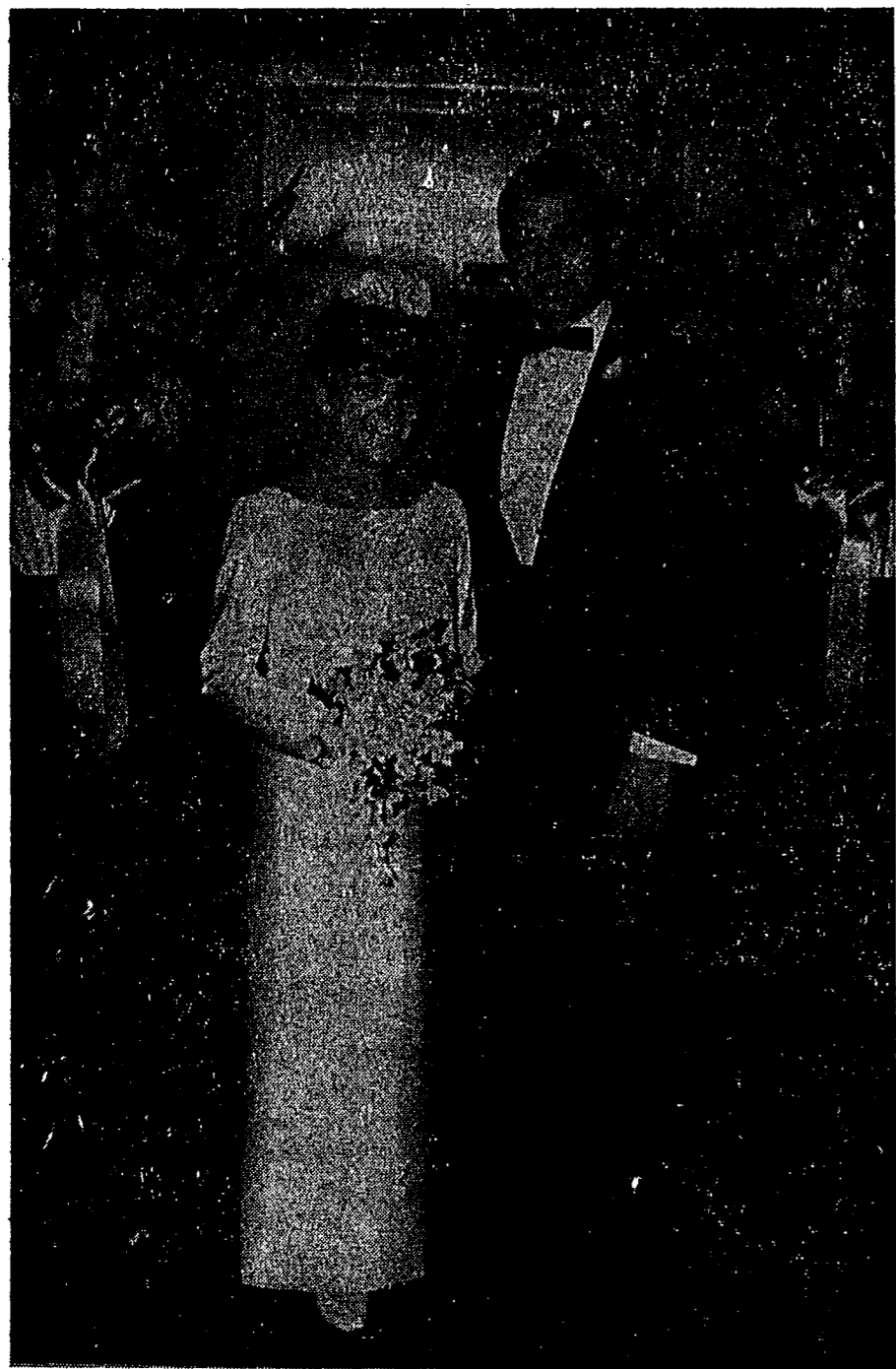

OTTO KRUGER DIES AT LEWISTON HOSPITAL OCT. 30

Otto Wilhelm Kruger, 82, who died of infirmities Wednesday night, Oct. 30, at St. Joseph's Hospital, Lewiston, was a German native who moved to the Southwick area in 1911.

