The meeting was conducted by Jerry Hines, Community Action Program Coordinator; Mrs. Jeanette Tarbet, Rural Community Action coordinator, and Mrs. Ruth West, Community Development Aid. They hope to have another meeting in the near future at Kendrick.

They ask that all interested persons in the area attend the next meeting in order to learn a little more about Community Action. The time and place of the meeting will be advertised.

Community Action is now in the process of reaching into the out-counties, in order to establish programs in these areas. The agency has services available now to residents of the area, and hopes to be able to start new programs, where necessary.

The Community Action agency is making an effort to open an office in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area, as well as working on a "Head Start" program in Moscow. Mrs. Judy Grimes of Lewis-Clark Legal Services will be in Moscow one day a week for consultations. Robert Glasby of Lewiston is director of the Legal Services. Referrals may also be made to C. A. programs now operating in the Lewiston-Clarkston area. The services include "Manpower Coordination" and "Family Services."

Community Action will be working primarily with low income families. However, they do ask the cooperation of the rest of the community to make their program work. If you wish to contact Community Action in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area, please phone Mrs. Ruth West 289-5847.

## DEATH CLAIMS VICTOR CASEBOLT

Victor S. Casebolt, 64, native of Geneese and long-time employee of Washington Water Power Co., died suddenly at 9:30 p. m. Wednesday at his home in Spokane.

He was born October 18, 1904, and attended grammar and high school at Geneese and the University of Idaho before accepting part-time employment with WWP in 1921.

June 9, 1924, he became full time stock clerk and combination man for the company. In 1931 he was promoted to district manager at Tekoa; he became district manager at Colfax in 1936 and at Moscow in 1948.

He was appointed Palouse Division manager with headquarters at Pullman on May 1, 1953 and was promoted to manager of the personnel and industrial relations department at Spokane September 1, 1958.

On May 8, 1959 he became WWP vice president of personnel and industrial relations, a position he held at the time of his death.

Casebolt had been active in the Boy Scouts of America; and was a member of the board of Goodwill Industries; a member of Downtown Kiwanis, Spokane; Lilac Festival Board; Chapter 34, International Footprint Assoc.; Vandal Boosters; Advisory Board, Spokane Community Action Council; Spokane Chamber of Commerce; Municipal League; U. S. Good Roads Assoc.; Inland Empire Science Fair Board, Pacific Northwest Personnel Managers Assoc. and many electric industry organizations. He was also a member of Manito Presbyterian Church.

He was married June 9, 1931, to the former Elizabeth Sheffels, of Wilbur, Washington, who survives at the home.

Other survivors include a son, Victor S. Jr., Paris, France; two daughters, Mrs. Robert (Judith) Howells, New York City; and Mrs. David (Caroline) Westendorf, Red Bluff, California; a brother, Walter Casebolt, Bainbridge Island, Washington, and three sisters, Mrs. Paul Sprague, San Leandro, California; Mrs. William Ritchie, Fairbanks, Alaska, and Mrs. Noel (Helen) Leavitt, Moscow, and seven grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Saturday, October 26 at 1:30 from the Manito Presbyterian church with Dr. Raymond Moody officiating. Burial, Spokane Memorial Gardens.

## WILLIAM STRICKER PASSES OCTOBER 29

GENESEE—William Joseph Stricker, 59, long-time Geneese resident, died at 1:30 a. m. Tuesday morning, October 29 at Gritman Memorial Hospital, Moscow, following a lingering illness. Death was attributed to cancer.

He was a welder by trade and worked for many years in Geneese and in Palouse.

He was born August 6, 1909 at Geneese, the son of Henry and Elizabeth Stricker, and received his education in Geneese and Lewiston schools.

He married Adeline Dresher at Geneese September 17, 1936. She survives at the family home.

He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Geneese.

Surviving in addition to the widow are five sons, William, Donald and Ronald, Geneese, and Terry and John, Clarkston; three daughters, Mrs. Bryan (Phyllis) Fromdahl, Lewiston; Mrs. Richard (Lillian) Smith, La Grande, Oregon, and Mrs. Charles (Lola) Coleman, Bend, Oregon; one sister, Mrs. Nick (Mattie) Bieren, Cottonwood, and eleven grandchildren.

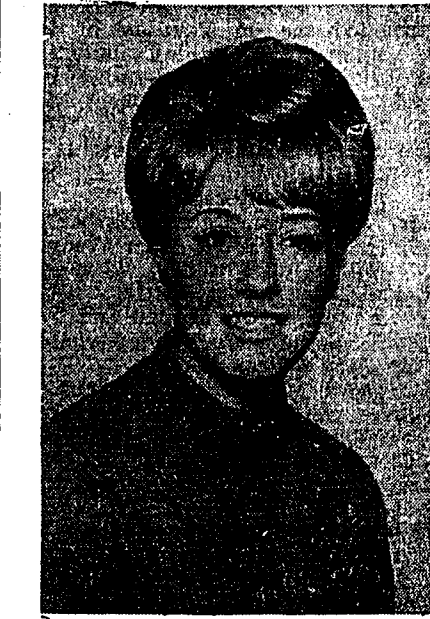
Geneese has a nonconference game against the Clarkston JV's and this was the final contest for the Tigers.

the sidewalks and streets in every town and city will be their stage," he said.

