## Home Cookin' . . .

Homemakers who serve something special during the holidays, add charm to their entertaining. Cookies have always been a holiday favorite, whether served with afternoon coffee or to wrap in gaily decorated boxes as gifts.

This week we have three cooks, all sending cookie recipes. Now there's no reason at all for that old cookie jar to be empty.

Mrs. Wm. Campbell offers her Carrot Cookies. She served these cookies at the United Methodist Church Coffee Hour and they met with such hearty approval of all that she was asked to have her recipe printed in the Gazette-News. The Campbells, who moved to Kendrick from Lapwai eight years ago, live in West Kendrick. Mr. Campbell is city police judge for Kendrick, and besides being a busy housewife and good cook, Mrs. Campbell is active in the City and Juliaetta Rebekah lodge.

**CARROT COOKIES**  
 3/4 cup sugar  
 1 cup shortening  
 2 eggs  
 1 cup mashed cooked carrots  
 2 cups flour  
 1 teaspoon soda  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 3/4 cup coconut  
 Cream sugar and shortening and add the rest of the ingredients. Bake at 375 degrees for 8-10 minutes.

**Frost:**  
 1/3 cup butter  
 3 cups powdered sugar  
 3 tablespoons orange juice.  
 Mrs. Don (Blanch) Edwards took time out from her busy everyday schedule to bring us a recipe for her favorite Christmas Rock Cookies which we are happy to print this week. They sound delicious, are easy to mix up, and filled with candied fruits and nuts make real "tasty eating."

Mrs. Edwards is one of these modern, active housewives. She is currently president of the local Jay-C-ette chapter here. In addition to caring for her home, and cooking for her husband and two hungry youngsters, she manages to work part-time. We hope you try her recipe—we did, and they were delicious.

**CHRISTMAS RACK COOKIES**  
 1 1/2 cup brown sugar  
 2 eggs  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1 cup butter  
 2 1/2 cups flour  
 1 tsp. soda dissolved in 1 tablespoon

hot water  
 Mix the above altogether—  
 1 lb. walnuts chopped  
 1 cup brazil nuts  
 3/4 lb. almond halves  
 1/2 lb. pecan halves  
 1 1/2 cups candied cherries  
 2 lbs. dates, cut  
 3 slices candied pineapple.  
 Take 1/2 cup flour and put over all fruit and nuts.  
 Mix well and add to cookie dough  
 Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 325 degree for 15 to 20 minutes.

Our next cook is Mrs. Mae Walsh. She sends in chocolate cookie and fruit cake recipes. Mrs. Walsh, who has lived alone since her husband's death, remains quite active, despite her advanced years. She enjoys cooking and during her husband's last illness prepared and cooked special health foods for him.

In past years she has taken people into her home and cared for them.

Chocolate Cookies and Fruit Cake are just a few of her favorite recipes. If and when you try them, please call Mrs. Walsh and tell her how much you enjoyed them.

**CHOCOLATE COOKIES**  
 Very Good For Large Group  
 2 cups shortening  
 3 1/2 cups sugar  
 add—  
 4 teaspoons vanilla  
 4 eggs  
 Cream together, beat good.  
 Can use either brown or white sugar.  
 Use four cups if using brown.

**FRUIT CAKE**  
 1 cup Wesson oil  
 3 cups flour  
 1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
 1 1/2 cups candied cherries  
 4 eggs  
 1 cup raisins  
 1 cup baking powder  
 1 teaspoon ground cloves  
 1 cup chopped figs  
 1 cup chopped candied pineapple  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 1 cup fruit juice  
 2 teaspoons allspice  
 2 teaspoons cinnamon  
 3 cups nuts  
 1 cup shaved citron  
 (If you wish, just use lb. of fruit mix and the cup of raisins)

Mix sugar and egg yolks and beat vigorously for two minutes. Sift together spices, salt, baking powder and two cups of the flour and add alternately with the fruit juice to the first mixture. Then add the fruit and nuts which have been mixed with the remaining cup of flour. Add the Wesson oil, fold in the egg whites, beaten stiff, and bake in very slow oven (275 degrees F.) for about four hours.  
 Do not bake so long. Makes too strong.

**POWER FAILURES AND FROZEN FOOD**  
 What do you do with frozen foods when electric power fails?  
 It may be retrofrozen if it is still icy or partly frozen when power is restored, advises Mrs. Esther Wilson, nutrition specialist of the U. of Idaho extension service. You should repack the food however, if the wrapping material has softened. Retrofrozen food may lose some of its color and flavor.  
 Completely thawed food should be cooked again. Mrs. Wilson recommends making jams and butters from fruits and preparing quantity recipes from other foods.

Here are some suggestions for keeping a freezer cold while power is off:  
 Keep the door closed. If the door is open, food will thaw faster. If it is available, add dry ice to the freezer. Be sure to handle dry ice with gloves or tongs in a well-ventilated room. The fuller the freezer was before outage, the slower food will thaw.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 3 AND 4 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 228 TO PROVIDE THAT THE FEE FOR A LICENSE TO SELL BEER WILL BE \$50.00 PER YEAR, THE EXPIRATION DATE OF SAID LICENSE, THE HOURS FOR THE SALE OF BEER, AND PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Ordinance No. 228 be, and the same is hereby, amended as follows:  
Section 3. Licenses for the sale in the City of Kendrick, Idaho, of beer, as defined in Laws of the State of Idaho, shall be \$50.00 per year beginning with licenses issued for the year 1969, and such licenses will be issued on the calendar year and will expire at 1:00 o'clock A. M. on January 1 of the following year and shall be subject to renewal upon re-application.

Section 2. That Section 4 of Ordinance No. 228 be, and the same is hereby, amended as follows:  
Section 4. That it shall be unlawful and a misdemeanor for any person in any place licensed to sell beer or where beer is sold or dispersed to be consumed on the premises to sell beer or permit the same to be consumed on the premises between the hours of 1:00 o'clock A. M. and 7:00 o'clock A. M.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.
