### NEW COMPUTER IN USE AT UNIVERSITY

U. of I., Moscow, — A new \$500,000 computer, capable of doing any type of arithmetic at a rate of 100,000 additions per second, has been installed at the University of Idaho Computer Center, Dr. Ward Crowley director of the center, announced today.

The new computer, an IBM 360, is much faster and has a much larger memory than the university's previous computer.

Some of the tasks slated for the new computer are scheduling students for high school classes throughout the state, doing rapid research computations for the university's various colleges, running student programs for computer courses and performing university administrative calculations. In addition, the computer will be used by federal and state agencies for their research projects.

Dr. Crowley also sees the computer eventually used for scheduling university classes and, perhaps, for computer aided instruction. With computer aided instruction, the instructor programs a course into the computer and then students are taught directly by the computer. According to Dr. Crowley, it would even be possible to program the computer to grade the students and give vocal responses to their questions.

### STUDDERED TIRES ARE BIG WINTER HELP

Knoxville, Tenn. — Steel studded snow tires increase traction significantly on glare ice, but reinforced tire chains provide materially greater traction, according to the Safe Winter Driving League.

Conclusions are based on the National Safety Council's 1967 winter test project at Stevens Point, Wis.

New studded tires on the rear wheels only reduced braking distances on ice by 19 percent, as compared with regular highway tires. After 2500 miles of wear, this improvement dropped to 13 percent.

With studded tires on all four wheels the braking distance was reduced by 31 percent when new, and 17 percent when used.

Reinforced tire chains on the rear wheels only reduced braking distance on ice by 50 percent, as compared with regular highway tires without chains.

From the standpoint of traction or pulling ability on glare ice, studded snow tires developed about three times the pulling ability of regular tires. Reinforced tire chains provided more than seven times the pulling ability of regular tires.

A somewhat surprising observation of the 1967 tests was that conventional snow tires (without studs) offered no advantage over regular tires in stopping on ice, although they do improve both traction and stopping ability in snow.

All this means that far slower than normal speeds are essential for safe driving on slippery pavement.

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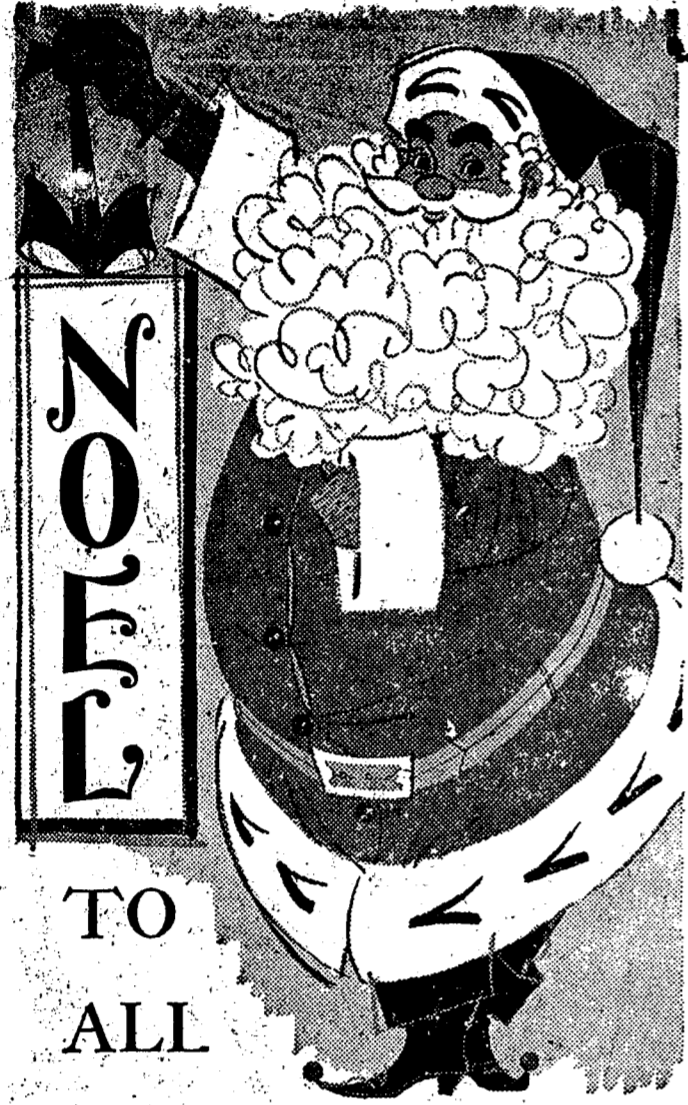

**FIRE RAVAGED AREA RESEEDED TO GRASS**

Lewiston—Has yellow sweetclover,

orchard grass, timothy and common rye replaced Douglas fir, ponderosa pine, grand fir and larch?