"Ghosts and goblins in white, witches and pirates in black, and storybook heroes and heroines in a colorful array of costumes will visit door-to-door on their trick-or-treat missions," the superintendent added.

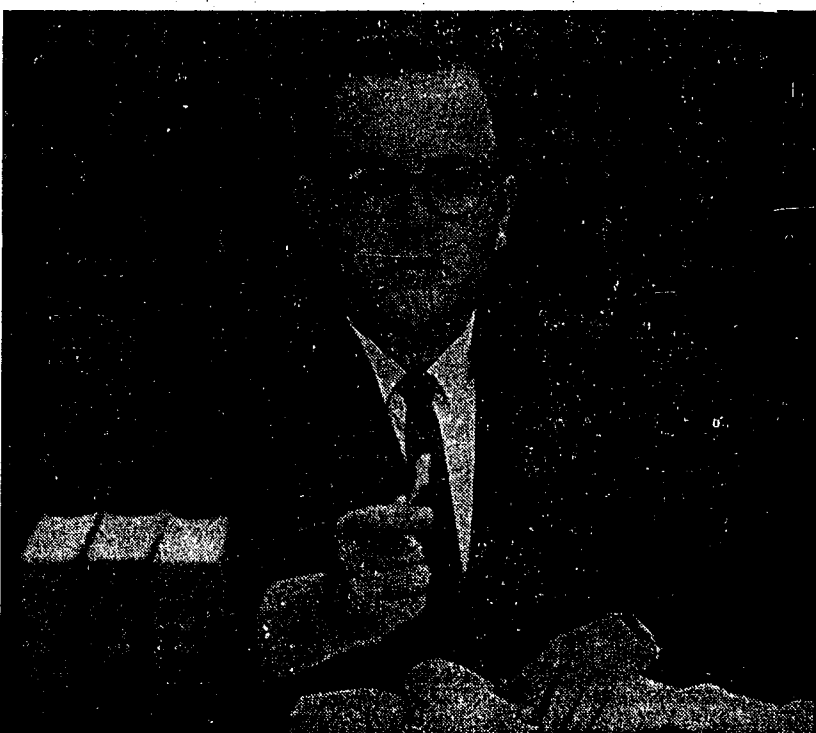

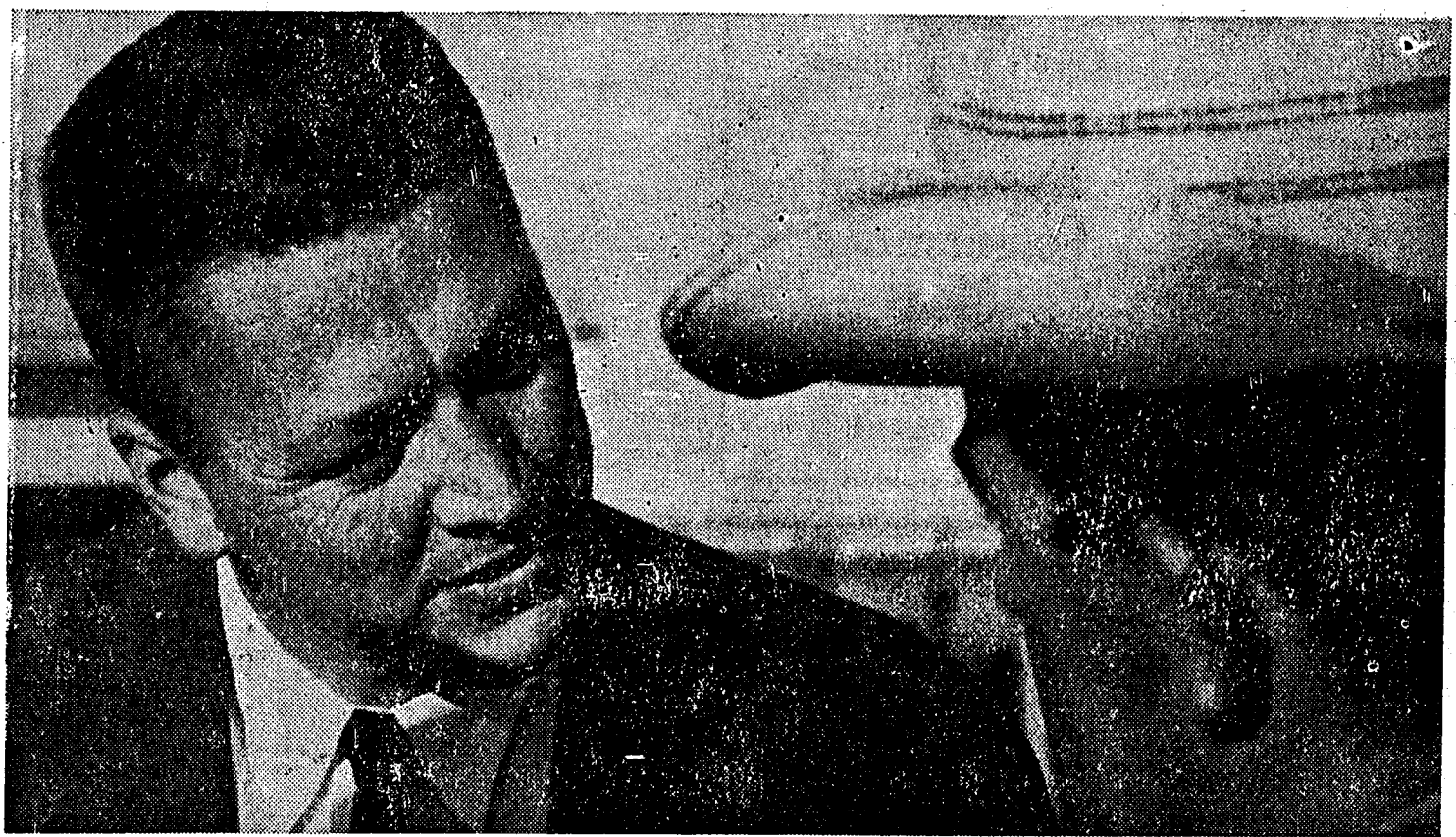

**Home Cookin'...**

With the holidays approaching, home-makers are searching through their cook books for holiday recipes—most of which will be old family favorites. Mrs. Ben (Miriam) Cook our columnist this week, is not only well-known in Kendrick, but in Genesee, too where she and her family resided for several years when Mr. Cook was teaching here. While in Genesee Mrs. Cook was active in school, church and other social activities.

**CHRISTMAS FRUIT COOKIES**

- 1 cup shortening
- 1½ cup white sugar
- 3 eggs, well beaten
- 2 tsp. molasses
- 1 cup raisins, or dates, or mixed
- 1 cup applesauce or other fruit
- 1½ cups walnuts
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 tsp. grated lemon rind
- 1 tsp. soda dissolved in 3 tbsp. hot water
- ¾ cups flour (or a bit more)
- 1 tsp. each cloves and cinnamon
- 1 tsp. salt

Cream shortening and sugar; add well beaten eggs, molasses, and mix well. Add fruits, nuts, vanilla, soda water and then the spices, salt and flour sifted together. Mix well. Drop by spoonfuls on a well-greased pan and bake in moderate oven until done.

