AUG. F. WEGNER, CAMERON PIONEER, DIES JANUARY 23

August Fredrick Wegner, 79, died at his Kendrick home on Thursday, Jan. 23rd, 1969 at 5:00 p. m. He had been ill with cancer for the last five years.



He began a lifetime in the area at the age of 13, arriving at Cameron in February of 1902 with his parents, Carl and Wilhelmina Wegner, and 11 brothers and sisters.

They traveled west in a Northern Pacific Railroad coach with his uncle and his family. Wegner was later to note that he was the only one of the 23 Wegners in that coach to remain in this area.

Wegner was born Nov. 5, 1869, at Arlington, Minn. He married Meta Schutz at Lewiston July 3, 1916, and they were honored at their 50th year of marriage with a reception given by their family in 1966.

Wegner, for some 45 years, was on the board of directors of the Kendrick Rochdale Co., Inc., warehouse at Kendrick, and for many years served as a trustee of the Cameron School District. He was a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church.

He is survived by his widow at Kendrick; a daughter, Mrs. Daniel (Gladys) W. Sullivan, Lenore; three sons, Glen, Wayne and Vern, all of Kendrick; seven grandchildren and three great-grandsons; a sister, Mrs. Augusta Rogers, Moscow, and two brothers, Carl W. Wegner, Fairfield, Wash., and Albert H. Wegner, Wenatchee.

Funeral services were held Monday at 11:00 a. m. at the Emmanuel Lutheran Church with Rev. Theo Meske, pastor, officiating. Songs were sung by Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., and Mrs. Jack Lohman, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Oscar Slind.

HENRY BRAMMERS TO OBSERVE 58TH ANNIVERSARY

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brammer this week celebrate their 58th wedding anniversary quietly waiting for the severe winter weather to moderate, when they will be guests at a reception given for them by their two sons and daughter, their spouses and their children.

Henry Brammer and Frieda Meyer were married at the second Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron on February 1, 1911. His father helped to build the first Cameron Church in 1891. Henry was confirmed in the church in 1895, one of a class of six. Others were Augusta (Wendt) Meyer, Anna (Oldag) Blum, Sophia (Schupfer) Noble, Joseph Schupfer and William Wilken. Confirmation classes from the first church gave the bell for the second church which was built in 1903 to replace the former one. In 1965 that same bell was placed in the bell tower of the third church built, the new, modern one of today. She was confirmed in the first church in 1900. Both have worked actively throughout their lives in church affairs, though now attend Zion Lutheran Church at Juliaetta, since retiring permanently in 1941.

The Brammers established their first home at Geyers, Mont., near where Henry and his brother, August had homesteaded. A daughter, Martha, was born to them there.

After two years the family returned to Idaho, settling on a 40-acre farm near Cameron, where their sons, Ernest and Werner, were born. Later a larger farm, at Southwick, attracted the family and they moved there, making their home on it until 1941, when they retired.

Mr. Brammer was one of the many individual leaders who did the "leg work" necessary to actually make the R. E. A. co-op a going concern in the late 1930's in Nezperce County. He served on agricultural committees of many kinds from 1932 to 1941 locally and in the county. And, since his retirement, and as a sideline he has competed with gardener and merchant Marvin Long, at Kendrick, as to which could get his own garden cultivated and in first.

As children of German immigrant settlers, the Brammer and Meyer families lived in adjoining sod dugouts on adjacent homestead claims at Luddell, Kansas, her birthplace, born on Jan. 1, 1886. He was born in Germany in 1881, and came to the United States with his parents in 1883.

When Frieda was 4, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Meyer, came west by train and wagon to Cameron. Henry came to Cameron a few years later with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brammer.

Recalling recently the difficult wagon trek from Genesee to Cameron, Mrs. Brammer told of the concern she felt when their cow, tied to the wagon, fell on the rough road and was dragged behind the vehicle.

The couples three children, Martha (Mrs. George Havens), Ernest and Werner, all live on farms in this area. There are seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

P. JOHNS REPORTS SOME FRIGID TRIPS

Mr. and Mrs. Phil Johns returned last Thursday from Butte, Montana, where Mr. Johns had delivered a shipment of squash, and he reported encountering frigid weather and plenty of ice and snow.

Staying over-night at a Butte motel, the couple arose Wednesday morning to find the mercury was a "minus 20 degrees!" He was informed later that the low for the evening was a very cool 36 below zero! It took over an hour to get his truck running so he could make his delivery to a Butte supermarket. The van of his truck is insulated and he places heaters in it to keep the squash from freezing.

This trip was made over the Lolo Pass, and he reported plenty of ice and snow on the road. Although he carries tire chains with him he said he hasn't been forced to put them on in over six years.

This was the eighth trip Mr. Johns has made this winter. He and his wife returned from making a delivery in Yakima a week ago Sunday, and he said the roads to and from that city were extremely slick because of ice.

Asked if he thought this was the worst winter for travel, Mr. Johns said he didn't think it was much worse than the winter of 1963, which he described as "real bad."

HWY. CREWS WILL HELP FEED BIRDS

Joe Schooler, foreman of the Genesee Rimrock Highway District, reported that wild birds are having a very bad time this winter with all the ice and snow covering their food and sand supply. He said he has been placing some grain out as he and his crews work to keep the roads open and that if anyone wishes to help feed the birds they can leave feed with him and he will put it out as he works.

