

GUN AND AMMO. LAWS IN EFFECT

Boise — New federal gun and ammunition control laws went into effect this week throughout the United States. Rules and regulations for both the trade and consumer are being administered by the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division of the Internal Revenue Service. Violations carry penalties or fines up to \$5,000 and imprisonment up to five years — or both.

In general, the new laws prohibit minors (below age 18) from buying ammunition and adults from purchasing a box of shells or firearms without filling out printed forms. Copies of the regulations may be obtained by writing the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, U. S. Treasury Dept., Washington, D. C. 20224.

Treasury officials explained that the new federal law is not directed at sport hunting. The Idaho state law permits the purchase of a hunting license at age 12.

New Licenses, Regulations

Hunters and fishermen both will need new licenses beginning January 1, or as soon as they go out again for sport, after the turn of the year. Waterfowlers will need new licenses to finish the remainder of the statewide duck and goose season, but

WATCH OUT FOR OLDER PEDESTRIANS

"This is the danger season when drivers need to be on the alert for older pedestrians," according to Hillel H. Yampol, Executive Director, Metropolitan Chicago Nursing Home Association. He pointed out that longer hours of darkness, fog, snow sleet, and rain make it harder for drivers to see and stop in time.

"For their part, older persons should avoid jaywalking," he said. "When they walk, they should try to avoid the hours between 4 p. m. and midnight, and they should remember that Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays are the worst accident days.

"Drivers must see to avoid collisions with other cars or pedestrians. They should keep their headlights clean as well as their windshields. It is especially important during inclement weather to have live windshield wiper blades to insure best possible visibility. Anything less than good visibility may cause a fatal accident.

"Pedestrian-motor vehicle accidents reach their peak frequency in December and remain high throughout the winter, Johnson.

