Charles Hick Dies Monday

Charles H. Hicks, 78, Juliaetta, a retired livestock buyer, died Monday, Nov. 27, at 4:36 a. m. at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston of pneumonia, complicated by the infirmities of age. He had been a patient there for two weeks.

Mr. Hicks was born Jan. 20, 1889, at Dry Ridge, Kentucky, and spent his early years in Indiana. He lived at Union City, Indiana until 1926, when he moved to Leland. There he farmed with his brother, George Hicks.

In 1932 he moved to Juliaetta. He was a stock buyer for the Twin City Sales Yard, Lewiston. He retired in 1952.

Hicks married Minnie Kite of Juliaetta on Feb. 9, 1945. In addition to his widow he is survived by a brother, Harry H. Hicks, San Diego, Calif.; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Frank Barton and Mrs. Sherman Schrock, both of Lewiston; two grandchildren and a great-granddaughter.

Rosary was recited at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday at the Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home, Lewiston, with the Rev. Fr. Howard Moran, pastor of St. Stanislaus Catholic Church, officiating.

POTLATCH WATER WANTED BY U. OF I. AT MOSCOW

Mel Hamilton, Juliaetta, called the attention of the Gazette to the following legal notice, which appeared in the Daily Idahoan, Moscow, under date of Monday, Nov. 20, 1967: We quote verbatim:

"Notice of Application for Permit To Appropriation of the Public Waters of the State of Idaho

"In accordance with the provisions of Section 42-203, Idaho Code

"Notice is hereby given that the Regents of the University of Idaho of Moscow, Idaho, has made application No. 42127 on May 15, 1967, to appropriate 33.91 cubic feet per second of the East Fork of the Potlatch River and the Potlatch River, for domestic purposes for the University of Idaho.

"That the points of diversion are located in 1) SW 1/4, Sec. 32, T. 41 N. R. 1 E. and 2) NW 1/4, Sec. 34, T. 40 N. R. 1 W. B. NW.

"That the place of use is the University of Idaho, City of Moscow, Idaho.

"That any protests against the approval of this application must be filed in the Department of Reclamation of Boise, Idaho, within forty (40) days from the date of this notice and such protest shall state the name and address of the protestant, and shall clearly set forth his objection to the approval of said application.

"Dated this 14th day of November, 1967.

"R. Keith Higginson, State Reclamation Engineer.

"Date of first publication November 20, 1967.

"Date of last publication November 21, 1967.

"Last date for protest December 26, 1967."

"Nov. 20, 21, 1967."

As near as can be determined from available maps at this time, and without knowledge of the exact points at which the University proposes to take the 33.91 cubic feet per second — it would seem that it is the East Fork above the City of Bovill, and again just above the Boulder Creek camp grounds, taking, apparently, all available water from both streams, just after Boulder Creek enters the Potlatch.

Now, should we have another dry summer such as the one just past — how much water would be left in the Potlatch River to supply those who now hold valid water rights? There is a serious doubt if there would be any!

Among those holding valid water rights, to our knowledge, in this section are:

Gem State Lumber Co., Juliaetta, where the water is used for log preservation, fire protection, mill operation, etc.

Juliaetta Dairy, Juliaetta, where the water is used for irrigation, barn sanitation, etc.

Mr. and Mrs. Ervil Woody, Juliaetta, where the water is used for irrigation, etc.

Phil Johns, Juliaetta, irrigation, etc.

At Kendrick:

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schupfer and Mrs. W. A. Watts, irrigation.

Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lind, irrigation.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Glenn, cattle feed, lot, etc.

George F. Brocke & Sons, Inc., cattle ranch. Used for irrigation, barn sanitation, etc.

There may be others of which we are unaware.

Also, the waters of the Potlatch river provide some fishing, water for grazing cattle in the area; water for wild animals and birds.

Taking that much from the Potlatch in a dry season would leave but two small trickles to keep the river going below the points of desired appropriation: Cedar Creek and Bear Creek. The other small streams could hardly be counted.

