JANUARY WAS WET— SO WAS 1968

The snow pack on Big Bear Ridge measures 26 inches and contains an estimated 6.00 inches of moisture.

Mr. Bower added that his figures show there was a moisture total of 27 inches recorded during the year of 1968. This is two inches above the ten-year average, he added.

School Consolidation Is Hot Issue In Idaho Legislature

With the fourth week of the 40th Session of the Idaho Legislature coming to a close, the session will soon begin the last half. Thursday was the last day for the introduction of personal bills. The last day for committees to introduce bills will be Monday, February 17th. For the balance of the session, only select committees can introduce bills. These select committees are: Appropriations, Revenue & Taxation, State Affairs, and Ways and Means.

This week has been a very slow one as far as real action is concerned. No major legislation was offered and only minor legislation was before the Legislature. Most all important legislation is now in the committees, with the committees holding hearings to justify the legislation offered.

The Education Committee is now bogged down over the school formula, which allots monies to the many school districts that operate public schools within the state. The larger schools with a low tax base want to keep the present formula without change of any kind. The smaller districts with a higher tax base are wanting some changes so they too can get a just share of state funds. At this time, the large districts control the vote in the Legislature.

I proposed this week that the committee recommend a \$600.00 per year teacher increase to all teachers in the state, which would cost some \$12½ million for two years, and the balance of the appropriation would go to the present foundation program, to be distributed under the present formula; also that we make that appropriation for one year and that a committee work out a new formula which would be fair to all school districts. Every one of the large districts opposed this plan, however, I still have hopes that something can be worked out.

School consolidation is fast becoming a hot issue. We have a bill that would eliminate 11 small elementary districts. Should this bill become law, these districts will be notified to the effect that they must consolidate with some other now-operating school districts by July 1, 1969. After July 1st, the power of the trustees to make a levy for school operation will be eliminated. Under this procedure, the school can no longer operate.

I am told that this is a test bill, and if this plan becomes law, the same law can be used to consolidate high school districts as now being proposed under the forty-four school district plan that was presented last week. Under this method, the people would have nothing to say in regard to school consolidation.

The Consolidation Bill for high schools has not made its appearance; however, it is my understanding that it will show up next week.

Other items of interest to North Idaho include dredge mining, log scaling, fire protection for our forests, and highway district consolidation. More on these items next week.—George F. Brocke, Sr., Rep. Dist. No. 5.

Slush and Mud This Week

Warm winds and gentle rain broke the icy grip of winter this week, and despite a last-gasp snow storm Sunday night in the higher areas, the weather appears to have taken a turn for the better. Temperatures climbed into the high thirties and mid-forties early this week, and Monday was the first night in months when the mercury failed to drop below freezing.

The good weather had an adverse effect on many of the roads in this area, especially those gravel ones which were more easily softened by the melting snow.

The precipitation falling in the Juliaetta-Kendrick region Sunday was in the form of rain, while the same storm dropped snow in Genesee and the higher elevations. Monday the snow turned to rain everywhere and continued to fall intermittently throughout the day and into the evening. The combination of melting snow and falling rain turned the snow pack on the ground to slush and made walking through either Juliaetta, Genesee or Kendrick, a foot-soaking experience. The country roads softened quickly and vehicles were soon cutting deep ruts in the muddy, gravel surfaces.

Marshall Bill White and Lloyd Nye helped matters considerably Tuesday afternoon as they were out with the city equipment removing some of the snow piles so the melting snow could more easily run into the gutters and storm sewer gratings at Kendrick.

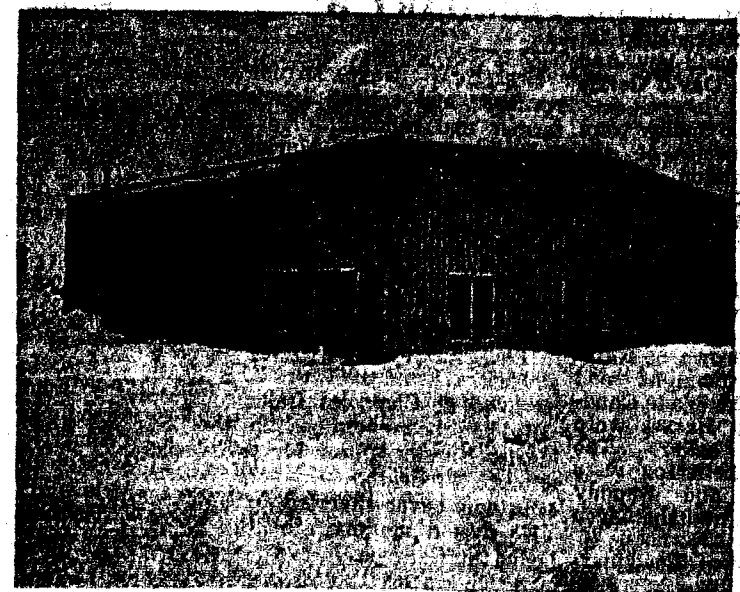

SS NEWS NOTES

Supplementary doctor bill insurance: Many of the elderly people in this area who have not yet signed up for the supplementary doctor bill insurance will be receiving application blanks in the mail soon. If they have any questions about how to fill them out or about Medicare itself, or if they do not receive a form, the people in the Lewiston Social Security Office will be glad to help them.