It might have appeared that way recently when more than 7,000 acres of burned over timber and range lands were seeded with grass, clover and other non-tree species. Forty tons of seed, costing more than \$11,000, were sown and not one tree seed was included.

The area seeded was south of Lewiston where the China Creek and Eagle-Deer Creek fires burned over a substantial area of timber and grass lands late last summer. Goal of the seeding operation is to stabilize fire lines and steeper hillsides to minimize soil erosion and to rehabilitate the cattle range damaged or destroyed by the fires.

The cooperative seeding project was coordinated by Nelson Howard, Lewiston, the major landowner affected by the fires. Other participants included Potlatch Forests, Inc., the State of Idaho and the Bureau of Land Management.

Some 2,850 acres were seeded by helicopter to timothy, yellow sweet clover, orchard grass and common rye. The total area burned by the China Creek fire was 15,200 acres, of which only about 5,700 acres, or 37 percent, is commercial type forest land, with the balance classed as non-forest and brush land.

Alta fescue, orchard grass, Drummond timothy and alsike clover were seeded on 4,220 acres in the Eagle-Deer Creek area. The Eagle-Deer Creek fire burned a total of 4,500 acres of which approximately 20 percent or 900 acres is classed as non-forest.

Choice of seed was based on recommendations from the Lewiston office of the Soil Conservation Service and the Coeur d'Alene office of the BLM.

Costs of the project, totaling \$15,770.40, covering seed, aircraft and administrative expense, were prorated on an acreage basis with Howard and P. F. I. being the principal contributors.

"Our foresters will be keeping close watch on Potlatch lands affected by the fire to determine whether artificial seeding of trees will be necessary," Royce G. Cox, managing forester stated. Some of the trees killed by the fire contained cones in

the tops which apparently were undamaged and have since opened and released their seeds, according to the company forester. "Surveys will be made next spring to determine the extent of this natural seeding and to locate those areas needing artificial seeding to properly restock the area," Cox added.

**ALIEN REGISTRATION**

Seattle — R. G. Hoffeler of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service states that the period within which aliens must report their addresses is almost at hand.

The month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, must report their addresses to the government during that period. The report forms will be available at all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during January. Wilful failure to report may lead to serious consequences.

**BETLES ARE PEST**

Wash., D. C. — Japanese beetles are being trapped on an isolated island by U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists to test the efficiency of a chemical lure in controlling this pest. More than 2,000 traps are being used and approximately 19 lures have been tested so far.

**NEW STEEL USE**

Chicago — Flexibility in the use of scrap by steel mills is being achieved with an oxygen and natural gas burner firing at more than 250 million British thermal units per hour. The burner allows steel producers to take advantage of low scrap prices by increasing scrap usage without impairing the quality.