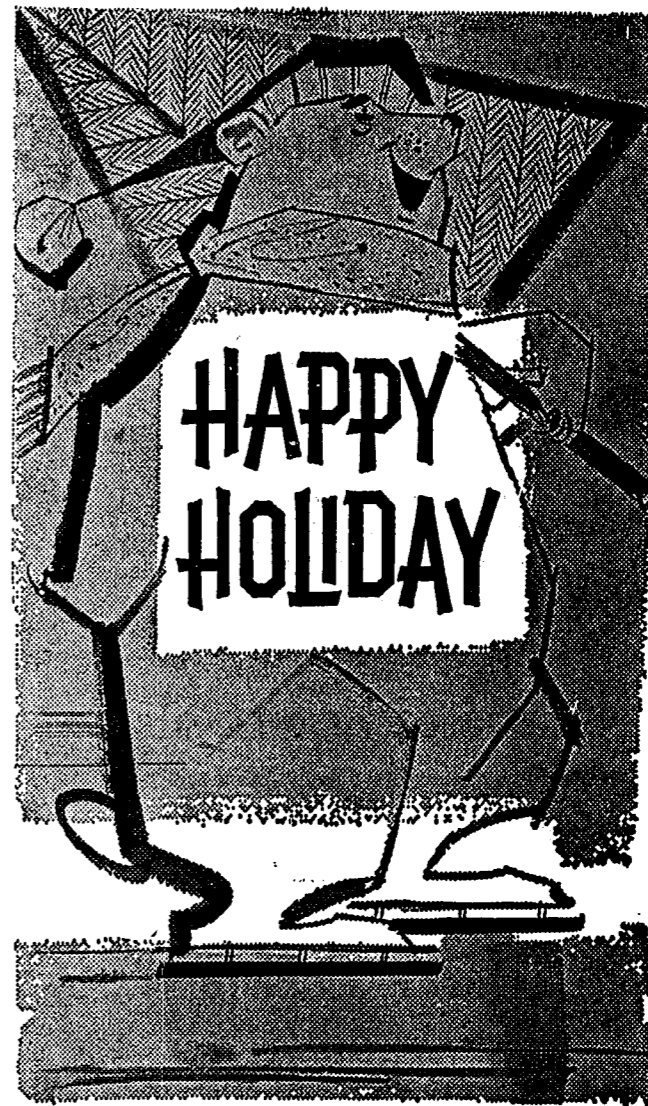

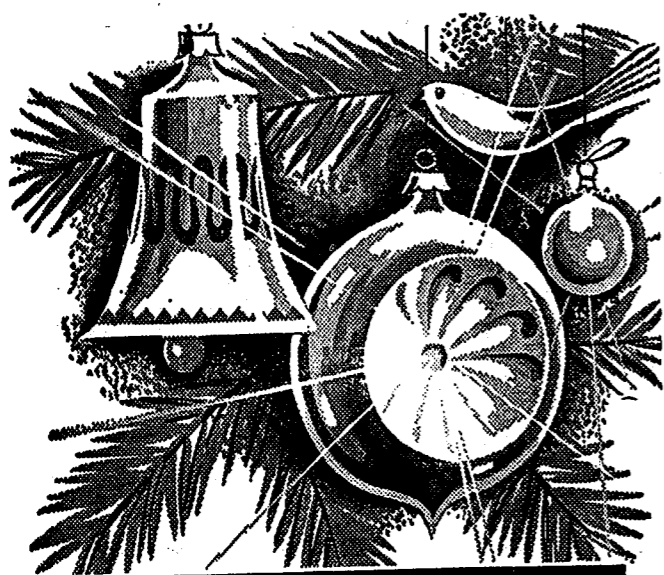

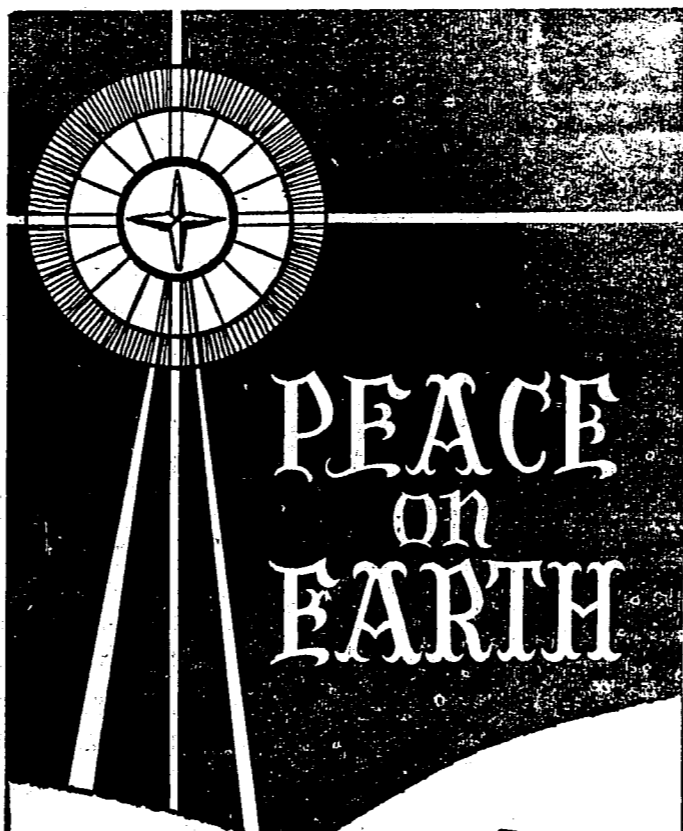

MORE AIRPORTS NEEDED TO RELIEVE CROWDING

MORE THAN 800 AIRPORTS must be built in the United States during the next five years to relieve present congestion and accommodate future growth, says the Federal Aviation Administration. Recommended new facilities include 808 airports, 31 heliports, and 4 seaplane bases. Also recommended are improvements needed at 2,965 existing airports. The cost of these projects is estimated at \$2.16 billion.

A BRONZE AX, a broken drinking cup, ancient royal tombs with caved-in roofs and the crumbled stone wall of a once mighty fortress—all are clues to a mystery more than 3,000 years old. Was the citadel once part of the Bronze Age Greek kingdom of Pylos, ruled by King Nestor, a leader in the Trojan wars? One of the detectives, the discoverer of the clues, has reason to believe so. He and a team of scientific investigators have been exploring the site in southwestern Greece for the past 10 years. Evidence for the importance of the discovery has mounted and now the Greek government has granted a permit for the site to be excavated.

AN EXPERT on primates has identified the mystery mummy found in the tomb of Egyptian Queen Makeri. It is a baby baboon. The tiny bundle in the queen's sarcophagus is identified by hieroglyphics as the infant Princess Moutemhit. From this and other evidence Egyptologists had concluded that the queen had died in childbirth or soon after, and that the princess was her daughter. But the mummy was never unwrapped, and X-rays proved that the bundle contained some sort of embalmed monkey that was later identified as a female baby baboon. It is the only animal ever found inside a royal sarcophagus.

