## Natural Gas Service Offered To Genesee

GENESEE—Washington Water Power Company has offered to bring a pipe line to Genesee which would serve this community with natural gas. The proposal was made Monday night to the city council by John Murray, Palouse Division Manager for WWP. If the council accepts the utility's offer, work will begin on the project this spring.

Murray and Floyd Ochs, local WWP representative, were present at the regular monthly meeting of the council. What WWP must have before any further work can be done is the granting of a franchise by the city to the WWP

Co. authorizing the utility to extend its lines into Genesee. The franchise is for a period of twenty-five years, and, as Murray pointed out, is not an exclusive one.

If the franchise is granted, the company would tap into their main line near the junction of Highways 96 and 195 on top of the Lewiston Hill and come across country seven miles to the Genesee city limits. The WWP man told the council that once the line to Genesee was complete the company would then install service lines throughout the city so that practically any home or business would have access to a connection if they desired.

Murray said he and his company realized that the cost would be great in bringing natural gas to the city but said the company felt the investment would give them returns over a long period of time.

Murray left information and proposed ordinances with the council so they may be studied and discussed. Further action is expected at the next meeting.

### Police Judge to Retire

Ray Johann, who has been Genesee's Police Judge for the past twelve years, was present at the Monday meeting to inform the council that he would be forced to resign effective February 28. Mr. Johann will retire from his position with the Genesee Rimrock Highway District at that time also. He thanked the council and city for the cooperation he has received during his years of service. Mayor Scharnhorst expressed his regret at losing Johann's services and thanked him for all his time and effort. Jack Magee, police and fire commissioner, will attempt to secure a new police judge before Johann's actual retirement.

Clark Holfeltz, who recently purchased the former LaVera Heinrich residence, appeared before the council to discuss the possibility of having the city sewer line extended to service his home. He also inquired as to the possibility of leveling the rise in the street leading to his home. Mr. Holfeltz, who with his wife and three daughters, recently moved to this area from California, said he was especially appreciative of the fine work city supervisor Bernie Grieser has been doing this winter in keeping the roads open.

In other action the council discussed the forthcoming city budget, which will be published next week; snow removal and the possibility of receiving state funds and the problem of obtaining a full-time police and fire chief.

All members of the council were present at the meeting presided over by Mayor Scharnhorst.

## Blizzard Blasts Area Friday; Roads and Schools Closed

A raging blizzard swept out of the north Friday of last week and paralyzed almost all travel routes over much of the area. Schools were closed in all of the communities and Highway 95 was closed to travel from Riggins North to the Canadian border. The heavy snow was swept along by gale force winds and piled into drifts that exceeded five feet in depth in many places.

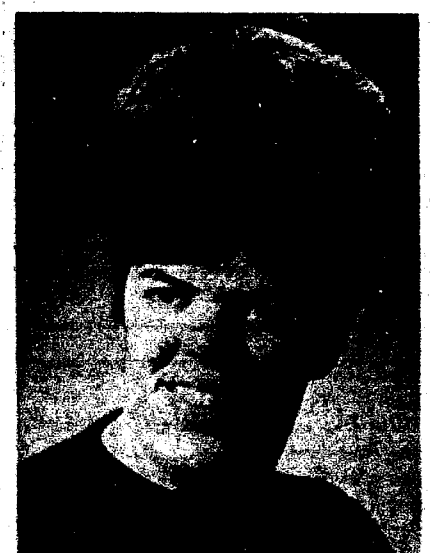
The first snow and winds began Thursday night but they gave little hint of the fury that was to come. By early Friday morning the snow had already begun to close many of the country roads and travel on the main highways

was very hazardous. By noon the storm had increased in intensity and the already tired highway crews realized they were fighting a losing battle and began placing barricades on highways leading out of many communities.

All of the ridge roads in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area were closed to traffic during the afternoon as many stores and business firms closed early to allow employees to return home, especially those living in the country. The Kendrick to Lewiston highway stayed open during the storm. The Genesee area was quickly sealed off by the drifting snow and blinding wind storm. Travel out of Moscow and Lewiston (for those wanting to use Highway 95) was blocked by the State Highway department. All the people who daily commute between Moscow and Genesee were trapped in Moscow overnight. Drifts over five feet high blocked the highway from Wagner Springs to the Junction of U S Highway 95 and 195. The snow drifted to depths of three feet and higher in the Genesee Valley and were over four feet on Fix Ridge between Genesee and Juliaetta.

## REP. GEO. F. BROCKE REPORTS ON THE LEGISLATIVE DOINGS

Boise, Feb. 6 — With the third week of the 40th Session coming to a close, things are beginning to "gel." New legislation is now showing up. Items such as lowering the voting age to 18, changes in the election laws, school consolidation, new type of school formula, zoning legislation for school districts. These are just a few of the items that the legislature is now working on.

Later, to come, will be court reform, highway districts, taxing measures, and many more.

This week the legislature was offered a plan of school consolidation. It is very interesting when it comes to schools in our area. This new plan calls for 44 school districts. One would be of the opinion that this would be county-wide school districts, but this is not the case. For example, in Latah County the plan proposes a new district that would be known as "School District No. 280." This new district would be made up of the present districts, Moscow, White Pine, Pottlatch, Genesee and Elk River. The new district in Nezperce County, known as No. 340, would include the present districts, Lewiston, Lapwai, Cullacass, Tammany and Kendrick of Latah County. This bill has not been introduced at this time but is before the Education Committee for consideration and introduction. Very little press exposure has been given this plan at this time. However, I am sure that the committee will give most serious study before such legislation is introduced.

The Water Resources Board appeared before the Resources and Conservation Committee and a matter that is of great interest to the people of Latah County was discussed, which is the water development plan that is being worked on by several progressive people in the Troy area. Should a proposed plan be worked out, this could become a reality under the Water Resources Board.

This morning all members of the seven northern counties met with the Governor to hear a report from the people of his office who went to northern Idaho to look over the seriousness of the snow situation. Another delegation will go north next week to deal with the County Commissioners. It is suggested that all Highway District Commissioners get in touch with the County Commissioners if you are running low on snow plowing funds.

## Legislative Busy Group

The Idaho Legislators attended last week's luncheon at the Stratatorium at the Boise airport, where they watched the planes come and go on the snowy field. ## TAX DUE DATES ARE LISTED

It's income tax time again—and here are some important dates and reminders from the Internal Revenue Service.

ALL TAXPAYERS: April 15 is the general filing deadline, with the exceptions noted below. File early, but carefully, including correct social security numbers. Errors delay machine processing of the returns and refunds.

FARMERS: January 31 is due-date for the annual social security tax report on all 1968 farm employees. February 17 is the final date for 1968 income tax returns, unless estimated tax was paid by January 15.

EMPLOYERS: January 31 is the deadline for issuing W-2's to employees, also for filing the final 1968 employers quarterly tax return, and the annual federal unemployment tax return.

EMPLOYEES: Before making returns to be to have all W-2 forms from every 1968 employer. Incomplete returns delay refunds.

Business and Professional People and others whose income taxes are not paid by withholdings from salaries or wages: January 31 is the due date for 1968 income tax returns for those who did not pay final quarterly estimates by January 15. Otherwise, April 15 is the deadline, including the first quarter estimate payment on 1969 income tax.

CORPORATIONS: March 17 is final date for calendar year 1968 returns.

## AMERICAN AGRICULTURAL MARKETING ASSOCIATION

Boise, Idaho—The American Agricultural Marketing Association has had a definite impact on potato contract prices for 1969, according to Russell Howard, coordinator of the AAMA's multi-state Potato Marketing program.

AAMA, an affiliate of American Farm Bureau Federation, serves as marketing agent for potato grower associations in several states, including Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. Following preliminary talks with the major potato processors in Washington State, Howard termed the discussion "very encouraging."

Most processors have agreed that the contract guidelines recommended by the AAMA advisory committee are both reasonable and realistic. Association members are not after blue sky profits in the potato business. "Our goal," Howard said, "is a fair return for a quality product. We do not intend to make excessive demands on any processor, nor do we intend to use our strength to extract unfair contract terms. However, we do intend to use considerable pressure to put a stop to certain abuses and inequities which the grower has tolerated for too long."

Washington potato processors are now formulating terms for 1969 contracts. Follow-up discussions with some processors will no doubt be necessary to iron out specific terms but Association members are confident that most contracts will include the AAMA recommendations presented on behalf of potato growers.

Thursday, Jan. 18, 1939, Gazette Historical Kendrick Gazette in 1919

On turning to the first page of the Gazette, dated January 17, 1919, we find there were still quite a number of the local boys overseas, and others who had just returned home.

A letter from Louie Rognstad, dated Nonsard, France, Nov. 26, 1918, in which he stated: "We are just straight out from Metz, not so far from Verdun. Another article stated that Fred Bolon had just returned home after having spent a year in France."