This recipe is favored by the Cook family because of the greater number of cookies it makes and because they stay moist and flavorful until gone.

The Christmas Fruit Cookies, a favorite of hers, is now getting started in the fourth generation of Mrs. Cook's family. She says her mother had clipped it from the "Idaho Farmer" magazine around 1930 or before and used it often with her large family. Some of Mrs. Cook's grandchildren have now reached the cookie baking age and have used it.

- some)
- 3 oranges, 3 lemons, add ground peelings of oranges
- 4 lbs. raisins
- 2 pts. or cans of pie cherries
- 8 to 10 cups sugar (part brown)
- 2 tsp. each of nutmeg and cloves
- 1 tbsp. cinnamon
- ½ tbsp. salt
- ½ gallon cider or crabapple juice
- 1 pt. vinegar (I prefer sweet pickle juice)

Put all together and cook in heavy kettle until apples are well cooked. Stir almost constantly. (a pressure cooker is ideal to use as an open kettle for this) Put in sterilized jars and seal

I usually chop two or three apples to add to a quart of mincemeat when making pies. Is less rich and makes pies more juicy.

This original recipe is one of few recipes that Mrs. Cook has made by trial and error. Her mincemeat pie is a favorite dessert with the families of their two sons and two daughters.

Mr. Cook is now in his 40th year of teaching, 29 of which have been in Latah county. Mrs. Cook taught a spring kindergarten for 11 years, and this is her 8th year as News Editor and proof-reader for the Kendrick Gazette—now