THE 'AIR HAMMER' effect of thermal contraction and expansion that causes banging in commercial hot water and steam heating systems can be overcome by the use of an expansion compensator developed by Tube Turns, Louisville. The unit absorbs all pipe movement caused by temperature change and is rated capable of absorbing up to 14,000 expansion/contraction cycles without failure.

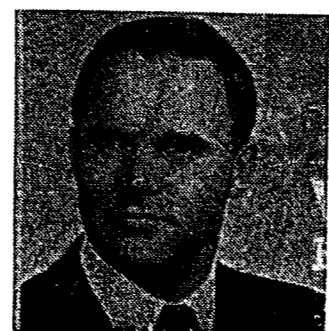
PLANT AND ANIMAL LIFE apparently has a much greater ability to survive the destructive violence of erupting volcanoes than previously believed, says an Ohio State University scientist who investigated the steaming crater of a South American volcanic cone. After a hazardous scramble up its lava-encrusted cone following a recent eruption he found a forest of trees and land iguanas undisturbed by the explosion. "What I saw clears up the mystery of survival in my own mind," he said. "It illustrates that anything short of a Krakatoa volcanic explosion of 1883 near Java) does not destroy all animal and plant life."

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Whitefish Angling Takes Slack Out of Wintertime

Whitefish fishing is fun for people with "know-how", they are good to eat fresh-fried or smoked, the bag limit is 50 fish a day and there is no possession limit, the Idaho Fish and Game department reminded sportsmen today.

The Rocky Mountain whitefish is the species known to most wintertime anglers. Sometimes called mountain herring and grayling, it is found throughout the Intermountain west. Anglers recognize this whitefish, which gets to be about a foot long but may reach as much as four pounds in weight, by its small mouth, large scales, lack of spots and a short dorsal fin. It likes clear, cold lakes and streams and spawns in late fall and early winter.

Hard-bitten whitefish fishermen say that in some respects this species is harder to catch than trout. Ordinarily the guy who does not know how, won't catch many of them. Bait and tackle must be rigged just right and used properly, even when cast in the midst of a school of whitefish. Of course, finding schools of fish is the first problem to be solved. They do not stay in all of the deep holes or pools.

Whitefish have small mouths, and small hooks (size 10 or 12) generally are more efficient for catching them. Sinkers heavy enough to take the line down quickly, and bobbers to keep bait off the bottom, complete such outfits.

Various baits are used. Small grub or larvae are good natural food. Whitefish seem to prefer stone flies that are sometimes called hellgramites and locally hickies. Another good bait is the mousy or rat-tailed maggot, which is

the larvae of the hover fly. Most anglers find their own bait in the stream where they fish. It is the Caddis fly larvae which builds stone or bark casings for its grub-like body and clings to rocks.

Whitefish are native to nearly every section of the state—and the best time to catch them is in the winter months. They run in schools and the cold water produces fish that are of good size and firm flesh.



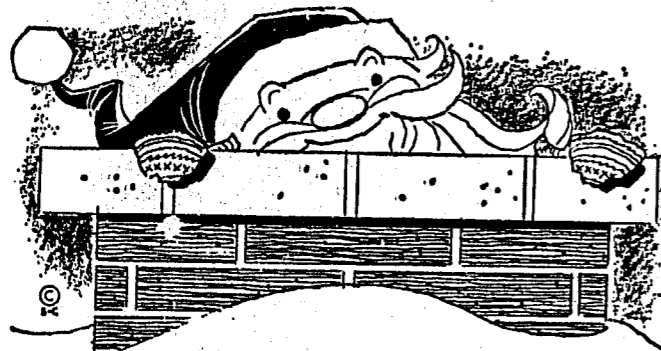

Cream sugar, shortening, add beaten

Dated this 12th day of December School Lunch Policy as to per Lunches and Cost.

In Idaho paragraph 111 F of the Agreement between our School District and the State Board of Education is: "Supply lunches without cost or at a reduced price to all children who are determined by the local school authorities to be unable to pay the full price thereof"; and paragraph 111 G is: "Make no discrimination against any child because of his inability to pay the full price for the lunch."

The condition above is based on Section 9 and Section 13 of the National School Lunch Act, as amended, and Section of the Child Nutrition Act of 1966, which requires that:

a. Meals meeting the established nutritional requirement be served without cost or at reduced cost to children who are determined by our schools and service institutions to be unable to pay the full cost of the meals and,

b. No physical segregation or other discrimination against any child shall be made because of his inability to pay.