He also suggested that farmers and others in the country might also put food out. With all the snow, sand and other small gravel is also needed by the birds.

It is not usually a good practice to encourage birds to feed along the roads where they may get hit by vehicles but they have to find food somewhere this kind of winter!

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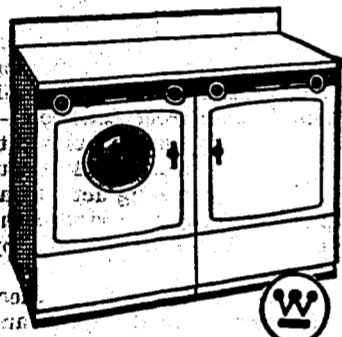

PEA, LENTIL FUNDS FOR RESEARCH

Moscow—Harold Blain, Administrator of the Washington and Idaho Dry Pea and Lentil Commissions announced today that a total of \$80,000 in new funds has just been made available for the USDA dry pea and lentil research program currently underway at WSU. Allocation of the new funds is the culmination of three years effort by the industry to expand the current program.

Blain noted that these new funds were particularly gratifying because out of this year's total Agricultural Research budget, dry peas and lentils were the only crops to receive an increase in research funds even though the Crops Research Division was forced to reduce its total budget by \$700,000 as a result of Congressional action. The fact that dry peas and lentils were the only crops to warrant an increase shows what can be done by an organized industry working together to share the cost of a strong research program as well as assuming the responsibility of developing new markets both here and overseas. Development of new markets makes it absolutely necessary that we have a strong research program to produce the quantity and quality of products needed to supply these markets, Blain said.

During the past three years approximately \$60,000 in Commission funds have been made available to research programs at WSU and the University of Idaho. This year, \$17,000 was made available to aid in the construction of an office and laboratory building at WSU which will be used to house the expanded program. Results of the current program are already paying off with the recent announcement that a new lentil variety had been developed which is currently being considered for release.

YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT SAGE GROUSE STUDY

The western Owyhee County sage grouse study, which was started last year and resulted in 396 marked birds, will be continued this season. Captured females have been given distinctive markers called "panchos" to wear, while the cocks have wing markers. Both types of markers have been seen from the air.

The overall purpose of the sage grouse study program is to locate new wintering populations of these large game birds, and to outline seasonal distribution. The goal is to get information needed to enhance the sage grouse population in some places, if possible, or to maintain them at present levels.

Hunter Report Cards

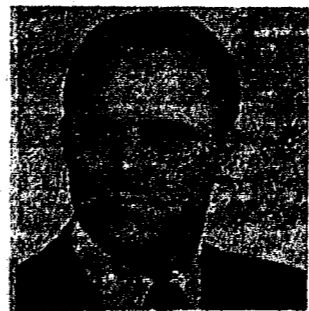
Substantial increase in deer and elk are indicated by hunter report cards voluntarily returned by the "cut-off" date January 7. These cards report 25,000 deer kills during 1968, compared with 21,700 in 1967; and 6,200 elk kills in 1968, against 5,400 in 1967. Because only part of the total number of deer and elk tag buyers tear off the hunter report card and return it to the department, the official statewide calculated kill figures for elk and deer won't be known until hunter questionnaires are completed and mailed back.

More Coho Eggs

Fingerling coho now being incubated at eight hatcheries of the Department will be stocked in a dozen Idaho lakes and reservoirs this spring as part of the three-year coho salmon introduction program. More than three million eyed-eggs were obtained this month and shipped to hatcheries at American Falls, Ashton, Eagle, Grace, Mackay, Hayspur, Hagerman and Mullan. This year, Lake Coeur d'Alene is scheduled to get coho fingerlings, along with a dozen southern Idaho waters.

COUNTY JOB SCENE

The demand for temporary workers continued high at the Moscow office of the Idaho department of Employment, according to Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager. Hartstein reported that his office filled 32 jobs during the week, many of them for jobs caused by the continued heavy snows in the area. Other workers, placed in such permanent jobs as secretaries, machinists, sales clerks, bookkeepers, and grocery checkers contributed to the total, which was considerably higher than the nine workers placed on jobs during the same week in 1968. Last week, the total placements were 28. At the end of the week, there were 47 jobs still available, all of them for permanent full time workers. Among them were openings for electricians, a TV repairman, farm workers, woods workers, secretaries, bookkeepers and a general office clerk. Cafe and domestic workers are also in demand.

There were 31 new claims for unemployment insurance filed during the week, bringing the total number of idled workers seeking jobless pay to 268. This compares with 248 at the end of the previous week, and with 216 at the end of the same week a year ago. In the Moscow area there are now 118 workers receiving unemployment insurance, last week there were 114 and a year ago only 84. In the Genesee area the total is now 15, a week ago 16 and a year ago 5. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area there were 72 persons seeking benefits compared with 69 a week ago and 76 a year ago. Sixteen Kendrick-Juliaetta residents are now filing claims compared with 14 a week ago and 10 at this time last year. The number of Potlatch residents seeking unemployment insurance rose from 30 last week to 39 currently. A year ago the total was 30. Eight Elk River residents are now receiving benefit checks, up from the 5 of a week ago, but fewer than the 11 of last year. No significant changes should be reflected in the number of persons seeking unemployment insurance through his office for the next few weeks, Hartstein said.
