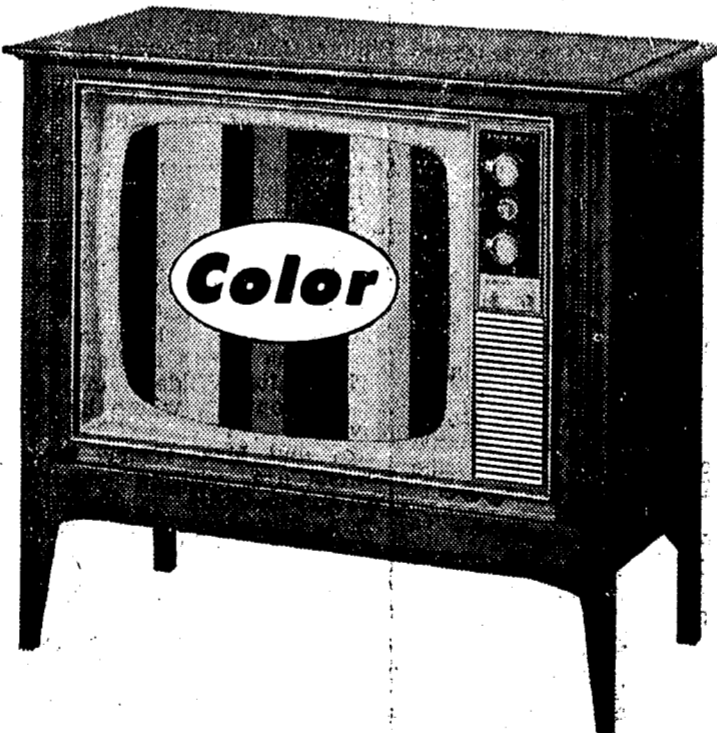

WANT A SPECIAL LICENSE NUMBER?

SAWLOG VALUE IS UP IN SECTION

St. Maries — Russell Slade, County Extension Forester, reports there has been a 4 percent increase in the value of all delivered sawlogs in Kootenai, Benewah and Latah counties since August. Some 32 million board feet of all species of sawlogs are wanted at 10 sawmills at a weighted average price of \$36.90 per 1000 board feet.

William Turner of Gem State Lumber Co., Juliaetta, reports that his company has confidence in the balance of 1967 in spite of a softening lumber market.

Bob DeArmond of DeArmond Lumber Co. of Coeur d'Alene feels that climbing stumpage prices of saw timber present the most difficult problem for the lumber industry. He said that this situation creates a cost price squeeze on the whole industry, including the loggers.

Ten million board feet of fir and larch sawlogs are wanted at \$30 to \$40 per 1000 board feet at all of the following points: Coeur d'Alene, St. Maries, Plummer, Troy, Fernwood, Tensed, Princeton, Moscow, Juliaetta and Cataldo. In addition 6 million board feet of white fir and hemlock sawlogs are also wanted at all of these points at \$30 to \$34 per 1000 board feet. White pine and Ponderosa pine are also wanted at \$30 to \$40 per 1000 board feet.

WINTER BOUQUET TIME IS HERE

U. of I., Moscow — This is the time of year to gather winter bouquets, and you should do it before the first severe fall frost, says Dr. Lambert Erickson, U. of I. agronomist.

Plant gathering should be done with care to avoid spreading the seeds, since many of them may be weeds. As the plants are gathered, place them in plastic bags. Then take them to the garage or work room where you can prepare your winter bouquet.

Place a newspaper on a wide cardboard. The side of a large paper box works well. Make up as many as necessary. Then place the plants side by side, arranging the leaves as you want them to look in the bouquet, and remove all the unwanted leaves and stems. Place weight on parts you want flattened.

them dry. Then paint them the color you desire. Small pressurized paint cans make this job easy and interesting.

Some common Idaho plants for winter bouquets are teasel, burdock, rough pigweed, sumac, Russian thistle, ferns, small pine twigs, small scraggy branches, fiddleneck, tarweed, sagebrush, wormwood, grasses and sedges, horsetails, snowberry or buckbrush, wild rose and rabbit brush. The heads of cattails and bull thistles must be sprayed with clear or tinted paints when they are picked to avoid their fuzzing out.

But be careful of your selection! Do not mistake poison oak or poison ivy for sumac. Sumac is a welcome dash of color to a winter bouquet. Poison oak and ivy are colorful but they are also harmful. They contain the toxic substance urushiol. Contact with any part of the plant — roots, leaves, stem or fruit — can cause a severe inflammation of the skin.

You can distinguish by berries. Sumac berries are red. Oak and ivy berries are white. Leaf formation differs from sumac, too. The leaves of poison ivy and poison oak are formed into three leaflets.

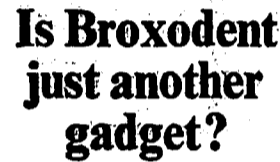