Kruger was born Oct. 15, 1886, in Immenhoff, Germany, and moved to the Southwick area in 1911. He was united in marriage to Ruth W. Boemeke on Nov. 20, 1935, at Cameron. He was a retired farmer.

Mr. Kruger had spent the month of July in the hospital, and then had re-entered it again on Oct. 17th. He had been in ill health for many years.

Survivors include his widow; a brother, Gustave Kruger, Lewiston; two sisters, Mrs. Berta Helne, Lewiston, and Mrs. Martha Rauche of Wenatchee.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday at 10 a. m. at the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church with Rev. Theo Meske, pastor, officiating. Mrs. Meske was organist and Ann Meske, soloist. Pallbearers were Grover Danforth, Willard Schoeffler, Leo Lohman, Elmer Lohman, Cecil Brammer and A. J. (Ted) Freeman, the latter of Lewiston.

Interment was in the Cameron Cemetery, with Brower-Wann Funeral Home in charge.

POLICE, STREETS TALKED BY COUNCIL

Genesee — Additional police protection for Genesee and the problem of improving streets were two of the main topics of the Genesee City Council meeting held Monday evening. All members of the Council were present.

In the wake of the Halloween robberies, the city is more concerned than ever about the apparent ease with which local business firms are being robbed. Jack Magee, police and fire commissioner, reported he had talked with the Latah County Sheriff's office and was told that possibly the city might secure a combination police and fire chief from a police school which is operated in Lewiston. This will be investigated more when the city determines just what funds will be available to pay for the additional help.

In the interim, city supervisor Grieser will increase his police patrol work during the nighttime as much as his other duties will permit. Street Commissioner John Myers, Jr., reported to the Council on his investigation of the various means the city could use in improving the streets and what types of surfacing would be the best over a long period of time.

GENESEE STORES HIT BY ROBBERS

GENESEE—Three business houses in Genesee were burglarized sometime between 1 a. m. and 6 a. m. Friday morning.

Ronald Geltz, owner of the Pastime Tavern here, discovered the lock broken on the front door when he arrived to open his place of business about 6:00 a. m. He notified the Sheriff's office in Moscow. Deputy Sheriff Dick Coomer and local officer Bernard Grieser, investigated. Stolen at the Pastime was \$200 in cash, about \$300 worth of cigarettes, a dozen pair of work gloves, and 4 boxes of candy.

A routine check by the officers revealed that the Thrift Food Store, managed by Jon Cantamessa had been broken into. Several cartons of cigarettes were taken and the dial on the office safe had been beaten off, but the safe was not entered. Entrance was gained through the front door. The store was also burglarized last March.

Further investigation by the officers found that Carter's Charcoal Broiler here had also been entered and an undetermined amount of liquor stolen from a cabinet. Entrance was gained by prying off the back lock.

