Fred Wilken from Commercy, France dated Nov. 26, 1918, told what he had been doing since he had been overseas, since the ban on censorship had been lifted, saying he expected to be sent to Germany as an interpreter soon, but did not know at that time where he would be sent. I have been at Toul, Prance, since last May, except when I was at the front. I am sending home a few souvenirs which should reach you about the time this letter does

(Delayed from Last Week)



SUCKERS PROTECTED BY '69 REGULATION

Boise A new change in the 1969 fishing regulations makes it illegal to take non-game fish in any waters unless the season for game fish is open. This would include the Potlatch River, where traditionally people have taken suckers and other rough fish during their early spring

The season for trout does not open until May 3rd, so people will not be allowed to catch rough fish prior to that time in the Potlatch River. Since the season on the Clearwater River from its mouth upstream to the mouth of the South Fork is open to year around fishing to all species except salmon and steelhead, the people will be able to fish for suckers in the Clearwater River at the mouth of the Potlatch River.