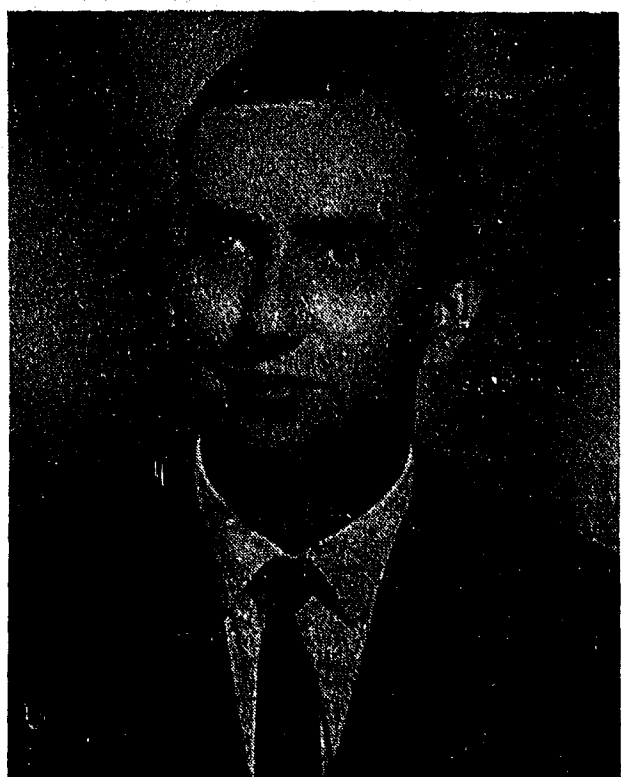

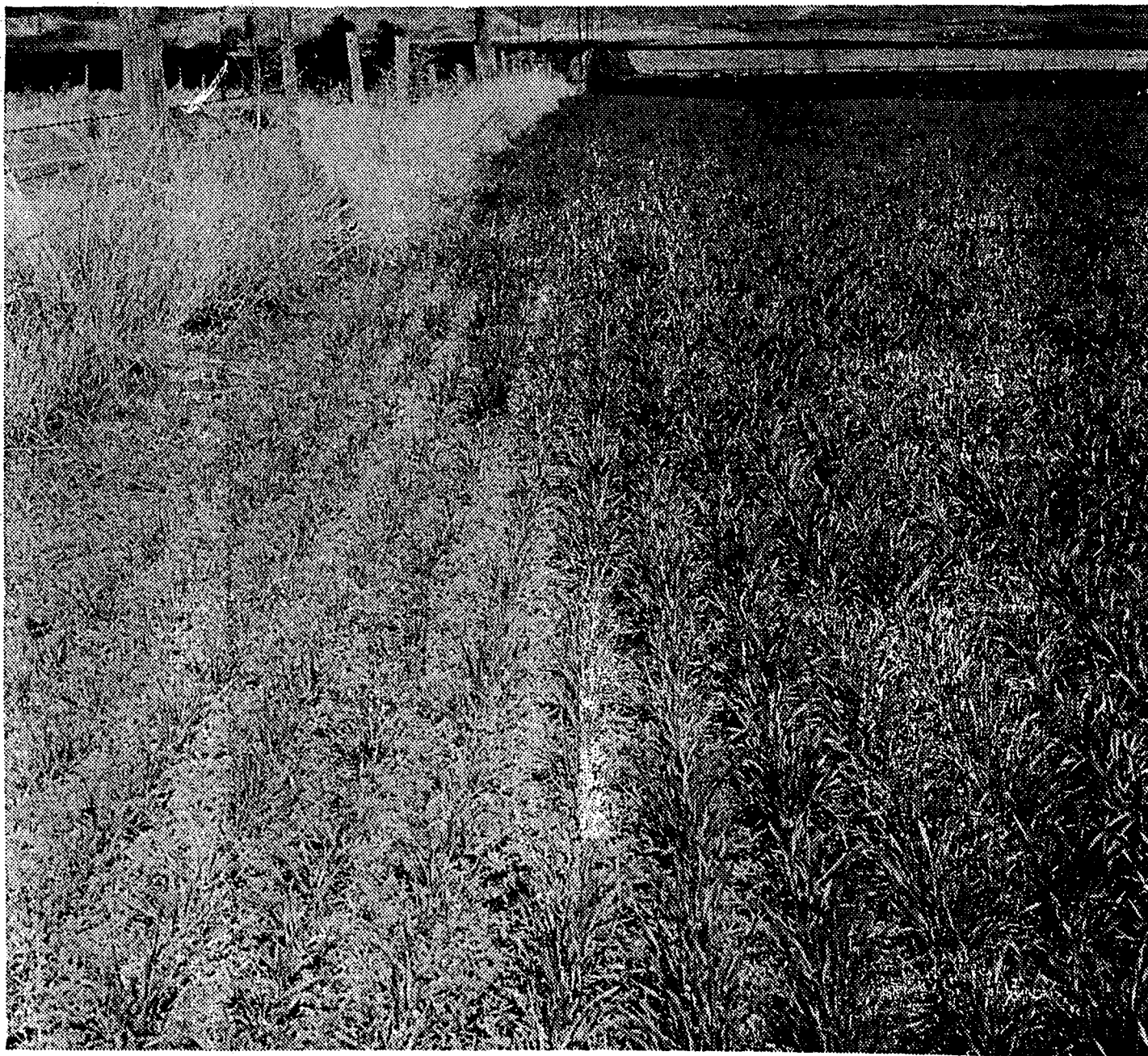

**Pheasant Season Underway**

Although overshadowed by the start of statewide hunting for migratory waterfowl the same day, pheasant season got underway October 12 in ten counties of northern Idaho for what appears to be another average year for the Clearwater and Panhandle regions. Releases of game birds have been made to supplement wild pheasant stocks. Surplus cocks from the Japanese green pheasant experimental program are being liberated along with ringnecks in the five northern counties.

Probably the best pheasant hunting in northern counties is in the lower Clearwater drainage, particularly some parts of Tammany and Lapwai Creeks. Years ago pheasant habitat north of the Solman River was considered good, especially in the lower Clearwater. But changes in farming techniques resulted in marginal pheasant habitat.

