VEHICLE REGISTRATION

Due to increased vehicle registration in the county during the past year and in anticipation of longer waiting lines, the License Department of the Latah County Assessor's Office is reminding residents of the county that registration of motor vehicles for 1969 will follow a slightly different procedure. On presentation of a 1968 registration, a set of decal type stickers will be issued. Applicants not bringing the registration will be charged a 75c fee if the clerk is required to make the registration from our duplicate file.

Companies or individuals having several vehicles to register may be spared a long waiting period if they will leave their registrations to be typed after the waiting lines thin out and call for them later. There is still time in November to prepay registration fees and request mail service for a 25c fee. Mail orders will be filled in December but only when the pressure at service at the counter lets up.

Residents of Idaho owning vehicles titled and licensed in other states should contact the license department for procedure to obtain 1969 Idaho license plates.

Proof of safety inspection as required by the Department of Law Enforcement before January 1 is not necessary when applying for 1969 license renewal.

Personnel from the license department will be in Kendrick December 7 from nine until four o'clock to renew registrations in that area.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY ACQUIRES AMERICANA FROM PRIVATE COLLECTOR

A proclamation for a Day of Thanksgiving 98 years ago, a railroad company advertising the celebrated gold fields of the Coeur d'Alenes, a 103-year old map of the route from California to Idaho territory and the first sketch of the State Seal are among a collection of Americana acquired by the University of Idaho library.

Aided by contributions from members of Library Associates, the university has added to its growing Northwest Collection a dozen items from one of the greatest private collections of Americana ever assembled. The items were purchased at a New York sale of the collection formed by the date Thomas Winthrop Streeter, a lawyer by profession. Sales of 3,322 items in his collection currently total more than \$4 million.

Included in the acquisition which is displayed in the lobby of the University of Idaho Library, are a proclamation for a day of Thanksgiving November 24, 1870, signed by the acting governor for the Territory of Idaho, E. J. Curtis; and a sketch for what would later be the State Seal, by an early territorial governor Caleb Lyon.

In the display is an 1865 map to guide gold seekers from the Chico, California fields to the new discoveries in the Owyhee, Boise and Humboldt mines of Idaho.

Gold is also the subject of published descriptive brochures on prospective mines, and a Rand, McNally broadsheet published in 1886 for Northern Pacific Railroad Company.

A population was attracted to Idaho Territory with such incentives as "Coeur d'Alene—\$100 per man per day," "Free Gold—This Ore Assays from \$28—\$100, 000 per ton."

MAKE WINTER HOLIDAYS HAPPY

Don't make this first of the winter's happy holidays an unhappy one by being involved in a traffic accident is the plea of Idaho's governor and the superintendent of State Police.

Thanksgiving is a traditionally family holiday, meant to be enjoyed by all, said Governor Dan Samuelson and Supt. L. Clark Hand. "But, a planned, festive occasion can be ruined if you don't follow good driving habits."

The officials suggest that if planning a trip to start early, then drive safely and within posted speed limits.

"Be aware of winter road conditions and adjust your speed accordingly," they said. "Drive with care and obey all traffic laws."

The officials added, "We want you to have an enjoyable Thanksgiving and we want you to be around to celebrate Christmas and the New Year."

"We feel you can do it if you really want to, but when on the highways you must follow the dictates of responsible driving or your chances of happy holidays ahead will be considerably less."

The governor and superintendent concluded "Don't endanger your life or the lives of others by foolish or irresponsible acts when driving. Plan ahead, drive safely and sanely. Don't be the one to cause grief at this joyous time of year."

Lineup For Opening Game

Coach Wayne Anderson, starting his third year as head basketball coach at the University of Idaho, announced today his probable starting lineup for the opening game with the Washington State University Cougars in Pullman on Saturday, November 30.

Anderson said that Jim Thacker, senior guard, who was an all-conference first team member last year, would start at one guard position, and Jim Christensen, senior, would be at the other spot. Phil Waddell, senior guard is also pushing for a starting berth, and will see plenty of action, according to Anderson.

In the front court will be veteran Tony Traweck at one forward and Steve Brown, NCAA high jump champion in 1967, at center. Brown led the team in rebounds last year, and Traweck was the third leading scorer and a fine playmaker. Adrian Prince, a 6'7" sophomore from Saginaw, Mich. will get the call at the other forward position. Prince, who was the frosh team's leading scorer last season, has been impressive in the early workouts and has quickly adapted himself to the Anderson style of play. Anderson also said that Jerry Smith, 6' 8" center and Henry Pettis, 6' 5" junior college transfer, would see much action in the front line.

The Vandals will open on the road with the Cougars, then will be home in Memorial Gymnasium for four straight games. They open the home season against Sacramento State on December 6, and then face Portland State on December 7. The following weekend, December 13-14 the Vandals will meet St. Cloud State of Minnesota and the University of South Dakota.