A Bit Of A Puzzle

Why apparently no publicity was given the "Notice to Appropriate" in any way until the required legal notice appeared and was detected by Mr. Hamilton is something of a mystery, and seems worthy of inquiry. It seems just a bit like California trying to get needed water from Idaho, while desperately saving their own!

It behooves everyone interested in the Potlatch River to "get on the ball" and protest the desired appropriation.

HOMEMAKING TESTS DEC. 5TH

Senior class girls in the high school here will be among more than a half million others in approximately 10,000 high schools across the country who will participate Tuesday, Dec. 5 in a written knowledge and attitude test touching on all phases of homemaking.

One of the girls will go on to merit a \$5,000 college scholarship as All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. National runners-up will be granted \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 in scholarships, respectively. State winners will be awarded \$1,500 scholarships with state runners-up receiving \$500 grants. Winners in each local high school will be presented specially designed silver charms and will have their test papers entered in state competition.

BIDS OPENED ON ARROW ROAD WORK

Lewiston — N. A. Dergstrom, Spokane contractor, was the apparent low bidder on a contract to widen and straighten 3.1 miles of State Highway 3 between the old Snalding bridge and Arrow, the State Highway Department reported Tuesday, Nov. 21. The firm bid \$890,-

284.45. Included in the contract is another project, laying a permanent asphalt surface on U. S. Highway 12 from Coyot Gulch to Spalding. This is a distance of 1.2 miles.

The Spalding to Arrow project on State Highway 3 involves construction of a new 40-foot-wide, two-lane roadway, drainage structures, a 132-foot bridge over Catholic Creek, a 66-foot bridge over Arrow Gulch and laying an asphalt-treated base, a plant-mix bituminous surface and a seal coat.

Donald L. Cox, Lewiston district engineer for the department, said if the bid is approved, construction could begin in about four weeks. It probably will begin first along high bluffs where there are sharp curves in the present bluff.

Ten bids were opened at the department's Boise office. Runner-up bidder was Murphy Bros. of Spokane with \$960,026.50, and third was Max Kunej, also of Spokane, with \$977,204.70.

Contractors were given alternate choices of crushing rock taken from a big cut to be made at the east end of the project at Arrow, or crushing rock from a gravel bar in the adjoining Clearwater river and wasting the rock from the cut. In highway terminology, when material is wasted, it usually is dumped into a gulch somewhere beside the highway to provide a widened fill.

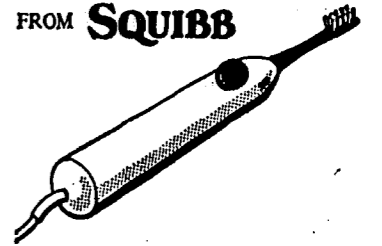
Cox said each of the three lowest bidders chose the plan of crushing rock from the cut, in submitting the lower of their two alternate bids. — Lewiston Tribune.

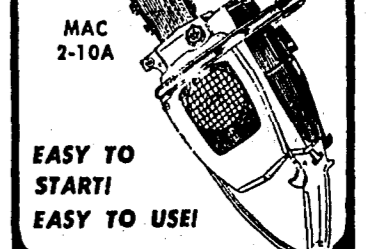

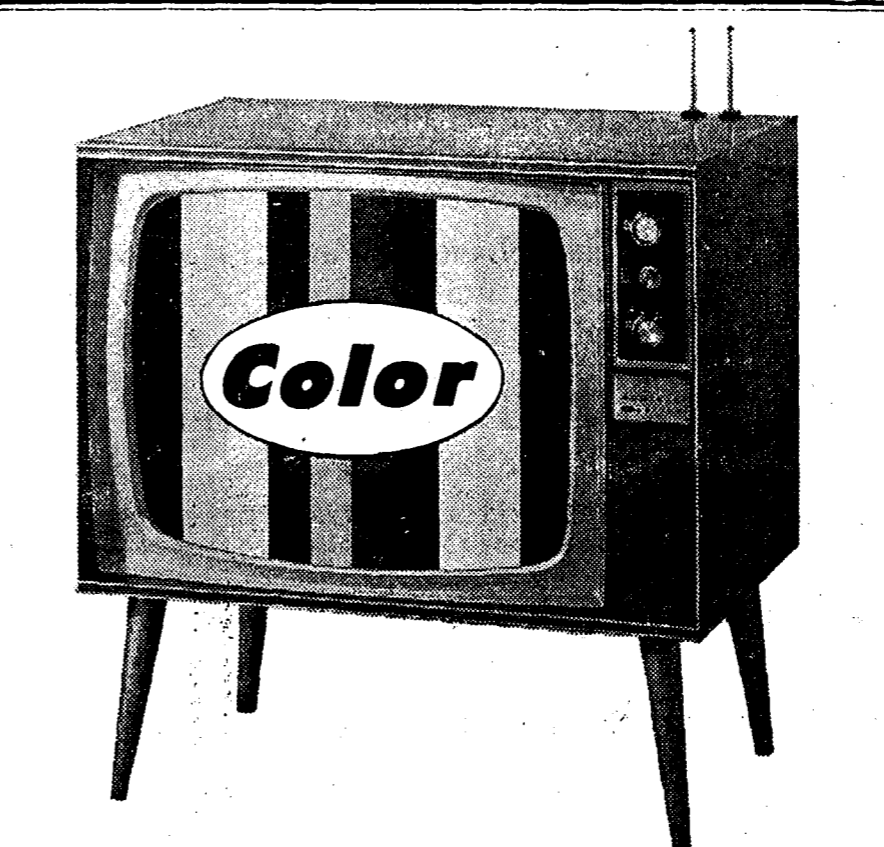

FOLKLORE FOUND IN CITY NAMES

Many Idahoans might be interested in knowing how the city they live in came by its name. When the settlers first arrived in the new, lush primitive area that is now Idaho, they tried to think of suitable names for their little hamlets and villages; some name that was distinct from the other small townships around.

However, if the area reminded them of another place that they were particularly fond of, the name was adopted for their new home. That is how Bern, Idaho, came about. It was the namesake of Bern, Switzerland; and Ferdinand, Idaho, was coined after a settler's homestead in Indiana; as was Genesee, Idaho, named after a garden valley in New York state.

Often for want of a name the people took the closest thing at hand. Such was the naming of Winchester, Idaho, which was dubbed upon seeing a stack of rifles next to a doorway. Chilly, Idaho, became a name when a group of men were in a cabin discussing the establishment of a town when someone came in, saying that it was chilly outside. Hayden Lake, in northern Idaho, was the result of a card game, the winner's name being Matt Hayden. Juliaetta, Idaho, was named after the two daughters of one of the early area residents, Julia and Etta. Kendrick, got its name from the engineer who surveyed the railroad grade into the town, a Mr. Kendrick.

The majority of city titles in Idaho were named after railroad operators or officials, post offices, senators, Indian chiefs, children of the settlers or mining establishments. Today cities such as Grand View, Fruitland and Golden simple show the surge of promotional pride in the state's growth.

CATTLE FACE FLY IS REAL PROBLEM

Moscow — With the coming of winter the 1967 face fly season is over for cattlemen, but it's just beginning for some housewives, according to Larry O'Keefe, University of Idaho extension entomologist.

Cattle face flies spend the winter as adults hibernating in sheltered locations such as barns, hollow logs, and the attics and interwall spaces of homes. Infestations are more likely in northern Idaho than in other parts of the state.

"We don't know why, but they hibernate in large numbers and they seem to select certain locations," said O'Keefe. "When this happens to be your home, a real fly nuisance can develop during the winter and early spring. On warm, sunny days the flies become active and a few will find their way into living quarters. Their presence will be annoying, although they don't feed and are sluggish."