A letter from Corp. Fred Wilken from Commercy, France dated Nov. 26, 1918, told what he had been doing since he had been overseas, since the ban on censorship had been lifted, saying he expected to be sent to Germany as an interpreter soon, but did not know at that time where he would be sent. I have been at Toul, France, since last May, except when I was at the front. I am sending home a few souvenirs which should reach you about the time this letter does.

Corp. "Buck" Browning had just arrived home a few days previously from across the waters, where he had been for over a year. Corp. Browning was among the first to go across. He considers it a fortune, however that he was not allowed to get in the thick of the fray. His company was stationed at an aviation center in England. He was mixed up in several air raids but came out of them uninjured.

Along with the army news, it might not be amiss to say that the paper bearing the date of 20 years ago this week carries a list of the Leland Red Cross Roll, which should make any town, or part of the country feel proud—it bears 193 names.

At a regular meeting of the village council, the final ordinance creating Improvement District No. 2, was passed. This ordinance calls for the paving of

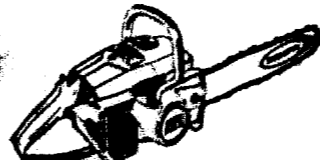
Main street and several side streets. The specifications called for the paving from curb to curb in the business part of town and a 16-foot strip through the residence district.

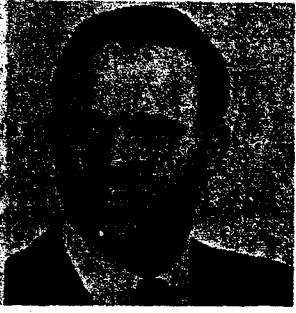

**REP. GEO. F. BROCKE  
REPORTS ON THE  
LEGISLATIVE DOINGS**

(Delayed from Last Week)  
With the second week of the 40th Legislature coming to a close, it can be reported that this week saw no major legislation being placed in the hopper. Coming before the legislators was only routine legislation on general house-keeping bills. A total of 10 of this type was passed by the House during the week.

The several committees of both Houses are now holding hearings in regard to proposed legislation.  
On Thursday of this week the Governor reported to the Legislators that the surplus, come June 30, 1969, would be \$20.7 million dollars. This is a new figure up from the \$15.3 million reported the week before. Next week we could have another figure, as the Revenue & Taxation Committee are doing research in this field. The surplus should be somewhere between \$21 and \$25 million. The projected income for the next two years will be some \$205 to \$210 million.

The Agricultural Committee held hearings on the "Egg Grading" law. The hearing was to the effect that all eggs produced in Idaho should be graded, and that all producers should come under the law. This would eliminate the present small producers, which are now exempted by law. A hearing will be held next week on the motor vehicle inspection law. The average cost of inspection at this time is \$8.54 per vehicle.

The Education Committee has a sub-committee that is now working on the public school foundation formula. Several new ideas have been proposed to the committee, and it may be that a completely new public school foundation formula will come from the work that this sub-committee is doing. This committee is also exploring the school formula of other states to secure basic ideas in the area of equalization. As these ideas and plans are placed in condensed form they will be reported to you in future news releases.

It is now the consensus of the legislature that the 30 mill limit for school districts should remain as it now is, and that increased funds for the operation of the schools should come from increases at the state level.

School consolidation is another item that is being tossed around, and will come before the Education Com-

mittee the first part of February.

A bill has been introduced this week to allow the Fish and Game Commission to close certain areas for the study of the cougar.

Next week the Agricultural Committee will have hearings with different Agricultural Commissions.

**Legisladies Are Active**

It was an active week for the wives of the legislators, better known in Boise civic and social circles as "The Legisladies."

Their attention was given to four sectors of economics in the State's over-all picture. Thursday of last week they held their weekly meeting at the Stardust.

Friday night they were guests of the Idaho Press Women at a dinner in the Downtowner. Helen Wilson, Dean of Women at Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, was the guest speaker, delivering an address on "The Responsibility of the Press to the Public". The First Lady of Idaho, Mrs. Ruby Samuelson, was honored guest of the Press Women. Saturday several of the wives joined their legislator husbands in a trip to Nampa State Hospital for the mentally retarded. This is an annual pilgrimage.

Monday many attended a meeting at the Columbian Club and heard a discussion on traffic safety.

Mrs. George Brocke, Sr., attended all four meetings.

**BAKED CHICKEN**

- 1 quart diced cooked chicken
- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 4 beaten eggs
- 1/4 cup fat from chicken
- 3 cups chicken broth—add milk, if needed to make 3 cups
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Mix all ingredients and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees. Serves 10.