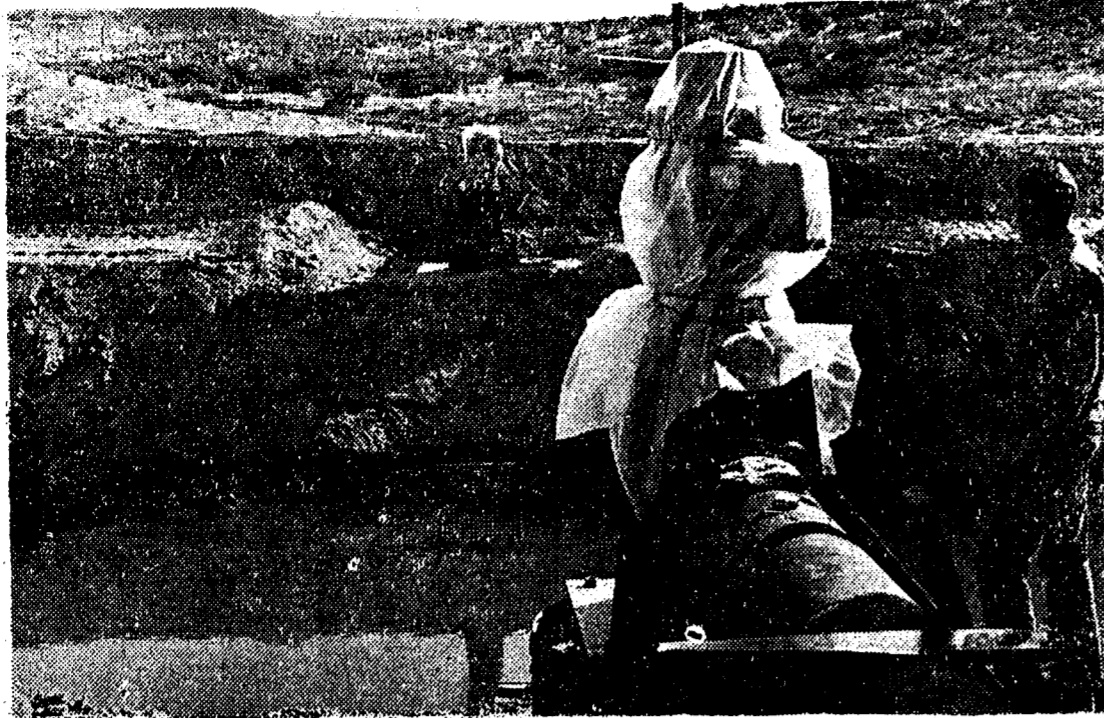

**DUCK PONDS**

Boise — Pumps will take Snake river water for 350-acre duck ponds near Bruneau bridge. Pump shown at center of photo across water is on the east side of man-made water-fowl resting and nesting place. Man standing shows relative size of the nearest pump. Bruneau ponds should attract thousands of ducks and geese.

Eight shallow dikes built by the Idaho Fish and Game Department form ponds behind them about 18 inches average depth, but four feet at most.

**FIRST SNOW SURVEY COMPLETED DEC. 2**

The first of the monthly snow surveys on Moscow Mountain was completed on Sat., Dec. 2nd, and the readings showed there was 8 inches of snow at the high snow course, 4100 foot elevation.

Last year there was no snow on any of the five Moscow Mountain snow courses on Dec. 1. In the ten years that measurements have been taken, only two years, 1959 and 1966 showed no snow. The highest reading was in 1961 when 24.9 inches of snow was down on Dec. 1, with 1960 next with 19 inches on the high course.

Saturday, Dec. 2 there was 4 inches of snow on the lowest course, which is on Howard Creek. The water content of the snow is approximately 15 percent on all locations.

The snow measurements were taken by Leroy Meitz and Jerry Smith of the University Engineering Experiment Station, and Tom Allen of the Soil Conservation Service. This is a cooperative effort on the part of these groups, and will be done the first of each month during the winter.

**DEER WEARING ODD TRACKING GEAR**

U. of I. Moscow — On the north slope of Moscow Mountain, University of Idaho scientists have outfitted more than 40 white-tailed deer with special tracking gear that makes them beep, blink, ring and shine.

The research, under the direction of Prof. Kenneth E. Hungerford, wildlife management professor, is designed to determine the nightly feeding and bedding habits of the deer. The area used for the study is the 800-acre Hatter Creek Deer Enclosure, a part of the University Experimental Forest about 15 air miles northeast of Moscow.

To study the animals, Dr. Hungerford has had to develop and use some very different devices, including neon blinker lights, luminous tape, an infra-red sniper scope, sheep bells and radio transmitters.

In most cases, several devices are attached to a deer to aid in the tracking. Bells are combined with radio transmitters or neon blinkers and sometimes wrapped in luminous tape.

According to Hungerford, "with many of the deer, it's quite a job to get the equipment in place. We had to construct special traps to

snag the deer and then wrestle them down." The other method is to shoot the animals with a dart gun loaded with a tranquilizer.

"One of the deer, a big 10-point buck, really complicated our experiments," Hungerford stated. It seems the buck learned to silence his bell by raising his chest. The animal could then roam the enclosure without making a sound.

The favorite deer is a two-year-old named Feline, a tame pet donated to the university by a Spokane family. "All Feline needs is to hear the truck coming and she's there waiting — hoping for an apple," commented graduate student V. W. Howard.

According to Dr. Hungerford, the techniques used by wildlife scientists have changed greatly. Where previously they merely observed the animals in the field, they must now get involved in many areas such as electronics, bio-chemistry and meteorology.

Purpose of this experiment and all wildlife studies is to learn more of the needs of animals in order to properly manage their environment and preserve them.

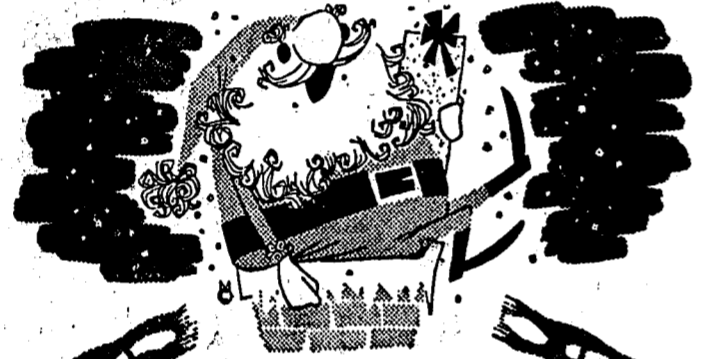

**WHAT TO DO FOR HOLIDAY STAINS**

**Moscow** — Spots and stains are as inevitable in the holiday season as new neckties. The hustle and bustle causes accidents with candle wax, candy and beverages. Helpful remedies are at hand. Here are tips from Miss Nancy Palmer, Extension Home Economics agent of the University of Idaho extension service.

**Candle Wax** — Scrape away as much as possible with a dull knife. Place the stains between clean blotters, cleaning tissues or paper towels and press with a warm iron until the blotters absorb the grease. Just change blotters as they become soiled. Finish by sponging with clean-

ing fluid. If color stain remains, sponge with liquid made of one cup of denatured alcohol and two cups of water.

**Candy** — Launder in warm, soapy water if fabric is washable. Otherwise sponge the stain with clear, warm water. Treat stubborn chocolate stains with hydrogen peroxide. If the stain still remains, cover the dampened spot with powdered sodium perborate and let stand an hour. Rinse thoroughly. Test a sample of the cloth for color change before using the bleaches. If the fabric is not washable, sponge with a grease solvent. Dry thoroughly then sponge with warm water and dust with pepsin powder. Work the powder into the cloth, let stand about 30 minutes and sponge with water.

**Alcohol and Soft Drinks** — These

stains are almost colorless when fresh, but if they stand or are washed in soap and water or heated in pressing, they turn brown and are difficult to remove. So act fast. Sponge the stain with water or equal parts of alcohol and water. Then pour glycerine on the stain and rub between the hands. Let stand half an hour and rinse with water. For non-washable garments or rayon, sponge with water. At the first opportunity take the dress to a dry cleaner as I tell him what caused the spot.

This includes noting traffic behind through continuous use of your rear view mirror. Don't "ride" the bumper of the vehicle ahead of you.

Take only your share of the road in the proper place. Keep in the proper lane. Pass only when you have ample time and space to avoid "cutting in and out" too sharply. Signal all lane and lane changes.

Turn signals do not give the signaling driver the right of way. The law places all responsibility for the safety of all involved traffic with the motorist who is passing or is changing lanes. The activity of the turn signals is only a warning to other motorists of the intention to change lanes and does not constitute a legal right of way.

The volume of traffic is heavier than ever. You can't beat it, so why not join it.

