



BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Ida-

ho, as following: Section 1. That Section 3 of Ordinance No. 228 be, and the same is hereby, amended as follows:

Section 3. Licenses for the sale in the City of Kendrick, Idaho, of beer, as defined in Laws of the State of Idaho, shall be \$50.00 per year beginning with licenses issued for the year 1969, and such licenses will be issued on the calendar year and will expire at 1:00 o'clock A. M. on January 1 of the following year and shall be subject to renewal upon reapplication.

Section 2. That Section 4 of Ordinance No. 228 be, and the same is hereby, amended as follows:




