REP. McCLURE VISITS GENESSEE

Congressman James A. McClure, (Republican First District) visited Genesee Tuesday in order to review the agricultural and educational problems of the area.

Activities included a tour of the Genesee Union Warehouse Company Seed Plant, where the congressman stated that "this is one of the most impressive seed plants in the northwest." He continued: "It is unfortunate that the State Department and the Administration have initiated free trade, non tariff policies which have hindered the development of this and other agricultural activities in Idaho."

On the topic of freight rates and the pending legislation on this subject McClure stated, "We have hopes of passing the freight bill this session. I believe that this law is definitely in the best interests of the agricultural interests of Idaho."

Congressman McClure was also guided through the educational facilities of the Genesee Public School. District Superintendent Lester C. Diehl, and Coach Ozzie Kanikbeberg accompanied the congressman on a tour of the building.

The congressman stated that "this system is an excellent example of what can be done in the area of education when initiative, for progress is handled and administered on the local level." He continued: "This is undoubtedly a very efficient and well administered school district. The people of Genesee should be commended for their efforts."





COUNTY JOB PICTURE IMPROVES

Employers in Latah County hired 36 workers through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment the past week, according to a report made by Frank J. Hartstein, manager of that office. Hartstein said that during the previous week 36 workers were placed on jobs by the office and 27 placements were made at this time one year ago. Thirty-six new jobs were listed with the office this week, and 39 remained unfilled at the end of the week. Experienced workers could fill such jobs as: service station attendants, automobile mechanic, lab technician, draftsman, baker, fallers, service-driver, milking-machine operator, part-time janitor and salesman. Women could find jobs, if qualified, as: waitresses, kitchen helper, day worker, grocery checker, legal secretary, office girl, a fast typist, saleswoman, babysitters, cook, part-time cook and part-time sales attendant. Hartstein indicated there is an urgent need for live-in maids, companions and housekeepers. There are also a few openings for babysitting in exchange for rent. Hartstein said that there are still some high school and college age youth seeking work for the next few weeks, but that most of the current jobs are for permanent workers.

Four workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, bringing the total up to 76 persons continuing to request unemployment insurance benefits. Last week the total was 66, and during the same week a year ago there were 55 persons throughout the county seeking jobless pay. In the immediate Moscow area the total was 47, slightly higher than the 39 of a week ago. At this time one year ago there were 38 persons filing claims from the Moscow area.

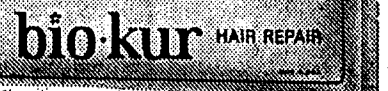

NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN





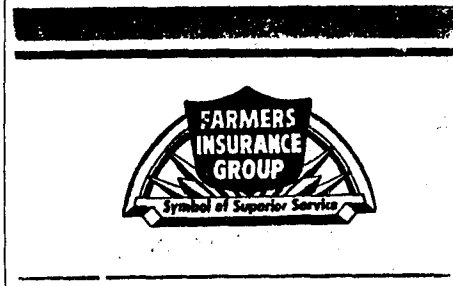