Effective control of face flies in the home can be accomplished with insecticides, but it is complicated and difficult to achieve in many cases. Details are provided in a publication from the county agricultural agent.

IDAHO INCOME UP SAYS U. OF I. REPORT

U. of I., Moscow — Total personal

incomes of people in Idaho have risen over a half billion dollars since 1960, according to a University of Idaho report issued by its Bureau of Business and Economic Research.

Dr. Norman Nybrotten, who is the associate director of the bureau, is the author of the report. He states that the per-person income trend in Idaho has compared favorably with other areas but the total for the state has lagged behind because of a slower population growth. Average income per person rose from \$1,894 in 1960 to \$2,398 in 1966, becoming slightly higher than that of Utah, but remaining below other adjoining states.

Wages and salaries account for about two-fifths of the income of which about 22 percent is derived from public payroll, according to Nybrotten. Almost one-fifth of the total salaries and wages is paid by the wholesale and retail trades. Income from dividends is only about one-third as high as nationally, but rents, royalties and interest are higher in Idaho.

State individual income taxes amount to only about 1 1/2 percent of personal incomes, averaging only \$113.63 per return in 1966. Dr. Nybrotten shows that use of graduated rates, higher rates on higher incomes, has brought about greater increases in income taxes than incomes. He warns that, if personal incomes should decrease, the yield from income taxes would decrease more, percentage-wise.

PENALTIES STIFF FOR CONTINUED LAW VIOLATIONS

W. A. Campbell, local Justice of the Peace points out that laws for continued violations of load, height and similar laws are very severe — and from the Idaho Vehicle Laws of 1961, page 140, Section 49-909 quotes: "Penalties for violations — It shall be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this chapter, and any person convicted of such violation shall be subject to punishment by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days and to the cancellation of registration of each motor vehicle operated in violation of any order for the regulation or suspension of traffic issued under the authority of this chapter, and the cancellation of the license of the operator."

Further, Mr. Campbell says that he believes most drivers are not aware of the new violation point count for traffic violations, and he quotes as follows:

Backing without reasonable safety, 1; driving on wrong side of road 3; Flashing red light (failure to stop) 3; Following too closely, 3; failure to obey police traffic order, 2 one-way island (failure to obey the markings) 2; passing on wrong side, 3; passing without sufficient clearance, 3; passing on hill crest, 3; passing at intersection or grade crossing, 3; passing with view obstructed, 3; passing violation of white line, 4; failure to yield right of way at an intersection, 3; failure to yield right of way on left turn, 3; failure to

yield right of way from private road, 2; failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle, 3; failure to yield right of way to pedestrian, 3; right of way failure to use due caution for pedestrian, 3; failure to stop at railroad crossing by school bus, bus or gas truck, 2; and failure to stop for a school bus, 4.

In the line of "variable point violations" are: Failure to signal, 3 to 4; speeding, 3 to 4; failure to reduce speed for curve or hillcrest, 3 to 4; violation of posted bridge speed, 3 to 4; failure to obey local posted speed zone, 3 to 4; failure to stop at stop sign, 3 to 4; failure to stop when coming from alley, 3; pulling out from curb without being safe, 2; failure to obey traffic light, 3; turning right from wrong lane, 3; turning left from wrong lane, 3; turning without 500 feet visibility, 3; failure to yield when being passed, 3; failure to yield when entering through highway, 3.

He recommends that all study the law and obey it.

He added that the law says: Departmental action indicated by accumulated violation points — Total of 6, first letter addressed to licensee; total of eight, personal interview or examination; total of 12 or more, license suspension.

IDAHO HISTORY

A Shoshoni Indian girl, born in the high mountains of Idaho a year before the election of the first president of the United States, was destined to fulfill the dream of "America's Manifest Destiny."

