PIONEERING with POTLATCH

The long stroke with the crosscut saw . . . the wide arc of double-bitted axes . . . and Timmmmberrrr! She's down ... trimmed into a log ... and now, how is she yarded? One answer was the logging arch!

Two giant, iron-rimmed wheels --- sometimes 10 feet high or more — with hubs bigger than a man's head and an axle thicker than his leg.. that was the high wheel logging arch. The simple principle involved in arch logging was to get the lead end of a log off the ground to reduce friction and allow easier skidding to the loading, decking or fluming area. Horse teams often were used for early arch logging, but were replaced by tractor. of increasing efficiency through the years.

This type of logging required reasonably level around to be effective but was used by PFI's predecessor, the Potlatch Lumber Company, for several years in the 1920's.

TODAY — the high wheel logging arch is gone. Modern descendants of rickety early "cats" skid their drags of logs with a comparative minimum of effort and maximum of effectiveness. Highly mobile rubber-tired tractors with built-in arches speed skidding operations on some logging jobs. The squeaks and groans that once signified the operation of a logging arch have been replaced by a high-powered roar. Thus another colorful chapter of logging has passed into memory . . . paying a nostalgic price for progressl