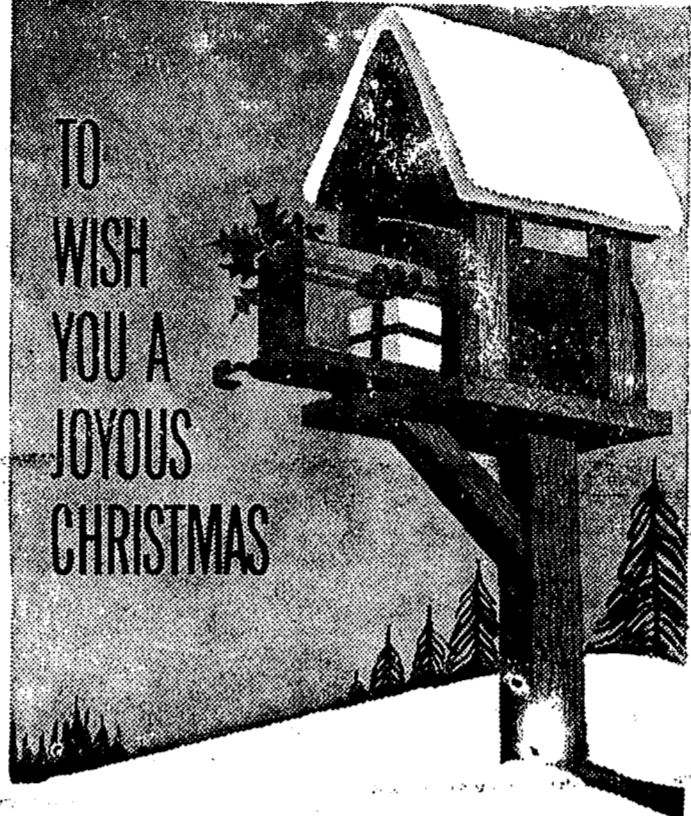

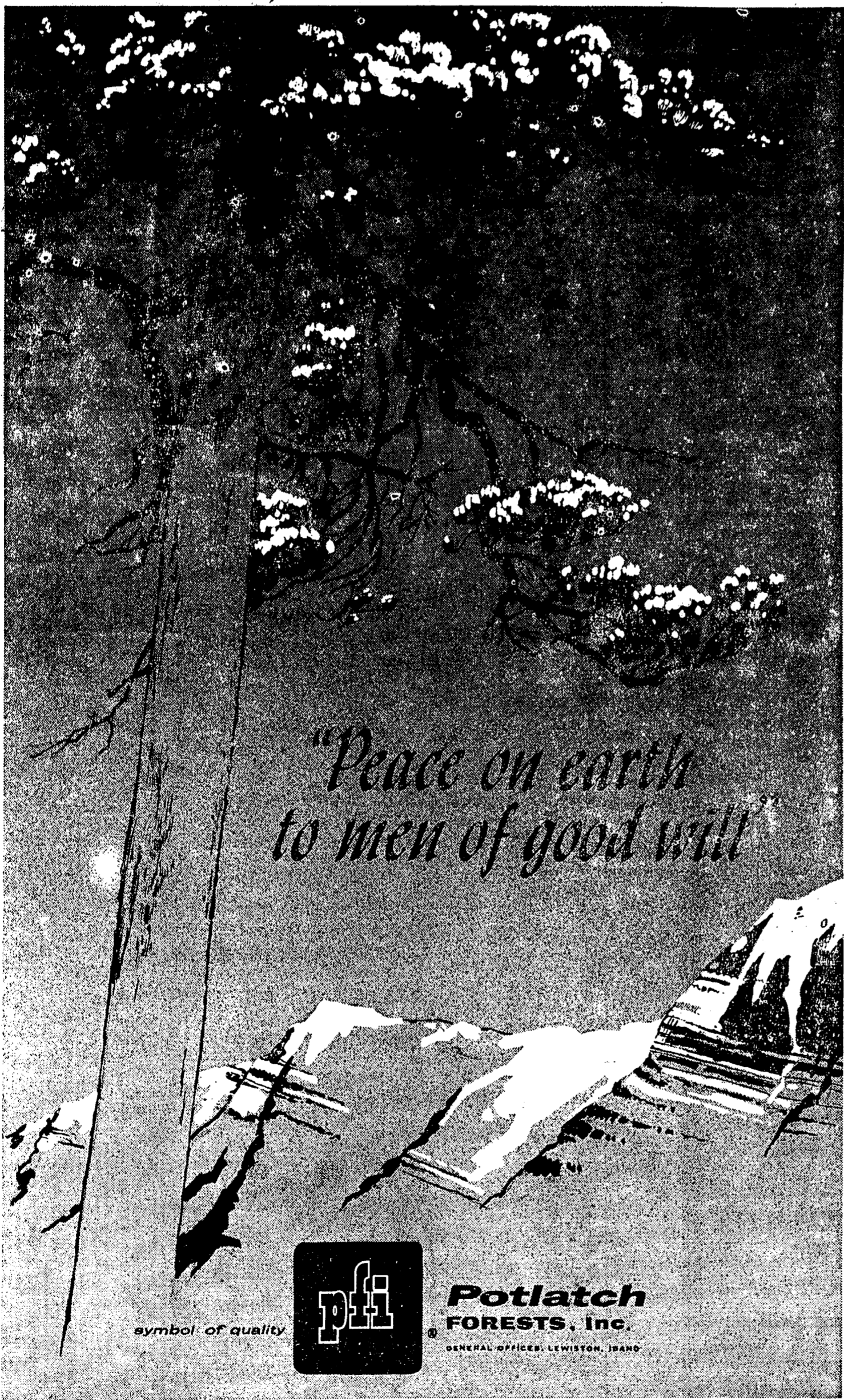

**CRIME ON INCREASE SAYS F. B. I. REPORT**

Wash., D. C. — The FBI's Uniform Crime Report, a compilation of statistics submitted voluntarily by local and state police agencies, disclosed that for the first nine months of 1967 crime in the United States increased 16 percent over the corresponding period of 1966. The crime rate or risk of becoming a victim of crime, increased 14 percent. These figures were released by Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark.