**Steelhead Count Soars**  
Some 62,000 steelhead trout have been counted since July 1, at the Ice Harbor Dam. The number is more than twice the count for last year and close to the third highest count on record for any fish year at Ice Harbor since the dam was completed in 1962. The highest Ice Harbor tally of steelhead ever recorded was 108,021 for the 1961-62 fish year (July 1-June 30). In 1962-63, the cumulative steelhead count was 72,150 fish, and the third highest number so far was in the 1965-66 fish year, when the count was 64,916 steelhead.

**General Trout Season**  
October 31 is the last day of the 1968 statewide trout season, but certain designated waters in all regions extend through December 31. As usual, many others in all parts of the state will stay open for fishing for some or all species on a year-round basis, irrespective of the general statewide trout season opening and closing dates.

New fishing regulations for 1969 will be established in Boise by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission at a regular quarterly meeting beginning October 23, but these will not go into effect until January 1, 1969. Current regulations, which list by name and area all waters which will stay open for fishing after October 31, do not expire until December 31.

**SAUSAGE FEED A SUCCESS**

Genesee — Nearly 400 persons went through the serving line in the Firemen's Hall Saturday night, as the Genesee Community Firemen presented their annual sausage and waffle supper. Poor weather kept the attendance below that of last year, but President Chuck Manfred said he and the Firemen were grateful to all who attended the supper. The profit realized from the event will be used to remodel the upstairs of the hall.

**IDAHO DEPT., LAW ENFORCEMENT**

**Public Service Spots on Winter Driving**  
The Idaho State Police joins the National Safety Council in warning motorists against carrying extra weight in the trunk of your vehicle to improve traction on ice and snow. While this can improve traction slightly, it also makes steering trickier and increases the possibility of dangerous skids.

To keep moving safely and surely on now-packed or icy highways, try to keep up enough momentum to carry you up hills without spinning your car wheels, suggests The Idaho State Police, but don't reach the crest of a hill at a speed which could cause trouble on the down grade. Occasionally it may be necessary to stop on an upgrade. That's when good tires and tire chains can help to compensate for lost momentum to get the car rolling again.

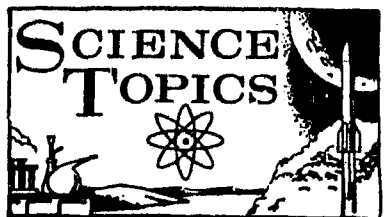

**TRANSPLANTS RAISE A MORAL QUESTION**

SELECT COMMITTEES that exclude doctors may be needed to make difficult moral decisions in future heart transplants, says a University of Michigan professor of psychiatry and law. "We are faced with a myriad of perplexing questions that will have to be answered," he said. "The prospect of more clinical transplant trials by surgical teams calls for defining the physician's role. Who gets the transplant organ? Whom do you let die, whom do you let live? This latter question is

critical. Can we leave it up to the doctors to decide?

FEW, if any, of the hundreds of thousands of people who visit the Lincoln Memorial each year realize that just a few feet below them, within the underground foundation of the Memorial, is a scene similar to those found in many natural caverns. Scientists of the U. S. Department of Interior report that stalactites—deposits of limestone normally found in caves—are growing down from the foundation ceiling, while short, stubby stalagmites rise a few inches from the floor.

HELIUM, the important lifting gas that is celebrating its centennial this year, has other important uses. The lightweight element has a significant application in medicine. It is used with oxygen in breathing atmospheres, says National Cylinder Gas, Chicago, for patients suffering from asthma and other respiratory diseases. The helium-oxygen mixture is much lighter than air

He announced also the appointment of Betty Hammond of Moscow to serve as publicity chairman in this area. Additional volunteer chairman to assist Mr. Inscore in the activities of the Heart Fund will be announced in the near future.

Mr. and Mrs. Inscore have lived in Moscow for twelve years. Until 1966 they owned and operated the Hillcrest Motel. Mr. Inscore is a member of the legislative committee of the Moscow Chamber of Commerce; chairman for U. S. Treasury Savings Bonds in this area and serves as Democratic State Committeeman from Latah County in addition to his chairmanship of the Heart Fund.

and flows through restricted respiratory passages more readily, so that more oxygen is breathed with the same muscular effort.

AN ANIMAL EXTRACT that stimulates nerve growth is being purified by New York University scientists. The nerve growth factor is an extract from the subaxillary glands of mice and is of interest because it stimulates neurons, or nerve cells, to produce neurites—tiny fibers that are the communication links between neurons and the sense organs, muscles and other neurons. If the nerve growth factor and its activity can be understood, it might lead to drugs helpful in the repair or possible regeneration of injured or diseased nerve fibers.

A RADAR MAP of Venus that shows for the first time the exact locations of unusually rough areas that may be mountains has been prepared by Cornell University astronomers using the world's largest radio-radar telescope at Arecibo, Puerto Rico. The astronomers report that the resolution of the map is about equivalent to what would be possible with the largest optical telescope on earth if it were not for the thick cloud cover that obscures the Venusian surface.