**STRING BEANS**

- 1 can string beans
- 1 can condensed mushroom soup
- Combine in shallow pan, top with toasted buttered bread crumbs and bake at 350 degrees for 1/2 hour.

- Sift:
- 1 1/2 cup flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 3 Tablespoon cocoa
- Mix:
- 1 cup cold water

- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 Tablespoon vinegar
- 5 Tablespoons melted shortening
- Combine the two mixtures quickly
- Bake in 9x9x2 pan, 30-35 minutes or until done. 350 degrees.

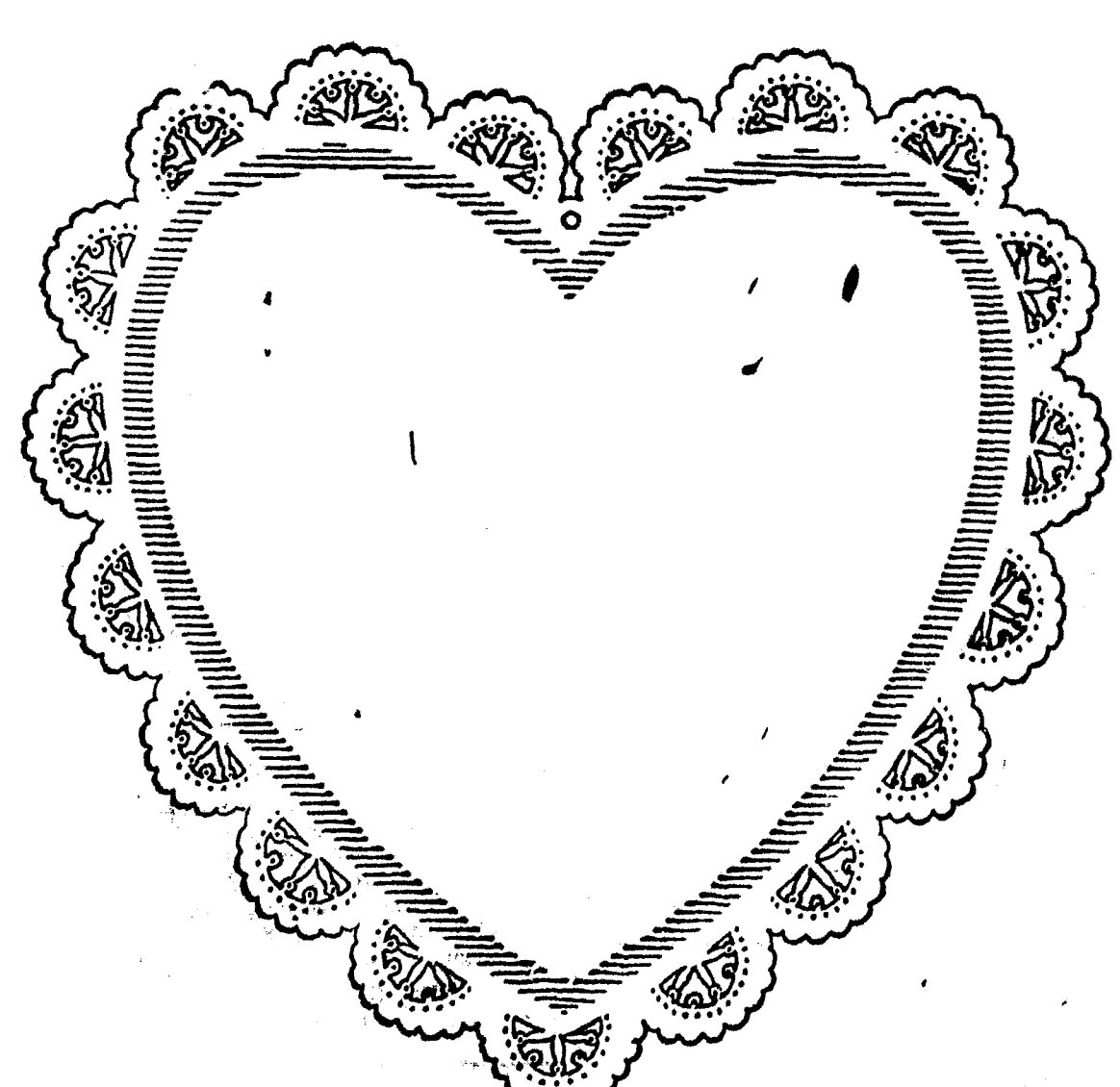