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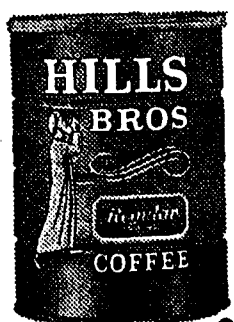

HONEY RAISIN DROPS

- ¾ cup honey
- ¾ cup sugar
- ¾ cup butter or margarine
- 1 egg
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp. each salt and cinnamon
- ½ tsp soda
- 2 cups uncooked quick oats
- 1 cup seedless raisins

Cream thoroughly honey, sugar, butter and egg. Sift together flour, salt, cinnamon and soda. Add oats and raisins. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375°) for 12 to 14 minutes or till lightly browned. Makes about four dozen.

COMMERCIAL FERTILIZER

Idaho farmers, like those in the rest of the country, are using more commercial fertilizer, according to a report the county agricultural agent had this week from Wayne Thessen, soils specialist at the U. of I. extension service.

Idaho used 326,598 tons of fertilizer materials in 1968, an increase of seven per cent compared with 1967. Use in the United States amounted to 38 million tons, a three percent boost from the previous year. The estimate includes fertilizers used on crops, pasture and other lands.

Part of the increase in Idaho or elsewhere, Thessen said, is due to development of new land. Need for higher rates of fertilizer to produce maximum yields was also a factor. Idaho farmers invested nearly \$29 million in fertilizing this year.

California used the largest amounts—3.5 million tons. Other leading states are Illinois, Georgia and Indiana.

The report showed a continuing upward trend for higher-analysis mixed fertilizers. The primary nutrient content of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium of mixed fertilizers advanced to 38 per cent. Direct application of fertilizer materials such as nitrogen advanced nine per cent from a year earlier. Phosphate materials decreased 2 per cent, and potash showed a gain of 16 per cent.

With the present competitive pricing of fertilizers, Thessen said they are one of the farmers least expensive capital investments in crop production. Judicious use of chemical fertilizers, he said, can result in substantially increased yields and profit.

REAR END COLLISIONS

Rear-end collisions are an all too frequent hazard on snow covered and icy roads. To protect yourself from this mishap this winter, the Idaho State Police advises motorists to slow down on slippery roads, increase your following distance to meet road conditions, watch for signals from the driver ahead and signal your own intentions far in advance before stopping, turning or lane changing.

BRONZE STAR FOR BUD LEE

MOTORISTS URGED TO "GET THE FEEL OF THE ROAD"

The Idaho State Police urges motorists to "get the feel of the road" before driving on slippery highways. Test the response of your car in gradual acceleration and braking in a safe area away from traffic. And after you're underway, and when you're sure there is no oncoming or following traffic, recheck the condition of the road occasionally by applying the brakes to find out for sure whether the pavement is slippery. In this way you will be better prepared to handle an emergency situation.

The Idaho State Police, in the interest of safer winter driving reminds motorists that ice near the melting stage at 32 degrees is twice as slippery as ice near the zero-degree mark.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Twenty-seven Latan County job seekers were assisted in finding employment during the past week through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment, according to the report made by Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager. Hartstein said that this is nearly double the 15 reported for the previous week, and three times the nine who were placed on jobs during the same week a year ago. Workers were placed in a variety of jobs from secretaries to laborers, from waitresses to carpenters, and in stores, offices and private homes. At the end of the week there were 33 jobs left unfilled, less than the 41 reported a week ago, and less than the 48 reported as unfilled at this time last year.

Even though the employment opportunities improved somewhat during the week, there were 33 workers who filed new claims for unemployment insurance, Hartstein said. He said that this compared with 29 idled workers filing claims during the previous week and 16 who filed claims during the same week in 1967. Those filing new claims were about evenly divided between woods workers and construction workers, he said.

The total number of workers seeking

jobless pay rose to 111 from last weeks 85, and compares with 89 jobless a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 42 persons filing claims for unemployment compensation, a week ago there were 36 and a year ago 23. At GeneSEE the total now stands at 7, last week it was 4 and a year ago only 1. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the present figure is 34, last week 29, and last year 33. The Kendrick-Juliaetta area now has 10 workers seeking jobless pay, last week there were 5 and last year 4. Fifteen checks are going into the Potlatch area, 9 a week ago, and 20 a year ago. At Elk River the total is now 3, the same as for this time last year, and one more than the total for last week.

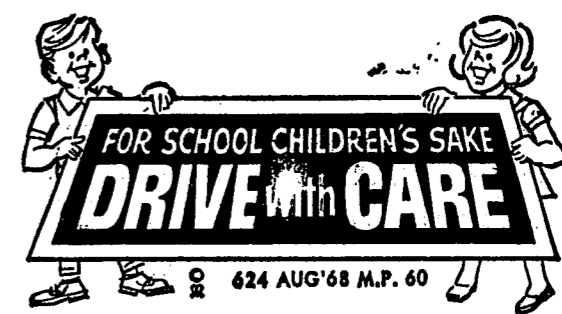
