GENESEE BANK ROBBED AGAIN

GENESEE—The First Security Bank of Idaho at Genesee was burglarized sometime over the weekend, the second time in less than two months.

It is estimated that the burglars took about \$700 or \$800 in silver and an undetermined amount of valuables from safety deposit boxes in the bank's vault. The bank safe inside the vault had been jimmied.

William Phar, manager discovered the break-in when he made a routine check Monday night. The bank had been closed for the Veterans day holiday. The F. B. I., Latah County Sheriff's officers and local Genesee police were called in to investigate.

It is assumed burglars entered the bank approximately the same way as used in the September 24th break-in—through an empty adjoining office building.

Entry was gained into the vault by entering the bank attic and cutting through the brick and cement ceiling. Once inside the vault, the safety deposit boxes were pried open and contents strewn about.

COTTONWOOD FIRM LOW BIDDER ON SEWER LAGOON

A Cottonwood firm, Seubert Excavators, was the apparent low bidder on the project of construction, a sewerage lagoon to serve the city of Kendrick. The bids were opened by the city council last Thursday evening and Mayor Donald (Bud) Eichner, reported that the Cottonwood company's bid of \$27,000 was the lowest of seven bids received by the city.

The contract has been signed and Mayor Eichner said the terms of the agreement call for the completion of the lagoon within a ninety-day period.

Involved in the project will be the moving of 8,000 cubic yards of embankment to form the main lagoon, installation of 2,300 feet of 10-inch sewer pipe and five sewer manholes plus erection of 1,700 feet of fencing material.

Construction site will be west of Kendrick at the old Kendrick sawmill which burned some time ago. The city has purchased three acres of land for the construction site.

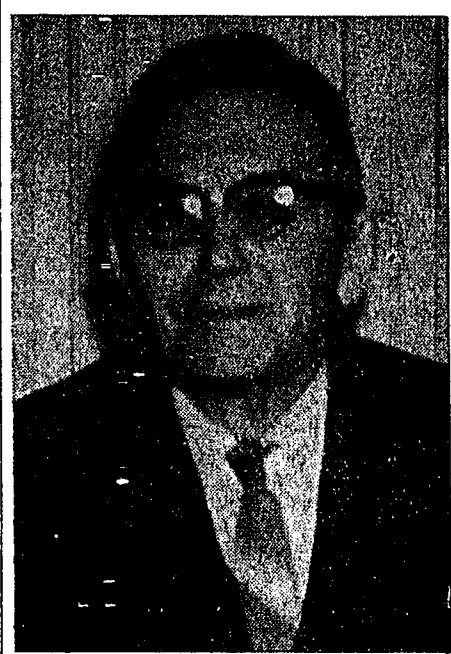

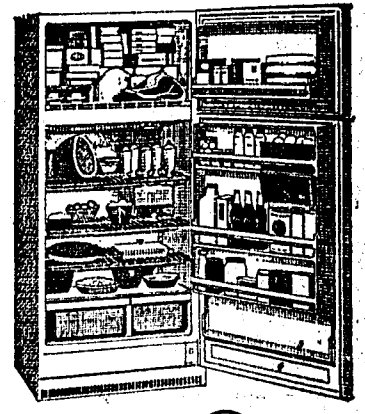

CHRISTMAS THEME FOR GARDEN CLUB SHOW IN LEWISTON

"Christmas Is Everything" is the artistic design theme for the annual Garden Clubs Show to be held at Lewiston December 7-8 at the Young Women's Christian Association.

This annual affair draws exhibits from throughout the area which includes the sale of items for the holidays. It outgrew its last year's quarters and will move to a larger place this year, Mrs. Emmett McKinley said.

Exhibits

The show will have four divisions and expects to draw some 200 exhibitors. In Division I the table themes are: We Bid You Welcome, Radiant Light, Tranquilote, Pink Elegance, Many Splendored Things, Forest Fantasy, Woodland Parade, Sounds of Christmas, Brighten the Season, and We Bid You Adieu. These flowers need not be grown by the exhibitor.

In Division II which is for Horticulture exhibitors, there will be sections of African Violets, Ferns, Begonias, Flowering House Plants, Foliage House Plants, Berried Branches, Evergreens, and cut flowers. All entries must be grown by the exhibitor and labeled as to variety, and must be in pots not over eight inches in diameter.

