Home Cookin' . . .

Home made candies that come from your very own kitchen make a special Christmas gift. It isn't too early to start making candy and cookies for Christmas. Make a box filled with home made goodies, and wrap it pretty and you have a gift friends will enjoy.

Verner Davis of Pendleton sends us this week's recipe. Sound delicious . . . quite a few calories. . . who cares, we all eat too much during the holidays anyway.

Mr. Davis says he sent these as it is almost Christmas and they can be used right now. He has made all of the recipes for several years and they are real good.

SOUR CREAM FUDGE

2 cups sugar
1 cup sour cream
½ cup broken pecans or other nuts
½ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter

Combine sugar, salt and sour cream. Cook, stirring occasionally to soft ball stage (236 d. F) on candy thermometer or tested in cold water.

Add butter and cool to room temperature without stirring. Stir just enough to keep candy mixture moving. As soon as the candy begins to lose gloss and will keep shape when piled up, add the nuts and spread in a buttered 8"x8" pan. Cut in squares before serving.

APPLETS CANDY

4 envelopes unflavored gelatin
2 1/3 cup cold applesauce
4 cups sugar
Juice and rind of 1 orange
Juice and rind of 1 lemon

Make applesauce without sugar and cool. Dissolve gelatin in 1 cup of cold applesauce. Place 1 1/2 cups applesauce and 4 cups sugar in saucepan and bring to boil. Add dissolved gelatin and cook 15 minutes stirring constantly. Add juice and grated rind of orange and lemon if you like. Pour into flat pan. Let stand overnight but DO NOT REFRIGERATE. Next day cut into squares and dust with powdered sugar.

Can be made a week or two ahead of the holidays.

ALMOND ROCA

1 cup white sugar
1 cup butter
1 tablespoon water
1 cup almonds (blanched)

Melt butter, add sugar and water and nuts. Cook to golden brown color or hard crack stage, about 290 degrees on thermometer.

Turn out on buttered pan or slab and spread thin. Break or cut into pieces. This candy can be left plain or covered with melted sweet chocolate and chopped nuts or coconut.

TURKISH PASTE

1 package raspberry gelatin
1 package orange gelatin
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1 1/4 cup water
1/2 cup broken walnuts
1/2 cup diced figs
1/4 cup raisins

1 cup powdered sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
Combine the gelatin, sugar and water, bring to boil, cooking 10 minutes. While cooking, stir frequently.

Add nuts and fruit and pour into shallow pan which has been rinsed in cold water (9"x9" pan). Let candy stand overnight. Next day dust candy thickly with powdered sugar mixed with corn starch. Pull out of pan onto board and cut into cubes. Roll in more sugar and dry a few hours. It will keep several weeks.

Latah's Wheat Yield Up To Sixty-four Bushels

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a new three-year average wheat yield of 64 bushels per acre for Latah County. This is an increase of 9.2 bushels from last year and is based on production from 1964 through 1966.

Clarence A. Jensen, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service explained that a great many factors helped to establish the higher yield. Farmers are applying better management in cultural practices, rates and types of fertilizer, and they are using improved seed. ASC records of proven yields for the past year show 210 farmers proved yields based on their production from 1964, 1965, and 1966. Proven yields add 155,500 bushels to the 3,765,000 bushels approved for use in establishing domestic certificates in the county.

Warehouse records and reports compiled by the USDA Statistical Reporting Service, together with ASC records indicate a strong upward trend in yields. The new base period for proving a 1969 wheat yield is 1965, 1966, and 1967. Total net production for this period is divided by the actual harvested acreage to determine an average yield.

The higher county yield means more income to the wheat producer who participates in the wheat program. For a farm with an average yield of 64 bushels per acre, the domestic certificate

earnings amount to about \$89.00 per acre for 43 per cent of the wheat allotment.

The higher yield will also encourage more wheat allotment diversion to other land uses. The diversion revenue amounts to one-half the county basic loan rate of \$1.24 per bushel multiplied by the farm's yield times the number of acres diverted. The diversion income per acre for a farm with an average yield of 64, amounts to \$39.68.

Farmers who have allotments of 21.3 acres or less may sign up the entire allotment for a diversion income based on the yield.

Maximum diversion for payment will be 50 per cent of the allotment into such land uses as new grass seeding, old grass or hay that is not harvested or into summer fallow. In past years, the acreage of new grass seeding has increased greatly when a diversion is offered.

The 1969 wheat allotments are about 13 per cent under last year's allotments and USDA hopes to obtain a total of 18 per cent reduction with additional diversion. A farmer could divert 50 percent of his allotment for a diversion income, and plant 50 percent of his allotment for a diversion income, and plant 50 percent of his allotment for the purpose of earning the full domestic certificate. In this case, his wheat would earn nearly the parity price of \$2.63 per bushel.

Record Yield

The latest USDA Crop Production report estimates a record U. S. harvest this year, with the "all-crops" production index at 3 percent above last year's all-time high. Prospects for food grains and oilseeds continue at record levels, and the output of feed grains is expected to be the second highest on record.

Estimates included a record 1-billion bushel soybean crop, as well as record crops of peanuts at 2.4 billion pounds, rice at 106.9 million hundredweight, and sugarbeets at 25.7 million tons. The corn crop estimate was revised downward slightly to 4.4 billion bushels with a record average per-acre yield of 79.4 bushels. A near-record crop of sorghum grain was projected at 755 million bushels. Below-average crops are indicated for cotton and tobacco.

