Donald K. Heath, 46, a life-long resident of north central Idaho, was pronounced dead on arrival at the St. Joseph's Hospital at 7:20 Friday morning, Sept. 20, after suffering an attack at his home, 1234 Burrell Ave. Heath operated a farm in the Cherrylanes area.

He was born Nov. 21, 1921, at Kendrick, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Newton E. Heath.

Heath graduated from Lapwai High School and later attended the University of Idaho. He served in the Army during World War II. He married the former Mrs. Eileen Banks at Coeur d'Alene June 5th, 1945.

Heath was a member of Nez Perce Masonic Lodge, the Scottish Rite Bodies, and Calam Temple of the Shrine.

GENESEE SLOSHES TO 26 TO 0 WIN OVER TIGERS

Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg and his Genesee Bulldogs kept their winning streak intact last Friday night by defeating the Kendrick Tigers 26-0 on the K. H. S. field. It was the fourth victory of the season for the Bulldogs and it tagged the Tigers with their third loss in as many starts.

The game was played on a rain-soaked field which affected both the offensive and defensive strategy of the two teams. Rain had fallen all day prior to game time and there was a moderate drizzle falling at kick-off time. After the first play from scrimmage, the football was muddy and although the ball was exchanged after each play, the slippery pigskin caused numerous fumbles for both sides and severely limited any passing attempts.

Kendrick kicked off to the visiting Bulldogs who gained less than 10 yards before punting. Kendrick took over on their own 35 but failed to gain and Darrell Green moved the ball 25 yards on the punt return and Genesee went deep into Tiger territory before a fumble cost them possession of the ball.

A blocked punt by Bob Schwenne on the Tiger two-yard line set up the first score of the game as halfback Jim Scharnhorst crossed over on the next play and fullback Doug Springer bulldozed across the conversion.

Kendrick came back in the second period to threaten as they blocked a Genesee punt and clicked with a pass play that moved them into Genesee territory before a Bulldog interception halted the advance. Martin Gilge broke through on a tackle play shortly afterwards for the longest run of the game; a 50-yard touchdown gallop that gave the Bulldogs the lead at halftime 13-0.

Darrell Tiechmer intercepted a Kendrick pass in the third quarter and scored from 10 yards out to give Genesee a 20-0 advantage.

Kendrick had one of their best opportunities to score in the final period as they stopped a Genesee drive on the 6-yard line. The Tiger back field failed to move the ball but when they punted the Genesee receivers fumbled and Kendrick recovered; however the field was too muddy and slick to allow the Tigers to take full advantage of the loose, free ball. By this late in the game, the ball, the field and the players were caked with mud. A few minutes later Martin Gilge brought the ball down to the Tiger 5-yard line and Springer boomed across for the final score which gave the Bulldogs their 26-0 win.



PUMPKIN PIE
1 cup pumpkin
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1 tablespoon flour
2 eggs, well beaten
1 cup milk

Mix well and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake about 50 to 60 minutes in moderate oven. Pie will be done when blade of knife comes clean when tested.

FRESH APPLE CAKE
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
1 egg, well beaten
1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
pinch salt.

1 cup sifted flour, all-purpose
1 teaspoon baking powder
3 cups chopped apples
1/2 cup finely chopped nut meats
Cream shortening and sugar, and add well beaten egg. Sift dry ingredients together and add to creamed mixture. Add apples and nuts last.

Pour in greased pan 8x8x2, and bake in 350 degree oven 40 to 50 minutes.

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ACT NOW TO PREVENT SERIOUS SOIL EROSION

As the time that Palouse area farmers need to act to avert possible serious soil erosion next spring, University of Idaho agronomists note.

Previous farming history in the Palouse area shows that the most severe erosion occurs on fallow soil that is overtilled and seeded or left over winter in a fine textured condition. Thus, rough fall plowing with an ample residue of stubble on the surface is desirable. Leave next spring's seeding areas in the rough condition. Also do not overwork fall seeded wheat land beyond that soil condition which will assure a good seed bed.

Although early seeded wheat sometimes gives a better ground cover, farmers growing the Gaines variety must compromise between early seeding and a later seeding where soil borne diseases are less severe. Late seeded Gaines

usually has about a 10 percent yield advantage over early September seedings. The University of Idaho recommends about October 1-10 as the most ideal seeding date for Gaines wheat in the Palouse area.

