

made by the Soil Conservation Service and the University of Idaho in co-operation with the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District.

Gary Morris, Chairman of the SWCD watershed committee, reported that on the lower snow courses there is about 3 times the normal ten year snow pack, while at the higher elevation it is about twice the ten year average. At the lower elevation there is an especially heavy snow pack. With accelerated runoff, the possibility of considerable out of bank flow exists

Last year at this time there was only a trace, and the ten year average is The February 1 snow survey was 15.6 inches. East Twin, one of the higher courses has 63 inches of snow with 18 inches of water in the snow. The ten year average is 26.2 inches of snow and 8.4 inches of water.

> Other snow courses measured include Sherwin, 8 miles northeast of Bovill, with 64 inches of snow, and Crummerine Creek with 52 inches.