**KNOW YOUR IDAHO**

**A Place of Real "Old West" Times**

Elk City, unincorporated, one of Idaho's oldest gold mining camps, is the main feature of one of the latest editions of Cascades, a magazine of Pacific Northwest Bell.

Back in 1861, Captain E. D. Pierce led other miners into the Elk City area. In six years, \$20,000,000 in gold was taken from the several camps that sprung up within a 150-mile radius of Elk City.

Local history has it that the city received its name in 1861 from the large elk herds that abounded in the area. To date, the actual population of the city is still a matter of dispute; it all depends on the logging season and who's doing the counting.

In the late '80's, the small city was nicknamed a "rag town" because the majority of the population at that time consisted of Chinese who followed the most prospective claims around and mined them after the whites moved on. By 1893, only 35 Chinese remained and the white race soared again to 400. Today, there is little or no evidence that the Chinese lived in Elk City at all, as they always returned the bones of their dead to the motherland for sacred burial.

Around the turn of the century, logging became the prime industry of the town which now consists of only one street, with two taverns, two groceries, a hotel and some gasoline pumps. The present day town spends most of its time knee-deep in mud the consistency of bubble gum, and every front porch is equipped with a sturdy broom for foot dusting before you enter. The townspeople are now looking forward to the installation of a sewage and water system which has never been present before; this is a town of real "old timers."

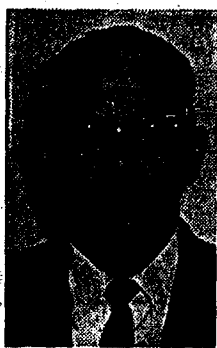

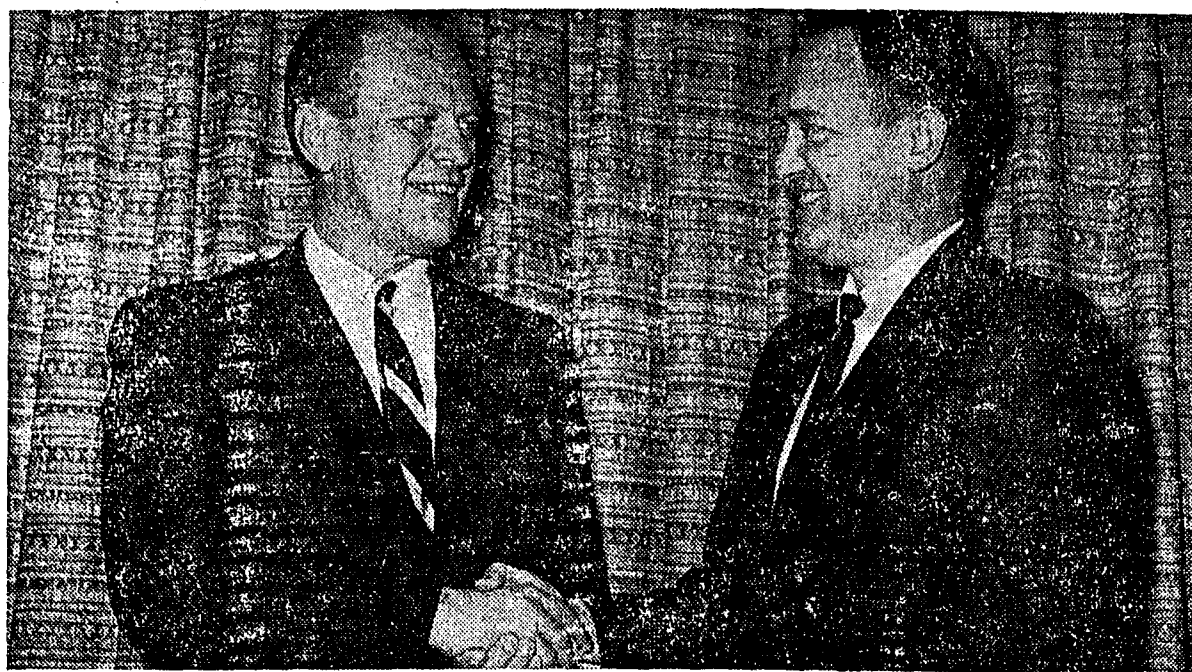

If a hunter is injured somehow while on private lands, the owner cannot be held liable, but if he injures livestock belonging to the landholder, he may lose his hunting privilege or have other problems with the law. In addition, he is liable for a civil suit in the courts.

Thus the Idaho Fish and Game Department today summarized some of the state's legislation covering trespass. It was passed in Idaho and many other states throughout the years on the theory that it is not reasonable to expect landholders to take the risks of liability

for injury to persons or property in the course of the use of their lands by strangers from whom the accommodating owner receives no compensation or other favor in return.

Although it can be argued that Idaho landholders always have had this kind of protection under the provision of several existing statutes (36-2501-02), the state legislation three years specifically spelled out these rights in the passage of Section 36-2503, according to Hawley Hill, chief of conservation enforcement.

Like most matters of law, the subject of trespass is complicated. Those who take a hard look at all Idaho laws having to do with trespass soon know why good landholder-sportsman relations are promoted so avidly by a great number of people.