University agronomists also endorse strip farming on severe erosion slopes. Alternate plowed and crop strips will help hold the soil on these slopes. These strips may be 200 to 400 feet wide, although narrower strips may be necessary on some slopes and with some soils. Admittedly these contour strips may be more difficult for some farming operations but since much of the farming operation is conducted on the contour any

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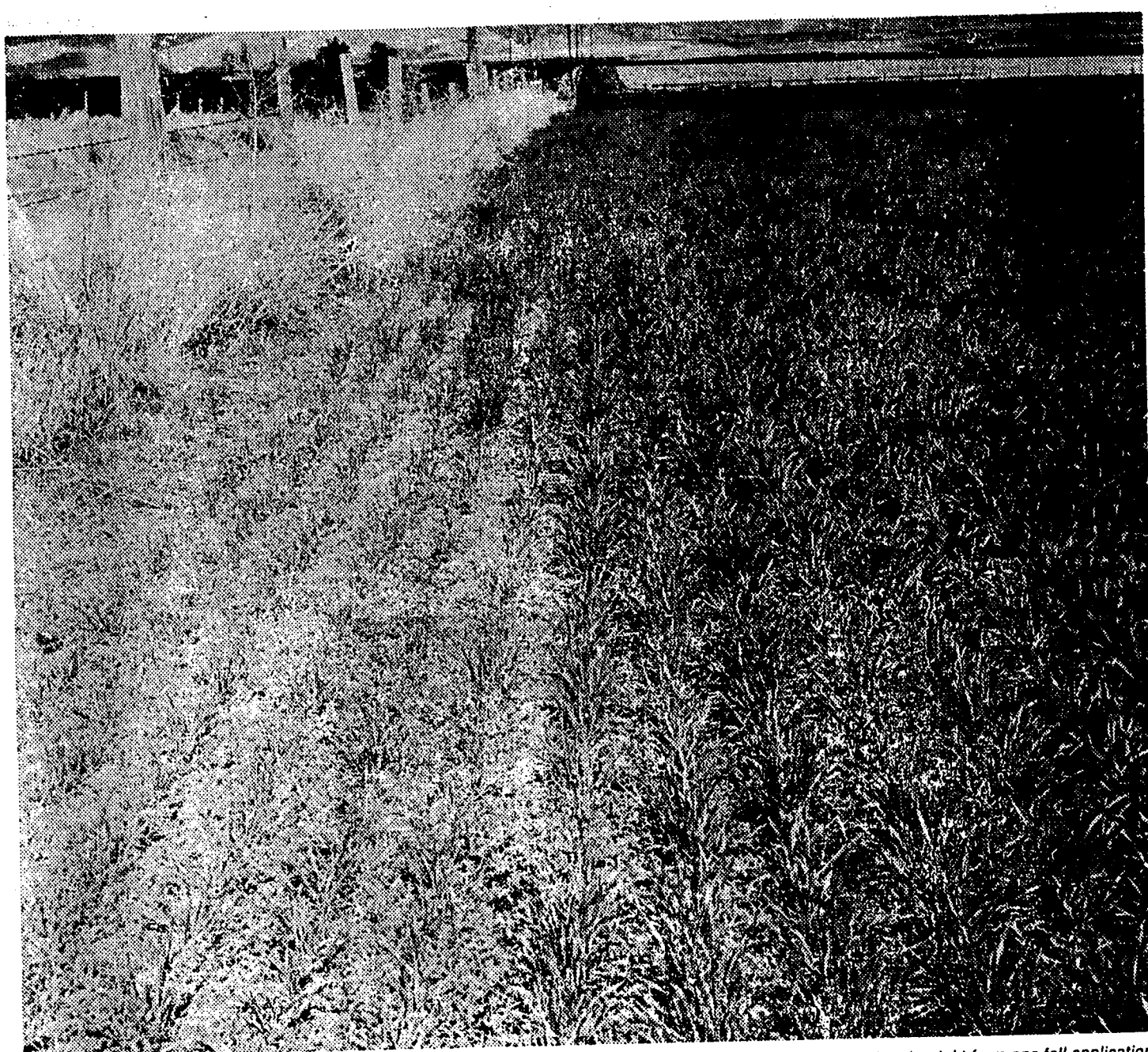

SNAKE RIVER BOUNDARY HAS RECIPROCAL RULES
 Reciprocal laws passed by state legislators in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Utah regulate fishing and hunting sports on that portion of the Snake River which serves as a boundary between the states of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, and Bear Lake, which straddles part of the border between Utah and Idaho, it was explained today by the Idaho Fish and Game Department.
 Oregon-Idaho portions of these laws date back to 1935, and the reciprocal laws involving Utah and Idaho (Bear Lake) can be traced to 1941. Most of the reciprocal laws for Washington and Idaho have been worked out since 1963, and actually passed in 1967.
 In general, the purpose of the recip-

cal laws governing the Snake River boundary between the three states is to avoid the conflict, confusion and difficulty in attempting to find the exact location of the state boundary on waters and islands of the Snake River.
 In the Snake River, however, fishermen with Idaho licenses cannot legally fish or hunt on the shore, sloughs, or tributaries of Washington and Oregon, or visa versa.