In making these figures available FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover stated that nation-wide the violent crimes as a group, increased 15 percent. Individually, these crimes showed a 27 percent increase in robbery; 16 percent in murder; 9 percent in aggravated assault and 7 percent in forcible rape. Each of the more violent property crimes recorded increases with auto theft up 17 percent, burglary 16 percent, and thefts over \$50 in value, 15 percent. As a group the property crimes registered a 16 percent rise.

According to the FBI, the large core metropolitan cities of over 250,000 population showed an average 15 percent rise. The suburban communities recorded a 17 percent increase and the rural areas a 12 percent rise. Regionally the crime trends were consistent, ranging from an over-all increase of 14 percent in the southern states, to an 18 percent rise in the northeastern states. The north central states registered a 17 percent increase during the 9-month period and the western states 15 percent. Each region recorded an increase in all crime classifications.

Assuming the 1967 crime trend as recorded during the first nine months continued at the same level through the last quarter, Mr. Hoover noted

**IDAHO DEATHS UP IN TRAFFIC COUNT**

Boise — The 34 traffic deaths in Idaho during November boosted the state's total for the year to 266, just one short of the number who were killed on Idaho highways during all of 1966, the Department of Law Enforcement reports.

November traffic fatalities this year totaled 13 more than were killed in the same month a year ago. Last month's highway deaths included one pedestrian-car accident, a single bicycle-car crash, and a car-train collision.

Department records show that more than half of the 29 fatal accidents last month involved only one car. Seventeen one-car accidents resulted in the death of 19 persons. Excessive speed was listed as the major contributing cause in the one-car accidents.

Idaho State Police point out to motorists that they are into one of the worst road condition months of the year and urge all to drive with extreme caution.

They also note that Idaho's present

**GAS TAX REFUND**

Moscow — Refund of the federal gas tax of 4¢ per gallon used for farming purposes should be claimed as a tax credit on the annual income tax report, Virgil Kennedy, farm management specialist of the University of Idaho extension service, reminds Idaho farmers. The report is to be filed before April 15.

The tax credit, he said, has been extended to include the federal tax on lubricating oil, diesel fuel and special motor fuels used in other than highway vehicles.

The gas tax refund period used to be July 1 to June 30 of the following year, and claims were filed by Sept. 30. A change was made in 1966.

This is the first full year for the new filing system. Farmers will claim the federal credit on qualifying fuels and lubricants purchased during the 1967 calendar year.

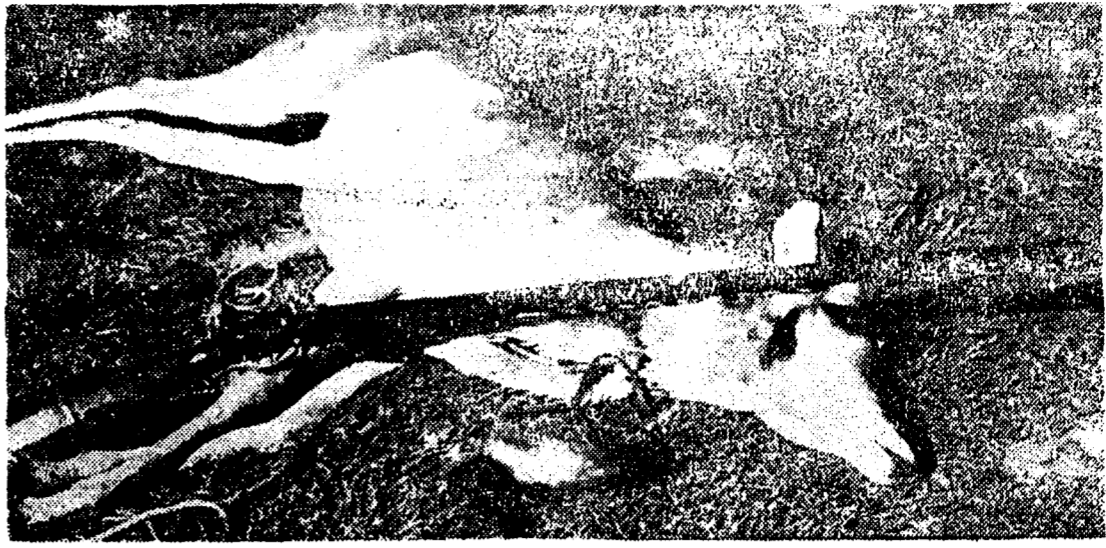
