On Tuesday, April 9, Whitted, had just completed his run from the heart of San Francisco to Hunters Point, a ghetto neighborhood near Candlestick Park, when four negro boys boarded his bus. Within seconds a shot was heard, and the boys, their hands full of money, were hurrying off the bus, disappearing almost immediately along the street, leav-