SNOW SURVEY
The first snow survey of the 1968-69 season was completed November 30 by the Soil Conservation Service and the University of Idaho in cooperation with the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District.

Gary Morris, chairman of the Latah SWCD Watershed Committee, reported that the Moscow Mountain Snow Course had 8.7 inches of snow compared to 7.9 inches for this time last year. The 1961 reading was the highest for this date when 24.9 inches were recorded. The water content is about the same as last year's 1.5 inches.

The other snow courses measured included Howard Creek, 0.5 inches; Crumrine Creek, 3.5 inches; West Twin, 5.9 inches, and East Twin with 6.0 inches of snow. These are all less than recorded at the first measurement last year (1967).

'68 WOOL PROGRAM MARKETING YEAR ENDS DECEMBER 31
Growers were reminded today that the 1968 marketing year under the wool and mohair program ends December 31.

Clarence A. Jensen, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Latah County, Committee, explains that this means that payments for the current 1968 year will depend on completing all details of marketing either wool, mohair, or lambs by that date. Marketings completed after Dec. 31, 1968, will become marketings in the 1969 marketing year, and thus not eligible for payments until early 1970.

The Chairman urges producers to make sure that all details for the 1968 sales are completed by the end of the year. This includes passing title to the buyer, delivering the wool or mohair to the buyer either physically or through documents (such as warehouse receipts or bills of lading) transferring control to the buyer, and having available all the information needed to determine the buyers' total purchase price.

Applications for 1968 marketing year payments under the National Wool Act may be filed with the Latah county ASCS office at any time, and the chm. advises that this be done as soon as possible.

Incentive payments under the wool program are based on the average national price for marketings during the whole year, and this can be determined more exactly if reports on marketings are complete. ASCS there fore is urging that all 1968-year applications be filed before January 31, 1969.

Payments for the 1968 marketing year will likely begin in April of next year.

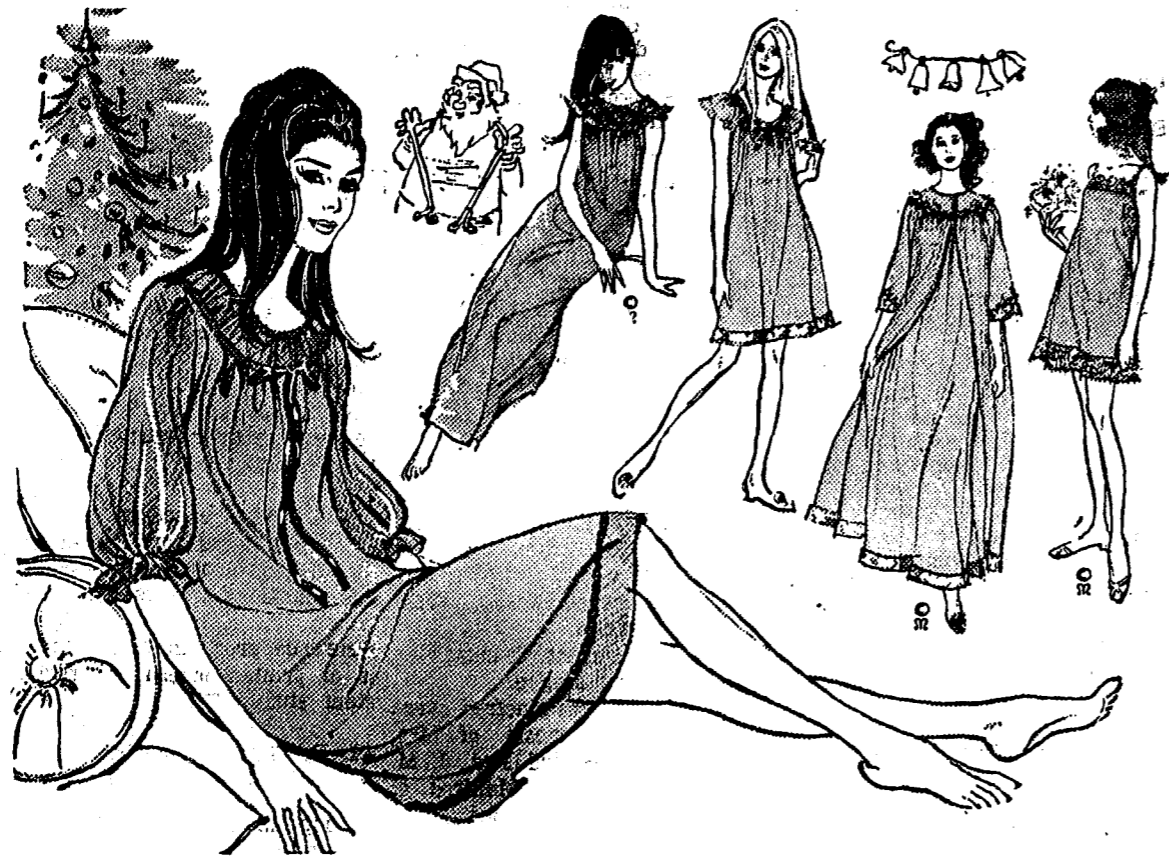
