also known locally as poison oak—
which gave the valley its name. is a shrub two to six feet tall. The shiny leaves occur in threes near the end of stems. The small flowers are greenish white. The fruit is white. In autumn the leaves vary in color from green to red.

Toxic oil is produced in all parts of the plant. Contact with the skin generally produces inflammation, swelling and blisters. Do not touch the plant, botanists warn, and do not burn it. The smoke can cause severe eye irritation. If exposed to the plant, repeated washings with warm water and laundry soap will often percent ferric chloride dissolved in equal parts of alcohol and water will emergency, the tannin from boiled tea leaves will give relief.

If you have poison ivy on your place, you can eradicate it with weed-killing chemicals. Formulations containing 2,4-D, 2-4-5-T, amitrole, silvex or ammonium sulfamate are the most effective.

Pamphlets that help in identification of poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac. — all related species — can be obtained at the county agent's office.

Late winter is the best time to prune many kinds of trees that shed their leaves, advises Tony Horn, horticulturist of the University of Idaho extension service. Branches that should be removed are easily seen when foliage is absent.

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# Three Governors Confer In Boise

Governors of three Pacific Northwest states met in Boise recently at the office headquarters of the Idaho Fish and Game Department to find ways and means of expanding anadromous fish resources rather than deciding "who catches the last salmon and steelhead,"

Expanding the resource, in the case of summer run chinook salmon, means boosting the production rate of this group or race of fish. Once the largest run of fish in the Columbia River but now an endangered species, summer chinook the past few years have been barely sustaining themselves on the spawning beds. The adult rate of return has been a thin ratio of 1 to 1-and in the lower Columbia so that the Snake sometimes not that.

In short, the summer chinook run in the Gem state is presently just sustaining itself on the spawning beds and no more. Any harvest, whether commercial, Indian, or sports fishing on the Snake River segment destined for Idaho, cuts into basic stocks now returning on a 1 for 1 ratio on the spawning beds. Any fishing reduces the number of returning summer chinook by whatever percentage the harvest rate has been.

All three states are bound to act responsibly in the management of these fisheries resources.

Gebhards says that Idano still could open the Salmon River for the summer fishery under the terms of the Tri-State Advisory Council. "But that would destroy the confidence in Idaho by the other two states, upset the cooperation of the past three years in giving maximum protection to summer chinook and could reopen fishing on summer chinook in the lower Columbia," he declares.

Gebhards explains that this year the salmon season was extended two weeks on the main stem of the Salmon River vond that allowed since 1965. This permitted a maximum harvest period on late arriving spring chinook salmon. The overlap of runs of spring and summer chinooks was small.

"This is a serious condition for sal-mon spawning runs," Gebhards emphasizes. "Delays of even five days for sockeye salmon, for example, results in significant fish mortality. Delays in passage of two weeks often are fatal to fish before they ever reach the upstream spawning beds."



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