Sacajewea was born west of the Great Divide, although her people spent nine months of each year at the foot of the Rockies on the Great Plains. They shuttled back and forth over the divide to spend the summer months in the lands of the "Singing Mountains" known as Idaho.

The young Indian girl was nearing her 12th year when she was taken captive at Three Fork village by a group of Indian warriors. Three years later she and a captive Shoshoni companion, Otter Woman, were auctioned as slaves at Mandan. A French-Canadian, Toussaint Charbonneau, bought both girls. He married Otter Woman at once and forced Sacajewea into marriage a year

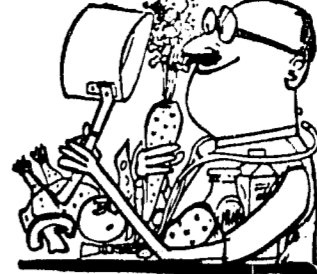
later.

In October of 1804 the Lewis and Clark expedition landed in Mandan and became acquainted with the Frenchman and his squaws. Charbonneau and Sacajewea were employed by the two Virginia-born captains as guides. A year later the company marched into Idaho.

Sacajewea's diplomacy saved the expedition from suspicious warring tribes and enabled the captains to purchase horses from her people. Her reward was a reunion in the Idaho mountains with her brother and father of the Shoshoni tribe.

IT'S NO JOKE, HUMOR SOOTHES

Music may have charms to soothe the savage breast, but humor does it better, two University of Rochester psychologists report. In a study of 50 undergraduate men they found that anger and anxiety are significantly lessened by exposure to any kind of humor. Paradoxically, they found, humor's soothing effects are greatest when the jokes are hostile, sarcastic and insulting and that angered people tend to appreciate hostile jokes more than non-angered people do.

DIET AND ACNE

One of the points that is always stressed for medical students is that where there are many varieties of treatment for any condition, it is a reasonable supposition that none of them is highly successful. If one were, the others would be forgotten.

So it goes with acne, the plague of youth.

This "skin" disease, so distressingly common in adolescent boys and somewhat less so in girls, is not really a skin disease. It is a general condition manifesting itself most annoyingly in the skin eruption. It is essentially a by-product of the changes inherent in moving into manhood or along the way to womanhood.

Glands Active
At this time, the glands of internal secretion are especially active in guiding the maturing of the body and the establishment of the adult pattern of sexuality. Among other glands stimulated are those of the skin, especially the oil or sebaceous glands.

There is no need to describe acne. Everyone knows what it looks like and how it acts. The question is, what to do about it? The usual answer, "You'll outgrow it" is met with the scornful rejoinder, "Yeah, but I've got a date this Saturday night!" And who can blame the guy or the gal!

Among other forms of treatment has been an effort, or many efforts, to control acne through diet. Usually the result is that

a good diet is little or no help, but an unbalanced diet makes matters worse. Suspected foods are the fatty ones, the fried ones, the chocolatey ones and the sweet ones. But take out these foods from the adolescent diet, and what have you got? You've got revolution!

Distorted Report

A recent report attributing acne to milk was based on young people who drank up to four quarts of milk a day, to the detriment of the well-balanced diet which they should have had. Their acne was blamed on the milk. It should have been blamed on the quarts! No one recommends such excessive use of one food.

I like the advice given in the Diet Manual of the Nutrition Department, the Presbyterian Hospital, New York City, which says in effect that the best diet for persons with skin disorders is one which is nutritionally adequate, in which the four basic food groups are represented: Meat, eggs, fish, poultry, milk and dairy products, fruits and vegetables, and whole-grain or enriched cereal products. No single food or group predominates in all allergic disorders, and a good diet accomplishes more than hit-or-miss elimination of specific foods.

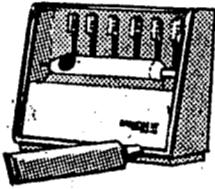
As to the rest of the treatment, let your doctor decide. And don't pick the pimples!