A new enrollment period opened January 1. D. Gene Shaw, District Manager, said, and will provide another chance for people who missed out earlier to sign up for the protection. For some—those who were born October 1, 1901, or earlier, and those who were enrolled but dropped out before January 1, 1967—it will be the last chance to enroll.

Older people who delay in enrolling

pay a premium that is 10 percent higher for each full year they could have had the medical insurance protection but were not enrolled. And those who wait 3 years past their first chance to sign up will not be able to get the coverage at all. He estimated that the period between now and March 31 will be the last chance to enroll for about two out of three persons 65 and over in the area who are not yet enrolled for the supplementary protection.

Anyone having any questions about any part of Medicare should get in touch with the Lewiston Social Security office. If they are unable to come to the social security office, they should make an inquiry by either telephoning Lewiston 743-9456 or inquiring by mail, Shaw said. The district office mailing address is P. O. Box 643, Lewiston, Idaho 83501. The street address is 726 21st Street.

Brown in 2 tbsp. fat, 1 clove garlic
Add 1 cup diced onion,

Simmer over low heat for 40 min.
Add:
1 cup finely diced carrots
1 cup finely diced potatoes

SNOW SURVEY

The February 1 snow survey was made by the Soil Conservation Service and the University of Idaho in cooperation with the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District.

Gary Morris, Chairman of the SWCD watershed committee, reported that on the lower snow courses there is about 3 times the normal ten year snow pack, while at the higher elevation it is about twice the ten year average. At the lower elevation where the snow can melt rapidly, there is an especially heavy snow pack. With accelerated runoff, the possibility of considerable out of bank flow exists.

Morris reported there is 43 inches of snow at the Howard Creek course.

Last year at this time there was only a trace, and the ten year average is 15.6 inches. East Twin, one of the higher courses has 63 inches of snow with 18 inches of water in the snow. The ten year average is 26.2 inches of snow and 8.4 inches of water.

Other snow courses measured include Sherwin, 8 miles northeast of Bovill, with 64 inches of snow, and Crummerine Creek with 52 inches.

The soil under the snow is almost filled to capacity, so if there is a rapid snow-melt, much of the water will run-off. At present the small streams are running clear, which indicates there is some slow melting taking place at the bottom of the snow pack.

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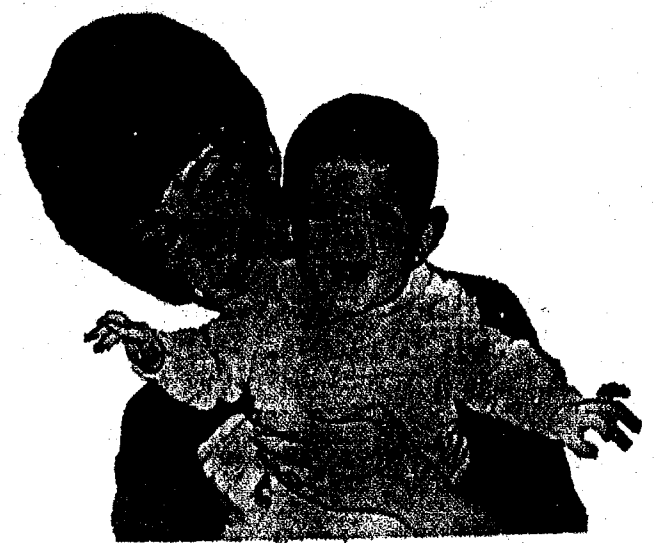

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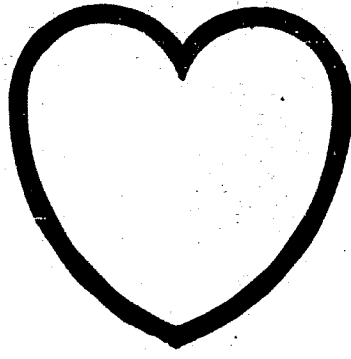

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DOGS AND GAME

Lewiston — Domestic dogs have been running and attacking big game animals in some portions of the Clearwater Region, according to Walter Berry, regional conservation officer of the Idaho Fish and Game department. Conservation officers have had problems with free running dogs in the Kooakia, Orofino and Moscow areas recently. Dog owners are advised to keep their animals tied up, particularly where their homes lie near big game winter range. The deep snows have caused big game to concentrate at lower elevations and closer to human habitation this year. Even though a dog may not catch and kill a big game animal it causes them to burn up badly needed energy. If an animal becomes weakened, he may not survive the winter.



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