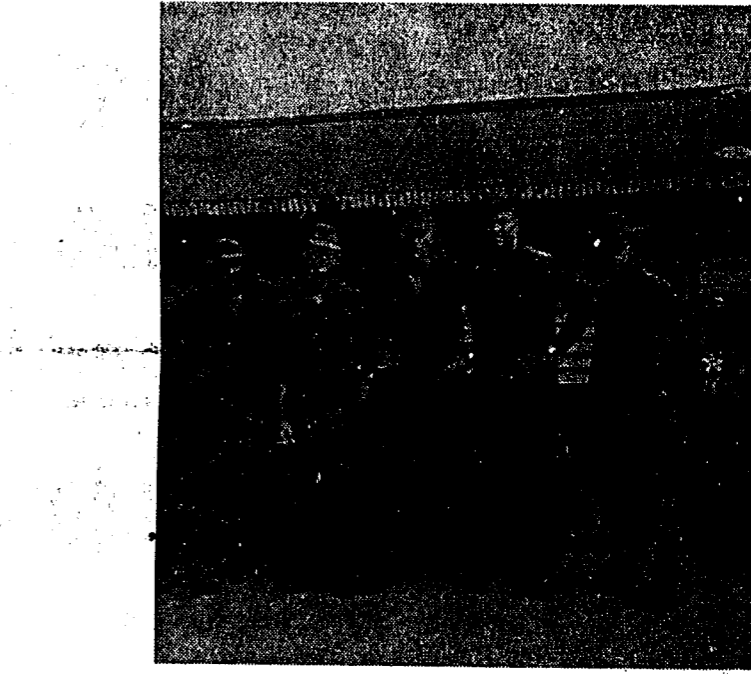

WASHINGTON AND IDAHO DRY PEA AND LENTIL COMMISSION COUNTY JOB NEWS

Palouse area dry peas and lentils are off to a good start in their bid for increased European sales at Paris, France reports Harold Blain, manager of the Washington and Idaho Dry Pea and Lentil Commissions. The industry is currently participating in France's prestigious food show SIAL (Salon International de L'alimentation) which opened October 27 at Paris for a 10-day run. The object of the show was to give consumers a chance to see and taste products such as dry peas and lentils and a wide variety of processed U. S. products.

Dry peas and lentils are getting an enthusiastic reception from French consumers at the demonstration kitchen according to Joe Spiruta, USA Dry Pea and Lentil Council representative. The superior quality of U. S. dry peas and lentils makes them attractive as a gourmet food. Dependability of supply and the fact that the United States is the only source in the world of totally weevil free lentils gives us a distinct advantage in this market.

France last year was a \$153 million market for U. S. farm products which included dry peas and lentils. With France's dry pea and lentil crop down this year, the U. S. is expected to increase sales to France during the coming market year. Promotions in Europe and elsewhere are a cooperative effort by the Commissions, Council and the Foreign Agricultural Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Active promotions are planned for Japan and South America during the coming year to develop new markets and enlarge present markets for dry peas and lentils.

CITIZENS REMINDED TO REGISTER CERTAIN FIREARMS

The Gun Control Act of 1968, recently passed by Congress and signed into law by the President, grants possessors of certain weapons and destructive devices 30 days grace to register these weapons. This amnesty period begins November 2 and continued through December 1, 1968.

Evidence furnished during this period to effect proper registration cannot be used against the registrants in criminal proceedings for a prior or concurrent violation. Possessors of machine guns, sawed-off shot guns, anti-tank guns, bazookas, rockets, mortars, bombs and similar destructive devices, including those classified as deactivated war trophies must be registered with the Director, Alcohol and Tobacco Division, Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C. Those weapons previously registered with this Division need not be registered. Failure to comply could result in criminal prosecution.

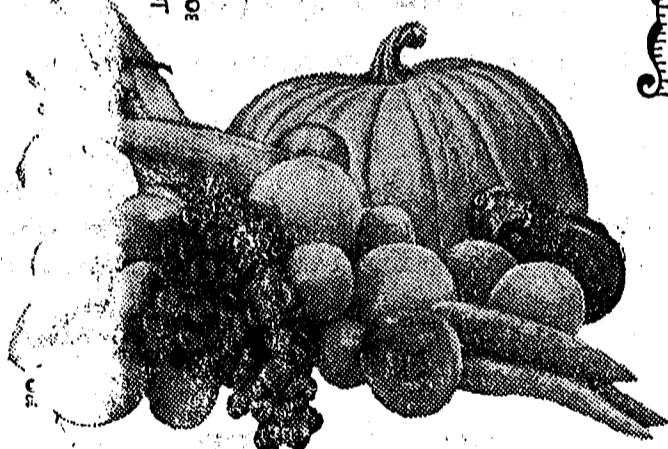

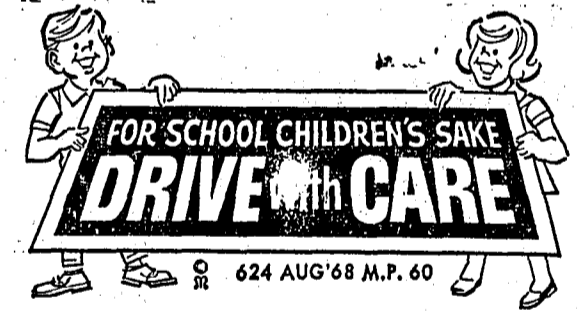