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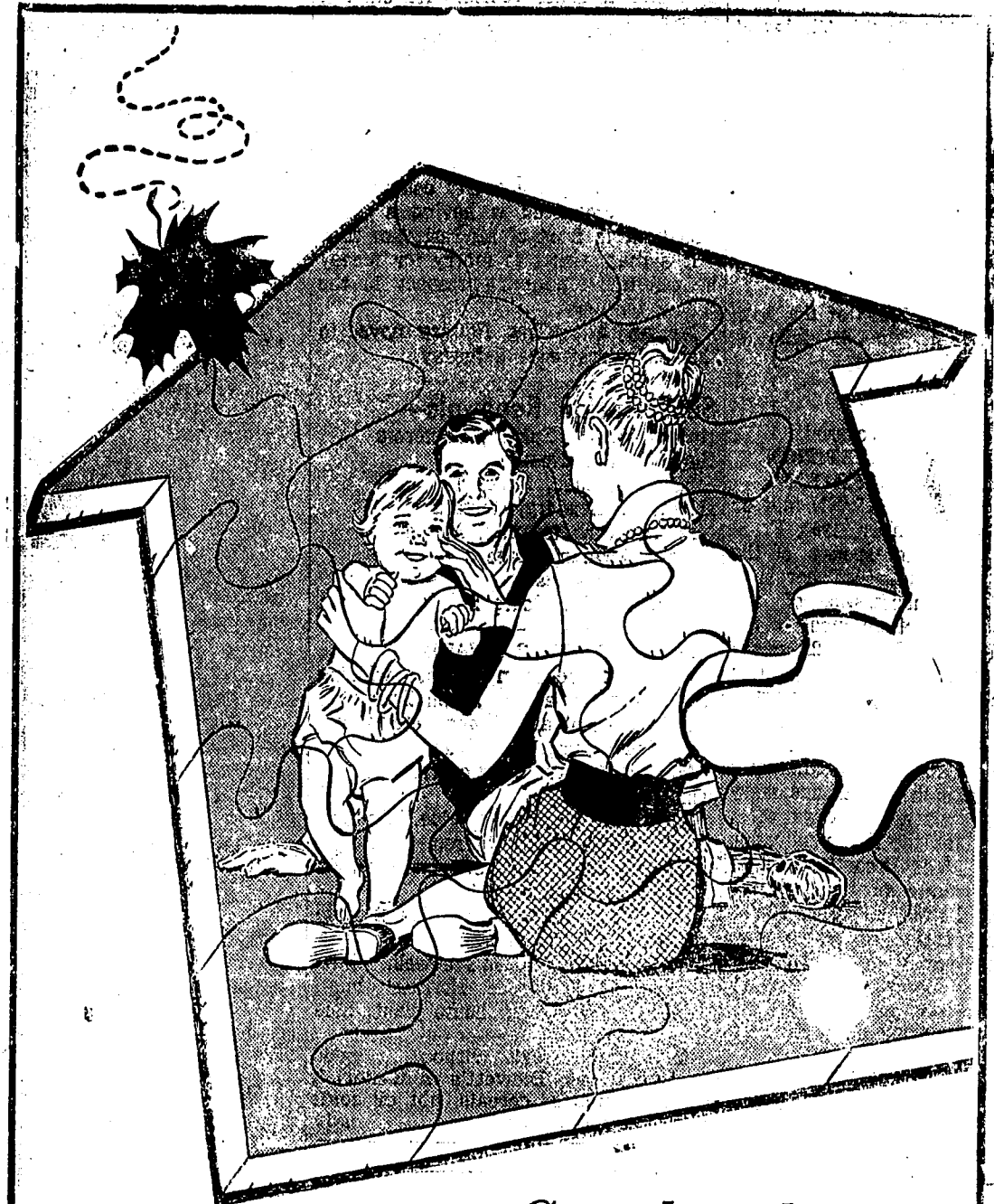

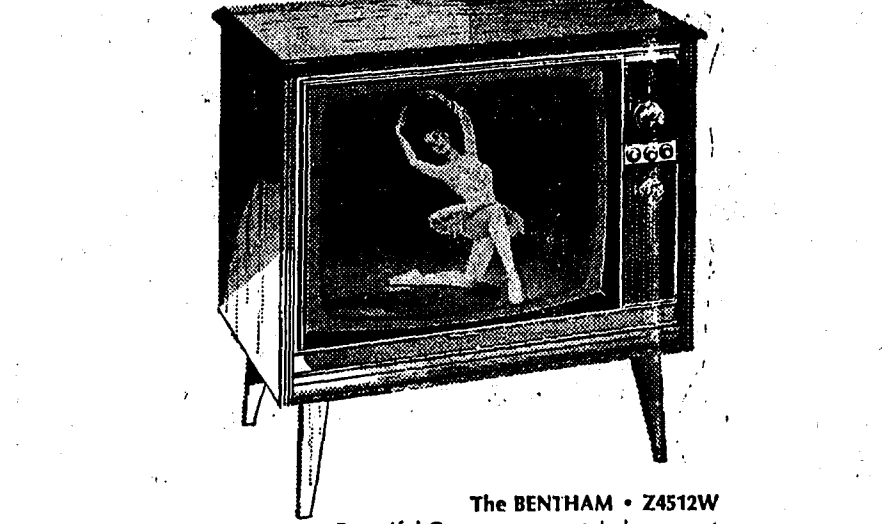