The State Health Department, Welfare, The County Commissioners and The School Authorities will determine what students are to receive free lunches.

All "Aid to Dependent Children" will also receive free lunches.

JOB OPPORTUNITIES AT LOW POINT

Moscow — Severe winter weather reduced job opportunities to a seasonal low as only seven Latah county workers were helped in finding jobs last week by the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment, according to Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager. This is fewer than the 10 helped a week ago and considerably less than the 18 helped during the same week a year ago.

Only 10 new jobs were received during the week compared to 11 received last week and 15 a year ago. Jobs available at the end of the week were down to 30, compared to 36 available the previous week and 34 last year at this time. Jobs still open include secretaries with shorthand, a cook, babysitters, housekeepers, a part time nurse and part time cocktail waitress. Experienced bricklayers are badly needed along with a garbage collector, TV repairman, service station attendants, automobile mechanics and a part time serviceman and part time

ticket agent. Hartstein said he expected no significant increase in the number of jobs available until the weather clears.

Seasonal unemployment continued to rise last week as 17 workers filed new unemployment insurance claims. Most of the workers were area carpenters laid off because many outside construction projects are at a standstill. A total of 151 workers were filing for unemployment insurance checks last week. One hundred forty-seven filed the week before and 169 were filing last week at this time. Hartstein said an area breakdown showed 70 workers filing in Moscow compared to 63 last week and 69 a year ago. Eight drew benefits in Genesee compared to 7 last week and only 4 last year.

The cold weather has sent many Troy-Deary-Bovill area woodworkers back to work as claims fell from 65 last year and 47 last week to 42 this week. Kendrick jobless pay increased to 9 this week from 7 last week and 7 a year ago. Seventeen workers drew checks in Potlatch as compared to 18 last week and last year. Five drew checks in Elk River, the same as last week, but

W. W. P. CO. PAYS HUGE TAX BILL

John B. Murray, Palouse Division manager for WWP said that the company's total 1968 Idaho property tax bill will amount to \$2,089,058.67.

down from 9 a year ago. Hartstein said he expected local woodworkers would continue to return to work as logging roads continue to freeze and hold up, but increased lay offs at construction would probably continue the seasonal rise in unemployment.

"Tax payments will range from \$7,773 in Boundary county to \$594,823 in Bonner county," he said. "This is an increase of slightly more than \$50,000 over what the company paid last year."

WWP is the largest taxpayer in seven of the ten Idaho counties in which it owns generating or distribution properties. It is one of the largest taxpayers in the State of Idaho. The company's total federal, state and local tax bill for 1968 will exceed \$12,000,000, or approximately 18c of each dollar it receives from its customers.

First-half payments to be made in each of the local area counties by WWP, are:

Clearwater — \$47,001.46, for a total of \$93,932.28; Latah, \$109,645.45 for a total of \$219,290.90; Nez Perce, \$194,033.37, for a total of \$388,066.74.

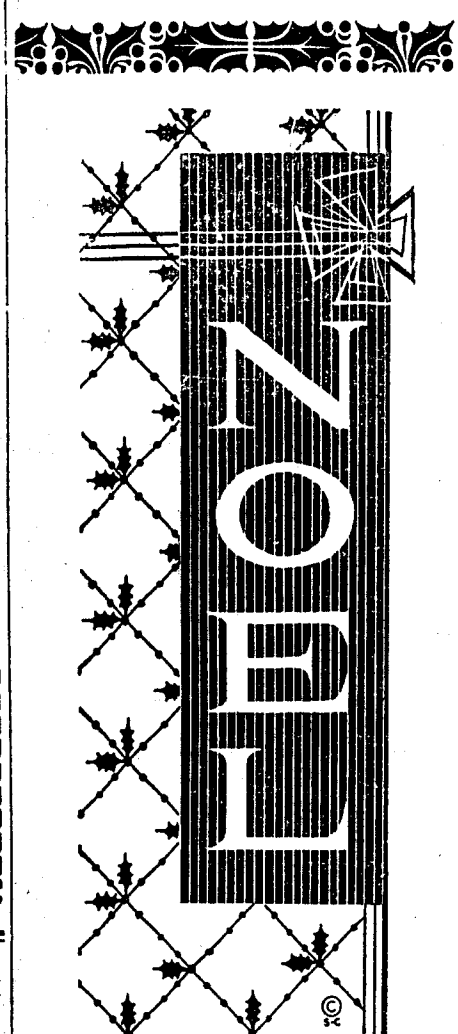