These include house plants a berried branch and an evergreen branch. In the artistic section for youth, the theme are Frosty Toes, Snow Flakes, and Merry Christmas To You. Included is

an education exhibit by the Orchardettes and a special exhibit by the Merri-Tillers.

The judging will be done by the standard system with blue, red and yellow ribbons being given in each class or sub-class. There will be sweepstakes in Divisions I and II to the persons with the most blue ribbons. There will also be an award of distinction and an award for creativity, which must contain some fresh plant material.

Entries will be received from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. on December 7. Containers for horticulture will be furnished by the show committee with exhibitors furnishing their own containers and accessories for the artistic designs.

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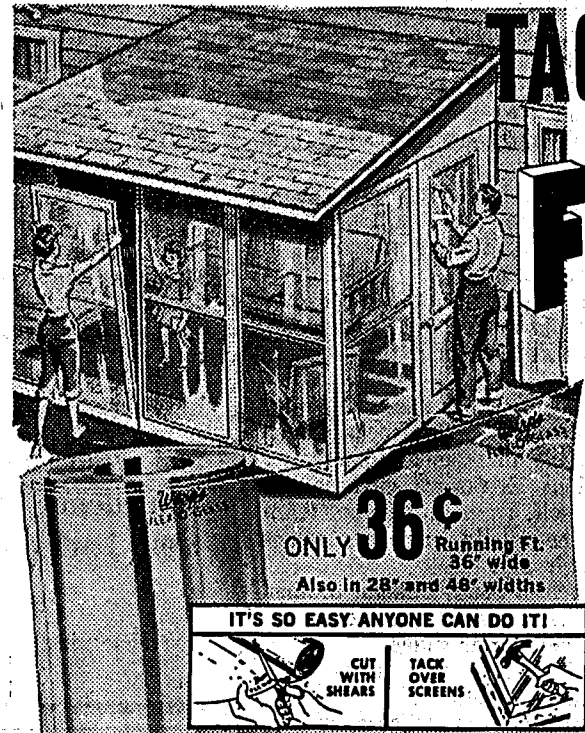

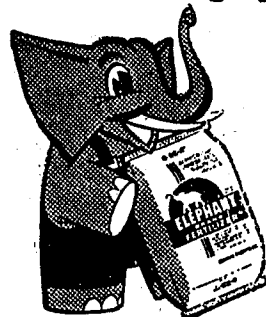

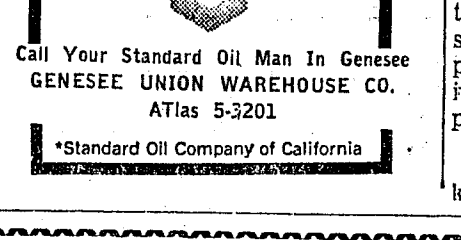

REMINDER ABOUT VEHICLE LICENSES
 Eugene Taylor, Latah county assessor, reminds vehicle operators that license plates issued in 1968 are to remain with the owner for another four years. On payment of fees registration renewals will be issued for a 1969 decal sticker, to be placed on the 1968 plate. The stickers go on sale Dec. 1st.
 Expiration date of 1968 registrations is Dec. 31st, 1968. For those wishing to avoid the long lines that do occur, fees will be accepted during November and held until Dec. 1st, at which time registrations and stickers will be mailed to the applicant. The 1968 registrations are to be presented for renewal. The handling and mailing charge is 25c, plus fee for year of the vehicle. This service is available only to those having a completed 1968 registration for the vehicle in use.
 Any change in vehicle anticipated before purchase of 1969 plate or sticker for plates to be transferred must first complete the title application in the license department of the assessor's office. Out-of-state vehicle owners registering in Idaho should inquire for procedure at the license department.
 Passenger and pickup fees for 1969 are: 1970, 1969, 1968, 1967, \$17.50; 1966, 1965, \$15.00; 1964, 1963, \$12.50; 1962, 1961, \$10.00; 1960 and older \$7.50. 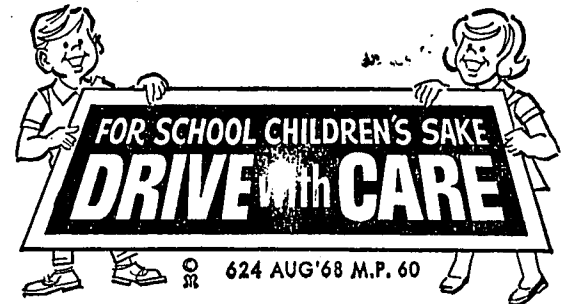