**STEELHEAD RECORD**

Nearly 70,000 steelhead trout have been counted at Ice Harbor Dam since July 1. The second highest count at that point was 72,000 fish in 1963. This figure likely will be smashed in view of the fact that the fish-year extends through next June 30, and the early spring run should peak next March. The all-time high was 108,000 steelhead counted at Ice Harbor in 1962.

While total numbers of steelhead at Ice Harbor are high this fall, analysis of the run shows that both "A" and "B" group steelhead are below average in the Columbia River. The count at Bonneville Dam to date shows that the run of "A Group" steelhead is one of the smallest runs on record, and that the "B Group" of steelhead is below average. The high count at Ice Harbor is the result of better water conditions than has been the case in the last few years, but the steelhead run in the Columbia River is smaller than average.

**Hunter Success Better**

Early returns of hunter report cards show that both deer and elk kills are running considerably higher than on the same date last year. However, it must be remembered that card returns are voluntary, and just a sampling of the total elk and deer harvest is indicated. Comparative deer figures through October 23 show 3,156 deer kills made on regular tags and 131 on extra tags and 146 on nonresident restricted tags, compar-

ed with 1967 data showing 2,033 deer kills on regular tags, 378 on extra tags, and 117 on nonresident restricted tags. The cards also report 1,470 elk kills, compared with 1,296 last year on the same date.

Other animal species reports are 17 moose (ten last year), 36 bighorn sheep (28 last year), 61 mountain goat (55 last year), and 651 antelope (683 last year). Last year's figures are also of this date.

**Trout Season Ends**

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission met last week in regular quarterly session and established statewide fishing seasons and regulation for next year. The regulation for 1968 remain in effect through December 31. But many special seasons and specially designed waters for year-round fishing provide ample opportunity for this sport in all parts of the state. Printed regulations for 1968 list these waters, which in all cases are exceptions to the general statewide trout season dates, under each geographic area.

**NEWS FROM COUNTY AGENT**

Be sure to empty the fuel tank of your lawn mower before you put it away for the winter, reminds Homer Futter, county agricultural agent. It will help to keep the mower in better condition for next spring. Evaporating gasoline will leave sticky gum in the tank, fuel line, and carburetor.

After using the mower for the last time this season, the agent suggests, drain the fuel tank. Then start the motor and run it until the fuel line and carburetor are empty. Remove the carburetor drain plug.

Lubricate the cylinder by removing the spark plug, pouring in a tablespoon of clean engine oil and cranking the engine slow several times. This coats all the exposed metal surfaces. Then replace the spark plug to keep out dust.

Clean the outside of the engine by brushing or washing off all dirt, clippings and grease. Apply a coat of oil or grease to unpainted surfaces. Clean the air cleaner, too.

For four-cycle engines, drain the oil from the crankcase and leave it empty. Disconnect the spark plug wire to remind you not to start the engine next spring until new oil has been added. If the mower will be left out in winter weather, wrap the engine in a water-proof cloth or piece of plastic and bind securely.