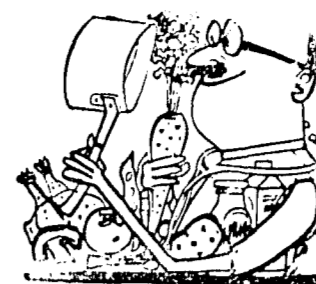

MILK FOR ATHLETES

When there is a difference of opinion among supposedly qualified persons, the best way to settle it is not by argument, but by scientific study.

Athletic coaches have held differing opinions about the values of milk for athletes in training for varsity or Olympic competition. Some have held that the competing, and often still growing athlete needs his milk as much or more than does the person who is not engaging in physically demanding sports. Others have taken the view that milk interferes with athletic performance.

Why The Objections

The specific objections raised to including milk in the diet of athletes were as follows:

- a) milk reduces the secretion of saliva and creates a dryness of the mucous membranes called "cotton mouth";
b) milk consumed within a few hours before competition curdles in the stomach and interferes with maximum performance;
c) milk in the athlete's diet raises his fat intake and lowers his breathing efficiency, and so decreases his performance capability.

Two Research Studies

Two separate and independent studies were initiated to establish the facts in this controversy. One was conducted at Michigan State University, East Lansing; the other at the University of Utah at Logan. At Michigan State the study was conducted with the aid of seven freshman track candidates and two experienced en-

duration runners. At Utah the subjects were 24 athletes representing the competitive sports of football, basketball, track and field, and wrestling.

Without going into all the details of the scientific procedures of the two studies, it is of interest to note that in each instance the subjects studied were divided into two groups. One group had plenty of milk and milk products, the other, for comparison, had the products omitted from their diets except as milk was used in cooking.

Comparisons Made

Comparisons were then made between the groups with respect to ability to run, on a treadmill or track, and other athletic performance, and they showed definitely that the group which had the liberal intake of milk was not affected adversely in any way, even when the milk was taken immediately before competition.

At Michigan State, it was found that the group from whose diet milk was eliminated tended to replace the lost calories with foods of inferior nutritional value, primarily carbohydrates.

Nutrients Far Low

The level of desirable nutrients, especially calcium and riboflavin, fell below desirable level. The claim that milk produces dry mouth and excessive gas formation was definitely disproved, and it was demonstrated that there are valid reasons for including milk in the diet of athletes.

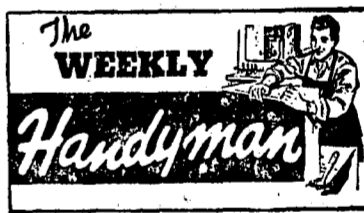

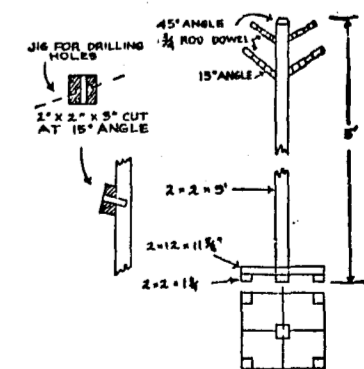

A worthwhile one-evening project is the construction of a hall tree. Easy to make by utilizing portable electric tools such as saw, jigsaw and table, and drill, a hall tree is an ideal substitute for closet space for hanging coats, hats, and jackets, near the recreation room where neighborhood youngsters and adult guests congregate.

The hall tree can be made from any type of wood, depending entirely on where you intend to use it. You'll need an 1 1/2-inch length of 2x12 for the base, 6 feet of 2x2 for the upright and base feet, and a few feet of 3/4-inch dowel rod for hanger pegs.



Hall tree is a one-evening project for a handyman with proper electric tools.

Since finished lumber always is somewhat smaller than the actual size designation, the 2x12 really is 1 1/2 inches wide and, by using an 1 1/2-inch length of that lumber, you'll have a square base. When you make the square hole in the center of the base to insert the upright, remember that a 2x2 actually is 1 1/2 inches square, so the hole should be that size.
