For the second week in a row, job op portunities declined in the Moscow, Idaho area, according to Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the laaho Department of Employment. Hartstein said that his office received only 7 new job listings during the week, compared with 29 new jobs listed with his office during the previous week. At the end of the week there 44 jobs open fewer than the 56 jobs vacant at the end of the preceding week. Seventeen workers were placed on jobs during the week compared with 23 given job finding help during the week before. A year ago 22 workers were assisted in finding employment by his office, Hartstein said. Most of the jobs still available fall into two categories according to the report. There are several jobs requiring considerable skill, training and experience; and some others where the pay, hours, and/or working conditions are somewhat less than desirable. With the coming of fall weather, and the anticipation of winter winter, Hartstein indicated that he expected job opportunities to remain at a low point for aw hile.

During the week, Hartsteins report continued, a total of 13 persons tiled new 'claims for unemployment insurance. This compares with 12 persons who filed new claims during the previous week, and 10 who filed during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week, however, there were only 35 persons still receiving jobless pay thruout the county. This is down from the 38 of a week ago, and fewer than the 42 who were seeking such compensation during the same week in 1967. In the immediate Moscow area the totals were, 18 persons receiving benefits now 17 last week and 20 a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area there are now 5, last week 9, and last year 15. At Genesee, one this week, and one last week. In the Kendrick-Juliaetta area, one this week, none last week. Seven persons are filing from Potlatch, the same as last week, and one more than a year ago. At Elk River the total is now 3, last week 4, and last year one. Hartstein indicated that the level of unemployment insurance will probably remain as it is for the next few weeks, but then rise as winter becomes more mistakes and misfortunes. -Winston severe and curtails more of the out-ofdoors activities.



PIONEERING with POTE ATCH



Early logging-area trains served many purposes. They brought in supplies and equipment . . . they hauled mail in and out . . . they carried passengers to and fro . . . but most important, they gave loggers a major means of getting their logs to

One such pioneer railroad was the Washington, ldaho & Montana Railway Company, started in 1905 by William Deary and the old Potlatch Lumber Company, and completed in 1908 with 50 miles of track. Although not a true logging railroad, it did haul many millions of board feet of logs to the Potlatch mill. Loaded flatcars were "spotted" at various sidings by lumbar assumptions. various sidings by lumber company crews using Shay locomotives to bring logs from the woods to the W I & M's mainline where they were hooked on and hauled to the mill.

In 1931, the W I & M was among the assets the

Potlatch Lumber Company brought to the newly formed PFI which later increased its rolling stock to 5 locomotives, 300 flatcars, 15 boxcars, 2 passenger coaches, and a locomotive crane. Although sold by PFI in 1962, the WI&M is still hauling logs and other materials but it stopped hauling mail and passengers many years ago.

TODAY—the jammers, McGifferts, Parbuckles and Lidgerwoods are gone and logs are loaded onto carriers by high speed, mobile cranes. Switchbacks and the maze of small trestles of former years have given way to modern all-weather truck roads. The smoke of hand-fired burners and the din of steel-on-steel have faded into the powerful roar of diesel engines and the hum of rubber tires. Log trains have been almost completely replaced by more versatile trucks today . . . but in their time, logging railroads contributed much to the modern woodsman's colorful heritage.