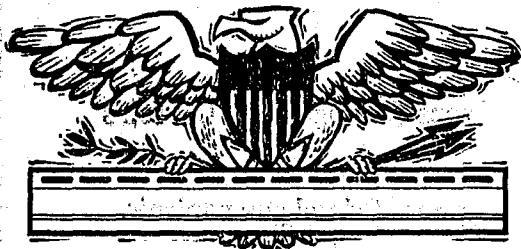

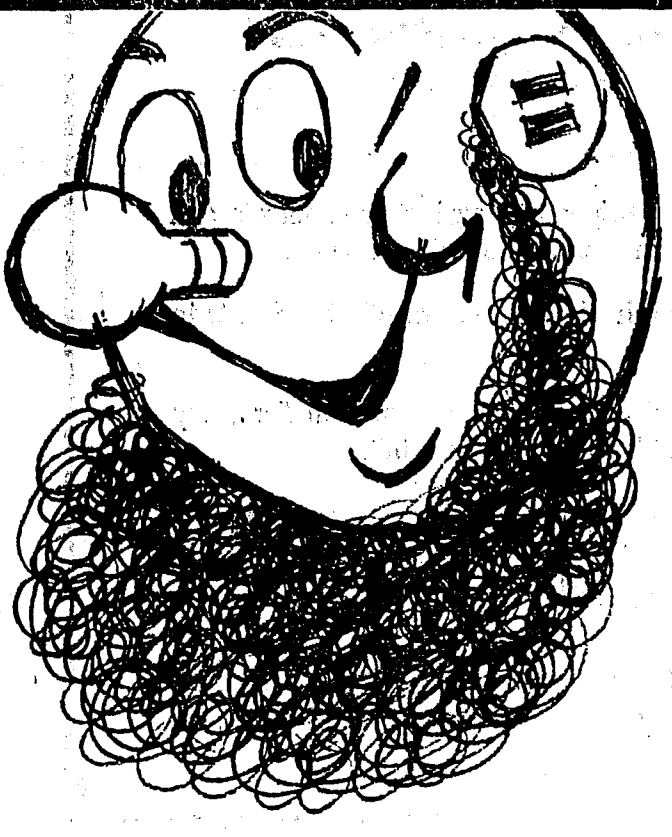

**KNOW YOUR IDAHO**  
 Idaho's Past Viewed in The Present  
 The ghost towns of Idaho offer a side trip resident in the history of Idaho's pioneers. Free for the asking, the Old West background of the towns will teach the children and entertain them at the same time.  
 Birch Creek, far out in western Clark County, Idaho, was at one time producing two-thirds of the lead produced in the United States. Now only a log cabin and slag dump remain.  
 Ruby City, which was located deep in the Owyhee Mountains, once had a population of 800; today the exact location is not known. It was one of Silver City's biggest competitors for the county seat in the late 1800's.  
 Dewey, once called Booneville was also in the Owyhees. In 1896 Colonel Dewey bought mining property and made the town into one of the most attractive in the state. His hotel burned to the ground in later years, and only a few deserted buildings now remain as a salute to his lavish spending to remake the city.  
 DeLaMar was a stopping place on a stage line and was located nine miles from Silver City. It was named after Captain De LaMar who bought the Wilson Mine and adjacent claims. The town is now deserted and decaying with only the footprints of the rabbit and coyote.  
 Florence was founded in 1861 and is located 31 miles south of Grangeville. One pan of gravel from the camp yielded at one time \$500, and in one day, one placer miner "rucked out" \$4,600. In the spring of 1862, miners were able to weigh out gold dust by the pound. Today, it is a ghost city and has no gold industry to sustain its life. In the Florence cemetery the burial of Cherokee Bob can still be observed. He was perhaps the most notorious "bad man" associated with the placer mining area.

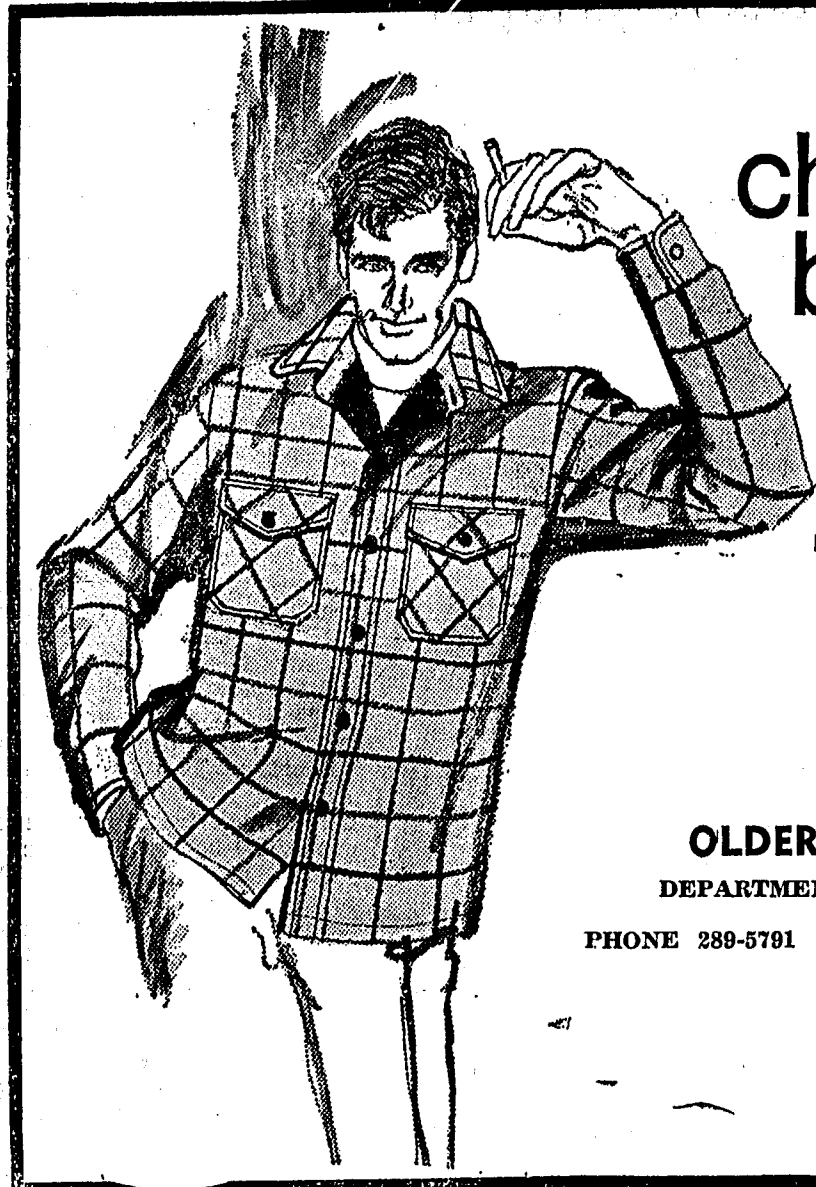

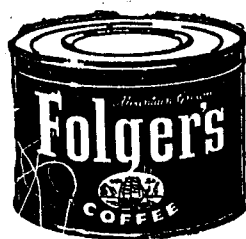
