

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TIPS ON GROWING "RE-CROP" WHEAT IN THE PALOUSE

Others tell us the Good Lord favors us folks in the Palouse area because we get enough rainfall to grow re-crop wheat. We don't have to summer fallow. That's fine. But we have to do things right or re-crop wheat yields can be a bust.

Since we are working our ground harder with a crop every year, we have to feed the crops better and conserve all the moisture we get. Here's what our good re-crop wheat growers do:

PLOW EARLY as soon as possible after the previous crop is harvested to conserve after-harvest rains. Don't waste the early rain by waiting too long to plow and fertilize.

SEED EARLY with Gaines or NuGaines seed, early seeding is a must so the plants have a good start to get through the winter.

FERTILIZE ACCORDING TO PREVIOUS CROP and yield goal. Notice that more nitrogen is needed, for example, if wheat follows wheat than if wheat follows peas or lentils.

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
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

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS OF INTEREST

Social Security beneficiaries in this area who need to report changes of address or other events that affect the payment of their monthly benefits are urged to do so through the Lewiston Social Security Office, D. Gene Shaw, District Manager, said today. Reports may be male by mail, telephone, or personal visit.

Post card forms bearing an address other than the Lewiston Society Office should not be used.

The change in reporting methods is designed to reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. The change is prompted by the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information by teletype to rec ord offices.

In addition to address changes, other events that affect receipt of monthly social security checks include employment, marriage or remarriage in some instances divorce, and death. Any notice of this sort should go through the Lewiston District Office P. O. Box 643 Lewiston, Idaho 83501, Shaw said.

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



CITY RESIDENTS live in an island of heat compared to the surrounding coun-In the breeding ewes class, Kenneth tryside, reports an environmental health scientist at the University of Cincinnati. He said that cities receive more solar radiation than rural areas and that the 'stone desert' of an urban area possesses a larger heat-storage capacity. Cities also lose less heat energy through evaporating cooling, receive more combustion and metabolic heat, and through smoke pall and "greenhouse" effect have a larger positive net radiation than their environs.

MOST FOODS of the future will require little refrigeration, reports Votator Louisville. The company says two processes already in use to reduce the need for refrigeration. They are freeze-drying, removing water without the use of heat, and aspetic canning. A number of quality freeze dried foods are already available including tea, coffee, shrimp, mushrooms and tomatoes. More whole milk and their dairy products soon will be stored at room temperature because they also will be dried or aseptically canned. In aseptic processing, milk is completely sterilized almost instantly, quickly cooled and poured into sterile containers.
